Crewe man charged with theft and drugs offences

A man from Crewe has been charged with theft and drug possession offences.

Connor Scragg was arrested in the Nantwich Road area of Crewe at around 11.57am on Friday 5 June. Scragg, of Nantwich Road, Crewe, has since been charged with theft by finding. The 23-year-old has also been charged with possession of class B drugs (cannabis). He has been released on conditional bail to appear at Crewe Magistrates Court on Monday 3 August.

Crewe man jailed for violent behaviour towards his partner

A man from Crewe has been jailed for his repeated violent behaviour towards his partner.

Mark Watson from Frank Bott Avenue in Crewe appeared at Chester Crown Court on 1 June to be sentenced after pleading guilty to assault, intentional strangulation, and coercive and controlling behaviour. The 36-year-old was jailed for 30 months after admitting his sustained and violent actions towards the victim and his controlling behaviour. Over the course of their two-year relationship, he berated her, beat her, strangled her, and isolated her from her friends and family. He refused to let her socialise with him and he drilled the lock on the door to prevent her from being able to lock it.



PC Jamie Blyth said: *"The victim was terrified of Watson and had permanent injuries caused by him - some of which require ongoing monitoring and treatment at hospital. The violence stopped when Watson's mask slipped in front of the victim's dad. He began to realise that his daughter was hiding a terrifying secret. When she finally told him of the horrifying treatment she had been subjected to, he convinced to get help by going to the police. As a direct result Watson is now behind bars for his inexcusable and abhorrent actions. Dad was the hero here and a reminder to everyone that when they suspect something isn't right, ask questions if you can, and help them make that first step by getting them to call the police, or call us yourself. It's not interfering, its looking after others who can't find their way out of a nightmare."*

Seven teenagers arrested in connection to youth-related anti-social behaviour series

Officers working to tackle a number of ongoing incidents in Warrington town centre have arrested seven teenagers.

On Wednesday 3 June, over 20 neighbourhood officers from Warrington Local Policing Unit came together to conduct a day of action following numerous reports from residents and retail staff within the town centre relating to instances of violent and hate-related crime, shoplifting, burglary and road traffic offences.

In response to the concerns raised by residents, officers identified a group of teenagers whom they believed were linked to the series of incidents. With the suspects identified, the officers were then deployed across the town centre and successfully conducted a number of arrests, including:

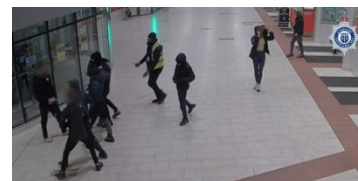


- A 13-year-old boy was arrested for offences including racially aggravated public order, affray, criminal damage, section 39 assault and threats to commit criminal damage
- A 14-year-old boy from the Bewsey and Whitecross area was arrested for offences including racially aggravated public order, racially aggravated assault, shoplifting, criminal damage, affray, burglary, s39 assault and threats to commit criminal damage
- A 15-year-old boy from the Fairfield and Howley area was arrested for offences including shoplifting, criminal damage, and racially aggravated assault
- A second 15-year-old boy from the Fairfield and Howley area was arrested for offences including affray, criminal damage and intentionally causing danger to road users
- A third 15-year-old boy from the Fairfield and Howley area was arrested for offences including intentionally causing danger to road users, affray, theft, s39 assault, criminal damage, burglary, racially aggravated assault and shoplifting
- A 15-year-old boy from the Poulton-with-Fearnhead area was arrested for offences including burglary, affray, criminal damage and racially aggravated assault
- A 16-year-old boy from the Poplars and Hulme area was arrested for offences including burglary, affray and criminal damage.

The teenagers, who cannot be named for legal reasons, have all been released on conditional bail.

Following the operation, Warrington Police Sergeant Anna Bell, said:

"Today's activity is the culmination of weeks of investigation into these offences, ensuring an appropriate response to concerns raised by the members of our Warrington town centre community. This operation also demonstrates our commitment to taking positive and robust action to deter young people from engaging in criminal behaviour and to protect those who live, work, and visit Warrington."



"I would also like to speak to the parents of the young people across Warrington and ask them to be aware of where their children are and what they are getting up to. It might appear that we are acting as the 'fun police', but despite their young ages, the teenagers we have arrested today are suspected of committing a number of serious crimes over a prolonged period – this is something that we cannot tolerate. Parents and guardians play a vital role in guiding their children's behaviour. In England and Wales, the age of criminal responsibility is 10 years old, meaning young people can be held accountable for their actions, and families must take responsibility to help prevent involvement in criminal activity and support positive choices."

"We want to be clear: If you come to Warrington Town Centre to commit crime, you will feel the full force of the law - regardless of your age."

Man handed Criminal Behaviour Order after shoplifting in Ellesmere Port

A man has been handed a three-year Criminal Behaviour Order following repeated shoplifting in Ellesmere Port.

Christopher Beaton, 39, appeared at Chester Magistrates' Court on Monday 1 June where he was handed a CBO for a period of three years. This comes following evidence secured by officers of repeated shoplifting in Ellesmere Port and intimidating behaviour towards retail staff. Under the terms of the order Beaton must not:

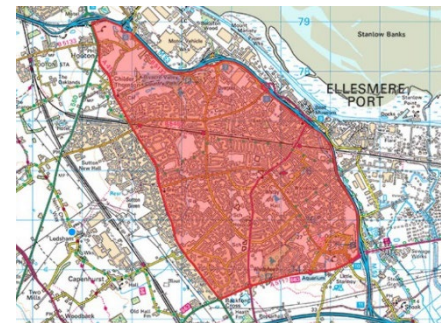
- Enter Ellesmere Port as defined by a mapped area
- Enter any retail premises in Ellesmere Port



He must:

- Leave any retail premises immediately, if staff or police request him to do so
- Engage with a nominated Alcohol and Drug Recovery and Wellbeing Service

Constable Lucy Hawkins: "Beaton is a prolific shoplifter, who has been responsible for persistent retail theft offences across Ellesmere Port for a number of years. He was also aggressive and intimidating towards retail staff, causing significant distress and concern within the local business community. This order aims to safeguard businesses, support staff, and reduce the impact of repeat offending in Ellesmere Port. If anyone witnesses Beaton breaching any of his terms, they should contact police on 101 or through our website to report it."



Man set to go on trial for non-recent sexual assault on a patient while a GP in Congleton

A 71-year-old man from Rainford is to go on trial for sexual assault.

Ninian Thomson from Randle Avenue, Rainford appeared at Crewe Magistrates on 9 March to face the charge of sexual assault. The charge relates to an incident involving a pregnant patient at Moody Street GP in 1990 where he was a doctor at the time. The practice no longer exists. He also worked in Staffordshire and Scotland as a GP. He will next appear at Chester Crown Court on 27 May 2027.

Over 40 knives recovered following vehicle stop

Officers who conducted a traffic stop near the M6 recovered a large quantity of zombie knives and other bladed weapons.

At around 11.40pm on Thursday 28 May, officers on patrol close to the M6 motorway stopped a red Volkswagen Polo after ANPR enquiries uncovered that the vehicle had been linked to weapons offences. Police stopped the car at junction 17 and found two occupants in the vehicle, a 19-year-old man and an 18-year-old woman, both from the Birmingham area.

In a subsequent search of the vehicle, several boxes were discovered which contained zombie style knives, knuckledusters and other bladed weapons. In total, more than 40 dangerous blades were found in the vehicle. The pair were both arrested on suspicion of possession of a bladed article in a public place and possessing offensive weapons for the purpose of sale. The 19-year-old man has

since been eliminated from the investigation, and the 18-year-old woman has been released on conditional bail.

Chief Inspector Joe McNally, Cheshire Constabulary's Knife Crime Lead, said:

"I'd like to thank the quick-thinking officers who were on patrol in the area at the time and acted on instinct to pull over the vehicle, leading to this alarming discovery. The Constabulary has recently just completed [Operation Sceptre](#), a weeklong national campaign that tackles knife crime in our areas through proactive policing operations and deployments and community engagement - during this week, our officers recovered over 250 weapons from across Cheshire. As a result of this stop, a further 40 blades, a combination of zombie knives, machetes and a knuckleduster, are now safely in our possession. These blades will soon be destroyed, permanently preventing possibility of them being used on our streets and falling into the wrong hands."



Man charged following reports of suspicious behaviour

A man has been charged following suspicious behaviour in Chester.

Ion Chelo, of Whipcord Lane, Chester, was arrested on Tuesday 2 June 2026. The 48-year-old has since been charged with using threatening/abusive words or behaviour to cause harassment/alarm/distress, and harassment without violence. Chelo appeared at Chester Magistrates' Court on Thursday 4 June 2026 and will now appear at Crewe Magistrates' Court on Monday 27 July 2026. The charges relate to reports of a man who appeared to be following women and girls in Chester between 6 May and 1 June 2026.

Warrington officers honoured by Humane Society following concern for safety rescue

Three officers from Warrington are set to be presented with Humane Society awards following a late-night river rescue.

On Sunday 30 November 2025, three Police Constables from Warrington were deployed to the Bridgefoot area after local CCTV operators had notified them that a woman appeared to be distressed and was moving close to the water. Upon attendance, the officers found that the woman had entered the river. Despite the darkening conditions, the temperature and the fast-flowing water, the officers bravely began rescue attempts.



Whilst attempting to rescue her using a throw line, the woman suddenly became submerged by the water. Without hesitation, Police Constable Alex Hill made the snap decision to enter the water and bring her back to dry land. After PC Hill successfully battled the current and brought the woman back to the riverbank, PCs Adam Keenan and Tom Pye assisted their colleague in administering emergency first aid. Following the rescue, the woman was taken to hospital. She has since made a full recovery.

The trio of heroic officers are now set to be honoured for their actions, with Police Constable Hill being awarded a certificate and Bronze Marine from the Medal Humane Society Awards and PCs Keenan and Pye being given certificates.

Northern Inspector Nick Bamber, who nominated the trio for the award, said: *“Whilst members of the public should always avoid conducting acts such as this themselves, always ensuring to contact emergency services first, PCs Pye, Hill and Keenan displayed exceptional courage, sound judgement under intense pressure, and an unwavering commitment to preserving life. Their actions represent the highest standards of policing and public service, and I am incredibly proud to have them serving the streets of north Cheshire. This outcome is unquestionably due to the professionalism, bravery and teamwork demonstrated by the officers who were deployed to the scene – their actions were, quite literally, lifesaving. I look to celebrating this team further when they receive their much-deserved awards”.*

Sceptre: Life-saving Bleed Control Kits rolled out to licenced premises across Cheshire East

Officers in Cheshire East have been given funding to purchase life-saving ambulance Bleed Control Kits that will be rolled out to pubs and bars across the area.

Between Monday 18 May and Sunday 24 May, [Cheshire Constabulary took part in Sceptre](#), a national campaign led by the National Police Chiefs’ Council focusing on tackling knife crime in our communities. Officers and community partners visited 38 schools and youth organisations across Cheshire, delivering educational inputs and demonstrations surrounding the dangers of knife crime and gang culture.



Knife sweeps across our town centres and parklands, community and public-facing engagements and deployments at our railway stations all took place over the course of the week of action. As well as this, residents were also given a number of opportunities to safely dispose of any knives into designated surrender points across the county. These efforts from officers from multiple departments across the county resulted in a total of 250 weapons being recovered.

In the run-up to Sceptre week, officers in the east of the county were provided funding by the Safer Cheshire East Partnership (SCEP) to purchase 45 life-saving Bleed Control Kits, which the public can use in incidents involving catastrophic bleeds. A number of these kits have since been rolled out to several licensed premises in Nantwich, Crewe, Macclesfield and Congleton as part of local Pub Watch schemes. Licensees were also provided with an in-person demonstration by an associate of the Daniel Baird Foundation, showing them how to use the kits should a life-threatening incident take place.



Eastern Crime Prevention Officer Victoria Moulton said: *“Knife crime is a key priority and Cheshire Police has an excellent history of partnership working, so we are very grateful to have received this funding from the Safer Cheshire East Partnership. This distribution of emergency kits to pubs and licensed premises across the east could be the difference in saving someone’s life. With a serious haemorrhage, it’s a grim fact that you can bleed to death in under five minutes – time literally does save lives and the quicker treatment begins, the better your chances of survival. The implementation of these life-saving kits is a welcome addition to a range of initiatives that we already have in place across our town, designed to keep everyone who lives, works and visits our communities in Cheshire East safe.”*

Crewe man charged with weapons offences following stop and search

Officers in Crewe have charged a man with weapons possession offences.

Jordan Hamlett was arrested in the West Street area of Crewe at around 7.45pm on Tuesday 2 June. The 28-year-old, of Smith Grove, Crewe, has since been charged with possession of a knife in a public place. Hamlett has been remanded in custody to appear at Chester Magistrates' Court on Thursday 4 June. The charges follow a stop and search conducted in the West Street area of Crewe on Tuesday 2 June.

Crewe dispersal order extended

A dispersal order currently in place in Crewe has now been extended for a further 48 hours.

Following the warrant at Webb House in May, officers have dealt with a number of protests outside the premises. While the vast majority of the protests have been peaceful, there have been a small number of isolated incidents which have resulted in arrests and minor disruption in the local area. To help provide reassurance to local residents, and prevent any disorder, officers have now extended a dispersal order which covers the local area. The order, which began at 10pm on Monday 1 June, will now run until 10pm on Friday 5 June.



The dispersal order, which is imposed under Section 35 of the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014, gives officers the power to direct individuals away from the area shown below for up to 48 hours if engaging or likely to engage in anti-social behaviour, crime or disorder. Anyone who fails to comply with the direction will face further police action.

Chief Inspector Matt Sanders, head of Crewe Local Policing Unit, said: *"Firstly, I would like to thank the local community for their support and patience over recent weeks. While we understand that everyone has the right to protest peacefully, it's also important to remember that residents also have the right to go about their daily business as normal. We know that the protests outside Webb House are likely to continue, however we would ask those attending to remain peaceful and respect the local community. Anyone who fails to do so will be dealt with by officers. We will continue to maintain an increased police presence in the local area, and I urge anyone with any concerns to speak to an officer."*

Officers are actively monitoring social media in order to minimise any disruption in the community.

Over 250 knives recovered following national week of action tackling knife crime

As part of a national campaign aiming to reduce the impact of knife crime in our Cheshire communities, over 250 knives and bladed articles have been recovered from across the county.

Sceptre (the campaign formerly known as "Operation Sceptre") is a national campaign led by the National Police Chiefs' Council focusing on tackling knife crime and bladed weapons-related offences in our communities. In Cheshire, the most recent figures have shown a 12% reduction in knife crime across the county, with the force working hard to ensure this downward trend continues.

Running from Monday 18 May to Sunday 24 May, this year's campaign saw a particular focus on children and young people. Officers and community partners visited 38 schools and youth organisations across Cheshire, delivering educational inputs and demonstrations surrounding the dangers of knife crime and gang culture. Officers also worked with the young people of Cheshire in conducting test purchase operations at 21 retailers across all nine Local Policing Unit areas, educating retailers on the correct laws and regulations that prevent blades falling into the wrong hands.



Proactive operations that ran over the week included knife sweeps across our town centres and parklands, more than 50 community meetings and public-facing engagements, and deployments at our railway stations, ensuring those travelling to, from and through Cheshire via train can do so safely. Residents were also given a number of opportunities to safely dispose of any knives, bladed weapons and knuckle dusters into designated surrender points across the county. These combined efforts from officers from multiple departments across the county resulted in a total of 250 weapons being recovered.

Chief Inspector Joe McNally, Cheshire Constabulary's Knife Crime Lead, said: *"Over the course of May's Sceptre week, we saw some great examples of community engagement and partner relationship building that will help us continue to push the message that Cheshire is a hostile environment for anyone who chooses to carry a weapon. We have been busy working with our partner organisations, including local councils, charities, third-sector organisations, young people and community groups, in conducting a number of activities such as knife sweeps, the delivery of safety demonstrations and the rolling out of knife arches and surrender bins in densely populated areas.*

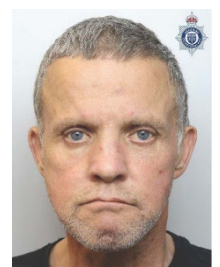
"Our officers have also been visiting the county's retailers along with colleagues from trading standards to conduct test purchase operations, ensuring that knives are not falling into the wrong hands. It was very reassuring to see that the majority of retailers are aware of the relevant rules and regulations surrounding the purchasing of what can be lethal weapons. When it comes to issues as serious as knife crime, it is so important that everyone feels that they can come forward to us with any concerns so we can take swift and immediate action and keep our communities safe."

Man jailed for 18 years for sexual offences against girls

A man has been jailed after admitting sexual offences against young girls dating back to 1989.

Ian Sutcliffe, of Dart Walk, Winsford, was sentenced to 18 years on Friday 29 May at Chester Crown Court. The 58-year-old had previously admitted unlawful sexual intercourse with a girl under 13 and gross indecency with a girl under 14 relating to one female victim in 1998. He had also pleaded guilty to two counts of indecent assault on a girl under 16 in relation to a second female victim between 1989 and 1994.

In April 2024, one of the victims reported the offences, which had taken place in Winsford, to police. She recalled that Sutcliffe had sexually assaulted and raped her when she was a child. A further woman reported that she had been sexually assaulted by Sutcliffe at around the same time when she was also a child. Following his arrest, Sutcliffe denied the offences during interview, but once charged, pleaded



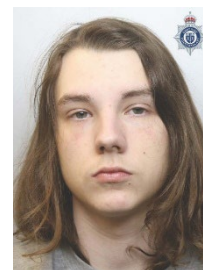
guilty at court. On top of his 18-year sentence, Sutcliffe is subject to restraining orders to protect the victims and must sign the Sex Offender Register indefinitely.

Detective Constable Jessica Small said: *"Firstly, I would like to recognise the courage shown by the victims in this case who have had to carry the weight of what happened to them on their shoulders for all these years. Sutcliffe has been handed a substantial custodial sentence for his wicked actions, and this is thanks to the bravery of the two victims in coming forward and speaking to police. I hope this case shows that it is never too late to report an offence and we will always investigate every report thoroughly. Teenager sentenced after raping girl in Crewe

A teenager has been sentenced to 10 years after raping a girl in Crewe.

Ryan Upton was handed the sentence during a hearing at Chester Crown Court on Tuesday 26 May. The 19-year-old, of Moorland Road, Sandbach, had pleaded guilty to rape and assault by penetration. Upton and the victim, a teenage girl, had been at an address in Crewe on the evening of 26 December 2024 when he had sexually assaulted her while she was asleep. Upton had also raped the victim, who fled from the address following the assault. She was found by a passer-by who helped her to call police.



Upton was arrested but denied the offences in interview; however forensic tests were conducted which provided a positive DNA hit for Upton. He was charged with the offences and admitted them in court. On top of his custodial sentence, Upton must sign the Sex Offender Register indefinitely and is subject to a restraining order to protect the victim in this case.

DC Sallis said: *"This lengthy custodial sentence reflects the severity of what Upton did – something which he ultimately had no choice but to admit due to the strength of the forensic evidence against him. We would like to commend the bravery of the victim in this case for reporting this offence and although she will never forget what happened, we hope the fact that Upton is behind bars will give her some closure. Two men charged following disorder in Crewe

Officers in Crewe have charged two people with violence and public order offences.

Daniel Tsimbilakis and Jordan Kennerley were arrested on Sunday 31 May in the Victoria Avenue area of Crewe. Tsimbilakis, 34, of Barony Road, Nantwich, has since been charged with public order offences, namely using threatening behaviour or words to cause alarm or distress. Kennerley, 42, of Badger Avenue, Crewe, has been charged with using violence to secure entry to a premises. Both men have been conditionally bailed to appear at Crewe Magistrates' Court on Tuesday 23 June. The charges relate to an incident in the Victoria Avenue area of Crewe on Sunday 31 May.

Staffordshire woman charged with attempted murder

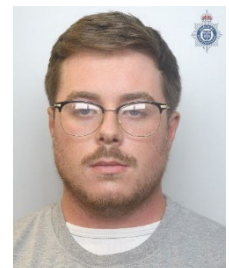
A woman from Staffordshire has been charged with attempted murder following an incident in Alsager.

Katy Fryer was arrested on Saturday 30 May. The 45-year-old, of Albany Road, Newcastle-Under-Lyme, has since been charged with attempted murder. Fryer has been remanded in custody and is set to appear at Warrington Crown Court on Monday 1 June. The charges relate to an incident that occurred in the Crewe Road area of Alsager.

Man jailed for sexually assaulting multiple women across Cheshire and Manchester

A sexual predator who targeted women while they shopped in Cheshire and Greater Manchester has been jailed.

William Kidd appeared at Manchester Crown Court on Friday 29 May where he was sentenced to four years, and is now subject to a Sexual Harm Prevention Order which remains in place indefinitely. The 27-year-old of Stanbank Street, Stockport, had earlier pleaded guilty to 11 counts of sexual assault on a female, two counts of voyeurism, eight counts of recording an image under clothing to observe another without consent, and possession of cannabis.

The case against Kidd involves five incidents that took place between May and September 2025. Following an investigation by Cheshire Police, supported by Greater Manchester Police, detectives found that Kidd targeted women while they shopped, discreetly following them through store aisles. He visited stores in Macclesfield, Handforth and Stanley Green in Cheshire, as well as Denton and Stockport in Greater Manchester. On four occasions, CCTV footage showed Kidd spraying the victims with a substance from a bottle he was carrying as he stalked them. He aimed at the women's hair or backs, and the victims were often unaware of what had happened. Forensic analysis later confirmed the substance was Kidd's semen. On a fifth occasion, Kidd followed a woman through a store and secretly filmed her on his mobile phone while she shopped with her five-year-old daughter.

Kidd was identified following a Cheshire Police CCTV appeal, and he was subsequently arrested in October 2025. He was found to be in possession of a quantity of cannabis at the time of his arrest. A review of his mobile phone uncovered further footage, including a video of Kidd following a woman pushing a small child in a shopping trolley while he filmed up her skirt. The woman appears to be completely unaware of his presence. Kidd was charged and later pleaded guilty to the offences put to him.

Following the sentencing, Detective Constable Tiffany Berry-Perkin said: *"Firstly, I would like to commend the victims in this case for the strength and bravery they have shown throughout this investigation. It is thanks to their continued support that our team was able to gather an overwhelming body of evidence against Kidd, leaving him with no option but to plead guilty. Kidd deliberately targeted innocent women as they went about their everyday lives, entirely unaware of the depraved acts he was committing against them. His behaviour is completely unacceptable, and I*

welcome the fact that he is now being held accountable behind bars, where he can no longer pose a danger to women in our communities.”

Detective Sergeant Steven Kaminski said: *“This case is an excellent example of neighbouring forces working together to identify and apprehend offenders who target women and girls. Kidd was fully aware that what he was doing was wrong. He knew his actions would cause his victims extreme distress, yet he chose to continue, deliberately travelling to multiple stores across two counties with the intention of violating and ultimately sexually assaulting innocent women. Putting an end to violence against women and girls remains a top priority for the force, and we will continue to remove sexual predators like Kidd from Cheshire and ensure they see justice. “We treat all allegations of sexual offences extremely seriously, and any allegation will be thoroughly investigated, with the wishes and needs of the victim as our main priority. “Victims should never feel ashamed of what has been done to them. Anyone who comes forward will be met with compassion, respect, and specialist support from our officers, alongside partner support agencies. All victims of sexual offences are entitled to anonymity, and we are committed to ensuring they receive the help and protection they deserve.”*

Appeal to trace man following serious assault in Runcorn

Detectives are appealing to the public to help trace a man wanted in relation to a serious assault in Runcorn.

Shortly after 3pm on Sunday 31 May, police were called to reports of a disturbance at Halton Park off Stockham Lane, Runcorn. Officers attended and found that a 19-year-old man had been assaulted and sustained serious facial injuries. The man was taken to hospital and has since been discharged. Enquiries in relation to incident have been ongoing and as part of the investigation are now appealing to trace a man they are keen to speak to. Kian Tipton resides in the Runcorn area, he is described as white, of slim build and around 5’ 4” tall. The 21-year-old has blue eyes and blonde hair.

CCTV images released following exposure in Congleton

Officers have released CCTV images of a man they would like to speak to following reports of exposure in Congleton.

Between 4.45pm and 5.10pm on Wednesday 27 May, a woman had been sat in a playing field in Back Lane, Congleton, when a man exposed himself in front of her. The woman then left the scene. The suspect is described as in his 20s or 30s, around 5’ 10” tall, of a medium build, and was wearing

a black baseball cap, a dark-coloured short sleeved t-shirt, trousers and carrying a dark grey backpack. The suspect was also riding a black mountain bike.

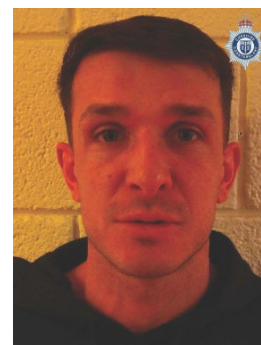
DC Doug Whitfield said: *"This incident understandably left the victim shaken and we are doing all we can to trace the man responsible. Enquiries have been carried out since the incident was reported, and we have now released CCTV images of a man we would like to speak to. Appeal for information after man absconds from prison in Warrington
