Spay Neuter Clinic held in Mountain Pine The first of six scheduled for 2025

At the Mountain Pine clinic on Feb. 7 & 8, 68 animals were sterilized and received vaccines. Thanks to Petco for providing free vaccines for the animals, and special thanks to our wonderful vet, Dr. Paula, vet techs Hailey and Abby, the Bissell Pet Foundation, and to all of our hardworking volunteers. The Bissell Fix the Future program has fixed 110,000 cats and dogs since the program launched a year ago.

Guest Relations Volunteers - The "Face" of the AWL



Fielding calls about stray or lost animals; how the adoption or surrendering processes work; animals that need medical attention or what to do if animals are brought directly to the AWL - these are just a few of the situations discussed in a meeting specifically for the Guest Relations team on January 29th. The Guest Relations volunteers greet all the guests who come to the Adoption Center, answer the phone, and serve as the lead to show our cats and dogs to potential adopters. The primary duty of Guest Relations is to "funnel all requests we get to the appropriate person," according to Melanie Marshall, Volunteer Liaison and BOD member. Melanie stressed how communication is the key, and how important it is to handle situations correctly. To ensure consistency among the group, a Guest Relations manual is updated regularly.

AWL Members attend Best Friends Animal Society's "Bring No-Kill Home to Arkansas" Summit in Little Rock



On February 1st, AWL BOD members (from left) Jennifer Hurd, Susan Senogles, President Beverly Fitzpatrick, and Laura Allworth participated in the summit to learn how we can help make Arkansas the first "no-kill" southern state and ban dog breed specific legislation. Workshops were also held to build lifesaving support and networking strategies with other no-kill shelters. Currently, more than half of the total shelters in Arkansas have reached no-kill, including the HSV Animal Welfare League. Note: The AWL achieved a save rate of 94.5% in 2024; well above the 90% save rate needed to be considered a no-kill shelter.

On average, the Awl expense to vet each cat prior to adoption is \$183; and the average cost to vet each dog prior to adoption is \$233.


