Rescue Report

MuttNation Grant!

AWL received a grant without even applying for it! MuttNation Foundation, a nonprofit founded by Miranda Lambert and her mother, supports rescues and sent AWL a check for \$3,000!

MuttNation Foundation has awarded \$150,000 in grants to 50 shelters around the country for their Mutts Across America campaign! Each organization was carefully vetted and chosen for the outstanding care they provide and their heart for animals. Since Mutts Across America started in 2015, donors have helped them award over \$750,000 in grants to more than 250 shelters.

Only one in each state each year will win, and here are the criteria:

High Adoption Rate; High Volunteerism; Fiscal Responsibility; High Activity/ Fundraising; Specialty; Community Presence; Website & Social Media Presence; Advocacy.

2019 Statistics on Website

Lots of Life-Saving Success:

219 Cats and kittens that came into our care.

229 Cats and kittens that went to loving homes (a small number were transferred to other rescues or sanctuary).

188 Dogs and puppies that came into our care.

183 Dogs and puppies that went to loving homes (some were transferred to other no-kill rescues or sanctuaries).

96.5% Live release rate (save rate) = number of animals that went to loving homes plus animals on hand at the end of the year divided by those on hand at the beginning of the year plus those taken in. We take in some very vulnerable and sick animals; therefore, some do die in our care in spite of quality care and some must be humanely euthanized to end suffering.

Emergency Veterinary assistance provided to animals owned by families within the community: 95 dogs and 22 cats.

42 Amazing Facts About Dogs

Here are a few:

DOGS LICK PEOPLE AND OTHER DOGS FOR A VARIETY OF REASONS.

Puppies will lick their mothers or owners as a sign of affection or to indicate that they're hungry. As adults, licking becomes a sign of submission to an authority figure. So if your dog licks you, they're probably trying to let you know that they want something—probably food and/or attention.

LICKING ALSO MAKES DOGS FEEL BETTER.

Licking your face releases endorphins that calm and relieve your dog's stress. But if a dog is constantly licking itself, they might be bored or have a skin problem you need to have checked out by a vet.

DOGS UNDERSTAND THE POWER OF "PUPPY EYES."

According to a study from 2017, dogs raise their eyebrows (to make "puppy eyes") and make other dramatic facial expressions when they know humans are watching. Shelter dogs have learned this trick, too; pups who employ the puppy eyes trick tend to get adopted more quickly than dogs that show other behaviors, like wagging their tails.

DOGS IMPROVE YOUR ATTITUDE.

That feeling of happiness you get while watching a bunch of puppies fall all over each other is genuine. Studies have found that spending time with dogs, especially in high-stress situations, can ease tension in humans. They can also lower your blood pressure (and they like going on walks, which helps you, too).

DOGS KNOW HOW YOU FEEL.

Dogs can read your mood. A 2016 study from the universities of Lincoln and Sao Paolo found that dogs can read and respond to the emotions on human faces, even in photographs.

DOGS HAVE AN AMAZING SENSE OF SMELL.

A dog can smell anywhere from 10,000 to 100,000 times better than the average human. Canines have 300 million olfactory receptors, compared to our measly 6 million. Moreover, the part of the brain dedicated to smell is 40 times larger in dogs than in humans.

Cat Toy & Behavior Problems

Now that laser pointer toys have been around a while, veterinary behaviorists are learning that like dogs, kitties can also develop behavior disorders as a result of chasing, but never catching, those little red dots (problem first identified in dogs).

Some cats develop a compulsion to chase anything resembling a laser light; eventually, they spend most of their waking hours engaged in the behavior to the point that it becomes a quality of life issue.

One way to use a laser pointer safely with your cat is to incorporate clicker training and treats into play sessions.

There are also lots of great alternatives to laser toys to ensure your kitty gets daily exercise.

AWL will be there to spread information about Finding Rover, as well as our multiple impressive life-saving


Petco Foundation Support

Why Register My Dog with the POA?

All dogs physically housed or boarded for more than 30 days in Hot Springs Village are required to be registered with the HSVPOA. The registration fees go to the Animal Control budget which funds the shelter for the POA responsibilities, such as Animal Control Officers' pay, utilities, etc. These funds do not lessen the funding that AWL provides, such as all veterinary care, food, and litter. AWL continues to finance those parts of what is POA responsibility in accordance with our agreement to use part of the building for adoptions and housing.

Champions

AWL's program for a sustaining pledge is the "Champions." These committed folks contribute a small \$10 a month as sustaining members. Each month we have a 50/50 raffle, with a cap payout of \$500. **Champions proceeds to date are \$34,305.00**.
