Update on the Adoption Center

The adoption center remains closed to the public but the volunteers are in the center caring for the animals while maintaining social distance and wearing masks. Adoptions for the cats and dogs remain by appointment and are doing well!

Kitten season is upon us and we have set up reservations for them to be adopted when they are old enough! The potential adopter fills out an on-line application then **Jill Jones or Nancy Jones** calls them and they are sent pictures of the kittens.

AWL adopted out 10 dogs and 26 cats in May, along with the HUG transfer of 7 dogs to new homes outside the Village. Kudos to **Nancy Jones, Jill Jones, & Shelley Shepherd** for their tireless efforts to adopt out these lovable pets.

Susan Luse, a retired nurse and AWL's liaison with our vets, is now having Tuesday Vet Days at the shelter. One of our Waggin' Wheel vets comes there to perform basic intake on numerous dogs and cats. This greatly facilitates the entry of strays into our adoption process since they are checked, treated, and sterilized so they are ready for a new home!

Thanks to Claire Jones for Her Dedicated Animal Care

Claire, our longest serving Animal Control Officer, is known for her love of the animals that come into the shelter. She has become well respected and loved by our volunteers, as well as the Village community.

Claire submitted her letter of resignation to the POA and will be taking another position outside of the Village. Though we are all sad to see her go, we are happy that the move will give her an opportunity to advance. On Wednesday, June 17th, AWL hosted a going away celebration at the Adoption Center with individual cupcakes and many congratulations.

Claire's last workday is Saturday, June 20th, and Salena will be working alone. However, our volunteers step up to help with the duties.

Non-Monetary Donations

AWL exists because of the generosity of our members and others in the community. Please review this list of the non-monetary donations we can or cannot accept (AWL always welcomes monetary donations!).

What We Can Accept:

towels, wash cloths, hand towels

bath mats or throw rugs (rubber backing ones are given to Spay and Neuter to use)

bedding in good condition (can be used at No Fleas flea market)

folding small, medium, large crates plastic crates

dog/cat food or treats- open or unopened

any animal medication that is labeled with type of medication and not expired

toys in good condition

collars, harnesses, leashes

decorator pillows (can be used at No Fleas flea market)

<u>What We Cannot Accept:</u> any crate that does not fold crates that are X-large carpeted cat climbers (unless new) human pillows blankets with stuffing quilts

We have very limited storage so if the item(s) is a household item that can be used at the No Fleas flea market and hope you can hold on to it until we have the next flea market. There is a sign in the office on the wall that lists most of the items we cannot accept, too.

How to Avoid Stressing Out Your Dog

1. Don't punish him/her for being a dog — Your canine BFF is a creature of opportunity, and when you give her opportunities to "misbehave" by leaving irresistible items within her reach, she'll take advantage.

2. Don't tell him/her "no" without offering an alternative — If your dog is doing something he shouldn't, telling him "no" will probably cause him to stop the behavior temporarily. But saying no to a dog without offering an alternative turns your "no" into a mere interruption, not a request or command.

3. Don't use different words for the same command — Train your dog to respond to simple, preferably single-word commands (sit, stay, come, down, pee, poop, etc.) and then use those words, and only those words, to communicate.

4. Don't say the words "it's okay" to your dog — Many dog guardians tend to say this phrase to their pet when something decidedly not okay is about to happen. For example, you're driving your dog to the groomer, which is a place he loathes. You've driven him there often enough that as always, he starts to whine.

5. Don't pull him/her along by her leash — Dogs who've been properly trained to walk on a leash don't typically do a lot of pulling, so if you feel the need to constantly yank the leash to redirect your pup, it's probably time to refresh her leash manners. Be understanding and tolerant and allow your furry friend a reasonable amount of time to sniff outdoor territory and pick up pee-mail without yanking. 6. Don't restrain him/her while you hug or kiss him — Canines really don't get these human expressions of affection and can be confused by them — especially when the hugger or kisser is a stranger.

7. Don't stare at him/her — Most people are uncomfortable being stared at by other people, so it's easy to imagine how unsettling it might be for your dog. The canine species views staring as a confrontational signal, which naturally triggers a stress response.

8. Don't point or shake your finger at your dog — The finger pointing/shaking thing is a universal stress inducer for dogs (and many humans).

9. Don't use the phrase "get down" when he/she jumps up — Train your pet to stop jumping with the verbal command "off" or "paws on floor" instead.

10. Don't wake up your dog — Unless there's a pressing reason to awaken your four-legged family member from a nice snooze, try to avoid it.

Why Register My Dog with the POA?

All dogs physically housed or boarded for more than 30 days in Hot Springs Village are required to be registered with the HSVPOA. The registration fees go to the Animal Control budget which funds the shelter for the POA responsibilities, such as Animal Control Officers' pay, utilities, etc. These funds do not lessen the funding that AWL provides, such as all veterinary care, food, and litter. AWL continues to finance those parts of what is POA responsibility in accordance with our agreement to use part of the building for adoptions and housing.

Champions
