Annual Meeting Contingency Plans

Because of the restrictions on inperson gatherings, the BOD is developing contingency plans to conduct the annual meeting and vote for directors and officers.

All members will receive detailed information in a separate email, and if they don't have an email, they will receive it via USPS.

The Bylaws require an annual meeting at a time the BOD announces to do two things:

- To provide a summary of activities and financial information for the past year.
- 2. To allow members in good standing to vote for directors and officers.

The Bylaws do not state that a "meeting" must be in-person, so the BOD is making plans that will allow the members to receive the summary information and cast ballots without endangering anyone with exposure to infections.

Peaches is just a year old and became a sweetheart.






She found a happy home with **Sunshine** until

Fun Facts About Cats & Dogs

Dogs and almost all other quadrupeds walk differently from all felines. You have seen your cat move stealthily, smoothly, and have been amazed at the grace she displays.

Cats are capable of walking very precisely because, like all felines including big cats, they directly register; that is, they place each hind paw (almost) directly in the print of the corresponding fore paw, minimizing noise and visible tracks. That's right fore, right rear, then left fore and left rear. This also provides sure footing for their hind paws when they navigate rough terrain.

So, they leave usually only two prints, not the four of a quadruped, good for disguise. Yet it is scientifically energy-inefficient, leading to need for food and sleep. It is also how they maneuver through obstacles without knocking them over (unless they want to knock something off the table).

Here's a video of direct register.

Dogs, horses, and other four-legged friends often walk with both feet on each side, but they do not directly register. Also, they first move their rear foot, and then the front foot. So, it's right rear, right front, left rear, left front. Scientists say it is a more energy efficient method, allowing them to cover greater distances than the cats who are stalking. Here's a video of normal dog gaits.

Why Register My Dog with the POA?

All dogs physically housed or boarded for more than 30 days in Hot Springs Village are required to be registered with the HSVPOA. The registration fees go to the Animal Control budget which funds the shelter for the POA responsibilities, such as Animal Control Officers' pay, utilities, etc. These funds do not lessen the funding that AWL provides, such as all veterinary care, food, and litter. AWL continues to finance those parts of what is POA responsibility in accordance with our agreement to use part of the building for adoptions and housing.

Champions

AWL's program for a sustaining pledge is the "Champions." These committed folks contribute a small \$10 a month as sustaining members. Each month we have a 50/50 raffle, with a cap payout of \$500. **Champions AWL proceeds to date are \$38,095.00.**
