Importance of Taking Photos of Your Pets

What if your beloved pet gets lost? A good photo is more identifiable that a wordy description. You need to show this: A head shot, side view, and a 3/4 view or full body view, but avoid including other pets or humans --just the subject animal. You should do this for all pets in the household, even indoor-only cats. It doesn't have to be a professional portrait, but just something that shows the animal and markings well.

AWL offers its Lily Alert to Villagers and others nearby, in which we email an alert to hundreds of residents, so please heed this request to take photos. Information about all vou can do about lost or found pets in HSV is on the AWL website here.

Also, AWL encourages all pet owners to register all pets with Finding Rover to impact a broader audience. **Finding Rover** (and Fluffy, too!) is a FREE service that uses patented facial recognition of your pet to identify a stray/found pet that you have lost and help you reunite with it.

Soon every dog and cat that enters the AWL shelter system becomes registered on Finding Rover. Users of Finding Rover can search the shelter and surrounding areas right from their smartphone or computer in efforts to find their missing pet, a neighbor's missing pet, the family of a found pet, or search for adoptable pets.

Registration of your pet is FREE. Just go to www.FindingRover.com and:

Upload your pet's photo

Enter a few details about your pet

Enter your name, email address, and zip code

It's that simple, and AWL hopes this, in addition to our Lily Alerts, will help reunite lost cats and dogs with their families. AWL and the POA Animal Control work hard to try to identify and reunited stray and lost pets with their families, and clear photos help tremendously!

Tracking Collars, too!

One of our members has suggested that Villagers research GPS tracking collars after having seen so many lost pets in HSV. You will find a number of tracking collars out there with various reviews. He states that he has had NO incidents of collar failure since they received the collar. He writes, "The collars are not foolproof but the peace of mind certainly helps reduce the anxiety of losing your animal in the jungles of HSV." Besides microchipping and photographing, consider this.

Feline-Friendly Houseplants

Indoor cats love to nibble on plants, and some are healthy for them, but some are toxic and can be deadly.

Some cat-safe air purifying plants include these: Areca Palm, Lemon Balm, Bamboo, Old Man Cactus Basil, Painted Lady, Boston Fern, Reed Palm, Cilantro, Rosemary, Dill, Sage, Dwarf Date Palm, Shrimp Cactus, Friendship Plant, Spider Plant (Spider Ivy), Hens and Chicks, Venus Flytrap, Lady Palm, Zebra Haworthia.

Here are some toxic to cats:

- 1. Plants from the Araceae family -1. These include the philodendron, pothos, peace lily, calla lily, dumb cane, arrowhead vine, mother-in-law's tongue, sweetheart vine, devil's ivy, umbrella plant, and ele-phant ear.
- 2. English shamrock, rhubarb (leaves), and tropical star fruit —
- Kalanchoe Kalanchoe plants are absolutely beautiful but unfortunately, they're also absolutely deadly if your cat nibbles on one because they contain cardiac glycosides.
- Corn plant/dragon tree Corn plants contain saponins, which are anti-nutrients that interfere with absorption of essential nutrients.
- 5. Spring flowers Certain spring bulbs, including daffodils, hyacinth, and tulips.



Dogs on Slippery Surfaces

Many of us have hard floors, and the older our dogs get, the harder it is for them to get traction. Here are some quotes from an article (<u>Here</u>) by a vet with a new product that might help:

For traction, a dog uses their nails, and it's like soccer cleats digging into the earth.

But of course, hard nails can't grab hard floors. And so, it's the simplest thing, it's just these little bands of a custom engineered rubber material that we ... apply onto the distal, the very ending, of the toenail, so it's not in contact with soft tissue or skin or anything like that.

The dogs really don't even notice them because there's not any innervation that they're directly touching. And they allow the dog to use that natural biomechanics of grabbing with the nails.

The product that Dr. Karen Becker recommends is <u>Dr. Buzby's Toe</u> <u>Grips</u>. You can find the information <u>here</u> if you are interested.

NOTE: AWL is <u>not recom-</u> <u>mending</u> this product, as no one has tested or evaluated it. If you decide to purchase it, you do so at your own risk.

Why Register My Dog with the POA?

All dogs physically housed or boarded for more than 30 days in Hot Springs Village are required to be registered with the HSVPOA. The registration fees go to the Animal Control budget which funds the shelter for the POA responsibilities, such as Animal Control Officers' pay, utilities, etc. These funds do not lessen the funding that AWL provides, such as all veterinary care, food, and litter. AWL continues to finance those parts of what is POA responsibility in accordance with our agreement to use part of the building for adoptions and housing.

Champions

AWL's program for a sustaining pledge is the "Champions." These committed folks contribute a small \$10 a month as sustaining members. Each month we have a 50/50 raffle, with a cap payout of \$500. **Champions AWL proceeds to date are \$39,995.00**.
