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## AWL'S Spay/Neuter Program Celebrates 15 Years & 8,276 Sterilizations

It was still dark at 6 am on March 28th when volunteer Chad Schaefer drove his personal truck hitched with the AWL trailer to Crows Fire Station. The fire department moved its trucks out, the trailer backed in, and volunteers spent the next 45 minutes unloading its contents - crates, pet carriers, towels, heaters, paper towels, food and other supplies - in preparation for a two day spay/neuter clinic.

Less than 48 hours later, a total of 80 animals were sterilized - 41 cats and 39 dogs - thanks to AWL partner Dr. Joanna McManus, D.V.M., of the Ozark Mountain Mobile S/N, two of her veterinary technicians, and up to 25 AWL volunteers who tirelessly helped each day under the expert guidance of Angela Nickols. The team of volunteers handled the intake paperwork (pre-registration was required), helped move the animals and cleaned cages, monitored the animals post-op, and called the pet owners when the animals were ready to be picked up. The animals' progress was closely tracked on two large boards indicating which stage they were in - intake, surgery, recovery, and release. The clinic didn't end until the last animal was released around 6 pm. Fatigued but happy, the team went home knowing they helped save many lives, and many of them would do it all over again the next day. (cont'd page 2)

### Spay / Neuter Program (cont'd)

Spay/Neuter Vouchers - Serving the Community Throughout the Year While the S/N clinics serve a very important community need, they occur only four times a year in four different locations. To continually serve spay/neuter needs, the AWL offers a low cost voucher program through our partner veterinarians, Kelly Veterinary Clinic and Waggin' Wheel Vet Clinic. Over 63% (598 of the 938 animals) that were spayed or neutered in 2021 used the AWL voucher program. The popular program is monitored by Angela Nickols, Nancy Jones, Chari Larimore, and Julia Pires maintains the financial records.

#### How the Spay/Neuter Program Began

In the fall of 2007, AWL Board Member Angela Nickols, realizing the importance of spaying and neutering animals, wanted to help set up a program. Angela explains:

"If we are going to have no-kill, the root to getting there is spay/neuter, and preventing the overpopulaton of unwanted animals is also part of the AWL mission statement."

With the board's approval, Angela promptly set up a 10 member committee and in that first year, three S/N clinics were held. In the ensuing years, Angela says "the AWL has built a definite presence in the community, and that our best advertising has been word of mouth." The S/N Program is able to operate because of grants, donations, volunteers, and the payment amount that pet owners can contribute to the spay/neuter cost. Reflecting on the past 15 years, Angela is especially grateful to the committee members who have volunteered since the program began: Wally Johnson, Nancy Jones, Chari Larimore, Mary McCullough, Mary O'Neill, Jackie Morris, and Judy Sierocuk. She is amazed by all of the volunteers' continual commitment and their exceptional teamwork. Angela is confident that "the program will continue as long as we have funds, our wonderful volunteers, and the support of the community and the AWL Board of Directors." # Importance of Spaying and Neutering

As an animal rescue, the AWL is required by Arkansas law to spay and neuter all cats and dogs

before adoption, unless that animal is less than 3 months old or not healthy enough for the procedure. Besides a longer life expectancy\* and controlling overpopulation, there are numerous health benefits from spaying and neutering, including a much lower rate of developing mammary and testicular cancers, as well as pyometra, a life-threatening uterine infection found in unspayed female dogs and cats.

By spaying and neutering just one male and one female DOG, more than 67,000 unwanted births can be prevented in just 6 years!

By spaying and neutering just one male and one female CAT, more than 2,072,514 unwanted births can be prevented in just 8 years!

\*The life expectancy of a neutered male dog is 13.8% longer. For spayed females, it's even longer -26.3%. On average, the procedure adds over a year to the animal's life. Dogs without it live about 7.9 years, whereas spayed and neutered ones live 9.4 years.

The numbers are even more drastic for cats. Spayed females have a 39% longer lifespan, and neutered males -62%.

# From a Wheelbarrow to Welcoming Homes - Truly a Team Effort

A caregiver notified the AWL, and Nancy Jones, one of AWL's Cat Adoption Coordinators, contacted Animal Care Officer Sean Sprague. As it was Sean's first experience rescuing a mama and her babies, Nancy provided guidance on how to safely catch them all. Sean promptly captured the kittens and set a trap for mom. Soon mama (named Sprite) and her kittens were reunited and taken to Cheryl Schaefer's foster home. Sprite was a very nurturing mama, and once the kittens were weaned, spayed and neutered, were all quickly adopted. Since Sprite had been a stray cat, foster mom Sharon Zaigler spent time socializing her so she could also be adopted. Around the same time, Jill Jones, AWL's other Cat Adoption Coordinator, was contacted by a gentleman looking for a "working cat" aka a mouser, for a large indoor space. Jill immediately thought of Sprite.
