Celebrate the Holidays Safely with your Pets

The holidays are certainly a time to celebrate with family and friends, including our cats and dogs. However, they also bring potential dangers for our pets but with a little effort, you can keep them safe.

PLANTS - Poinsettias, lilies, holly berries and mistletoe are all problematic to dogs and cats. Of all of these festive plants, lilies are the most toxic and are potentially fatal if ingested. The leaves and berries of holly and mistletoe plants, even the dried plants, should be kept well out of your pet's reach, or better yet, kept out of the home altogether. Daffodils are also toxic to both dogs and cats. The bulbs are the most toxic; even a few bites of the flower can cause kidney failure. Symptoms of illness from ingesting these plants include intestinal upset, vomiting and diarrhea, and abdominal pain. FOODS

Some of the most toxic food for pets include onions & garlic, raw eggs & meat, chocolate, alcohol, nuts, grapes and raisins. Avoid feeding your pets table scraps, especially around the holidays, as these may contain potentially toxic ingredients.

In Memoriam - Connie J. Mills Forever Friend to the AWL Felines!

We were very saddened to learn of the recent passing of Connie Mills, an amazing volunteer who was so instrumental in saving the lives of cats in the Village and getting them adopted. Connie (pictured with her husband Dave), worked very closely with good friend, Nancy Jones, in starting the TNR (trap, neuter and release) program in 2009. At that time, the AWLwas not a no-kill shelter, and only had room for 5 cats. Needing more space, Nancy and Connie began to house adoptable cats in their garages and living rooms. As a result, they adopted out 51 cats in 2010, and in 2011, that number more than doubled. Shortly thereafter, the shelter became no-kill, was renovated, and a dedicated cat room was created.

"Connie and I worked as one. We went to Petco to do adoptions. We cleaned cages, fed the cats, and gave medicine daily. Generally, we each devoted between 2-4 hours a day, 7 days a week, to care for the cats. Without Connie, none of the cat rescues could have been done."

We are very grateful to Connie and Nancy for their passion to protect our felines, and for expanding the cat care programs we follow today. Connie would be pleased to know that so far in 2022, more than 200 cats have found loving homes. Below are some lucky cats and kittens adopted in December with their new families!
