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AWL's HUG Program Saving Lives by Helping Us Go!

The AWL works very hard to match our homeless pets with the perfect families in 2021 alone, 248 cats and 96 dogs found their forever homes. Although in many cases, adopters are not available within local communities, and that's when our HUG, or Help Us Go program, helps save even more lives. Because of HUG, last year an additional 65 dogs were transferred to our no-kill, partner rescues. Shelley Shepherd, AWL's Dog Adoption Coordinator, explains:

"More than 80% of the dogs that are transferred to other rescues already have adopters before they leave the AWL, and the majority of them are larger sized dogs that are harder to adopt locally. HUG is their fastest way to a new home."

It's a win-win situation. As more of these in-demand dogs are transferred to other rescues (typically in northern states) where new adopters anxiously wait, it frees up space at the AWL so we can vet and care for other dogs left behind

that are more popular with adopters in the south.

Setting the Wheels in Motion

Although very successful, the HUG program requires a lot of community cooperation, committed volunteers, and financial assistance. But the payoff is well worth it. In January, Shelley was contacted by a dog foster parent about a large number of beagles that desperately needed help or they would be confiscated by a municipal shelter with the possibility of being euthanized. Their owner could no longer afford to maintain them, and because they had not been sterilized, within a year there were 25 beagles that needed homes. Could the AWL help? Fortunately, we were able to help due to an incredible effort from AWL volunteers and the generosity of the Ryan Lund Memorial Fund.* Since Ryan's parents wanted the funds to make a difference in the lives of animals, the expenses were paid for from his Memorial Fund. It was definitely a team effort. Sue Luse coordinated the beagles' medical care, and volunteers Julie Keck and David Sparks took the dogs to Waggin' Wheel for vetting, and Shelley contacted Border Tails Rescue, a no-kill rescue, to see if they could assist. Fortunately, Border Tails Rescue, who has had a partnership with the AWL for several years, was able to take all 25 dogs. (continued on page 2)

Help Us Go (cont'd)

Since Border Tails is located in northern Illinois, everyone agreed to meet in St. Louis to transfer the beagles. On the appointed day at 7:30 am, Shelley, along with Julie and Pam Easterwood, met at Waggin' Wheel, picked up the 25 dogs, loaded them in Shelley's personal vehicle and AWL's van, and then Julie and Shelley embarked on the 400 mile drive to St. Louis. They drove back to HSV the next day (less 25 beagles) but extremely happy knowing the dogs were saved and would be adopted.

Building Relationships with Partner Rescues

Along with Border Tails Rescue, the AWL has had a long-time relationship with Bark from the Heart Rescue, which also has a strong connection to HSV. Kathy Deets, known as the rescue's "Lifesaver," met Shelley on her many travels to HSV to visit her mother Nancy, and stepfather DuWayne Beaver. During many of these visits, Kathy would take dogs back to Illinois for adoptions, and the outcomes were always positive. Sadly, Mr. Beaver, a HSV resident for 25 years, passed in January, and the family graciously requested that donations be made to the AWL. On that recent bittersweet visit, Kathy took a very special dog from the AWL with her - Annette, an Anatolian Shepherd mix - to find a forever home. Now back in LaGrange, Illinois, Kathy reports that Annette has been renamed Kimber after the two things DuWayne loved very much - his (predeceased) daughter Kim, and Kimber Manufacturing, in honor of his military career. Oh yes, and that Annette is doing wonderfully. To the AWL, Help Us Go sounds a lot like Happily Ever After!
