From nurturing and monitoring our shelter animals, taking them to the vet, partnering with the POA Animal Control Officers, operating spay/neuter clinics, fostering in their homes, finding the perfect pet for adopters, or serving behind the scenes in countless ways, volunteers make all the difference in our day to day operations.

To honor our volunteers for the tireless work they do, a long overdue luncheon was held in their honor at the DeSoto Club on August 31st. Shelley Shepherd welcomed the more than 90 volunteers that attended and quipped that "the dogs and cats have been asking us to do something for you - you are all heroes!"

The highlight of the luncheon was a special presentation to three extraordinary volunteers who have done - and continue to do - so much for the AWL. Visionaries Nancy Jones, Angela Nickols, and Cheryl Schaefer, along with her husband Chad, epitomize what can be accomplished with passion and fierce desire to save the lives of cats and dogs.

Below are just a few of their outstanding accomplishments for the AWL over the years:

Although the AWL is a no-kill shelter, that wasn't always the case. In 2009, it had a high 70% kill rate, and there was only room for 5 cats at the shelter. At that time, there were also several feral cat colonies in the village, so Nancy and Connie Mills started the TNR (trap, neuter, release) program. They did anything they could to place cats in suitable homes, and found many people who could keep the cats in their garages or homes while waiting adoption. Their efforts paid off, and they were able to place or TNR over 700 cats through 2013, when the AWL became a no-kill shelter.

Through her advocacy and tireless work, Nancy has been instrumental in the adoption and saving the lives of well over 2,000 cats.

Cheryl and Chad Schaefer were approached by Nancy when they moved to the village in 2009, when she found out they were avid animal lovers. They took care of many cats and kittens in their home. but soon realized they needed more space. So Chad built an extention onto their garage, complete with electrical, plumbing, cabinets, heating and air

conditioning, which they call their "Kitty Palace" and that they personally funded. It was the beginning of a commitment they keep 24 hours a day, 7 days a week - bottle feeding kittens, round the clock feedings, deworming, monumental

laundry, cleaning, and vet visits to name a few of their responsibilities. During the 8 month kitten season, they keep anywhere from 10 to 40 kittens, including many pregnant mothers.

Cheryl and Chad have personally saved hundreds of feline lives each year for 12 years.

Angela Nickols has always understood that the key to becoming a no-kill organization is spaying and neutering, and in 2007 set up a 10 member team committed to prevent the overpopulation of unwanted animals. In that first year, the AWL sponsored three spay neuter clinics. To help with the expense for needy pet owners, a low cost voucher system was quickly established and four annual clinics were held in the community. Today, Angela spearheads a team of up to 25 volunteers who actively help at these two day clinics, four times a year. As Shelley Shepherd stated, "AWL's spay/ neuter program is the backbone of our organization and is a well respected presence in our community and surrounding areas. The tireless efforts of you and the volunteers that work under your leadership have made this program a great source of pride for Hot Springs Village and the Animal Welfare League."

Since the fall of 2007, A grand total of 8,433 owned animals have been spayed or neutered, resulting in saving the lives of millions of unwanted cats and dogs!
