ConnCAT's Daytrip to the Capital

This year the Summer Arts Youth closed out the program with a day trip to Washington, D.C. First stop was to see the Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial, the first memorial to an African American on or near the National Mall. Students and Staff gathered in front of the 30-foot high granite statue of Civil Rights Movement leader MLK, for a group photo. From there the trek was made to the Lincoln Memorial walking past the Lincoln Memorial Reflecting Pool.





Our Final stop was to the Smithsonian National Museum of African American History and Culture (NMAAHC). The four-level museum is the only national museum solely dedicated to the documentation of African American life, history and culture. Students pointed out a shawl given to Harriet Tubman by Queen Victoria, a training aircraft used by the Tuskegee Institute suspended in the air, a tribute to Trayvon Martin, and a photo of Motown's Jackson 5.
