


The Suncoast Conchologists were featured during the summer at the Palm Harbor Library "Marine Life Under the Sea" exhibition.

Shells of the Minoan civilization By Ying Tong

In August 2023, I traveled to Greece and stayed in Crete, the southernmost part of the Aegean Sea, for two days. This is the starting point of European civilization and the birthplace of the famous Minoan civilization.

In the early 20th century, British archaeologist Arthur Evans excavated the palace of Knossos in Greece, which is the legendary labyrinth of Minos. Many royal palaces and city ruins have also been found in Crete: the ruins of the Maria Palace, the ruins of Gurnia, etc. Many details of the Minoan civilization are still mysterious.

With archaeological excavations, a large number of cultural relics were unearthed. These cultural relics are displayed in the Archaeological Museum of Heraklion, which is the second largest museum in Greece. I visited this museum twice. The civilization in Greece is the marine civilization, and there are some objects related to shells. I chose a few to share with my friends.

Vases with light-on-dark decoration and others with dark-on-light floral motifs, dated to the early and mature Neopalatial period respectively. A series of strainers and a rectangular vessel decorated with seashells in relief are distinctive. Poros Heraklion, 1700-1450 BC.



(Left) Large core of raw obsidian imported from Nisyros, triton-shaped rhyton and fragment of a vase of Nisyros obsidian, produced by Cretan workshops. Knossos, Hagia Triada, 1500-1450 BC.

(Right) Double-rim ritual ewer and rhytons of various types for liquid offerings. Gournia, 1600-1450 BC.



Alabaster libation vessel in the shape of a triton shell with a pouring spout at the top. Imported glass flask-shaped vase, Egyptian alabaster vessel and stone vase imitating an Egyptian prototype. Phaistos-Kalyvia, 1400-1300 BC.
