On Sunday November 17 we had a wonderful trip to the south end of Anclote Key aboard the Odyssey Cruise catamaran leaving from the sponge docks in Tarpon Springs. The naturalist on board was quite well versed in local lore and ecology and entertained on the ride out. The excitement built as we witnessed an exceptionally low tide, field by northeast winds but the highlight of the ride was a pod of dolphins with a newborn calf, frolicking around the end of the Anclote River channel. Edisto Island - A Hidden Gem

Between Charleston and Hilton Head lies a well-kept secret gem of the SC Coast. Edisto Island is a quiet, rather secluded beach town that only has houses on the Atlantic and Inlet areas and some condos on the marina side on the creek. They don't do hotels. The town boasts one old, small Bi-Lo grocery store, one gas station, a few beach shops and a few small eating places. Oh yes, there is a golf course and a bike path. Nothing fancy, just beautiful and peaceful. People come to Edisto to relax and enjoy quiet time with family and friends. Many have been coming for years. Some own homes there and others rent a cottage (which are usually large homes) every year.

This past October I was invited to join one of my dear friends and some of her family at Edisto. They have been vacationing there for over 20 years. It was a perfect time to be there—not too hot, water warm enough to wade in. Unfortunately, Dorian's impact was definitely evident in the beach erosion, but the island is coming back.

Edisto Island was settled in 1695, just five years after Charleston, SC. It was home to many large cotton plantations that produced the long staple Sea Island cotton during the "Golden Age" (1820-1860) and made the owners quite wealthy. As you know, next to shells, early American history is my thing, and there was plenty history for me to explore around the island and at the Edisto History Museum.

The highlight of my trip was getting to go to **Shell Island** – which is actually more of a large sand bar on the north end of the island. It is only accessible by boat and I found Captain Ron to take my friends and me. Now this Captain Ron did not look anything like Kurt Russell from the movie of that name, but he was just as much a character. He is very picky about whom he takes to the island but since I was a native South Carolinian, he consented to take us (for a price, of course). We met him at 9:00 sharp at his dock on the creek after driving down a one lane dirt road that went for several miles into nowhere. He, with his two young children, delivered us to the island in his skiff and gave us lots of information on the area and the changes in the last 50 years caused by the ocean moving in and development of the area for profit. He told us we could only stay for two hours on the island and made it clear that we were only allowed to bring back a one-gallon bag of shells each. Lucky me that I know how to pack a bag to the hilt and that my two friends did not want any shells so I got their bags also. Tons of shells are on this island – mostly whelks, oyster and clam shells, and cockles. We were the only three people there. What

bliss! And what a treasure trove! We had time to collect and then pick the best ones to pack in the bags to bring back.



After Shell Island, we toured Botany Bay Plantation Heritage Preserve and Wildlife Management Area. It is the former home of two large cotton plantations Bleak Hall and Sea Cloud and Indian Point which was a community for the Cusabo Indians (Edistow) who inhabited the area back to 2500 BC. Nothing much is left of the plantations and the Cusabo disappeared in 1728, but what is left along with the wildlife, plants and trees, is quite lovely to see as you drive through. The big attraction here was **Hammock Island—the boneyard beach**—which is only accessible by foot during low tide. It is a beautiful yet sad sign of how the ocean is eroding the shoreline.

MEMBERS SHELL SHOW IS COMING!

On February 4th, Suncoast Conchologists will have its semi-annual Members Shell Show. No—you won't need a case or two of shells to put on display—only single specimens—just one shell or an item that fits in one of the categories. You may have 2 separate entries in each category. If you don't already have one, applications will be available at our January 7th meeting. To help with your identification, check out our Library List on the club's website, www.suncoastconchologists.org, then have Shirley Anderson bring the book(s) to you on the 7th.

Our show categories are:

Florida/Caribbean—Any shells entered in this category **MUST** be selfcollected specimens—no purchased, borrowed or gifted shells. You may have 2 entries, each displayed separately.

Worldwide—These shells may have been obtained in any manner—bought, traded for, won at a club raffle, received as a gift, etc. This category includes FL/Caribbean specimens.

Fossils—Obtained in any manner. Fossils can be difficult to identify—so do your best, including family and location.

Sea Life—Sand dollars, crabs, starfish, etc., obtained in any manner.

Shell Art—Created by the exhibitor—not purchased, gifted, etc. You may have 2 separate entries: Stained glass, jewelry, quilting, drawing, needlework, painting, photography.

Shell Craft—Created by the exhibitor—not purchased, gifted, etc. You may have 2 separate entries. Craft includes items made primarily of seashells—wreaths, mirrors, flowers, animals, etc.

The evening of the show, set-up will begin at 6:15; all exhibits must be in place by 6:45.

Please refer to Exhibiting Guidelines and Members Shell Show Q and A attached to your application.


