We have reached the end of another Columbian year. Thank you to all who attended our 2024 State Convention in May. It was a great success and it gives us an opportunity to show how well the Knights of Columbus has progressed in this Province.

No doubt the last few years have been a challenge but we are seeing positive change. We have 34 councils: a small number of these councils are having challenges particularly due to deaths and/or transfers to the affiliate list. What is the affiliate program? Every council member that doesn't pay their annual dues becomes a liability to the council. The council is still responsible for paying State and Supreme assessments. So councils are permitted to move delinquent members to affiliate status. Expectedly, some affiliate members are surprised to be on the affiliate list and quickly pay their outstanding dues, most of which are forgiven, to come back to the council.

Past State Deputy Patrick Gambin assisted by our online chair Brother Gerard Butt, we took close to 100 new members. A great achievement. If your council has not taken in a new member this year or the last number of years, then this coming year is the year to make good and bring in new members.

The key elements of our Jurisdiction are based on the four tenants of Community, Faith, Family, and Life. Our State personnel directors have done great work and many successful programs have taken place throughout the province. Much work needs to be done on the Safe Environment program. Only a few councils are compliant, which has prevented us from obtaining the Circle of Honour.

In 2024-2025, we need to look at all that makes us a council and a Jurisdiction. We can do it. This year, we will continue our work on projects like Food for Families, Coats for Kids, support for the Unborn Child, etc. We are also slowly introducing the Cor program. What is Cor? It's a program to draw men back to their faith: you'll hear more about it later. Corner Brook have

The following is a summary of activities in the councils which make up District #2:

Terra Nova #1452: Unfortunately, the Grand Knight passed away in March 2024. The council was left in the capable hands of Deputy Grand Knight Chris O'Brien. This council received several program awards during the annual State Convention. Programs are continuing in a timely manner. Membership activity has been good, and the Supreme quota has been surpassed. Their Election of Officers for the 2024-25 Columbian year was completed on May 21st and all elected positions were filled. This has not happened in many years. I worked closely with the Grand Knight elect to have the Installation of Officers completed on June 25th.

St. Teresa's #7702: The council received many program awards at the annual State Convention. Grand Knight Phil Fahey was named Grand Knight of the Year at the same time. The Election of Officers for the 2024-25 Columbian

District #3 is comprised of St. John the Baptist Council #7405 (formerly known as Mary Queen of Peace), St. Paul's Council #11776, and Father John B. Kent Council #6638. The councils in this district have been continuing with their spiritual and charitable works of mercy.

St. John the Baptist Council has not completed their election of officers for this Columbian Year. Acting Gran Knight Brian Whitty and other members of the council have met with Father Paul Lundrigan to discuss the council possibly moving to Holy Trinity Parish in Torbay. More meetings will be held over the summer with Fr. Lundrigan to discuss what St. John the Baptist Council can offer the parish. A council meeting will be held in September with the goal of updating members of what was discussed with Fr. Lundrigan and to hold the Council election. This is a difficult period for St .John the Baptist Council but members are still confident that a new home can be established at Holy Trinity Parish and that the Council can continue its good works.

Both St. Paul's Council and Fr. John B. Kent Council have completed their elections for the 2024-2025 Columbian year and subsequent Installation of Officers. Both councils have continued to recruit new members.: over the past Columbian year, St. Paul's Council have added 4 new members and Fr. John B. Kent Council had 12 additions.

Over the summer months, councils in this district continued to be busy. St. Paul's Council sponsored Memorial Day celebrations again this year at the Logy Bay/Middle Cove/Outer Cove War Memorial on July 01. There was a great turnout with 12 Knights in attendance. Fr. John B. Kent Council, in partnership with Our Lady Queen of Families Parish, held the Northeast Avalon Deanery Family Days on July 14. This was an afternoon of fun activities, music, kids' games, and BBQ. This was a great way for the council to be visible in the Parish and help the Parish to succeed.

To celebrate their 50th Anniversary as a council, Fr John B. Kent Council participated in a Mass on July 22 that was celebrated by Archbishop Peter Hundt along with 4 Priests including Council Chaplain Fr. Wayne Dohey. Immediately after the Mass there was a banquet and dance. This event was attended by State Deputy Gary Gallagher and his wife Shelia, Archbishop Peter Hundt, Father Wayne Dohey, Master of the 4th Degree Gerard Butt and his wife Heather, State Warden Ray Bonia and his wife Angela, as well as my wife

Agnes and I. We were also joined by MHA Lucy Stoyles, Mayor Dave Aker and several councillors from the City of Mount Pearl, 11 wives of deceased members, and other special guests. Following the banquet, awards were presented for Family and Knight of the Year, as well as certificates to members who had between 50 and 60 years of service. In total, there were 17 members who qualified for this award. There were 5 of these Brother Knights in attendance for the celebrations and they were presented with their certificates by State Deputy Gary Gallagher. Two of these Brother Knights were Charter Members Steve Best and Frank Buck. The evening was topped off with the opening of a time capsule by Past Grand Knight Steve Best and current Grand Knight Con Milmore. This capsule was sealed on the council's 25th anniversary. This was a great evening of celebrating the many accomplishments of Fr. John B. Kent Council. In total, there were 132 people in attendance for the event.

District #4 is comprised of three active councils: Conception Council #1930 on Bell Island, Blessed Trinity Council #6792 in C.B.S., and St. Kevin's Council #7786 in the Goulds.

I was pleased to be able to visit these councils. Activities continue which address the needs of the communities. Ensuring the safety of our Brother Knights is always uppermost in mind. All councils in the district have experienced challenging times. However, they have been making great strides to continue their work.

The following are some of things that have been happening within District #4. Councils conducted their Elections and

Installation of Officers. Councils have conducted the combined degree to bring in new members and recruitment incentives continue to be ongoing. Councils have held regular monthly meetings and have awarded Families and Knights of the Month/Year. Birthday greetings were extended to members of councils. Councils have actively participated in the selling of State Lottery tickets.

Also, the councils have supported their churches by helping with cleaning, erecting Christmas and Easter signs, conducting the Stations of the Cross on Good Friday, Eucharistic Ministry, and serving as Lectors. They have also carries out visitations to sheltered Brother Knights, widows, and those in hospital for prayer and communion while praying the Rosary both in church and at funeral homes as well as for those affected by the crises in Ukraine.

The councils have made donations to various worthwhile causes: the Centre for Life, Building the Domestic Church, high school scholarships, food banks, purchasing Bibles, the Petty Harbour Storybook history, support for Seminarians, support to the Brazil family,

support to widows of deceased Brothers, hygiene products for the needy, Special Olympics, and St. Thomas Villenova. They have placed key roles with the parishes and in partnership with other groups using Bingo to raise funds for the church and Councils' charitable causes.

In addition to financial contributions, the councils in the district have participated in many projects throughout their communities. Some of these include the adoption of foster children, Coats for Kids, graveyard cleanups, a Silver Rose ceremony, skating with Santa and Christmas party for children, and the Free Throw Championship (Council, District, and Regional levels). As well, councils participated in Blessed Father Michael J. McGivney relic tour events including: adoration, veneration, visits with sick members and widows, Mass, and a graveyard visit.

Congratulations to the councils in our district for all their excellent work. Remember, "leave no neighbour behind".

District Deputy's Message - #5

When I was asked to become the District Deputy for District #5, it included the southern part of the Avalon Peninsula encompassing St. Anne's Council #6494 in Placentia, Dean Patrick Cleary Council #6672 in Witless Bay-Bay Bulls, Council #9662 in Trepassey, and St. Mary's Council #13220 in St. Mary's. In the past number of years, these councils were very large in terms of number of members, and were quite active in their respective church Parishes and throughout their communities.

When my wife, children, and I relocated to Deer Park near St. Mary's Bay, we chose Our Lady of Mount Carmel Parish to be our place of worship. Within a year or so, I was invited to be active in church ministry, which included the area from North Harbour to Peter's River, St. Vincent's, and St. Mary's Bay. At that time, there were nine active churches in that area.

Shortly thereafter, some of those communities decreased in number due to out-migration, sickness and death, and shortage of priests due to lack of Vocations and retirement. As a result, our

nine active Parish churches in St. Mary's Bay were reduced to four Parish churches as part of Good Sheppard Parish. Similar changes happened to the Knights of Columbus in the region. During this time of change, there were four active Councils in the St. Mary's Bay - Placentia Bay region. As a result of the declining population and the lack of young people interested in joining members of the Knights of Columbus of St. Mary's Bay Council #13320 and a parishioner of St. Edward's Parish in Conception Bay South, can be a good example for others. How important is it for my wife, Emily, and I to practise the faith that we were baptized into?

A short time ago, we watched a movie on the life of St. Josephine Bahkita. She once said that God will not allow us to experience suffering or struggle in this life and not receive a blessing from those struggles. She was abducted at the age of seven, used as a slave, and abused in many ways. On one occasion, she had her skin cut in 114 places and salt poured into them, leaving scars on her body. Through all of this suffering, she was accepted into a convent and became a nun. She was once asked what

she would do if she encountered her abductors and she replied that she would kneel and kiss their hands because, if that had not happened, she would not have been a Christian and a religious.

Brother Knights, while we all struggle, remember that we will be rewarded through our examples of good works and prayers as we continue to renew and strengthen the Catholic faith community. Our actions should include the invitation of men in our communities to become members of our Order, so that they can enjoy the benefits that they and their families are offered, and do the best we can to assist in rebuilding our churches, communities, and families. Other programs available to our members through Faith in Action include: Into the Breach, Marion Icon Prayer Program, Rosary Program, Holy Hour, The Cor Program, and Scripture Sharing and Reflection.



Councils can also start by submitting

As this data indicates participation of 14% of assemblies, 11% of councils, and 45% of districts, I would highly encourage more submissions for future editions (make my job as hard as possible!).

Don't stop here though. Ensure that parishioners and the general public are aware of what your councils are doing. Consider adding an insert to your parish's bulletin, making a short newsletter or brochure to place at the back of the church, or to display at future council functions; having a social media or webpage to display pictures, upcoming events, etc.; post upcoming events through TV and radio. These small steps can increase your council's exposure and allow more people to be

touched by our Order's charitable works. An added benefit is that the more people that become aware of what our Order does, our recruitment pool increases alongside it. New members (especially younger men) will be the lifeblood of our Order going forward once our aging population are forced to step back.

If any council or Brother Knight has any questions regarding communications of any kind, do not hesitate to ask any of our State Executive/Personnel.
