Inspiring Students to Follow Their Dreams

Claudia: What motivated you to become a teacher?

Natalie: I never wanted to be a teacher. My initial plan was to be a journalist. I got the job of anchor on the morning announcements in fifth grade, and I knew that that's what I wanted to do. I wanted to study journalism, and so throughout my grade school years, I did radio broadcasting, newspaper, I did media, journalism, every form of journalism. I did it. And when I got to college, I sat with my guidance counselor, and she told me that I wouldn't be a good fit for journalism because my accent would not get me far in the field, and also that they hire attractive people, and so wouldn't be a good fit for me. And so right then and there in her office, my vision just crumbled to the ground, because, like I said, I was dead set on this field. And she said, What do you do now? And I said, I'm a camp counselor. And she said, Well, you like kids? And I said, Yes, and she said, Okay, well, then you should be a teacher.

And I listened to her, and here we are, 14 years later, three degrees later, I feel like she was put in my path as an intervention. I feel like she guided me to steer my career for the rest of my life. I think had I sat with somebody else, I probably would have never become a teacher. I would have just followed through and become a journalist. But I'm thankful that I listened to her in a way, and there are moments. I'm not going to lie to you where I do wish that I would have listened to my heart, to follow my dreams, to do what I wanted to do. But at the end of the day, this field allows me to really touch the lives of so many, and it's amazing what 10 months in a classroom can do and the profound impact it makes on people. So I think had I become a journalist, I don't think I would have been able to do that.

Claudia: I want to touch on the last part, because I know, the counselor put your dream down. Has that really affected how you reach out?

Natalie: Absolutely, you know, I feel like, in a way, it was kind of an ignorant comment to tell me that my accent would not take me very far. I've actually been able to speak to so many journalists who have told me that when you go to college, they do teach you how to neutralize your accent, because there are so many different, you know, immigrants and people from, you know, all over the United States. And so I wish I would have known that, because I would have stuck up for myself and continued through my journey. And so I think with my students, I always make sure that they understand that it doesn't matter where you come from, what you look like if you want to pursue something and you just have that spark and that passion, that willpower and desire, you can do it. And so I never want my students to think they can't get into a field because of something so silly, like, an accent, um, you know, I, I do work in a title one school where the majority of my students are underprivileged. And at the end of the day, it doesn't really matter if they want to be, you know, an astronaut. It doesn't matter like, I definitely will tell them, like, go do what you gotta do to become an astronaut. Like, do what you have to do to be a doctor, a lawyer, a nurse, whatever you want to do, like you should be able to do it. And even though she might have, like my guidance counselor, might have thought her intentions were good at the end of the day. You know, it's so disheartening to tell somebody that they can't do something because of something they don't have control over, if that makes sense, yeah? So, yeah, it definitely affects how I, you know, how I speak to my students, and how I motivate them for their future.

Claudia: But how do you think social media has an effect on your teaching?

Natalie: So I feel like social media has provided me with such an amazing opportunity to teach our newbies, you know, our little green bean teachers that are coming in for the first time, but also to kind of spark our veterans. I know as a veteran myself, I know that we can get very it can become very routine with what we do. And so to be able to provide a platform and a place to share what I do in the classroom, to receive so much love from people who tell me, thank you so much for sharing this lesson, I'm going to infuse it myself as well. Or, you know, thank you so much for sharing this. I've been doing the same thing for years, and it's time for a change, or, you know, I'm doing my student teaching. I'm so nervous this semester, but I'm going to infuse these things, and you know, I'll let you know how it goes. That, to me, is invaluable. I wish I had that when I was getting into the field. I would have loved to have been able to follow somebody and to kind of learn from them and do fun things that you know, that they do. I learned in a more traditional setting, you know, in college, but to be able to, you know, share that with people.

And even though I am a veteran, I've also been able to learn from so many teachers. There's so many other teachers that post on there that, you know, I'll look at something and go, my gosh, what a great idea. I'm going to do that too. I think it's vital for teachers to go on there and see what people are talking about, see what people are sharing, so that we can stay with the times and so that we. Can evolve as our students evolve with our instruction and our pedagogues.

Claudia: Have you ever had any issues arise from social media?

Natalie: So I've been very blessed. I have the best parents, truly. They support me in everything that I do. I haven't had any issues with any parents of students in my classroom at all. I've been very blessed. So shout out to all of the amazing parents at me. I love you. Um, I will tell you, people have taken this very far. I did have someone reach out anonymously to my principal to inform her that I was posting children online. Obviously, I have a release form, so she clarified that with the follower who did that? Um, we also, I also get, it's very common for me to get comments on my post with the kids to say, you know, did you get permission? Did you get permission for this? And you know, you're posting kids. Is that okay? So it's funny, because on every single post that has children, if you go to the comment section, I always copy paste the same exact comment that tells my followers, yes, we have release forms. Yes, we have FERPA forms, you know. But I also think something that's helped me, as far as you know, with the parents and the community, is I go to extreme measures to make sure that my students are not exposing their names or anything like that. You know, safety is number one.

If you're going to infuse social media with your class, you have to take it very seriously. It's important for the kids who don't have a release form, they can never be, you know, shown, photographed, videotaped, whatever. And, you know, again, like, for example, we just did a video two last month. We did a video where it was a Chip Challenge. This is like a super popular Tik Tok trend, and so we did the Chip Challenge, where everybody states their name, what chips they brought, and then they dump it into the bowl. Nobody said their name, everybody said the first letter of their name. That was a safety and security measure that I personally took so that nobody knows their names. A lot of people in the comments were like, Who names their kid? One letter? That's so weird. People were like, Why are all their names? One letter? Like, people weren't getting it. But again, it's important to take that into consideration.

A View of Education from the Eyes of a Budding Educator

Claudia: What motivated you to become a teacher?

Kayla: What motivated me to become a teacher? It's kind of funny. I love to tell the story because it kind of fell into my lap. I remember following going into high school, and we had, like, a Choice Program. We had several programs in high school, and as he was, like, you have two choices. You could do nursing or you could do teaching. And I'm like, I'm going to do teaching because I just didn't want to become a nurse. But eventually, as the years passed by, I fell in love with teaching, seeing how much of an impact you can make on students' lives, and how much the little things you do in class can lead to big things that they do later on in life.

I just fall in love seeing kids grasp that concept that you've been working so hard to teach them and then using it later on. So it kind of fell into my lap, and I molded myself to really just fall in love with it. And you know, I've been working on my teaching degree, and finally, now have it for over 10 years now, because I started earning my degree 2014 and now here I am a second year teacher in 2024 so being able to work with students and see them growth is like, really what motivated me to be into this position, because I always like To say, like a teacher's job helps everybody else's job. So without a teacher, you couldn't do what you couldn't do what you like. We couldn't have doctors. We couldn't have lawyers. You need a teacher in your life. So I really, I just love being that one person in students' lives

Claudia: How do you handle classroom management and discipline?

Kayla: I handle classroom management and discipline as a lover, but with stern standards, I believe that kids need routine and structure to be able to prosper in life. So I basically hold my kids to a level of standard, and it's that and only that. Of course, you know, we all make mistakes, and we always sometimes don't meet that standard, and sometimes that's okay, and I'll constantly remind my students, like, hey, we didn't meet the expectation.

Let's work on it. What were some difficulties that you couldn't meet that expectation? How can I help you? As far as, like, discipline, my kids know I like to do like, a really three strike system. First Strike, you know me. You have a talk. We sit down. How can I help you? Second strike is obviously removal from like set activity, and then we have another talk. And then the last strike is me, if it's really egregious, having to remove you from the classroom entirely, and a phone call home or probably a meeting with parents. And throughout this whole process, I always talk to students. Students have to be aware of what they did, and I have to be aware of why they do it. Some students aren't willing to tell me why, but I still sit with them and talk with them and discuss things like, Hey, these are our rules. These are our standards. These are our procedures. You have to follow them. If you don't do this, X, Y and Z, will happen. And in my classroom, I kind of like to do a class promise. Because we all promise to follow these rules, and I myself have to follow them, and we sign them every year, so I always like to refer back, hey, you sign this class. Promise you promise that you will do this. And I know sometimes we falter, but we have to be on the ball and the money to do this.

A lot of people do not like my style of discipline because I seem to be a little bit mean or a little bit rough around the edges, but it's because I believe, like once you hold kids to that standard, they will always meet them. And you can't lower your standards just because their kids are very moldable and malleable, and they can do such great things. So I don't like to sell my kids short. I like to really push them to the limits and expectations. And of course, if there's something that doesn't work with my students or that classroom, I remove it or tweak it for them to work, but I never lower the standards.

Claudia: Have you ever really connected to a student or, like, just had a very aspiring moment that has stuck with you?

Kayla: I think I had that moment with my students last year, believe it or not. Um, being a first year teacher, it's definitely the scariest thing in the door, in the scariest thing in the world. Because once they close that door, you realize, wow, they really left me here by myself, like they believe in me. Like, oh. And I think I connected and bonded with my students so much to the point like they thought of me as, like part of them. Like, if I weren't coming to school, they'd be like, Why? Where are you going? Who you going with? What time are you coming back? So building that bond with my students really made me understand, like I'm making an impact by talking about my students all the time. I like to call them my kids, to the point my mom was like, you don't have any kids? Oh, I guess I do. I got 22 kids right now, and I'll name them all. So it's like, I think what's really important for me in the classroom is building the classroom family. And I started that really early on.

So we became this, this little family, and I genuinely adore every single one of them as many times they get on my nerves when somebody's not listening. I'm just like, wow, look at you. Like, I just, I love you and like, somebody will tell me by my seat. Like, Oh, Mr. Friendly so and so did this. I'm like, That's my student. So I genuinely love and adore all my students. I was blessed to have those students in my life and I was meant to be in that place. I think the best memory that I had with them is when I did my book exchange for Christmas and seeing their faces on getting these books for me and I was like wow. I love every single one of you, and I just know that you love me. It brings me to tears knowing I won't be with them next year, but I just, I adore them.
