

To Roxana, Chicago served as a middle ground where she experienced the heartland of America. Chicago encapsulated both the cosmopolitan atmosphere she sought from Western society and the distinctive Americana she was familiar with. She expresses, "I could find similar things, but it wasn't my tribe. It was very hard to find croquetas, Cuban coffee, pastelitos de guayaba! However, I also felt as if I belonged in that environment because I still am very American,".

"A lot of the work [I did in Chicago] was to help people understand that... I wasn't the stereotypical Hispanic person. I wanted them to understand that there are groups of Hispanics out there that have a different experience from what they see on TV," Roxana said. She challenged the misconceptions surrounding Hispanic experiences in America by emphasizing the diversity within her community through her artwork.

Roxana's passion for inspiring others drove her to transition to higher education, at Florida International University, "I always knew that I was going to be a teacher, I enjoy teaching. I love to motivate and encourage and reveal things to students,". Roxana revealed that her inspiration stemmed from her

experiences with professors at the Art Institute, blending traditional lecture styles with performance elements to engage her students effectively. "My idea is, I present you this material and you do with it what you wish. Hopefully it will motivate you in your personal life, in your hobbies, and hopefully you can connect in some way in the career field that you choose," Roxana expressed.

When asked what she would provide to students who wish to pursue a career in art, she expressed that art education should be a prolonged and multifaceted journey, despite what 4-year colleges tend to advertise. Roxana advocates for a more extended period of exploration. She suggests a longer college experience, interspersed with breaks to develop artistic skills and explore philosophy, sociology, anthropology, and religion. Additionally, she insists that art students should be knowledgeable in business and marketing before entering the field, recognizing the practicality of understanding the financial aspects of the art industry.

Roxana's commitment to challenge the status quo and innovate with her teaching philosophies illustrate her undying dedication to foster inclusivity and inspiration in art education. Her story stands as a testament to the richness that is fostered when one's educational path becomes a canvas for personal and artistic growth.
