Remember to maintain your septic system to avoid costly replacement.

The Association replaced the original dam in the 1950's. There are more pictures on our web site under history showing the construction of the dam. The Association is responsible for maintaining the dam. There is a Deeded agreement that allows the Association ingress and egress to the dam to maintain it. Creek Clean-up is vital to prevent what happened in the 50's when the dam failed. The dam would not be replaced, which would make our 4.5 miles of navigable water mere puddles and low water. If you have a couple hours and want a "free lunch", please join Creek Clean-up to keep our beautiful creek flowing deeply. Most of the 4.5 miles average about 8-10 foot, dropping that 3 foot without the dam, makes for a shallow braided stream.

Remember to maintain your In Lot septic system. Prevention is less expensive than repair or replacement.



THE STORY OF SLIPPERY ROCK PARK

Since the late 1920's the summer community of Slippery Rock Park has dozed in the tranquil sunshine. It was known primarily by the few residents who owned land in the immediate vacinity and by the occassional traveler who unknowingly happened upon it. The winds of change have blown all around the Park. Projects such as Pymatuning Resevoir, Moraine State Park, and various private recreational ventures have been instituted and grown. Yet Slippery Rock Park has remained virtually unchanged and unaffected.

Now with the growing scarcity of recreational land the decision has been reached to sell the remaining homesites. Ten years from now it is doubtful whether much, if any, private recreational land will be available around the Pittsburgh area.

If you are at all interested in having a summer or permanent homesite in a beautiful area within easy driving distance of almost any location in Western Pennsylvania now is the time to act. Let the winds of change blow you will be secure in "the place that time forgot."
