# **Department of Pastoral Services**

## **SCOPE OF SERVICE**

#### 1) Department Function

Recognizing that patients have the right to pastoral and spiritual services, and that spiritual care can promote wellness and recovery, Greystone Park Psychiatric Hospital has established a Department of Pastoral Services.

Within the constraints of the institution and clinical practice, the Department of Pastoral Services supports:

- a) the right of patients to pastoral care or other spiritual services;
- b) the right of patients to practice their own religion, or to abstain from practice;
- c) a treatment milieu in which the patient's spiritual values are respected.
- d) when requested, assist patients in exploring their own spiritual values, including
  - their <u>self-identity</u>,
  - their <u>hope</u> for living in recovery,
  - the experiences, decisions, and relational <u>responsibilities</u> for living within recovery
  - the goodness and sacredness of their life, and the immutable dignity of their <u>humanity</u>.

As befitting a state hospital, this Department is clinical, rather than religious, in orientation. The Department and its staff does not evangelize, proselytize, or promote a religious system.

#### 2) Description of Staff

The Department consists of:

- a) One full time Board Certified Chaplain as Director
- b) One consulting Board Certified Chaplain .25 fte
- c) One consulting Chaplain, deaf program .20 fte
- d) The three staff chaplain positions (nominally *Board Certified Chaplains*) are vacant due to state hiring freeze.

#### 3) <u>Description of Services</u>

- a) Visitation. All chaplains provide pastoral visitation on patient units.
- b) <u>Participation in Hospital Protocols</u>. Chaplains Participate in hospital policy specific protocols for *End of Life* and *Event of Patient Death*.
- <u>Consultation</u>. Chaplains will consult with the treatment teams on special issues arising from a patient's religious practice.
- d) Provide <u>program groups</u> or other venues for the exploration of spiritual issues.
- e) <u>Counseling</u>. Further pastoral counseling or consultation with the patient can be provided as appropriate.
- f) On-Call coverage. An on-call list is maintained with the hospital operator and central staffing.
- g) Specialized Clinical Services.

In addition to providing clinically based pastoral care, *Board Certified Chaplains* of this department may:

- Take a religious or spiritual history and assess the psycho-dynamics of a patient's spiritual ideation and practice through a formal pastoral assessment;
- In conjunction with the treating psychiatrist, treat for the V-62.89 code under DSM-IV;
- Coordinate pastoral interventions with other disciplines, particularly for spiritual expression, reduction of anxiety, relational issues, and obsessive thought patterns manifesting as religious ideation.
