

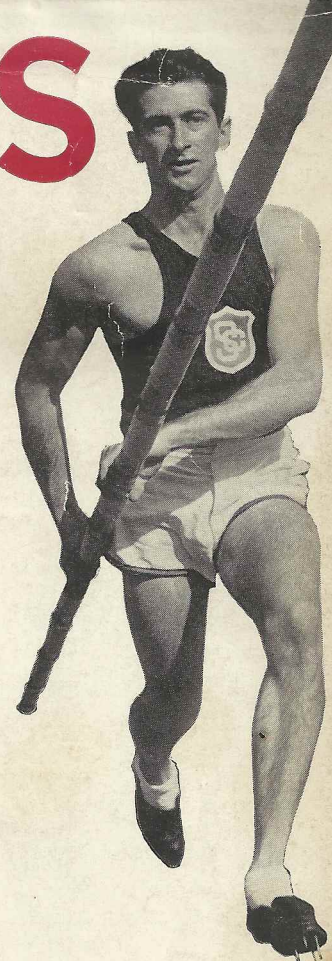
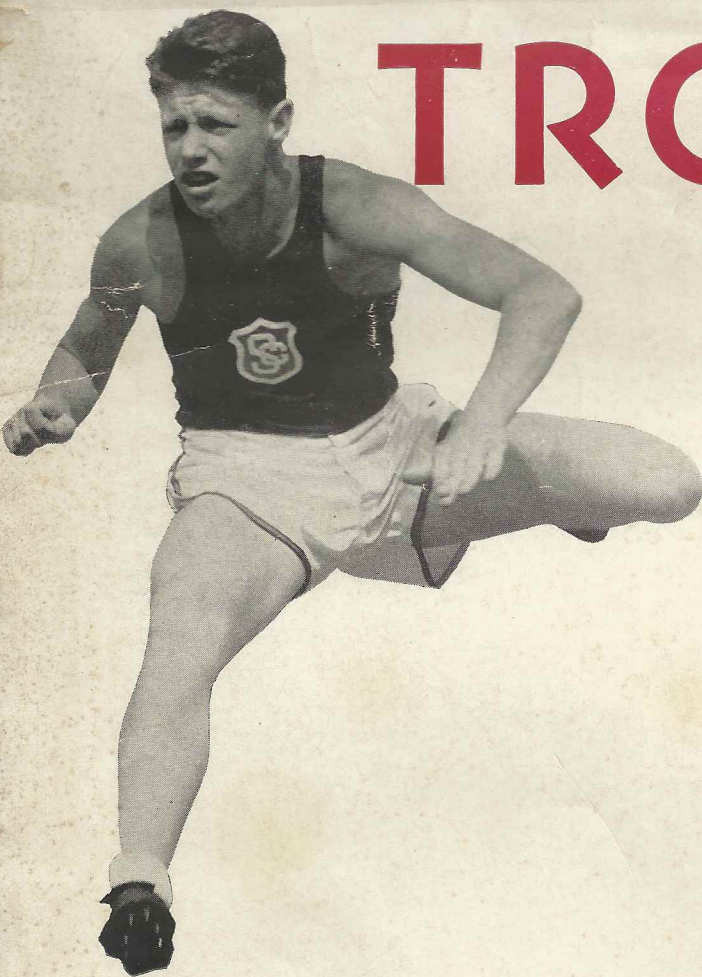

COACH JESS HILL

After watching his SC track and field teams react for two national collegiate championships in two seasons as head man, Jess Hill moves on to the football coaching job at the University of Southern California. Hill retains his title as nominal head of Troy's track team but acting coach Jesse Mortensen undoubtedly will shoulder the major portion of the work and responsibility for the 1951 team's performance.

In both years as track coach at Troy, Hill guided his team to cherished NCAA championships, to the Pacific Coast conference dual meet title, to team championships in the Long Beach, Fresno and Coliseum relays, the P.C.C. meet championship and to the Modesto relays crown in 1949.

Over the period, Trojan trackmen broke four world records. In his first year, Pell Mel Patton lowered Jesse Owens' 220-yard mark to 20.2s. and anchored a four-man 880-yard relay team to a 1m. 24s. record. Last season, Dick Attlesey bettered Harrison Dillard's record for the 120-yard high hurdles to 13.5s. and twice improved on the 110-meter mark to the same 13.5s. figure.

To his new head football coaching position, Hill brings 16 years of experience at Riverside JC, Corona high school, Long Beach CC, St. Mary's Pre-Flight and with the SC freshmen. If he can do as well with Troy's gridiron fortunes as he did as Dean Cromwell's successor in track and field, Hill can become his University's greatest all-around coach as well as one of its top all-around athletes.

Hill was a member of three successive track teams at S.C., 1927-29, and lettered all three years in the broad jump. He climaxed his track career at Troy when he won the I.C.4-A. broad jump title in 1929 with a meet record leap of 25ft. 7/8in. He was the first Trojan ever to better 25 feet in the event, and only two other S.C. jumpers -- Dick Barber and Al Olson -- have since surpassed Hill's supreme effort.

Jess played two years for Howard Jones' football team (1928-29) and was a whiz as a fullback. Although never a starter (he played behind "Sheriff" Jim Musick in his senior year) Hill topped the Pacific Coast Conference statistics in '29 for the highest average yards gained per play of all backs. Jess, in seven conference games, handled the ball 54 times for 441 yards, an average of 8.2 per play. He was the star of the 48-0 win over Washington at Seattle, even though he received belated credit as a befuddled radio announcer misnamed him "Cliff Thiede" all afternoon as Jess ran wild.

Hill didn't report to Sam Barry for baseball until his final year, 1930, but neither Sam nor Jess ever regretted the ultimate decision. First playing third base and later shifting to the outfield, Hill was the leading batter of the California Intercollegiate Baseball Association with a .389 average (21 hits for 54 at-bats) as the Trojans won their first CIBA title.

Orv. Mohler and Garrett Arbelbide were Hill's teammates on that nine.

Jess promptly signed with the old Hollywood Stars at the end of the college schedule and on his first official time at the plate in Wrigley Field on June 5, 1930, with Beryl "Trader" Horne of the Angels pitching, Hill powdered the ball over the fence for a home run. Jess went on that year to bat .356 in 115 games of double-A ball, and next year hit at a .318 clip.

Purchased by the New York Yankees, Hill played for Newark in 1932, St. Paul in 1933 and came back to Newark in '34 (batting .349) before stepping up to the Yanks in

'35. He saw action in 107 games as he batted .293 for Joe McCarthy that season, hit for .305 for Washington in 1936, and then played both for the Senators and Connie Mack's Philadelphia A's in '37. In 1938 and 1939 he played for Oakland and then retired with a 10-year professional batting average of .306 with play only in Major League and AAA ranks.

At Corona High School before he came to S.C., Hill was a one-man riot. Over a two-year span he won ten letters in football, basketball, baseball, track and tennis. Then he moved on to Riverside Junior College for a year and there earned awards in all the above-mentioned sports but tennis. Riverside had championship teams in all four sports that year (1925-26).

Jess entered S.C. in February, 1927. He graduated in June, 1930, cum laude.

After his retirement from baseball, he coached at Corona High, Riverside Junior College and Long Beach City College.

In March, 1942, Hill enlisted in the Navy and was discharged in February, 1946, as a lieutenant-commander. In the Navy he coached and played baseball at St. Mary's and Del Monte Pre-Flights and later was athletic director at Clinton, Camp Kearney and Memphis Naval Air Stations.

After his discharge, Jess went back to Long Beach City College and coached an unbeaten baseball team in the Metropolitan Conference.

Hill finally returned to S.C. in July, 1946, and immediately got off to a flying start by mentoring one of Troy's greatest frosh football teams that season. The mighty '46 Trobables were unbeaten and untied in five games, rolling up 238 points to 26 for the opposition. In their two games with UCLA the Trojan yearlings triumphed by scores of 66-13 and 40-7.

Jess coached frosh football from 1946 to 1948 and assisted Dean Cromwell with the 1947 and 1948 track and field teams. In 1948 he also held the job as freshman track coach.

Hill is married to the former Elizabeth Helen Glass, who was his high school sweetheart at Corona High. He has two children--Mary Elizabeth, 18, and Jesse T. Hill, Jr., 9.

FRESHMAN COACH BOB CHAMBERS

Bob Chambers, one of the most inspiring performers ever to represent the University of Southern California in track and field, takes his first crack at coaching this spring. A native of Los Gatos, he was a veteran of 4 years on the track team.

Co-Captain of last season's NCAA championship team, Chambers will handle Troy's splendid crop of freshman trackmen, as well as help with the varsity.

A member of the U.S. Olympic team that won the London Games in 1948, Chambers ran his most inspirational races while qualifying for the team and placing sixth in the 800 meters.

Chambers returned to the Trojan campus in 1949-50 to stage some of the greatest driving finishes ever witnessed in Troy's rich track heritage. Twice running the unfamiliar 440-yard dash against Stanford in a 1949 dual meet, Chambers nipped quarter-miling specialist Larry Hoff of Stanford at the tape.

ACTING COACH JESSE MORTENSEN

Sporting a rich background as a coach and as a player, Jesse Mortensen returns to the University of Southern California as acting track and field coach. He pinch hits for Jess Hill, who this spring will devote his major efforts to preparing the Trojan football team for the 1951 season.

Mortensen comes back to SC from the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, where he was head track and field coach. Along with Hill, his team-mate at Troy in the late twenties, Mortensen is considered one of the greatest all-around athletes in the annals of Western sport. He has supplemented his athletic background, which included the National AAU decathlon championship, with a broad background in the coaching field.

Following his graduation from SC in the spring of 1930, Mortensen began a 14-year career as coach of football, track, basketball and baseball at Riverside junior college. Co-coaching with Hill in the 1930-33 seasons, Mortensen enjoyed three Southern California junior college championships.

During World War II, Mortensen served as a physical education instructor in the Navy pre-flight training program. He was discharged as a Lt. senior grade early in 1946.

Mortensen returned to Riverside for the spring and fall of 1946 to act as head football coach and dean of men. In 1947, he went to Denver university to become head track coach and freshman football coach. His track team won Denver first Skyline Six title in 1949 and his frosh footballers were undefeated in two years. He developed Jerry Biffle, NCAA champion in the broad jump in 1949, during his stay at Denver.

On Hill's recommendation, Mortensen was appointed track coach at Army in January of 1950. As well as taking the Cadets through indoor and outdoor and cross country seasons, he aided Red Blaik as a football scout.

Mortensen's athletic career began at Gila academy, a religious institution in Thatcher, Arizona. Following a brilliant all-around prep career, he entered Gila junior college. In the period from 1925-27, he lettered in football, basketball and track. On one afternoon, he scored 26 points in the shotput, discus, javelin, high jump, high hurdles and 100-yard dash.

Immediately following his enrollment at Troy in the fall of 1927, Mortensen became a regular on the varsity basketball team and made all-Pacific Coast conference. In the summer of 1928, he just missed making the U.S. Olympic team as a decathlon man. Mortensen placed fifth in the trials at Franklin Field in Philadelphia.

The new Trojan track coach first achieved national recognition by winning the javelin in the 1929 NCAA. Following another season as an all-Pacific Coast basketballer and Trojan footballer in the 1929-30 seasons, he won the National AAU javelin as Captain of the 1930 track team.

Before being declared ineligible for participation as an amateur because of his coaching connection with Riverside JC, Mortensen set a new world's record for the decathlon in 1931. He scored 8177 in the National AAU finals at Lincoln, Neb., to become the first man to hit the 8000 mark in the sport.

A native of Gila, Arizona, Mortensen was born April 16, 1907. He is married to the former Irene Ross of Riverside. The Mortensens have a daughter Anne, 12, and a son Ross, 9.

JOHN BRADLEY: 21, 5:11, 152, Junior, graduated from Glendale Hoover. All-time best marks of 9.7s. and 20.8s., both made in high school where he gained all-American H.S. recognition. State 220 champion two years running. Best last year of 9.9s. and 21.2s. Best race is furlong where he won four dual and triangular meet races last year. Pulled muscle late last season. Majoring in foreign trade.

AL MEJIA: 22, 5:7, 148, Junior, graduated from Fremont High. Transferred from Compton College last year and developed into SC's best century man. Best mark 9.7s. in qualifying for NCAA finals. Won four dual and triangular meet races in 100. Best 220 mark was 21.5s. Won National JC 220 in 1949 in 21.4s. Majoring in physical education.

VERIE SORGEN: best times of 9.9s. (high school) and 21.6s. (frosch).
(see broad jump)

NORM STOCKS: best time of 21.6s. in 220. (see quarter-mile)

QUARTER-MILE

NORM STOCKS: 23, 6:0, 160, Senior, graduated from San Diego High. A two-year letterman with best mark last year of 48.8s. Placed fourth in PCC last year. Ran third man on the 1949 Trojan world-record 880-yard relay team. Pulled leg muscle in early practice this year and may be hampered. Majoring in business.

BUD CURRY: 21, 5:11, 155, Senior, graduated from South Gate High. Transferred from Compton College last year and had best time of 48.9s. Ran 48.4s. lap on Trojan distance medley team that set school record in 1950. All-City 440 champion in 50.1s. as prepper. Finished sixth in PCC 440 last year. Majoring in zoology.

NOTE: Sam Nicholson (see broad jump) and Jerry Kincheloe (see high jump) may run 440 this year. No previous recorded times.

HALF-MILE

FRED WEHKING: 20, 5:9, 153, Junior, graduated from Bell High. With the great collection of half-milers at Troy last year, sophomore Wehking did not get much of a chance to perform but still was clocked in 1m. 54s. in placing third in the UCLA dual meet. Expected to come into own this year. An NROTC student, he plans a career in the Navy. Former All-City 880 champ in 1947.

LLOYD JEPSON: 20, 5:8, 150, Sophomore, graduated from Benson Tech, Portland, Oregon. Ineligible last year after a great freshman season in 1949, Jepson has three years remaining. Best of 1m. 56.5s. as frosh when he was nipped in a dual meet race by Oxy frosh John Barnes. Has mile clocking of 4m. 25.9s. Majoring in general business.

BOB MITCHELL: 23, 5:8½, 130, Senior, graduated from Huntington Park High. A two-year letterman. Best last year of 1m. 55.5s. and 4m. 20.9s. in mile. Will run both this year. All-City half-mile champ in 1945. Only man to defeat Newcomb in cross-country in 1949. Majoring in business.

MILE AND TWO-MILE

JIM NEWCOMB: 22, 6:0, 150, Junior, graduated from Benson Tech, Portland, Oregon. One of the greatest sophomore tracksters in history last year, Newcomb ran bests of 4m. 7.7s. and 9m. 6.5s. in the mile and two-mile. The mile mark bettered the school record formerly held by Louis Zamperini. Newcomb was never defeated in high school or at Santa Ana Junior College, where he won national JC mile and two-mile championships in 1949. PCC mile and two-mile champ last year and second in the NCAA two-mile. Second in the AAU 1500 meters in 3m. 52.2s. Majoring in physical education.

ART GARCIA: 20, 5:10, 145, Junior, graduated from San Bernardino High. Transferred from San Bernardino Valley College where he did not run last year. National JC 880 champion in 1948 with best clocking of 1m. 58s. Won AAU 5000 meters cross-country championship this fall and is going to concentrate on distance work. Majoring in finance.

GRAY BERG: 24, 5:7, 130, Senior, graduated from Carter Riverside High, Fort Worth, Texas. Lettered last year and rated most improved man for this season. Won Southern Division cross country championship this fall. Best time in two-mile last year 9m. 46.4s. Will probably concentrate on the eight-lapper. Majoring in industrial relations.

HIGH AND LOW HURDLES

ART BARNARD: 21, 6:1, 175, Senior, graduated from La Jolla High. Co-Captain of the 1951 varsity. Placed fourth in the NCAA highs last year and had a best time of 14.2s. Three men who finished ahead of him are not returning this year. Running behind Dick Attlesey last year, he failed to win a race (two heats excepted). This year, however, he should not lose many. Best time in lows of 23.6s. All-CIF hurdles champ in 1947. Majoring in art.

JACK DAVIS: 20, 6:3, 180, Sophomore, graduated from Glendale Hoover High. Former state hurdles champion who has bests (as frosh) of 14.6s. and 23.5s. All-American H.S. prep. Can broad jump if needed with best last year of 23ft. 2in. Majoring in physical education.

KEITH MCDONALD: 20, 6:2, 165, Junior, graduated from George Washington High, Alexandria, Va. Transferred from Duke University and was ineligible last year. Best time of 14.7s. in highs. Best low hurdle time of 24.8s. A NROTC student majoring in engineering.

BILL PETTIS: 19, 6:1 $\frac{1}{2}$, 175, graduated from Long Beach Jordan High. Transferred from Long Beach CC where he was second in National JC highs with best mark of 14.9s. Ran 440 in high school and has a best mark of 49.5s. Has run lows once, clocked in 24.5s. Also ran 220 in 22.1s. around curve last year at Long Beach. Majoring in physical education.

JACK BARNES: Best time of 14.8s. (see high jump)

SHOT PUT

PARRY O'BRIEN: 19, 6:3, 227, Sophomore, graduated from Santa Monica High. Here is the greatest freshman shotputter in American collegiate history. O'Brien, in 1950, had five puts over 52ft. with a best of 53ft. 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. His best mark was made in the Coliseum Relays against the toughest competition, placing him third. Has tremendous speed across the ring for his size. Plays halfback in football. Majoring in business administration.

JESS SWOPE: 23, 6:2, 230, Senior, graduated from Polytechnic High. A three-year letterman who stayed out last season because of injuries. Placed sixth in the 1949 NCAA shot and has a best of 53ft. 1 $\frac{3}{4}$ in. Voted most improved athlete in 1949 and a former freshman record holder. Majoring in physical education.

DISCUS

ELMER WILLHOITE: 20, 6:1 $\frac{1}{2}$, 225, Sophomore, graduated from Merced High. Former state shot put champion, had best marks in weights last year of 145ft. 10in. and 49ft. 2in. Varsity letterwinner in football. Majoring in general business.

BROAD JUMP

VERLE SORGEN: 19, 6:1, 165, Sophomore, graduated from Riverside Poly High. Sorgen was one of the finest prep broad jumpers in southland history, leaping 24ft. 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. Last year bothered by foot injury and had best of 23ft. 5 $\frac{3}{8}$ in. Holds a scholastic scholarship. Majoring in mathematics.

FRANK FLORES: 21, 5:9, 160, Junior, graduated from Monterey High. Transferred last year from Monterey Peninsula College where he had a best of 23ft. 7 $\frac{1}{4}$ in. Last year he was somewhat inconsistent but had a best of 23ft. 5in. A pre-dental student.

SAM NICHOLSON: 21, 5:10, 140, Senior, graduated from Glendale Hoover High. A versatile performer who can sprint, run the low hurdles, broad jump, and this year may concentrate on the 440. Had a best broad jump mark last year of 23ft. 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ in.

HIGH JUMP

DICK BROMBACH: 21, 6:1, 168, Junior, graduated from Long Beach Poly High. Best of 6ft. 5in. last year in winning California dual meet. Had prep best of 6ft. 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. and tied for state championship in 1949. Majoring in industrial management.

MANUEL RONQUILLO: 19, 6:4 $\frac{1}{4}$, 170, Sophomore, graduated from Roosevelt High, Los Angeles. Had a best as frosh of 6ft. 6 $\frac{1}{4}$ in. Also cleared 6ft. 6in. once, and 6ft. 5in. twice. Never finished lower than second in both freshman and open meets. Majoring in physical education.

JACK BARNES: 23, 6:2 $\frac{1}{2}$, 180, Senior, graduated from Dorsey High. A two-year letterman who holds school freshman high jump record of 6ft. 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. Had best last year of 6ft. 5in. in winning PCC championship. Tied for first in PCC-Big 10 dual meet at 6ft. 4 $\frac{1}{4}$ in. Majoring in art.

JERRY KINCHELOE: 20, 6:1, 160, Junior, graduated from Benson Tech, Portland, Oregon. Best last year of 6ft. 3in. May concentrate on 440 this year. Majoring in physical education.

POLE VAULT

WALT JENSEN: 22, 6:½, 158, Senior, graduated from Alameda High. Transferred last year from Modesto JC where he was national JC champion and had a best last year of 14ft. 4in. Tied for fifth in the NCAA meet. Majoring in physical education. Holds national JC record of 14ft. 3½in.

JOHN ROWAN: 27, 5:8½, 145, Senior, graduated from Maui High, Hawaiian Islands. Co-Captain of the 1951 varsity. Best last year of 14ft. Tied for fifth in the NCAA meet. 1949 best also of 14ft. Majoring in physical education.

FRANK JOHNSON: 21, 6:2, 180, Senior, graduated from Washington High. A 1949 letterman who stayed out last year and has two years of eligibility remaining. Best of 13ft. 6in. Set SC-UCLA frosh meet. record of 13ft. 6in. Majoring in physical education.

JAVELIN

LARRY GOINS: 20, 6:1, 190, Senior, graduated from Pasadena High. Transferred last year from Pasadena CC and had a best of 204ft. 11 ¾in. Majoring in physical education. Ineligible at the start of the season.

BOB HOOKS: 20, 6:1, 210, Sophomore, graduated from Washington High. Attended SC as a freshman in 1948, then transferred last semester to El Camino JC where he played football. Has thrown the javelin over 200 feet in practice. Majoring in general business.

DICK GENTHER: 19, 5:10, 196, Sophomore, graduated from Allentown, Pa. High. Did not compete as a freshman because of football injuries. Has a high school best of 180ft. Majoring in physical education.
