Varsity Prospects

"Enthusiasm runs high among the 1957 Trojan varsity track and field team—despite their ineligibility for the national collegiate championship."

So states Coach Jess Mortensen in a pre-season evaluation of this year's track squad. Because of NCAA rulings, the Trojans will be unable to avenge their loss in last year's championship meet—their first in eight years and only their eighth setback in 27 tries

Emphasis will naturally be placed on the dual meet season, and here the Trojans seem to be stronger than ever. Highlighted by two invasions of Texas, the dual meet season includes the three regular PCC foes, and Occidental, Arizona, and San Diego State.

Tremendous depth in the mid-distances, distances, and weights should give Mortensen one of his strongest dual meet teams during his seven-year reign at Troy.

An event-by-event breakdown:

SPRINTS: Together with hurdles, must rank as one of two weakest events. Dick Dorsey is ineligible. Trojans will miss senior Jim Decker, who was forced to drop out with knee injury. Top newcomers include sophs Ramon Lopez, Larry Gilbert, junior Don Risinger, and 1956 non-letterman Carl Peterson. Look for Gilbert to develop into top sprinter.

440: With a great wealth of haif-milers, Mortensen will be able to juggle his mid-distance corps in attempt to find a capable replacement for departed Mike Larrabee. Lopez has plenty of power and could develop into one of the Coast's top 440 men. Junior Murray Cockburn represented Canada in the Olympic Games as a member of the 1600-meter relay team. Other outstanding prospects include sophomores Jim Brooks, Tom Anderson, and Bob Shankland, 1956 letterman Bruce Kitchen, and non-letterman Bob Harman.

880: Troy's entries in the half-mile must rank as some of the best in history. Topped by school record holder Chuck Kirkby (1:51.2 and a non-winning 1:49.7), two-lappers include Tom Anderson (frosh record holder and an all-time best of 1:51.2), Cockburn (1:51.4), Sid Wing (1:52.3), and Shankland (1:55.2). Look for a new world mark in the two-mile relay by a quartet of the above Trojans.

MILE: Wing should rank as one of America's top milers before season is over. Has a best of 4:08.2—second fastest in SC history. Ran a sizzling 4:13.3 in mid-February time trials. Wes McLeod (4:09.1) and JC transfer Ray Hale (4:18) should give the Trojans good mile depth.

TWO-MILE: The mighty phenomenon of the track and field world, Max Truex, should be without a peer in the collegiate two-mile ranks. He entered the season with a career best of 9:01.5, second fastest in SC history. Understudies include soph John Fer and Mal Robertson, the sensation of last year's cross-country team. Letterman Chuck Tobias and Hale may also be called upon for two-mile duty.

HURDLES: Durable Bob Lawson is the only hurdler of note. Has bests of 14.6 and 23.8. Has shown no ill effects from last year's back injury in early season drills and should have best year of career. Wayne Bithell and Hank Ketels should give Bob some support in the highs.

SHOT PUT: Ray Martin's top effort as a Trojan, 57' 6½", has been beaten by only one man in SC history, the incomparable Parry O'Brien. Dick Bronson, frosh record holder at 5½' ½", has already bettered his '56 best in drills to date. Service returnee Carl Self and discusmen Rink Babka and Jack Egan give the Trojans extra strength.

DISCUS: Babka ranks as the second-best discus jockey in SC history with a best of 179' 8½". Egan—with a career best of 174' 1"—showed great improvement last year and should rank with Babka among world's best in '57.

JAVELIN: The torrid duel between Doug Maijala and Bob Voiles will be renewed this year. The two men split victory honors last year. Maijala, with a mark of 231' 2", holds a slim edge over Voiles, 227' 9½", for all-time bests. Mike Page and Ray Taylor also available.

HIGH JUMP: The ineligibility ruling for Charlie Dumas dealt the Trojans a terrific blow. The world record holder and first man to clear seven feet was to receive little competition from the collegiate ranks. Lawson, with a best of 6' $4\frac{1}{4}$ ", and Rock Burgoyne, 6' 3", will attempt to keep foes from posting a complete sweep in the event.

BROAD JUMP: Footballer C. R. Roberts and JC transfer Kirby Mannon should be able to hold their own against the nation's best. C. R. jumped 24' 41/2" as a freshman and Mannon 24'.

POLE VAULT: Ranks as Troy's strongest field event. Ron Morris, one of six men to clear 15 feet, claims the school record of 15' ½". JC transfer Ernie Bullard has a best of 14' 2". Rich Virtue, a holdover from last year's varsity, and JC transfer Jerry Hren top the list of other hopefuls.

Javelin Throw

THAT Trojan Head Coach Jess Mortensen was a three-year SC letterman in the javelin throw. He won the NCAA title in his junior year and the National AAU title the following season with his all-time best throw of 204' 1134". He also won fame as a decathlon man, winning the National AAU title in 1931 with a world record-breaking score.

THAT the SC varsity has gone through 67 consecutive dual meets without a loss since May 12, 1945 (includes a 1949 dual meet tie). The Trojans have lost but 2 dual meets since 1933.

THAT the Trojans are behind in only one dual meet series. The Troymen are two meets behind Stanford in the all-time standings—with the Indians claiming a slim 28-26 meet edge. The Trojans' greatest series edge, meanwhile, is in the UCLA standings. The SC trackmen have won 24 consecutive meets from their crosstown rivals.

THAT the Trojans have had an Olympic Games track and field champion in every Olympiad since 1912. Hurdler Fred Kelly was the first to win a gold medal—at Stockholm in 1912.

THAT Jess Hill, former SC grid coach who will succeed Willis O. Hunter as athletic director in August, was the first Trojan trackman to clear 25' in the broad jump. He turned the trick on June 1, 1929, jumping 25' %". That jump still ranks as the fourth best in SC history.

THAT T. W. Robinson set the first Trojan record in the shot put with a tremendous 15' effort in the SC-Academy Field Day Meet, January 23, 1892. That put, incidentally, was almost quadrupled by current SC record holder Parry O'Brien (59' 2½"). The SC-Academy Field Day Meet also saw Rae G. Van Cleve set α Trojan record in the high jump—4' 6".

BILL HUNTER, DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Willis O. Hunter will retire as director of intercollegiate athletics and remain as an advisor at the University of Southern California in August of this year after 37 years of service to the University and to the Southern California community, 32 of them in charge of the Trojan athletic fortunes.

Bill was born in Mt. Pleasant, Utah, on June 8, 1892, the son of a rancher. He first became interested in athletics at Wasatch Academy in Mt. Pleasant, where he was outstanding as a half-back in football, as guard on the basketball team and as a baseball player. He went East to finish his education, attending Oberlin College in Oberlin, Ohio, from 1911 to 1915. At Oberlin he played football, basketball and baseball for his three varsity years, captaining the baseball nine in his last season. As a 155-pound fullback he was named to the All-Ohio team in 1914.

After graduation he moved to San Francisco, where he began his coaching career at Polytechnic High School, handling all sports. He left Poly High to enter the Navy in 1917 and served as an ensign on a destroyer before leaving the service in 1919 after World War I.

In the fall of 1919 he was appointed assistant supervisor of physical education for the Los Angeles City Schools. Elmer Henderson, then head football coach at SC and a friend of Hunter's at Oberlin, persuaded him to help coach the Trojan backs in 1920. That began Bill's long association with the University.

Thereafter, he became basketball and baseball coach at SC in 1922, while continuing to help Henderson in football and also continuing his duties with the City Schools.

In the same year Bill was appointed director of intramural athletics at SC by Dr. Rufus B. von KleinSmid and three years later succeeded Henderson as director of intercollegiate athletics, February 11, 1925, being the exact date on which he began his tenure as the Trojan athletic boss.

The following season Howard Jones came to SC from Duke University as head coach and Hunter continued active coaching as Howard's assistant, handling the backfield. Four years later Hunter brought Sam Barry to SC from lowa to take over the basketball and baseball teams.

Those were the beginnings of the rise to national prominence of SC athletics. In the ensuing years SC was to win conference and national championships in football, track, baseball, basketball, swimming, tennis and gymnastics.

His only absence from SC since 1920 came during World War II when he served from 1942 through 1945 in the Naval Aviation Training Command at Pensacola Naval Air Station, Washington, D.C., and St. Mary's Pre-Flight School. He held the rank of full commander when he went off active duty in 1945.

In 1917 Bill married Myra Rice, whom he met at Oberlin. Mrs. Hunter undoubtedly was instrumental in bringing Bill to Los Angeles in 1919, since this is where her home had been. They have a daughter, Mrs. Russell Smith, and four grandchildren. The Hunters reside in Brentwood, California.

HEAD COACH JESS MORTENSEN

In his six seasons as SC's track and field coach, Jess Mortensen has won five straight NCAA titles and has yet to lose a dual meet.

Born in Thatcher, Arizona, on April 16, 1907, he attended Gila Academy and Gila Junior College for his freshman year.

He won two letters in football at SC as a right halfback, playing behind Lloyd Thomas in 1928 and Erny Pinckert in 1929. As a cager he earned three awards and was an All-PCC choice in 1928, his sophomore year.

As a trackman he lettered in 1928-30 as a javelin thrower. He won the NCAA title in his junior year and won the National AAU title the following season with his all-time best throw of 204 ft. 11¾ in.

Mort also won fame as a decathlon man. In 1931, while coaching at Riverside JC, he competed in his last decathlon and won the National AAU title at Lincoln, Nebraska, with a world-record-breaking score.

He handled football, basketball, baseball and track while at Riverside during his fourteen-year stint, taking time off during World War II to serve as a physical education instructor for the Navy. He was discharged in 1946 as a lieutenant (senior grade).

Upon return to Riverside he was appointed dean of men and resumed his duties as head football coach.

In 1947 he moved to the University of Denver as frosh football and head track coach. Mortensen turned out two unbeaten frosh grid teams. He also gave Denver its first Skyline Conference track championship in 1949 and developed Jerome Biffle, Olympic Games winner at Helsinki.

From there he went to West Point in a similar capacity in January, 1950, and a year later returned to SC.

Jess is married to the former Irene Ross of Riverside. They have two children—Anne, 18, and Ross, 15. They live in South Pasadena.

ASSISTANT COACH JIM SLOSSON

Assisting Mort with the Trojan trackmen this spring will be Jim Slosson, former highly successful coach at Valley JC. Slosson gained a reputation as one of the finest young coaches in this area, particularly for his work with middle-distance and distance runners during his three years at Valley, during which he never lost a Conference dual meet and only lost one meet otuside the league. In addition to his record of 27 wins in 28 meets in dual competition, Slosson's teams finished second in the state meet in 1952, won it in '53 and finished 6th in '54 (out of 40 competing schools).

Slosson was born on April 12, 1923, in Van Nuys, California, and has lived there ever since. He was L.A. City half-mile champ as a senior at Van Nuys High School in 1941. He ran for SC for three seasons (1946-48) after serving in the Army and Air Force for three years in World War II. His best times were 1:54.8 for the 880 and 48.7 for the 440.

Jim teaches geology at Valley College, as he has since the fa!l of 1950. He also is employed as a research geologist at Western Gulf Oil Co. Jim and his wife, Nancy, an SC graduate in 1947, have two children, Bonnie, 6, and Tommy, 3.

CHAMPIONS AND RECORD HOLDERS

WORLD RECORDS: 44 SC trackmen have equalled or bettered world records since 1912. The names of 6 Trojans — Mel Patton, Dick Attlesey, Parry O'Brien, George Pasquali, Ron Frazier and Norm Stocks — appear in the current record book.

OLYMPIC GAMES: SC trackmen have won 13 individual Olympic titles and have shared in nine relay victories. Forty men have won a total of 63 places on United States Olympic teams. Two Olympic records are currently held by SC men: Jack Davis, high hurdles, and Parry O'Brien, shot put.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS: SC has won 19 out of 27 NCAA meets competed in since its beginning in 1921. On five occasions they have finished second. The Trojans won nine in a row (1935-1943), and seven straight (1949-1955). A total of 51 individual championships and six current meet records highlight the record.

NATIONAL AAU CHAMPIONSHIPS: SC men have won 46 senior titles since 1905, and 35 individual junior championships before the meet was discontinued after 1951.

PACIFIC COAST CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIPS: SC has been defeated but once in the meet since 1928. This included 107 individual championships, while 8 of the 15 meet records are held by SC.
