Varsity Prospects

Prior to the start of the 1957 Trojan track season, Coach Jess Mortensen commented that "enhusiasm runs high among the team despite their ineligibility for the national collegiate championship."

Needless to say, that enthusiasm runs even higher at the start of the 1958 campaign as the Trojans set their sights on their first NCAA title in three years. Ineligible for the championship meet last year, the SC trackmen were unable to avenge their loss in the 1956 national collegiates—their first loss in eight years and only their eighth setback in 27 tries.

In addition to the NCAA meet June 13-14 at Berkeley, the 1958 Trojan track and field squad has a full slate of dual and relay meets. A new addition to the '58 schedule is the Apple Valley

At this writing, the Trojan experience breakdown appears much the same as last year: weak in the sprints, tremendous depth in the distances and weight events, and fair strength in the hurdles and jumping events.

An event-by-event breakdown:

SPRINTS: Very little improvement over the dismal picture of 1957. Heading the list is Larry Gilbert (a non-letterman), freshmen

Chuck Lindsay and Jack Holman, and Hank Hollingsworth (a converted hurdler who, according to Coach Mortensen, could develop into Troy's top sprinter before the end of the season).

440: Sophomore Ted Smith heads a talented crew of quartermilers. The slim-built Smith set a new Trobabe record last year at 47.9. In all, Mortensen can call on six under-49-seconds 440 men—Tom Anderson (48.3), Ramon Lopez (48.3), Murray Cockburn (48.4), Jim Brooks (48.4), and Bob Harman (48.9).

880: Not many track teams could lose 1:50.7 (Chuck Kirkby) and 1:51.2 (Sid Wing) half-milers and still claim the distance as one of its strongest events, but that's the happy situation that the Trojans face this year. Heading an outstanding corps of 880 men is school record holder Tom Anderson (1:50.0). Although predominantly a miler, Wes McLeod has been clocked in 1:52.0 for the distance and should see some duty at this event, as will Murray Cockburn (1:53.0), Wayne Lemons (1:54.8), and Bob Shankland (1:55.5).

MILE: Because of his great wealth of distance runners, Mortensen will be able to do considerable juggling among his 880, mile, and two-mile men to compensate for the loss of last year's standout, Sid Wing. Impressive in drills to date has been Trobaberecord holder Wayne Lemons (4:15.2). Also competing for mile honors will be Wes McLeod (4:09.1) and Bob Shankland (4:14.5). And then, of course, there's Mighty Max Truex, the holder of the fastest mile clocking in SC history at 4:06.7. And this isn't even his distance!!!

TWO-MILE: Max Truex should again be without a peer in the collegiate two-mile ranks this year. He set a new national collegiate record last year when he ran 8:55.0. Also tabbed for a top finish in this year's nationals is Mal Robertson, credited with a fine 9:07.9 effort last year.

HURDLES: A surprise double winner for both the highs and lows in last year's PCC meet, Bob Lawson could prove the real sensation of the 1958 Trojan varsity. His 14.2 and 23.3 clockings rank among the nation's best for returning collegiate hurdlers. Backing up durable Bob in the highs will be sophs Jim Waldron and Frank McConnell, with Waldron, McConnell, Jack Holman, and Charlie Dumas all in the battle for a berth in the lows.

SHOT PUT: Dave Davis' tremendous 57' 934" effort as a Trobabe last year has been beaten by only one man in SC history, the incomparable Parry O'Brien. Look for this growing lad to break every mark in the book before he's through. There's tremendous depth in this event, with Dick Bronson (54' 6") and Carl Self (52' 734" and 53' 10" in practice this spring) backing up the sophomore great.

DISCUS: Rink Babka ranks as the second-best discus jockey in SC history on the basis of his 185' 1" throw last year. With the added help of Jack Egan (174' 8"), the Trojans should go 1-2 in all dual meet competition this year, with a chance for a like finish in the nationals. Egan has shown improvement in spring workouts and could push Babka for the blue ribbon throughout the season.

JAVELIN: Gone from last year's team are the two best javelin throwers in SC history—Bob Voiles $(251'\ 51_2'')$ and Doug Maijala $(236'\ 71_2'')$. Only thrower of note on this year's team is returning letterman Mike Page $(209'\ 9'')$. Other hopefuls include Ray Taylor $(197'\ 5'')$ and footballer Don Hickman, in his first year of competition with the spear. The latter has been receiving a lot of special instruction from Voiles and shows the potential to develop into an important point-winner.

HIGH JUMP: Last year at this time, the Trojans were dealt a terrific blow by the ineligibility ruling of Charlie Dumas. But the

American record holder is now ready for a big year as a Trojan thindlad. Dumas, it may be remembered, was the first man in track and field history to clear seven feet. Back for a final year of action following a year's ineligibility is Junior Singh, with a best of 6' 5".

BROAD JUMP: Sophomore Chuck Lindsay should rank among the nation's best this year. He set a new Trobabe record in 1957 with a best of 24' 63". Other hopefuls include Kirby Mannon (24' 36") and Jim Waldron (23' 1½"). Workhorse Bob Lawson has a best of 23' 93" and may be called upon for some help.

POLE VAULT: The Trojans will sorely miss the departed Ron Morris, school record holder at 15′ 2½″. And it'll be a year before freshman Jim Brewer will be eligible for varsity competition. The Trojans in 1958, however, can call on two 14-footers—Jerry Hren and Ernie Bullard. Also available are soph Dick Reese (13′ 5¾″) and JC transfer Gene Freudenthal (13′ 8″).

JESS HILL, DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

On September 1, 1957, Jess Hill became Director of Intercollegiate Athletics at the University of Southern California upon the retirement of Willis O. Hunter. Hill retired as head football coach at the end of the 1956 season, at which time he completed six successful years as the Trojan football coach.

Born Jesse Terrill Hill in Yates, Missouri, on January 20, 1907, Jess came west with his family ten years later and became one of the top athletes in southern California while at Corona High School. From the fall of 1923 to the spring of 1925, he was awarded ten letters in five sports.

Following his graduation from Corona in 1925, Hill attended Riverside Junior College for one year, earning letters in football, baseball and track as Riverside fielded championship teams in all four sports.

Jess entered SC in February, 1927, and continued to exhibit his all-around athletic prowess, playing football and baseball and compiling an outstanding track and field record.

He became the first Trojan in history to surpass 25 feet in the broad jump, leaping 25' 7/8" to win the 1929 IC4A title. This mark has been bettered by only three Trojans since 1929.

Also outstanding in his studies, Jess graduated cum laude following the 1930 collegiate baseball season.

Hill signed immediately to play professional baseball and enjoyed a brilliant ten-year career in Triple-A and Major League ball. He compiled a lifetime average of .306, seeing service with the Yankees, Senators, Athletics and Oakland, Hollywood and Newark.

In the off-season during his professional baseball years, Jess launched his coaching career at Corona High. Just as in his playing days, he moved from Corona to Riverside JC. His next position was at Long Beach JC, where he was on the physical education and coaching staff when World War II came.

Hill enlisted in the Navy in March of 1942 and served until February of 1946, when he was separated from active duty with the rank of Lieutenant Commander.

Jess returned to Long Beach City College after getting out of the Navy and immediately piloted the junior college baseball team to a Conference championship.

Hill returned to SC in the fall of 1946 to begin a period of ten years of advancement within the athletic department. His first team at SC, the 1946 frosh football team, went through an undefeated season. In 1948 he was selected as assistant track coach, being groomed to succeed Dean Cromwell as head track coach after the latter's retirement at the end of the '48 season.

Hill had two undefeated years, 1949 and 1950, as head track coach at SC, continuing the great Trojan track heritage and winning two National Championships.

Early in 1951 he was named head football coach, following the resignation of Jeff Cravath. In 1952, Hill steered the Trojan varsity through an undefeated Conference season and a 7-0 win over Wisconsin in the Rose Bowl game. That win is still the only PCC victory over the Big Ten in the Pasadena game since the Bowl pact began eleven years ago.

Hill's six-year record as head football coach at SC was 45 wins,

17 losses and 1 tie for a .722 winning percentage.

Jess is married to the former Elizabeth Helen Glass. They have two children, Mrs. Mary Bett Carter, 25 and an SC graduate, and Jess Jr., 16. The Hills reside in San Marino.

HEAD COACH JESS MORTENSEN

In his seven seasons as SC's track and field coach, Jess Mortensen has won five straight NCAA titles and has yet to lose a dual meet.

Born in Thatcher, Arizona, on April 16, 1907, he attended Gila Academy and Gila Junior College for his freshman year.

He won two letters in football at SC as a right halfback, playing behind Lloyd Thomas in 1928 and Erny Pinckert in 1929. As a cager, he earned three awards and was an All-PCC choice in 1928, his sophomore year.

As a trackman he lettered in 1928-30 as a javelin thrower. He won the NCAA title in his junior year and won the National AAU title the following season with his all-time best throw of 204 ft. 1134 in.

Mort also won fame as a decathlon man. In 1931, while coaching at Riverside JC, he competed in his last decathlon and won the National AAU title at Lincoln, Nebraska, with a world-record-breaking score.

He handled football, basketball, baseball and track while at Riverside during his fourteen-year stint, taking time off during World War II to serve as a physical education instructor for the Navy. He was discharged in 1946 as a lieutenant (senior grade).

Upon his return to Riverside, he was appointed dean of men and resumed his duties as head football coach.

In 1947, he moved to the University of Denver as frosh football and head track coach. Mortensen turned out two unbeaten frosh grid teams. He also gave Denver its first Skyline Conference track championship in 1949 and developed Jerome Biffle, Olympic Games winner at Helsinki.

From there he went to West Point in a similar capacity in January, 1950, and a year later returned to SC.

Jess is married to the former Irene Ross of Riverside. They have two children—Anne, 19, and Ross, 16. They live in South Pasadena.

ASSISTANT COACH JIM SLOSSON

Jim is in his fourth season as assistant track coach at SC.

Before his move to SC, Slosson gained a reputation as one of the finest young coaches in this area while at Valley JC, particularly for his work with middle-distance and distance runners. In his three years at Valley, he never lost a Conference dual meet and only lost one meet outside the league. In addition to his record of 27 wins in 28 meets in dual competition, Slosson's teams finished second in the state meet in 1952, won it in 1953, and finished sixth in 1954.

Since his move to SC in 1955, he has been credited with playing an important role in the development of Max Truex, Sid Wing, Mal Robertson, and more recent top Trojan distance runners.

Slosson was born on April 12, 1923, in Van Nuys, California, and has lived there ever since. He was L.A. City half-mile champ as a senior at Van Nuys High School in 1941. Following a tour of service with the Army Air Corps during World War II, he ran three years of track at SC (1946-48). His best times were 1:54.8 for the 880 and 48.7 for the 440.

Recently obtaining his doctorate in Geology from SC, Jim has been teaching geology at Valley JC since 1950. He is also head of the Earth Science Department at the Junior College.

Jim and his wife, Nancy, an SC graduate in 1947, have two children, Bonnie, 7, and Tommy, 4.

CHAMPIONS AND RECORD HOLDERS

WORLD RECORDS: 46 SC trackmen have equalled or bettered world records since 1912. The names of 4 Trojans — Mel Patton, Parry O'Brien, Jack Davis and Jim Lea — appear in the current record book.

OLYMPIC GAMES: SC trackmen have won 13 individual Olympic titles and have shared in nine relay victories. Forty men have won a total of 63 places on United States Olympic teams. Two Olympic records are currently held by SC men: Jack Davis, high hurdles, and Parry O'Brien, shot put.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS: SC has won 19 out of 27 NCAA meets competed in since its beginning in 1921. On five occasions they have finished second. The Trojans won nine in a row (1935-1943), and seven straight (1949-1955). A total of 51 individual championships and six current meet records highlight the record.

NATIONAL AAU CHAMPIONSHIPS: SC men have won 47 senior titles since 1905, and 35 individual junior championships before the meet was discontinued after 1951.

PACIFIC COAST CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIPS: SC has been defeated but once in the meet since 1928. This included 114 individual championships, while 10 of the 15 meet records are held by SC.
