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Varsity Prospects

Vern Wolfe, one of America's bright young track coaches, returns to the University of Southern California as head coach under challenging circumstances.

Wolfe, a post-war pole vaulter for USC under the old master, Dean Cromwell, inherits some top talent for 1963, but he also falls heir to a heavy burden: attempting to put the Trojans back on the national track pedestal from which they were toppled last season by Oregon's awesome Webfoots.

Those familiar with Wolfe's skills, however, feel that Troy's track destinies are in capable hands and that 1963 may be the starting point for a memorable new athletic chapter to follow in the proud tradition established by his predecessors, Cromwell and Jess Mortensen.

Trojan track suffered another serious loss last year with the death of Mortensen just as the season was to get underway, following which Athletic Director Jess Hill took over and served as interim coach for one season.

Optimism is apparent for 1963, but Wolfe tempers that optimism by cautioning that his squad has weak spots, lacks depths in other events and that Bill Bowerman's Oregonians will carry another powerful, well-balanced team against the Trojans in their dual meet at Eugene April 6 and into the NCAA championships at Albuquerque, N.M., June 13-15.

Only 7 3/7 points return from USC's 27 3/7 and disappointing third-place finish in the Eugene-held NCAA meet of 1962. Making up the 20 points lost are two NCAA champions, world-record shot putter Dallas Long (graduated) and school-record javelin thrower Jan Sikorsky (left school).

But to base the Trojan outlook on such statistics would be erroneous. Of the returning point getters, 440 man Rex Cawley (one point) looks ready for a big season in that race as well as the 220 and the 440-yard hurdles, and could easily improve upon his own quarter-mile school mark of 46.2. Cawley shows no effects of the 1961 leg injury which definitely hampered last season's campaign.

Brian Polkinghorne, surprise third-placer in the NCAA high hurdles (6 points), figures to better last year's 14.0 performance, and he is joined by a completely fit Bob Pierce (13.8n), who picked up eight big points in the 1961 NCAA but who failed to repeat in last year's championship and missed much of last season with a leg injury.

Pole vaulter Mel Hein Jr., who accounted for the remaining 3/7th of a point with his fifth-place NCAA tie, already has cleared 15'8" indoors this season and soon should join the ever-expanding 16-foot club. Teammate Mike Flanagan, who matched Hein's school-record 15'4 1/2" in the opening USC-UCLA Relays, also will be a factor in any major competition.

Unquestionably, the key to Troy's track fortunes this season rests with a half-dozen acquisitions to the varsity. The top newcomers are sophomore high jumper Lew Hoyt, who rubbed out the school record with a brilliant opening 1963 leap of 7' 1/2"; national JC javelin record-holder Larry Stuart; state JC sprint champ Dave Morris; miler Doug Calhoun, who stepped off a promising 4:09.1n last season as a frosh; state JC two-mile champ Frank Muller and JC shot-put transfer Dennis Wynn.

Strong-running Kevin Hogan, whose switch to the half mile in 1962 resulted in a school-record 1:49.6, gives USC a national caliber entry in the 440 as well as the 880. Also bidding for national recognition will be steadily improving

two-miler Julio Marin, fast-accelerating sprinter Dick Cortese and still-climbing high jumper George Fleckenstein.

A fast rundown by events for the 1963 campaign (with 1962 best marks listed unless otherwise noted):

SPRINTS: Troy boasts a strong one-two punch in Dave Morris (9.5, 20.3) and Dick Cortese (9.6n, 21.2n), who has looked sharp in pre-season trials, and this event may be stronger than a year ago despite the loss of dependable point getter Bruce Munn (9.5n and 20.8n). Quartermile ace Rex Cawley may see action in the 220, and could be one of the best. With hurdler Bob Pierce and Cawley lending a hand, the Trojans will be top contenders in any sprint relay company. **RATING:** Excellent.

MID-DISTANCES: In Cawley (46.2) and Kevin Hogan (46.5n), USC claims two of the nation's leading 440 men. With Ted Doll (47.7n) and Jack Talsky (48.4n) adding depth, the Trojans expect to challenge Arizona State University's powerful mile relay team for national supremacy. Hogan moved up to the 880 with outstanding success last season (1:49.6) and probably will concentrate on the longer race. Returning strength in the halfmile includes Tom Lile (1:50.5n) and Ted Eggleston (1:52.7). Chris Johnson comes up from the frosh expected to offer valuable help here and in the mile. **RATING:** Good.

DISTANCES: Wolfe anticipates notable improvement in this area, a Trojan soft spot in recent seasons. Newcomers Doug Calhoun, who posted a non-winning 4:09.1 mile as a frosh, and Frank Muller, state JC two-mile champ (9:16.9) at Glendale College in 1962, give USC a top trio rounded out by the oncoming little Costa Rican, Julio Marin, whose indoor two-mile of 8:58.2 in the winter promises better things for the outdoor campaign. He had a 1962 best of 9:06.2n. Chris Johnson, who reeled off a surprising 4:13 mile drill in early practice, could provide an assist in that event as should Muller, who has a 4:14.0n junior college mark to his credit. **RATING:** Good.

HURDLES: Troy undoubtedly holds the top college hurdles hand in the country with its brilliant senior twosome of Bob Pierce (13.8n) and Brian Polkinghorne (14.0n). It will be a comebacking year for Pierce who was slowed up for the major meets last season by a muscle injury. But pre-season form suggests that he will plunge under the 13.8 best he achieved as a sophomore. Polkinghorne, who came on with a rush late last season, figures to score heavily again in the nationals and may find the brand-new 330-yard medium hurdles right down his alley in dual meets. Pierce, who whipped over the 220-yard lows in 22.8 two years ago, also will give the 330s a whirl. But there's little question that Cawley will prove USC's No. 1 gun in the untried event. World ranked for two seasons in the 400-meter hurdles with a superb school-record clocking of 49.9 in 1961 behind him, the fluid-striding senior should rule the collegiate roost, barring any bad luck. Rex came along slowly a year ago while recuperating from the deep muscle pull that cut him down at the pinnacle of his sophomore season. Junior college transfer Theo Viltz (14.8) may provide dual-meet help in the highs. **RATING:** Excellent.

SHOT PUT: Replacing the incomparable Dallas Long, who left no world's to conquer in his four-year career at USC, would be an insurmountable task for any coach. Long, who surpassed 60 feet in 69 of the 77 meets he competed in for Troy, won his third consecutive NCAA crown and capped his senior season with a prodigious world record of 65'10 1/2". However, Wolfe holds high hopes for incoming junior Dennis Wynn,

whose first effort as a Trojan (55'9½") was a personal best. Wolfe believes Wynn could approach 60 feet this season. Newcomer Dave Dornsife (50'3") and returnee Ed Shuey (50'2½") complete the candidates. **RATING:** Fair.

DISCUS: The loss of Jim Wade (170'3½" last year) leaves the Trojans without a proven discus thrower. Troy must depend on Mike Rowe, a Citrus JC transfer with potential (164'5½"), returning Terry Mix (156'8½") and inexperienced Chris Davis (147"). This event could prove an achilles heel unless unexpected development is shown. **RATING:** Fair.

JAVELIN: When a track team loses an NCAA champion, it could be excused for singing the blues. But there'll be no sad songs for Troy in the javelin despite the departure from school of Jan Sikorsky, national college champ and school record holder (261'3½"). The Trojans may have a ready successor for NCAA honors in Larry Stuart, who attained world class (256'2") at Santa Ana JC and looks capable of longer distances. Footballer Ernie Jones (176'7½") could climb to 200 feet and provide vital dual-meet points. **RATING:** Good.

BROAD JUMP: Sophomore Carlos De La Rosa, who was a 24-foot jumper as a prep, should beef up this event considerably if he matures as Wolfe expects. Last season De La Rosa disappointed with his freshmen best of 22'10", but a year's seasoning should help. Max Johnson returns to the varsity hopeful of improving upon his 23'4¾" of 1962. **RATING:** Fair.

POLE VAULT: The soaring pole vault explosion touched off by the spectacular fiberglass pole finds USC well fixed with two candidates for 16-foot honors, senior Mel Hein Jr. (15'4½") and junior Mike Flanagan (15'4½"). Each cracked the school record to start the current season following Hein's indoor effort of 15'8" and no ceiling is apparent for these two sky climbers this season. Ernie Jones, after a great year as a punting specialist with Troy's national champion football team, will give the vault a try. He has a prep mark of 13 feet. **RATING:** Excellent.

HIGH JUMP: The Trojan tradition of excellence in the high jump carries on with the acquisition of dedicated sophomore Lew Hoyt, who already has swept past the top performances of his noted predecessors, Charlie Dumas, Bob Avant, Ernie Shelton and Johnny Wilson. Wolfe sees some flaws in his pupil's style, despite the stunning 7'½", and feels that Hoyt is bound to go higher. George Fleckenstein, off to a good start himself this season with a best of 6'8½", gives USC a strong second man and a threat for NCAA points. **RATING:** Excellent.

TRIPLE JUMP: This long-neglected event, until recently designated as the hop, step and jump, will be one of experimentation for a quartet of unseasoned Trojans who are candidates in the first season the triple jump has been included on the NCAA dual-meet program. Broad jumpers Carlos De La Rosa (42'6") and Max Johnson (41'8¼") are joined by hurdler Brian Polkinghorne (43'10") and pole vaulter Mike Flanagan (42'11") in attempting to master the intricacies of this rugged jumping test. None is rated outstanding, and the triple jump may be a troublemaker for Wolfe this season. **RATING:** Fair.

Born Jesse Terrill Hill in Yates, Missouri, on January 20, 1907, Jess came west with his family ten years later and became one of the top athletes in southern California while at Corona High School. From the fall of 1923 to the spring of 1925, he was awarded ten letters in five sports.

Following his graduation from Corona in 1925, Hill attended Riverside Junior College for one year, earning letters in football, basketball, baseball and track as Riverside fielded championship teams in all four sports.

Jess entered USC in February, 1927, and continued to exhibit his all-around athletic prowess, playing football and baseball and compiling an outstanding track and field record.

He became the first Trojan in history to surpass 25 feet in the broad jump, leaping 25' $\frac{7}{8}$ " to win the 1929 IC4A title. This mark has been bettered by only three Trojans since 1929.

Also outstanding in his studies, Jess graduated cum laude following the 1930 collegiate baseball season.

Hill signed immediately to play professional baseball and enjoyed a brilliant ten-year career in Triple-A and Major League ball. He compiled a lifetime average of .306, seeing service with the Yankees, Senators, Athletics and Oakland, Hollywood and Newark.

In the off-season during his professional baseball years, Jess launched his coaching career at Corona High. Just as in his playing days, he moved from Corona to Riverside JC. His next position was at Long Beach JC, where he was on the physical education and coaching staff when World War II came.

Hill enlisted in the Navy in March of 1942 and served until February of 1946, when he was separated from active duty with the rank of Lieutenant Commander.

Jess returned to Long Beach City College after getting out of the Navy and immediately piloted the junior college baseball team to a Conference championship.

Hill returned to USC in the fall of 1946 to begin a period of ten years of advancement within the athletic department. His first team at USC, the 1946 frosh football team, went through an undefeated season. In 1948 he was selected as assistant track coach, being groomed to succeed Dean Cromwell as head track coach after the latter's retirement at the end of the '48 season.

Hill had two undefeated years, 1949 and 1950, as head track coach at USC, continuing the great Trojan track heritage and winning two National Championships.

Early in 1951 he was named head football coach, following the resignation of Jeff Cravath. In 1952, Hill steered the Trojan varsity through an undefeated Conference season and a 7-0 win over Wisconsin in the Rose Bowl game.

Hill's six-year record as head football coach at USC was 45 wins, 17 losses and 1 tie for a .722 winning percentage.

On September 1, 1957, Hill officially succeeded Willis O. Hunter as Director of Athletics. Jess took over as acting head

track coach in the spring of 1962 after the sudden death of his close friend Jess Mortensen. His team won the AAWU Conference crown, and placed 3rd in the NCAA finals.

Jess is married to the former Elizabeth Helen Glass. They have two children, Mrs. Mary Bett Carter, a USC graduate, and Jess Jr., a senior at USC. The Hills reside in West Los Angeles.

HEAD COACH VERN WOLFE

Vern Wolfe, former Trojan track star, was appointed to the post of head track and field coach at USC at the conclusion of the 1962 season. Wolfe, who earned varsity letters at USC in 1946 and 1947, succeeded Jess Hill as head mentor of Troy's track and field fortunes. Hill served as interim coach for the 1962 season as a result of the sudden death of Jess Mortensen just as the season was to get underway.

The 39-year-old Wolfe becomes only the fourth head track and field coach at USC since 1909. Dean Cromwell held the post from that time until 1948, with Hill taking over the reins for the 1949 and 1950 seasons. Mortensen, meanwhile, took over the post in 1951 and held the position until his death in February of 1962.

The new Trojan coach is no stranger to USC track and field. Following an outstanding career at Gardena High School, where he won honors as an All-League back in football and in track as a pole vaulter, Wolfe, entered the University of Southern California. Winning a monogram with the 1941 frosh team, he also saw duty with the 1942 varsity squad before being called to military duty.

Following three and one-half years of service with the Paratroops, he was discharged in 1946 and returned to USC, winning varsity letters in 1946 and 1947. Obtaining a bachelor and master's degree in Education, he graduated from the University in 1949.

Wolfe started his track coaching career at Torrance High School in 1952. Following three years at the local school, he moved on to North Phoenix High School in Arizona for the 1955 season. It was during his six-year reign at North Phoenix that he gained a reputation as one of the nation's most successful prep track and field coaches.

While at North Phoenix, he coached Jim Brewer, the first prepster to clear 14 and then 15 feet in the pole vault, and Dallas Long, national interscholastic record holder in 1955-56-57-58 and the first high schooler to better 60 feet with the 16-pound shot. Both trackmen went on to USC to become Trojan record holders. Brewer until this season claimed the Trojan pole vault mark at 15 ft. 4 in. while Long, currently in dental school at USC, broke the world mark with a put of 65 ft. 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ in., last season.

Other outstanding athletes coached by Wolfe at North Phoenix were George Davies, claimant of the best vault by a collegian in 1961 at 15 ft. 10 $\frac{1}{4}$ in., and Karl Johnstone, who set a new high school record for the discus in 1959 and is currently ranked as the third-best collegiate discus thrower in the country.

The new Trojan coach moved on to San Jose State College as head frosh and varsity field event coach in 1961. While at San Jose, he helped coach a trio of his pole vaulters to become the first three collegiate vaulters from the same school to clear 15 feet or better in the same meet.

Wolfe moved on to the head coaching post at the newly-established Foothill Junior College in Los Altos for the 1962 season. Although a brand-new institution, Foothill ran away with this year's Coast Conference track title—outscored their closest opponents by one-hundred points—and finished fifth in the State Junior College meet.

Outstanding athletes at Foothill Junior College last year included Mahoney Samuels, national JC and frosh record holder in the hop, step, and jump; Allan Chapman, a 4:13.2 miler; Charles Oakley, a 1:51.0 half-miler; Clayton Anderson, a 6 ft. 7 3/4 in. high jumper; and Dan Washer, a 14 ft. 4 1/4 in. pole vaulter. His distance medley relay team, meanwhile, led the nation with the best clocking for junior colleges and frosh teams with a 10:05.4 effort.

Vern resides in Lomita with his wife, Marilyn, and two boys, Corey, age nine, and Dean, age six. The latter is named after Dean Cromwell, Wolfe's track coach in his undergraduate days at USC.

ASSISTANT COACH WILLIE WILSON

Willie came to USC in July of last year after guiding La Habra High School track and field from 1954 through 1962.

A graduate of Pepperdine College, Wilson took over the track and cross country coaching reins at La Habra in 1954 and proceeded to produce championship teams during his nine-year reign. His 1958 and 1959 teams won the league track crowns while his cross country squads annexed four consecutive loop titles (1958-1961) and clinched the 1961 CIF championship.

Among the stars he developed during his coaching career at La Habra is Bruce Bess, CIF mile champion and claimant of one of the fastest four-lappers ever recorded by a prepster. Bess is a member of the USC frosh team this year.

Willie will serve as a part-time member of the USC coaching staff. He also serves as Director of Physical Education, Recreation, and Attendance for the La Habra City Elementary School District.

Willie lives in La Habra with his wife, Joan. They have four children—Sam, 14; Jane, 11; Bill, 10; and Jim 7.

Trojan Track History

MISCELLANEOUS

CHAMPIONS AND RECORD HOLDERS

WORLD RECORDS: 50 USC trackmen have equalled or bettered world records since 1912.

OLYMPIC GAMES: USC trackmen have won 13 individual Olympic titles and have shared in nine relay victories. Forty-four men have won a total of 69 places on United States Olympic teams. One Olympic Games record is held by a Trojan: Jack Davis, high hurdles.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS: USC has won 21 out of 31 NCAA meets competed in since its beginning in 1921. On six occasions they have finished second. The Trojans won nine in a row (1935-1943), and seven straight (1949-1955). A total of 63 individual championships highlight the record.

NATIONAL AAU CHAMPIONSHIPS: USC trackmen have won 75 individual senior AAU championships.

PACIFIC COAST CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIPS: USC was defeated but once in the meet from 1928 through 1959. This included 119 individual championships, while nine of the 17 meet records are held by Trojans.
