Varsity Prospects

Six sophomores and a gilt-edged junior college transfer could tell the story of 1965 Traian track and field.

For the first time in three years at his alma mater's track helm, Vern Wolfe will be relying heavily on young and relatively inexperienced talent to perpetuate Troy's preeminent position in the national picture.

These half dozen first-year men are good ones—all hold or share freshman records—and the JC acquisition carries impressive credentials in the dashes and 440 (9.6, 20.8n and 46.6n times), but Wolfe admits that sophomores can be unreliable. Trojan hopes of reclaiming the national collegiate crown won two years ago in Wolfe's introductory season will depend very largely on valuable seasoning gained during dual meets.

All-time prep 880 great Dennis Carr (1:49.7n), high hurdler Paul Kerry (14.2), pole vaulter Bill Fosdick (15'6½"), discus thrower Gary Carlsen (173'2") and quartermilers Dave Buck (47.5) and Hutch Gibb (48.3n) are the ace sophomores who figure so prominently in Wolfe's plans. Dwight Middleton, who sat out last season at Foothill College after sophomore competition at San Jose State, gives USC first-class sprinting and a potential NCAA point winner in the 440.

A hard corps of holdovers, halfmiler Bruce Bess, hurdler Theo Viltz, shot putter Don Castle and long jumper Wellesley Clayton, who aggregated 16 points in the NCAA meet, provide reliable, experienced help along with school high jump record holder Lew Hoyt (7'1/s'1), who won the USTFF title but failed in the NCAA meet, and triple jumper Mahoney Samuels, who is recovering nicely from surgery to remove a calcium deposit near the pelvic bone. Jamaican Samuels, national JC record setter at Foothill College three years ago, should be ready to soar past the winning 51'11/4" mark he posted in the 1964 AAWU meet when injury forced him out for the season.

Hard-to-replace losses will be Trojan javelin record holder Larry Stuart (267'3"); New Zealand weightman Les Mills, No. 2 shot putter (62'1½") and No. 2 discus thrower (191'½") in school history; sprinters Dave Morris (9.3, 21.1) and Dick Cortese (9.5n, 20.8n) and record-holding pole vaulter Mike Flanagan (15'9½").

Mills, a 29-year-old athlete with family responsibilities who qualified for his nation's Olympic team last fall and picked up a shot-put seventh at Tokyo, elected to forego his final season's eligibility in favor of returning to business interests in New Zealand.

Undeniably, Troy has track and field soft spots this season, especially the javelin in which no proved performer is available in light of leg ailments continuing to plague John Yancy, last year's promising sophomore. But the overall outlook, both dual and national, presents a much brighter hue than confronted Wolfe a season back.

In Carr, Bess and Chris Johnson, the Trojans wheel out three of their best-ever mid-distance prospects, indicating that a powerful two-mile relay team is in the making.

Equally imposing is Wolfe's stock of quarternilers who appear capable of challenging California's powerful returning foursome for all-important NCAA points in the mile relay.

Carr, Buck, Gibb and Phil Lee blended for a frosh mile relay record of 3:10.6n in 1964, and with the inclusion of Middleton as anchor or third man, the combine should plunge to 3:07 or better.

The Viltz-Kerry twosome gives USC solid hurdling strength and more point potential for the nationals.

On the field, the ability to project Tray into national contention again rests on come-through performances by so, homores like Fosdick and Carlsen and on continuing excellence by old reliables Castle, Clayton and Hoyt.

Barring a repetition of 1964's injury-ridden season, the Trojans should be in a position to improve their third-place NCAA standing of a year ago and make a strong run at highly rated New Mexico, San Jose State, Oregon State and California teams for the top track prize.

A brief rundown by events for the 1965 campaign (with 1964 best marks listed unless otherwise noted):

SPRINTS: Loss of the dependable Dave Morris-Dick Cortese duo hurts, but Dwight Middleton's San Jose State clockings two seasons ago (9.6, 20.8nt) suggest he'll ably take up part of the slack. Junior college transfer Steve Firenze could improve off 9.7 and 21.1n times at San Mateo JC. Footballer Phil Lee, who won his Trojan spurs as a defensive halfback last fall, apparently has shaken off hamstring miseries and may run back to his prep times of 9.6n, 21.1n. Long jumper Wellesley Clayton (9.8n) will lend dual-meet aid. RATING: Good.

MID-DISTANCES: Traditionally a Trojan strongpoint, the middle distances again look formidable. Middleton can shave 46-flat in the 440, Wolfe believes. Three parts of the recordbreaking freshman mile relay team, Dave Buck, Hutch Gibb and Dennis Carr, all are rated highly. Buck, a strong runner who will be used occasionally in the 880, has great potential as does Gibb, who only needs to gain strength to dip below 47.0 in the quarter. And the toughest competitor of them all may be Carr, who loves to win at any distance including his favorite 880 event. Carr, whose 1:49.7n as a freshman was disappointing by comparison with his all-time prep mark of 1:49.2n, should be ready to contend for national collegiate honors in the halfmile. Bruce Bess, who came on strong at the crucial moment for an NCAA third (1:48.9m) last year, had his training set back by a brief bout with mononucleosis. and early in the campaign will confine himself to halfmiling. Chris Johnson, fourth fastest USC miler in history (4:07.3nl. figures to improve on his '64 best of 1:50.9n. RATING: Excellent.

DISTANCES: With No. 1 man Bruce Bess [4:02.7n] temporarily incapacitated, Chris Johnson will carry Troy's mile banner. And it will be in good hands off his early indoor performance of 4:06.6 at Portland, Ore. Johnson was a pleasant late-season development with his 3:47.6 (comparable to a 4:04.6 mile) for 1,500 meters and fifth in the USTFF championships. He should get adequate help from Doug Calhoun, who looks sharp early with a 4:13.4 time trial. In the two mile, Calhoun eyes his finest season after last year's meet-saving 9:14.2 win against Cal. But the big surprise may be senior Gary Goettelmann, who bettered his USC best by some 18 seconds with a nifty 9:10.6 in January all-comers competition. Wendell Cox, 4:15.4 freshman miler, is another candidate at both distances. RATING: Good.

HURDLES: Theo Viltz (14.1n) and Paul Kerry (14.2) could become a high-hurdling tandem to be remembered with such great Trojan twosomes of the past as Cope and Staley, Davis and Wright and Pierce and Polkinghorne. Viltz snapped back from spring football chores last season to come through when it counted in the blue-chip meets, winning the AAWU crown and scoring a surprise NCAA fourth. Kerry, twice tieing the frosh highs record, made a remarkable bigtime showing, too,

by chasing NCAA and USTFF champ Bobby May for second place in the federation championships. Wolfe would be disappointed if both barrier men fail to break 14-flat. Two years' seasoning lends to the belief that Viltz will come into his own over the demanding 330-yard intermediates. He trimmed his 1964 time to 37.5 and may approach Rex Cawley's school-record 36.5. Kerry (39.4), completely over last year's muscle pull, has the stamina for this race, and Rod Sherman (39.2n), hero of last fall's fabled football win over Notre Dame, will take another crack at the event between spring scrimmages. RATING: Excellent.

SHOT PUT: Don Castle, who became the third Trojan in history over 60 feet last spring with 60'93'/4" and then saw teammate Les Mills move past him with late summer throws, has added 15 pounds for strength and hopes for added distance as well at 230 pounds. Mills' decision to pass up his senior season to return Down Under hurts this event, but Troy gains a good prospect in powerful linebacker Jeff Smith, who won the state JC title at Long Beach CC last year with 57'8 ½" and has all the tools to surpass 60 feet. Bob Young, another possibility for points, hit 54'6" as a freshman. RATING: Excellent.

DISCUS: With the loss of Les Mills, who hit 182'7" during the regular season and boosted that to 191' ½" during the summer, Vern Wolfe obviously needs a big man to step into his shoes. And he has just such an ample-sized individual in growing sophomore Gary Carlsen, frosh record holder at 173'2". Carlsen beefed up some 25 pounds to 230 on an accelerated summer weightlifting program and Wolfe envisions great things after a 181'2" early all-comers toss by this young 6-3 ½ giant. Smith, already over 160 feet in practice, tossed 159'7 ½" for fifth in the '64 state JC meet and has set his sights on 170 feet at least. Returnee Dave Davies (154'6'¼") rounds out the top candidates. RATING: Excellent.

JAVELIN: For the first time in years USC cannot count on a first-rate javelin thrower, unless gimpy John Yancy recovers his health and rejoins the team. Only ray of hope is Santa Ana JC acquisition Dick Carter (197'41/3"). The situation is so desperate that mid-distance man Dave Buck, a cooperative fellow, has been drafted to try the event and shows some promise. RATING: Fair.

LONG JUMP: One of the most consistent long jumpers in school history, Wellesley Clayton (25'8") 10 times exceeded 25 feet in 1964 and posted the longest winning leap ever by a Trojan. Shows no signs of the muscle strain that occurred in last year's conference meet and should become first 26-foot performer for Troy. Carlos De La Rosa (24'5½") improved steadily from meet to meet last season, picking up fourth-place points in the AAWU championships. Triple jumper Mahoney Samuels (23'5¼"), apparently sound after summer surgery, should provide valuable dual-meet help here. RAT-ING: Good.

POLE VAULT: In this advanced age of the fiberglass pole, standards of excellence continue to climb. And Troy possesses a pole vaulter in Bill Fosdick (15'6'\(\frac{1}{2}'\)") who is climbing right along with them. This dedicated sophomore is expected to soar into the 16-foot range this season, thus erasing Mike Flanagan's school standard of 15'9'\(\frac{1}{4}'\). Bill Milne (14'), another sophomore, has 15-foot potential. Doug Swartz and Dave Saffren, varsity holdovers, should improve upon last year's 14-foot marks. RATING: Good.

HIGH JUMP: Healthy, Lew Hoyt is one of the world's best, but that condition was an infrequent one the past season, unfortunately. If he escapes further injury, the senior from San Marino should wipe out his sophomore-set varsity record of 7'1/2" and contend once again for the NCAA title. Mike Parker, who looked like a comer last year with an early season 6'7'1/4" clearance, reports his knee mending well from surgery to correct a cartilage condition. He has the stuff to jump 6'10" or better as does sizeable sophomore Jerry Murphy, who uncorked a January all-comers leap of 6'6". RATING: Excellent.

TRIPLE JUMP: Wolfe promises that several records, including Luther Hayes' four-year-old USC mark of $51'9\,\%_2''$, will tumble if Mahoney Samuels comes up sound after two offseason operations. The springy Jamaican bounced 52'7'' indoors before succumbing to leg trouble last season. Carlos De La Rosa (46'6 $\%_2''$), having mastered the mechanics of the tricky triple jump, now looks for 48 feet or better. Steve Bloomfield, inactive last year with mononucleosis, recorded 46'5'' in all-comers action during the summer and could be a dual-meet factor. Big footballer Mike Hull, jumping $45'8\,\%_2'''$ with little training in 1964, has vast possibilities. RATING: Good.

JESS HILL. DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Jess Hill, former track and football coach at Troy who is in his eighth year as Director of Intercollegiate Athletics at the University of Southern California, looks back on the 1962-63 athletic season as the most memorable in his long association with sports.

In that school year USC's athletic program accomplished the unprecedented feat of winning five national collegiate championships-in football, swimming, track and field, baseball and tennis.

Born Jesse Terrill Hill in Yates, Missouri, on January 20, 1907, Jess came west with his family ten years later and became one of the top athletes in Southern California while at Corona High School. From the fall of 1923 to the spring of 1925, he was awarded ten letters in five sports.

Following his graduation from Corona in 1925, Hill attended Riverside Junior College for one year, earning letters in football, basketball, baseball and track as Riverside fielded championship teams in all four sports.

Jess entered USC in February, 1927, and continued to exhibit his all-around athletic prowess, playing football and baseball and compiling an outstanding track and field record.

He became the first Trojan in history to surpass 25 feet in the broad jump, leaping 25" %" to win the 1929 IC4A title. This mark has been bettered by only six Trojans since 1929.

Also outstanding in his studies, Jess graduated cum laude following the 1930 collegiate baseball season.

Hill signed immediately to play professional baseball and enjoyed a brilliant ten-year career in Triple-A and Major League ball. He compiled a lifetime average of .306, seeing service with the Yankees, Senators, Athletics and Oakland, Hollywood and Newark.

In the off-season during his professional baseball years, Jess launched his coaching career at Corona High. Just as in his playing days, he moved from Corona to Riverside JC. His next position was at Long Beach JC, where he was on the physical education and coaching staff when World War II

Hill enlisted in the Navy in March of 1942 and served until February of 1946, when he was separated from active duty with the rank of Lieutenant Commander.

Jess returned to Long Beach City College after getting out of the Navy and immediately piloted the junior college baseball

team to a Conference championship,

Hill returned to USC in the fall of 1946 to begin a period of ten years of advancement within the athletic department. His first team at USC, the 1946 frosh football team, went through an undefeated season. In 1948 he was selected as assistant track coach, being groomed to succeed Dean Cromwell as head track coach after the latter's retirement at the end of the '48

Hill had two undefeated years, 1949 and 1950, as head track coach at USC, continuing the great Trojan track heritage and winning two National Championships.

Early in 1951 he was named head football coach, following the resignation of Jeff Cravath. In 1952, Hill steered the Trojan varsity through an undefeated Conference season and a 7-0 win over Wisconsin in the Rose Bowl game.

Hill's six-year record as head football coach at USC was 45 wins, 17 losses and 1 tie for a .722 winning percentage.

On September 1, 1957, Hill officially succeeded Willis O. Hunter as Director of Athletics. Jess took over as acting head track coach in the spring of 1962 after the sudden death of his close friend Jess Mortensen. His team won the AAWU Conference crown, and placed 3rd in the NCAA finals.

Jess is married to the former Elizabeth Helen Glass. They have two children, Mrs. Mary Bett Carter, a USC graduate, and Jess Jr., a graduate student at USC. The Hills reside in West Los Angeles.

HEAD COACH VERN WOLFE

Verne Wolfe returned to his alma mater as head track coach in spectacular fashion in 1963, leading the Trojans to their 22nd NCAA championship at Abluquerque, N.M.

Wolfe, who had lettered as a pole vaulter in 1946 and 1947 under the late Dean Cromwell, succeeded Jess Hill as head coach after Hill's one-year term as interim coach in 1962 following the sudden death of Jess Mortensen just as the season was to get under way.

The 42-year-old Wolfe became only the fourth head track and field coach at USC since 1909. Dean Cromwell held the post from that time until 1948, with Hill taking over the reins for the 1949 and 1950 seasons. Mortensen, meanwhile, took over the post in 1951 and held the position until his death in February of 1962.

The new Trojan coach is no stranger to USC track and field. Following an outstanding career at Gardena High School, where he won honors as an All-league back in football and in track as a pole vaulter, Wolfe, entered the University of Southern California. Winning a monogram with the 1941 frosh team, he also saw duty with the 1942 varsity squad before being called to military duty.

Following three and one-half years of service with the Paratroops, he was discharged in 1946 and returned to USC. Obtaining a bachelor and master's degree in Education, he was graduated from the University in 1949.

Wolfe started his track coaching career at Torrance High School in 1952. Following three years at the local school, he moved on to North Phoenix High School in Arizona for the 1955 season. It was during his six-year reign at North Phoenix that he gained a reputation as one of the nation's most successful prep track and field coaches.

While at North Phoenix, he coached Jim Brewer, the first prepster to clear 14 and then 15 feet in the pole vault, and Dallas Long, national interscholastic record holder and the first high schooler to better 60 feet with the 16-pound shot. Both trackmen went on to USC to become Trojan record holders. Brewer until 1963 claimed the Trojan pole vault mark at 15 ft. 4 in. while Long, currently in dental school at USC, broke the world mark with a put of 65 ft. 10 ½ in., in 1962 and since has improved that record to 67 ft. 10 in. and claimed an Olympic gold medal at Tokyo in 1964.

Other outstanding athletes coached by Wolfe at North Phoenix were George Davies, claimant of the best vault by a collegian in 1961 at 15 ft. 10 1/4 in., and Karl Johnstone, who set a new high school record for the discus in 1959.

The new Trojan coach moved on to San Jose State College as head frosh and varsity field event coach in 1961. While at San Jose, he helped coach a trio of his pole vaulters to become the first three collegiate vaulters from the same school to clear 15 feet or better in the same meet.

Wolfe moved on to the head coaching post at the newlyestablished Foothill Junior College in Los Altos for the 1962 season. Although a brand-new institution, Foothill ran away with the Coast Conference track title—outscoring their closest opponents by 100 points—and finished fifth in the State Junior College meet.

Vern resides in Rolling Hills with his wife, Marilyn, and two boys, Corey, age 11, and Dean, age nine. The latter is named for Dean Cromwell.

ASSISTANT COACH WILLIE WILSON

Willie came to USC in July of 1962 after guiding La Habra High School track and field from 1954 through 1962.

A graduate of Pepperdine College, Wilson took over the track and cross country coaching reins at La Habra in 1954 and proceeded to produce championship teams during his nine-year reign. His 1958 and 1959 teams won the league track crowns while his cross country squads annexed four consecutive loop titles (1958-1961) and clinched the 1961 CIF championship.

Among the stars he developed during his coaching career at La Habra is Bruce Bess, CIF and state mile champion and claimant of one of the fastest four-lappers ever recorded by a prepster. Bess is a member of the USC varsity this year.

Willie serves as a part-time member of the USC coaching staff. He also serves as Director of Physical Education, Recreation, and Attendance for the La Habra City Elementary School District.

Willie lives in La Habra with his wife, Joan. They have four children—Sam, 16; Jane, 13; Bill, 12; and Jim, 9.

MISCELLANEOUS

CHAMPIONS AND RECORD HOLDERS

WORLD RECORDS: 52 USC trackmen have equalled or bettered world records since 1912.

OLYMPIC GAMES: USC trackmen have won 16 individual Olympic titles and have shared in ten relay victories. Forty-six men have won a total of 73 places on United States Olympic teams. Two Olympic Games records are held by Trojans: Jack Davis, high hurdles; and Dallas Long, shot put. Mike Larrabee, as a member of the winning 1,600-meter relay team, shares an Olympic record.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS: USC has won 22 out of 33 NCAA meets competed in since its beginning in 1921. On six occasions they have finished second. The Trojans won nine in a row (1935-1943), and seven straight (1949-1955). A total of 67 individual championships highlight the record.

NATIONAL AAU CHAMPIONSHIPS: USC trackmen have won 78 individual senior AAU championships.
