Varsity Prospects

Paradoxically, Troy's 1965 track and field season was not accounted a particularly successful one in spite of the NCAA co-championship that climaxed the campaign.

Only at USC could such an anomaly exist. The reason: Trojan trackmen dropped two dual meets in one year, an occurrence that last shook school partisans early in the Dean Cromwell era (1928) when four dual defeats were sustained.

Coach Vern Wolfe, who had anticipated some inconsistency of performance from a very youthful squad, found encouragement in the late-season improvement that achieved a clear United State Track and Field Federation championship (62 points) and an NCAA co-crown (32 points) and believes that

it signals better things for 1966.

Dual-meetwise, the Trojans should be in a less precarious position than last year, though most AAWU conference opposition will be similarly improved. The sprints have been shored up considerably with the acquisition of Long Beach City College hurdler Earl McCullouch, prep record holder at Long Beach Poly who boasts 9.7 credentials in the 100 and the potential to improve on that. A last-minute blow was the ineligibility of Santa Ana College's national JC record holder Fred Kuller (9.3), but fleet Valley College footballer Terrel Ray (9.8) comes in to help the situation.

Another junior college nugget showed up in Valley College's Roger Wolff, who set a national JC two-turn 440 record of 47.1 and later clocked 46.7 in the exacting company of the National AAU championships. He's capable of 21.5 in the 220 to pro-

vide more dash insurance.

Frosh record-breakers John Link, 4:06.6n in the mile, and Chuck Schulz, 9:07.2 in the two mile, lend important new help in the distances in which a stronger Bruce Bess, recovered from mononucleosis, returns to the mile where his 1964 time

(4:02.7n) remains the fastest in university history.

But the brightest prospect inherited from the frosh should be high jumper-hurdler Greg Heet, a versatile athlete with decathlon aspirations who leaped 6'101/4" to crack Lew Hoyt's freshman record. Heet, a 19.0 prep low hurdler, possesses the strength and stamina demanded by the 440-yard hurdles, newly installed in the dual-meet program, and will take a whirl at this difficult event.

NCAA champions Bill Fosdick (pole vault) and Paul Kerry (high hurdles) along with fifth-placer Gary Carlsen (discus)

return 22 of Troy's 32-point total in the NCAA meet.

Supporting this brilliant trio will be a key nucleus of returnees in triple jumper Mahoney Samuels (52'5"), school record holder and No. 2 ranking collegian last year; halfmilers Dennis Carr (1:49.7n) and Dave Buck (1:50.1n); and miler Bess.

Available, too, is quartermiler Dwight Middleton, inconsistent last season but whose best (46.9) puts him right with the

top ones.

While Trojan depth and balance on the track appears more than adequate, the field-event position is less encouraging. With the damaging loss of Wellesley Clayton, USC's best-ever long jumper (26'0"), Wolfe comes up short in this event. His two leading candidates, Randy Beardslee and Steve Bloomfield, are still striving for 24 feet.

The javelin picture brightens because of a pair of sophomore prospects who could blossom, Bill Bonniksen and Steve John-

son, but Troy still may find the going rough there in vital dual meets.

Departure of co-captions Lew Hoyt (high jump), Theo Viltz (high hurdles) and Chris Johnson (mile) naturally leaves a large void. School record holder Hoyt (7'1/2") earned two national titles as a Trojan (NCAA, 1963; USTFF, 1964). Viltz, always tough under pressure, contributed a big six points in USC's NCAA title win after scoring four in the 1964 national collegiates, and the hard-working Johnson, clocking a 4:08.0 mile last season, claimed the first NCAA indoor crown in school history.

Again this year, USC's NCAA point potential diminishes with the ineligibility of certain important personnel. Penalized by an age rule applicable to foreign athletes, Jamaica's classy Samuels will close out his college career without NCAA championship competition. Also ruled out of the national collegiates is junior college newcomer McCullouch, who falls short of minimum unit requirements for the title meet. Then, another possible point maker disappeared when shot putter Jeff Smith

(59'3/4") came up ineligible.

Nonetheless, Wolfe takes the optimistic tack that performance to their fullest potential by his remaining eligibles would keep them very much in contention for Troy's 24th NCAA track and field title. Admittedly, it will be a hard, uphill battle against the likes of New Mexico, Oregon, Brigham Young and UCLA.

A brief rundown by events for the 1966 campaign (with

1965 best marks listed unless otherwise noted):

SPRINTS: Former prep hurdle great Earl McCullouch (9.7, 21.6t) now shoulders heavy responsibility as No. 1 sprinter with the loss of Kuller. Wolfe feels the former Long Beach Poly flyer could provide a major surprise with his explosive start. Terrel Ray is another dual-meet hope, while muscle-troubled quartermiler Dwight Middleton (9.7, 21.2nt) will be called on frequently to fill a sprint role. Jaysee ace Roger Wolff will concentrate on the 440, but could contribute needed dual-meet points in the 220 (21.5t). RATING: Good.

MID-DISTANCES: Minus a national caliber quartermiler since Rex Cawley, the Trojans may have one in Wolff (46.7n). Physically gifted, he trains like an 880 man and his coach views him as a threat to Cawley's school record (46.0n). Dave Buck (47.2n), with lots of heart but shy on speed, may save his best efforts for the 880 (1:50.1n). He added a strong 1:49.4 lea in Troy's 7:19.4n two-mile relay performance in the Coliseum Relays. Hutch Gibb (47.7n) and the erratic Middleton (46.9) lend the ingredients for a potentially top mile relay team. Dennis Carr, who suffered the inconsistency of many sophomores, came in 10 pounds lighter than a year ago, suggesting he's ready for a big year. If he avoids the muscle trouble prevalent last season, he could make his 1:47.3 Coliseum Relays leg a regular thing. Bruce Bess (1:50.1), physically unable to produce his best in 1965, will be seen in the halfmile some, but probably more often in the mile. RATING: Excellent.

DISTANCES: Hopefully, Bess will regain the mile form that carried him to victory over UCLA's Bob Day in the AAWU meet two years ago. Otherwise, the distance burden falls on fine first-year men Link and Day. Link, a top pre-med student and dedicated trackman, is developing fast in both mile and two mile, where he clicked off a snappy 8:58.4 in January allocomers competition. He'll be gunning for sub-4-minute clockings in the mile. Schulz, apparently recovered from a thigh injury that curtailed his performances late last season, is ex-

pected to shade 9 minutes for two miles this spring. Carr, virtually inactive in the mile since his record prep time of 4:08.7 four years ago, will give it another try. **RATING:** Good.

HURDLES: Paul Kerry and Theo Viltz surely ranked with the best high hurdling twosomes in Trojan history. But Troy could equal or top that with Kerry, defending NCAA champ, and Earl McCullouch, the speedburning footballer via Long Beach City College. Kerry, coming on fast last year for 13.7 and 13.9 times to win the USTFF and NCAA crowns, figures to dip close to Dick Attlesey's school record of 13.5. Blessed with a very loose hip and quickness over the hurdle, he could approach the memorable feats of all-time USC greats Attlesey and Jack Davis. McCullouch's junior college hurdling was hampered by injury last season, but his 14.3 under the circumstances plus his sprint speed points to great hurdle potential. Halfback Wilson Bowie (14.9n), who'll be occupied with spring football, adds dual-meet aid. Kerry, unfamiliar with the tough 440 hurdles, could develop with experience. High jumper Grea Heet, the only other candidate for the intermediates, could surprise. RATING: Excellent.

SHOT PUT: A surprise added starter, Alain Drufin of France, somewhat lessens the shock of Smith's loss. Durfin, already in Southern California to study local track technique, enrolled for the spring semester with one's year's eligibility and promising shot put (55'7") and discus (167'11") marks. He's a powerfully built (6-0, 220) weightman with good speed in the ring. Sizeable sophomore Steve Johnson (6-4, 240) has the explosiveness to improve considerably upon his freshman distance

(53'3"). **RATING:** Good.

DISCUS: On his best days, Gary Carlsen was the nation's No. 2 college discus thrower last year, as his seasonal high (190'8 1_2 ") would indicate. But inconsistency marred much of this sophomore season, dropping him to fifth in the NCAA championships. Loaded with talent, however, Carlsen gained indispensable experience that promises more poise for the future. Wolfe envisions 200-foot distances for his muscular weightman from Rock Island, Ill., which would make him the all-time top Trojan. Johnson, promising with his freshman throw of $157'11''_2$ ", sets his sights on 170 feet this spring. Drufin (167'11'') adds depth as does senior Dave Davies $(159'101''_2)$ ", recovering from a recent appendectomy. **RATING:** Excellent.

JAVELIN: Sophs Bill Bonniksen (211'1/2'') and Johnson (206'3'') and returnee Dick Carter (206'41/2'') improve balance in this event. But it will be up to the first-year men to develop rapidly if Troy is to contend in most dual meets. Johnson, with an exceptionally strong arm, perhaps ranks as the leading prospect, but competing in three events dampens his chances. RATING: Good.

LONG JUMP: There is no available replacement in sight for USC's only 26-footer in history, Wellesley Clayton, leaving Trojan long jumping in unhappy straights. But short sophomore Randy Beardslee (23'6") works hard and possesses the capabilities to attain 24 feet soon. He'll be helped by Steve Bloomfield, better in the triple jump, but who has a 23'43'4" mark to his credit. RATING: Fair.

POLE VAULT: Few sophomores have enjoyed better seasons than Bill Fosdick's a year ago. He won USTFF indoor and outdoor titles as well as the NCAA outdoor crown, tied the Trojan indoor record (15'9") and broke USC's outdoor record, thereby becoming the first Trojan over 16 feet. But, in this erratic era of the glass pole and the big benders, you're only as good as your last performance. Fosdick realizes he needs to iron out

some flows in his form to keep pace with the ever-rising opposition. When he acquires a better rock-back on the pole, his coach predicts 16'6" or better for this apt pole-vaulting pupil. Consistent 16-foot performances should easily be in range this season. Unfortunately, there is little depth in the event with Doug Swartz, who managed 14'6" once in 1965, the only other candidate of the moment. **RATING:** Good.

HIGH JUMP: A school record holder departs, but there's still joy in Troyland. For Vern Wolfe feels that Greg Heet $(\delta'10)'_4$ "), already the best freshman in school history, will soon claim the varsity standard $(7'\,l_2'')$ held by the now-absent Lew Hoyt. A powerful jumper with an explosive takeoff, Heet owns all the equipment to be a great one. Versatile enough to rate consideration as a decathlon prospect, he can provide important help in the brand new 440-yard hurdles this year. Veteran Mike Parker $(\delta'7\,3'_4'')$ reported with his knee much sounder after 1965 surgery. He's a smooth stylist with the ability to reach higher heights. **RATING:** Excellent.

TRIPLE JUMP: A year ago coach Wolfe predicted that his Jamaica ace, Mahoney Samuels, would eclipse Luther Hayes' long-standing school record (51'91/2"). The likeable Samuels proceeded to make a good prognosticator of his coach by springing to a then-NCAA record of 52'5" against UCLA. This year Wolfe forecasts no less than 54 feet for his foreign star who cannot compete in the NCAA championships. Such a monumental leap would at least establish national college preeminence. Backing up Samuels are a pair of steady performers, JC transfer John Armstrong (47'81/2") and Steve Bloomfield (47'3/4"). Armstrong, arriving from Foothill College, is a good competitor, and the surprising Bloomfield came through with his best mark for key second-place points in last year's squeaker over Stanford. Football fullback Mike Hull, out with injuries a year ago, still is regarded as a promising prospect. RATING: Excellent.

JESS HILL, DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Jess Hill, former track and football coach at Troy who is in his ninth year as Director of Intercollegiate Athletics at the University of Southern California, looks back on the 1962-63 athletic season as the most memorable in his long association with sports.

In that school year USC's athletic program accomplished the unprecedented feat of winning five national collegiate championships—in football, swimming, track and field, baseball and

Born Jesse Terrill Hill in Yates, Missouri, on January 20, 1907, Jess came west with his family ten years later and became one of the top athletes in Southern California while at Corona High School. From the fall of 1923 to the spring of 1925, he was awarded ten letters in five sports.

Following his graduation from Corona in 1925, Hill attended Riverside Junior College for one year, earning letters in football, basketball, baseball and track as Riverside fielded championship teams in all four sports.

Jess entered USC in February, 1927, and continued to exhibit his all-around athletic prowess, playing football and baseball and compiling an outstanding track and field record.

He became the first Trojan in history to surpass 25 feet in the broad jump, leaping $25^{\prime}7_8^{\prime\prime}$ to win the 1929 IC4A title. This mark has been bettered by only six Trojans since 1929.

Also outstanding in his studies, Jess was graduated cum laude following the 1930 collegiate baseball season.

Hill signed immediately to play professional baseball and enjoyed a brilliant ten-year career in Triple-A and Major League ball. He compiled a lifetime average of .306, seeing service with the Yankees, Senators, Athletics and Oakland, Hollywood and Newark.

In the off-season during his professional baseball years, Jess launched his coaching career at Corona High. Just as in his playing days, he moved from Corona to Riverside JC. His next position was at Long Beach JC, where he was on the physical education and coaching staff when World War II came

Hill enlisted in the Navy in March of 1942 and served until February of 1946, when he was separated from active duty with the rank of Lieutenant Commander.

Jess returned to Long Beach City College after getting out of the Navy and immediately piloted the junior college baseball team to a Conference championship.

Hill returned to USC in the fall of 1946 to begin a period of ten years of advancement within the athletic department. His first team at USC, the 1946 frosh football team, went through an undefeated season. In 1948 he was selected as assistant track coach, being groomed to succeed Dean Cromwell as head track coach after the latter's retirement at the end of the '48

Hill had two undefeated years, 1949 and 1950, as head track coach at USC, continuing the great Trojan track heritage and winning two National Championships.

Early in 1951 he was named head football coach, following the resignation of Jeff Cravath. In 1952, Hill steered the Trojan varsity through an undefeated Conference season and a 7-0 win over Wisconsin in the Rose Bowl game.

Hill's six-year record as head football coach at USC was 45 wins, 17 losses and 1 tie for a .722 winning percentage.

10-TRACK & FIELD

On September 1, 1957, Hill officially succeeded Willis O. Hunter as Director of Athletics. Jess took over as acting head track coach in the spring of 1962 after the sudden death of his close friend Jess Mortensen. His team won the AAWU Conference crown, and placed 3rd in the NCAA finals.

Jess is married to the former Elizabeth Helen Glass. They have two children, Mrs. Mary Bett Carter, a USC graduate, and Jess Jr., also a USC graduate. The Hills reside in West

Los Angeles.

HEAD COACH VERN WOLFE

Verne Wolfe returned to his alma mater as head track coach in spectacular fashion in 1963, leading the Trojans to their

22nd NCAA championship at Abluquerque, N.M.

Wolfe, who had lettered as a pole vaulter in 1946 and 1947 under the late Dean Cromwell, succeeded Jess Hill as head coach after Hill's one-year term as interim coach in 1962 following the sudden death of Jess Mortensen just as the season was to get under way.

The 43-year-old Wolfe became only the fourth head track and field coach at USC since 1909. Dean Cromwell held the post from that time until 1948, with Hill taking over the reins for the 1949 and 1950 seasons. Mortensen, meanwhile, took over the post in 1951 and held the position until his death in

February of 1962.

The new Trojan coach is no stranger to USC track and field. Following an outstanding career at Gardena High School, where he won honors as an All-League back in football and in track as a pole vaulter, Wolfe entered the University of Southern California. Winning a monogram with the 1941 frosh team, he also saw duty with the 1942 varsity squad before being called to military duty.

Following three and one-half years of service with the Paratroops, he was discharged in 1946 and returned to USC. Obtaining a bachelor and master's degree in Education, he was

araduated from the University in 1949.

Wolfe started his track coaching career at Torrance High School in 1952. Following three years at the local school, he moved on to North Phoenix High School in Arizona for the 1955 season. It was during his six-year reign at North Phoenix that he gained a reputation as one of the nation's most suc-

cessful prep track and field coaches.

While at North Phoenix, he coached Jim Brewer, the first presster to clear 14 and then 15 feet in the pole vault, and Dallas Long, national interscholastic record holder and the first high schooler to better 60 feet with the 16-pound shot. Both trackmen went on to USC to become Trojan record holders. Brewer until 1963 claimed the Trojan pole vault mark at 15 ft. 4 in. while Long, currently in dental school at USC, broke the world mark with a put of 65 ft. 10 1/2 in., in 1962, improved that record to 67 ft. 10 in. two years later and claimed an Olympic gold medal at Tokyo in 1964.

Other outstanding athletes coached by Wolfe at North Phoenix were George Davies, claimant of the best vault by a collegian in 1961 at 15 ft. 101/4 in., and Karl Johnstone, who set a new high school record for the discus in 1959.

The new Trojan coach moved on to San Jose State College as head frosh and varsity field event coach in 1961. While at San Jose, he helped coach a trio of his pole vaulters to become the first three collegiate vaulters from the same school to clear 15 feet or better in the same meet.

Wolfe assumed the head coaching post at the newlyestablished Foothill Junior College in Los Altos for the 1962 season. Although a brand-new institution, Foothill ran away with the Coast Conference track title—outscoring their closest opponents by 100 points—and finished fifth in the State Junior College meet.

Vern resides in Rolling Hills with his wife, Marilyn, and two boys, Corey, age 12, and Dean, age 10. The latter is named

for Dean Cromwell.

WILLIE WILSON

Administrative Assistant Assistant Track Coach

Willie came to USC in July of 1962 after guiding La Habra High School track and field from 1954 through 1962.

A graduate of Pepperdine College, Wilson took over the track and cross country coaching reins at La Habra in 1954 and proceeded to produce championship teams during his nineyear reign. His 1958 and 1959 teams won the league track crowns while his cross country squads annexed four consecutive loop titles (1958-1961) and clinched the 1961 CIF champion-

Among the stars he developed during his coaching career at La Habra is Bruce Bess, CIF and state mile champion and claimant of one of the fastest four-lappers ever recorded by a prepster. Bess is a member of the USC varsity this year.

This spring Wilson became the Athletic Department's administrative assistant for academic affairs, succeeding Hal Charnofsky. He also continues to serve as assistant track coach. He formerly held the post of Director of Physical Education, Recreation, and Attendance for the La Habra City Elementary School District.

Willie lives in La Habra with his wife, Joan. They have four children-Sam, 17; Jane, 14; Bill, 13; and Jim 10.

MISCELLANEOUS

CHAMPIONS AND RECORD HOLDERS

WORLD RECORDS: 52 USC trackmen have equalled or bettered world records since 1912.

OLYMPIC GAMES: USC trackmen have won 16 individual Olympic titles and have shared in ten relay victories. Fortysix men have won a total of 73 places on United States Olympic teams. Two Olympic Games records are held by Trojans: Jack Davis, high hurdles; and Dallas Long, shot put. Mike Larrabee, as a member of the winning 1,600-meter relay team, shares an Olympic record.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS: USC has won 23 out of 34 NCAA meets competed in since its beginning in 1921. On six occasions they have finished second. The Trojans won nine in a row (1935-1943), and seven straight (1949-1955). A total of 69 individual championships highlight the record.

NATIONAL AAU CHAMPIONSHIPS: USC trackmen have won 79 individual senior AAU championships.

Both pole vaulter PAUL WILSON and halfmiler RICHARD JOYCE boast best-ever marks by prep athletes in their events ... WILSON'S $16'6\frac{3}{4}''$ was third best in the world last year, and JOYCE'S 1:48.8 recorded in the state high school meet wiped out all previous prep performances at the distance . . . Jamaican import LENNOX MILLER clocked 9.4 for 100 yards, then finished a close second the next day to American champion George Anderson, timed at 10.4 for 100 meters . . . Both races were in MILLER'S hometown, Kingston, last August . . . Fellow Jamaican RUPERT HOILETT competed in the 1964 Olympics at Tokio as a high school junior . . . In a 400-meter second-round heat, he recorded 47.6 as former Trojan Mike Larrabee, the ultimate gold medal winner, was coming home in 46.5 . . . Halfmiler CRAIG GRANT from Illinois' Proviso West High is the first USC athlete to become a Trustee Scholar . . . Only 10 entering freshmen qualify for Trustee Scholarships annually . . . The honor is based on excellence of high school record, leadership and unusual talent in one or more fields . . . Also competing for the Trobabes is Grant's former Proviso West teammate, BRUCE BOWMAN, a 4:08.7 miler . . . Another top miler in Trobade uniform is Westminster's CARL TRENTADUE, winner of the Southern California CIF title in 4:08.5.
