## INDIVIDUAL BIOGRAPHIES

[Note: These sketches are limited to those performers who figure to see the most action. They are listed in alphabetical order.]

### TIM BARRETT—6-1, 170, 19, So. (Triple Jump)

Was plagued with injuries throughout his freshman season at USC... Still recorded a best of 50-6½, a new Trobabe record and the third best triple jump mark in USC history... While competing as a prep, Barrett had an all-time best mark of 51-11¼.

### ERIC CHRISTIANSON — 5-11½, 185, 20, Sr. (Javelin-High Jump)

Could develop into pleasant surprise for Trojans this spring... Will compete in both the javelin and high jump... Transferred to USC from U. New Mexico... Had a best javelin toss last season of 233 feet... Lifetime best is 244.7... Also a fine high jumper... has already cleared 6-10 in workouts... A potential 7-footer according to track coach Vern Wolfe.

### NEILL DUGGAN—6-1½, 160, 27, Jr. (Distances)

Easily the greatest distance runner in junior college track history... Holds five different JC records... Attended Hancock Junior College in Santa Maria... State junior college champ in the 880, mile and two mile... Has career bests of 1:49.9; 3:56.1; 13:30.8... If he runs true to form, he could become the greatest distance man in USC history... Practically a cinch to become USC's first sub four-minute miler.

### GREG HEET — 6-1, 175, 21, Sr. (High Jump)

Has a best mark at USC of 6-10¼... Fifth on USC's all-time list... Placed third in the NCAA championships as a sophomore... Has been over 7-feet many times in practice... Is still looking for first 7-foot leap in meet competition.

### RUPERT HOILETT — 5-11, 150, 21, Jr. (440)

Has great potential and talent... Could be top 440 man if healthy... Recorded a blistering 46.6 as a freshman two years ago... Managed a 48.4 mark last season despite his injuries... Has been running well in early practices... Is sorely needed in both the open 440 and mile relay.

### RICH JOYCE — 6-2, 175, 20, Jr. (880)

Must be regarded as No. 1 boy along with Carl Trentadue in the 880... Outstanding performer in high school... Best 880 mark of 1:48.8 is national high school record... Long striding powerful athlete... Workouts have been outstanding... He's the boy who can make the Trojans go in the 880 and two mile relay... Figures to improve on 1:50.6n of last season.

### FRED KULLER — 6-2, 168, 22, Jr. (Sprints)

Co-holder of national JC 100 mark of 9.3... Ran the second leg on Troy's world record setting 440-yard relay team last season... Finished second in both sprints in the AAWU conference championships... Ran 9.4 in semis of NCAA championships... Placed fourth in finals of the 100... Had seasonal bests of 9.4 and 20.8 (new career best)... "Fred can get down to 9.2 if he can learn to relax," says Trojan coach Vern Wolfe... Great potential in both sprints particularly 220, where he covers a lot of ground with long strides... Extremely important man on relay teams.

### STEVE LEHMER — 6-2, 225, 19, So. (Discus)

Potentially a fine discus thrower... Starting guard for USC's national championship football team in 1967... Threw over 166 feet as a freshman... Will be one of the very few left handers throwing the discus... Has the potential to be in the 170's this year.

### JOHN LINK — 5-11, 150, 21, Sr. (Distances)

Ran 4:02.2 two seasons ago... Last season was able to manage only 4:04.0n... But did record an 8:55.5 in the two mile... Steady performer who always gives a good race... Possibly could dip under the four minute barrier.

### MAX LOWE — 6-1, 175, 20, Jr. (High Jump)

Outstanding performer in junior college... Prior to suffering serious knee injury he had cleared seven feet twice outdoors and three times indoors... Had a best leap last season of 6-8... Has already cleared 6-10 this season... Appears to be completely healthy once again and should hit the seven-foot mark very soon.

### EARL McCULLOUGH — 5-11, 170, 22, Sr. (120HH-Long Jump)

Fastest hurdler in the world in 1967... Tied the world record in the 120-yard high hurdles in the Pan American Game Trials at Minneapolis in 13.2... Is considered the fastest starter out of the blocks in the history of track and field... Captured both the NCAA indoor and outdoor hurdle championships last season... Indoor mark of 7.0 broke the NCAA meet mark... Blossomed into outstanding long jumper with leap of 25-2¼... Extremely talented athlete who is also an outstanding football player... Was the leading pass receiver for Troy's national championship football team with 30 catches for 540 yards and five touchdowns... Earl "The Pearl" as he is known on the Trojan campus, was a first round draft selection by the Detroit Lions... His marks thus far in 1968 are just short of fantastic... Formwise, "The Pearl" is better than ever this season... Besides being a great team leader, McCullough is an extremely hard-working dedicated runner... Excellent leadoff man on USC's world record breaking relay team.

### LENNOX MILLER — 5-11, 165, 20, Jr. (Sprints)

Has developed into world class sprinter off of sophomore year... Possesses unusual poise in starting blocks... Is gifted with complete relaxation in blocks... Has the potential of breaking both world records in the 100 and 220... The smooth running Miller broke both Trojan sprints marks last season with clockings of 9.2 and 20.4... A classic sprinter, Miller rates a strong chance of winning a gold medal in the summer Olympics at Mexico City... Potential appears greater in the 220... An extremely hard worker in practice... A native of Kingston, Jamaica, Miller captured first place in the 100-meters when the United States collided with the British Commonwealth last summer in a fast 10.1... In addition to his sensational sprint times, he anchored the USC 440-yard relay team to a world record breaking 38.6 last spring... Captured both sprint titles at the AAWU championships with times of 9.3 and 20.6... Both marks are conference records. Recorded fastest one-day sprint double in history at NCAA championships with clockings of 9.2 and 20.5... Captured two second place finishes in the NCAA championships in his first season of varsity competition.

**OLE OLESON — 5-9, 150, 18, So. (Distances)**

Transfer from Santa Monica City College... Placed second in state JC two-mile last season... Had a seasonal best of 9:01 but has already shattered that mark in the early going of 1968... Clocked 8:45.8 at San Diego Invitational... This mark is faster than any time ever recorded in USC history... Was Los Angeles City cross-country champion at Palisades High School... Should help Trojans considerably in distances.

**BOB SEAGREN—5-11, 175, 21, Jr. (Pole Vault)**

One-time outdoor world pole vault record holder and present indoor record holder at 17-4 1/4... Leaped 17-7 last season at San Diego... Second best mark in the world for 1967... At his best under extreme pressure... Poised, cool competitor... Most active vaulter in the world last year... Along with teammate Paul Wilson, Seagren quite possibly could hit the magic 18-foot barrier this season... Won NCAA championship with leap of 17-4 (New NCAA record)... Became the first man to ever clear 17-feet indoors back in 1966... Aggressive attitude... Cleared 17-feet 11 times in 1967... Jumping as well as ever thus far in 1968... Early co-favorite for Gold Medal in summer Olympics.

**O. J. SIMPSON — 6-2, 202, 20, Jr. (Sprints)**

Sensational footballer who was voted both "Back of the Year" and "Player of the Year" in 1967 by United Press International... Consensus All-American halfback who led the nation in rushing in 1967... Also an outstanding track man... Blazed to 9.4 clocking last season... Fastest time ever by USC football player... Extremely powerful runner who runs the curves to perfection on 440-yard relay... Finished third in the AAUW conference championships in the 100 and fourth in the 220... Also placed sixth in the NCAA 100... Should improve to greater heights in 1968 with hard work and concentration... Could be a big surprise with sprinting ability... Untapped potential as far as sprint times are concerned... Could dip well under 9.4... Has also clocked 6.1 in the indoor 60-yard dash... Must be considered one of the fastest big-men of all time... Will be strong candidate for Heisman Trophy next season in football... Team man all the way.

**CARL TRENTADUE — 5-10, 150, 20, Jr. (880)**

Former high school miler who ran 4:04.0n last season as sophomore... Will concentrate strictly on 880 this season... Will also run on two-mile relay team... Has good potential, but was plagued by injuries last season... Has run well in early workouts thus far.

**GEOFF VANDERSTOCK — 6-2, 170, 21, Sr. (440-440IH-120HH)**

Already a world class hurdler... Placed second at NCAA championships with clocking of 50.7... Had seasonal best of 50.2 last season... Was ill part of last year, but still managed tough second in nationals... Could have real fine year for Trojans... Possible threat to former Trojan Rex Cawley's 400-meter IH world record of 49.1... Will also compete in 120 high hurdles... Clocked 14.0 in 1966 at Mt. Sac Junior College... Had 14.7n time last season... Can also be counted on to give the Trojans some valuable points in the open 440... Turned in 46.6 relay leg for USC's mile relay team at NCAA championships.

**PAUL WILSON—6-1, 155, 20, Jr. (Pole Vault)**

World record holder outdoors at 17-7 3/4... Set world record at National AAU championships in Bakersfield... Greatest prep vaulter of all-time... Was first prep over the 16-foot barrier... Holds national prep mark of 16-6 3/4... Set mark at Warren High School in Downey, Calif... Currently holds national frosh mark of 17-1... Has whipped leg problems that bothered him in 1967... Finished second to teammate Bob Seagren at NCAA championships with leap of 17-4, same as Seagren, but decided on fewer misses... Great student of all phases of pole vaulting... Along with Seagren, Wilson could possibly hit the 18-foot barrier this season... Strong contender for Gold Medal at Olympics in Mexico City.

## The Staff

## JESS HILL, DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Jess Hill, former track and football coach at Troy, begins his 11th year as Director of Intercollegiate Athletics at the University of Southern California.

Born Jesse Terrill Hill in Yates, Missouri, on January 20, 1907, Jess came west with his family ten years later and became one of the top athletes in Southern California while at Corona High School. From the fall of 1923 to the spring of 1925, he was awarded ten letters in five sports—football, basketball, baseball, track and tennis.

Following his graduation from Corona in 1925, Hill attended Riverside Junior College for one year, earning letters in football, basketball, baseball and track as Riverside fielded championship teams in all four sports.

Jess entered USC in February, 1927, and continued to exhibit his all-around athletic prowess, playing football and baseball and compiling an outstanding track and field record.

He became the first Trojan in history to surpass 25 feet in the broad jump, leaping 25'½" to win the 1929 IC4A title. This mark has been bettered by only seven Trojans since that date.

Also outstanding in his studies, Jess graduated cum laude following the 1930 collegiate baseball season.

Hill signed immediately to play professional baseball with the old Hollywood Stars. In his first plate appearance, he hit one out of the park at Wrigley Field to start a ten-year career in Triple-A and Major League baseball.

During the following ten years, he saw duty with the Stars (1930-31), Newark (1932), St. Paul (1933), Newark (1934), New York Yankees (1935), Washington Senators (1936), Philadelphia Athletics (1937), and Oakland (1938-39). Topped by his .356 average with the Stars in 1930, Hill wound up his ten-year playing career with a lifetime batting average of .306.

In the off-season during his professional baseball years, Jess launched his coaching career at Corona High. Just as in his playing days, he moved from Corona to Riverside JC. His next position was at Long Beach JC where he was on the physical education and coaching staff when World War II came.

Hill enlisted in the Navy in March of 1942 and served until February of 1946 when he was separated from active duty with the rank of Lieutenant Commander. Jess coached and played baseball at St. Mary's and Del Monte Pre-Flight Schools in the Naval Aviation training program and later was the director of athletics at Camp Kearney and the Clinton (Okla.) and Memphis (Tenn.) Naval Air Stations.

Jess returned to USC in the fall of 1946 to begin a period of ten years of advancement within the athletic department. In 1948 he was selected as assistant track coach, being groomed to succeed Dean Cromwell as head track coach after the latter's retirement at the end of the '48 season.

Hill had two undefeated years, 1949 and 1950, as head track coach at USC, continuing the great Trojan track heritage and winning two National Championships. He also held that post in 1962 following the sudden death of his close friend, Jess Mortensen.

Early in 1951 he was named head football coach, following the resignation of Jeff Cravath. That fall his first varsity football squad won 7 while losing only 3, its most notable

win coming over California by a 21-14 score, breaking the Bears' three-year win streak within the conference.

The following season Hill steered the Trojan varsity through an undefeated conference season and a 7-0 win over Wisconsin in the Rose Bowl game. That win was the first for the PCC over the Big Ten after six straight losses. The '52 Trojan squad was acknowledged to be one of the finest defensive teams in modern football annals.

Hill's six-year record as head football coach at USC was 45 wins, 17 losses, and 1 tie for a .722 winning percentage.

Jess is married to the former Elizabeth Helen Glass. They have two children, Mrs. Mary Bett Carter, a USC graduate, and Jess Jr., 26, also a USC graduate. The Hills reside in West Los Angeles.

### HEAD COACH VERN WOLFE

Coming off one of USC's greatest years in track and field history, Vern Wolfe begins his sixth year at the helm of Troy.

Wolfe, a former Trojan pole vaulter under the late Dean Cromwell, inaugurated his USC coaching career by capturing the 1963 NCAA crown, added another in 1965 and then pulled off the first double in history by capturing both the NCAA indoor and outdoor titles in 1967. USC has now accumulated 25 NCAA titles in track and field, five times as many as runner-up Illinois.

Only the fourth head track coach in Trojan history, Wolfe has also become involved in the international sphere of the sport. In 1966 he was named to assist Texas Southern coach Stan Wright with the U.S. national team which competed against Australian, British, New Zealand and other world class stars in Los Angeles. The previous year he spent part of his summer vacation training Rumanian athletes and holding clinics for Rumanian coaches as that country prepared for the Balkan Games.

Friendly and buoyant in nature, the 45 year-old Wolfe has been coaching track since 1952. He arrived at USC in the summer of 1962 to succeed Jess Hill, the current Trojan athletic director. Hill had served as interim coach that season following the sudden death of Jess Mortensen just as the season was beginning.

During his tenure at USC Wolfe has coached 12 athletes who have set or tied seven world records, 10 NCAA individual champions and two national frosh record setters. From his 1967 team, Wolfe had the great privilege of tutoring the fastest 440 yard relay team of all-time. The listed world record before the '67 season began was 39.6, but coach Wolfe's quartet of Earl McCullough, Fred Kuller, O. J. Simpson and Lennox Miller on successive weekends, tied that mark, then broke the world mark with a clocking of 39.0, then in the NCAA championships to prove it was no fluke, ran a phenomenal 38.6. Experts have called this performance one of the greatest feats in track and field history. Pole vaulter Bob Seagren continued to raise the world standard throughout the 1967 season to 17-7, then in the AAU championships teammate Paul Wilson finally overcame early season injuries and recorded a new world record with a leap of 17-7 $\frac{3}{4}$ . One of the classiest performers for Wolfe during the season was McCullough, the NCAA indoor and outdoor hurdle champ. In the Pan American Game trials, McCullough tied the world mark in the high hurdles with a sizzling 13.2.

Wolfe was born July 14, 1922 in Garber, Okla., but moved west and went to Gardena High School in Southern California. He won honors as an All-Marine League back in football and in track as a pole vaulter.

He then entered USC, winning a letter with the 1941 frosh track team and the 1942 varsity squad, before being called to

military duty. Following three and one-half years with the Paratroops, he was discharged in 1946 and came back to school. He vaulted for Cromwell again in 1946 and 1947 and also obtained a bachelor's and master's degree in education.

Graduating in 1949, Wolfe began his coaching career in 1952 at Torrance High School. He was there three years, then moved on to North Phoenix High School in Arizona for the 1955 season. It was during this six-year reign at North Phoenix that he achieved recognition as one of the nation's most successful prep track and field mentors.

While at North Phoenix he coached Jim Brewer, the first prepster to clear 14 and then 15 feet in the pole vault, and Dallas Long, former national high school record holder and the first prep to break 60 feet with the 16-pound shot. Both trackmen went on to USC and became Trojan record holders, while Long also bettered the world mark. Other outstanding athletes Wolfe coached at the Arizona school were George Davies, the nation's leading college vaulter in 1961, and Karl Johnstone, who set a high school record for the discus in 1959.

Wolfe moved on to San Jose State College as head frosh and varsity field event coach in 1961 and once again worked magic with his pole vaulters. Three of them cleared 15' feet that season in the same meet. It was the first time in the history of any school.

He took the head coaching post at newly established Foothill College for the 1962 season and proceeded to run away with the Coast Conference title and finish fifth in the state junior college meet. USC hired him in June of that year.

Wolfe resides in Rolling Hills with his wife, Marilyn, and two boys, Corey, 14, and Dean, 12. The latter is named after Dean Cromwell.

### KEN MATSUDA

Athletic Advisor

Assistant Track Coach

Ken Matsuda, highly successful track coach at Foothill College, rejoined Vern Wolfe in the summer of 1966 as his assistant.

It was a reunion for the two coaches, for Matsuda had worked with Wolfe one season (1961) at San Jose State when the Trojan head man trained the Spartan freshmen. In addition to his track duties, the 32-year-old coach serves as administrative assistant for academic affairs in the athletic department.

The Trojan track assistant had an outstanding athletic career of his own, lettering four years in football, track and baseball at Westchester High. From Westchester Matsuda went to Santa Monica City College for a year and a half, making the All-Metropolitan Conference team in football. He then transferred to San Jose State where he earned two letters as a Spartan halfback and competed in track as a sprinter and long jumper. Matsuda began working as a graduate assistant with the San Jose track team in 1959, the year he graduated.

In the fall of 1961 he went to Andrew Hill High School in San Jose, where he coached the Bee football team and turned in two undefeated track seasons (1962-63).

The soft-spoken Matsuda then took over at Foothill where he developed several outstanding trackmen, including seven-foot high jumper Max Lowe, state junior college two-mile champ Ed Ortegon, national AAU decathlon runner-up Russ Hodge and high jumper Gary Hines, fourth in the 1966 NCAA meet.

Born Feb. 11, 1935 in Fresno, Ken now has two children of his own. He and his wife, Janet, have a girl, Jo Ann, 8, and a boy, Michael, 6. They live in Torrance.

## MISCELLANEOUS

### CHAMPIONS AND RECORD HOLDERS

WORLD RECORDS: 59 USC trackmen have equalled or bettered world records since 1912.

OLYMPIC GAMES: USC trackmen have won 16 individual Olympic titles and have shared in ten relay victories. Forty-six men have won a total of 73 places on United States Olympic teams. Two Olympic Games records are held by Trojans: Jack Davis, high hurdles; and Dallas Long, shot put. Mike Larrabee, as a member of the winning 1,600-meter relay team, shares an Olympic record.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS: USC has won 25 out of 37 NCAA meets competed in since its beginning in 1921. On six occasions they have finished second. The Trojans won nine in a row (1935-1943), and seven straight (1949-1955). A total of 73 individual championships highlight the record.

NATIONAL AAU CHAMPIONSHIPS: USC trackmen have won 80 individual senior AAU championships.
