## The Staff

### JOHN MCKAY

#### Director of Athletics



Honors and recognition continue to multiply for John H. McKay, 49, head football coach and athletic director at the University of Southern California.

Since the first of the year, McKay has been named Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Assn. for guiding his team to an unbeaten season (12-0) in 1972 and the Trojans' third national championship in the past 11 years. He has also received Coach of the Year honors from

the Football Writers Assn. of America, the Columbus Touchdown Club, Washington D.C. Touchdown Club, the Washington Pigskin Club and Football News.

McKay's Trojans have won three national championships (1962, 1967, 1972), finished in the Top Ten in wire service polls eight times, won seven Pacific-8 championships and appeared in the Rose Bowl six times, winning four of the six.

McKay is currently serving as President of the American Football Coaches Assn. and as a member of the football rules committee.

Three times—1962, 1969 and 1972—USC teams under John McKay have been undefeated. The 1962 team was 11-0, the 1969 team was 10-0-1 and 1972 was 12-0. All three won Rose Bowl games. McKay's 13-year record at USC is 100-33-6.

Southern California has, by far, the best record in the Pacific-8 Conference over the past eleven years overall (92-22-5) and in conference play (48-11-1). The Trojans are twenty-three and a half games ahead of the next best conference team in games against all competition.

In the 59-year history of the Rose Bowl, only one coach—John McKay—has had a team qualify for four successive trips to the Bowl. The Trojans played in the 1967, 68, 69 and 70 versions of the "Granddaddy" of all bowl games.

McKay came to USC in 1959 after having served as an assistant coach at his alma mater, the University of Oregon, since his graduation in 1950. McKay served as an assistant under his college coach Jim Aiken and remained at Oregon Under Len Casanova upon Aiken's retirement.

He joined the staff at USC in 1959 and became the Trojans' 16th head coach in 1960.

McKay served in the Air Force following high school before enrolling at the University of Oregon where he starred at halfback for the Ducks during the 1948 and '49 seasons. McKay led the Fighting Ducks in scoring during the 1948 season with eight touchdowns.

The McKay and Norm Van Brocklin-led Oregon club went 9-1 during the regular 1948 season and lost to Southern Methodist in the Cotton Bowl. McKay earned All-Coast first team and All-America honorable mention recognition. He was drafted by the New York Yankees of the old All-American conference following the 1949 season but decided, instead, to pursue a career in coaching.



## VERN WOLFE HEAD COACH



Vern Wolfe, in his 11th season, at USC, is continuing the incredible success story of the Trojan track program. Only USC's fourth head track coach since 1916, he belongs in the company of the great former coaches Dean Cromwell (nine straight NCAA titles from 1935 to 1943 and a total of 12), Jess Hill (two titles in three years) and Jess Mortensen (seven in 11 years including five straight from 1951 to 1955) that have led USC to

a record 26 NCAA outdoor championships, more than five times as many as runner-up Illinois.

Wolfe, a former pole vaulter under Cromwell, returned to his alma mater as head track coach in spectacular fashion in 1963, winning the NCAA championship. He added another in 1965 and then pulled off the only double in history by capturing both the NCAA indoor and outdoor crowns in 1967. His team won the outdoors again in 1968 and collected another indoor title in 1972.

Thus, in 10 years, Wolfe's teams have won six NCAA team championships, a total that exceeds any other collegiate coach in history outside of USC. It also is more than any university except Kansas (which also has six)! His two indoor titles rank USC second behind Kansas' three in the eight-year history of the NCAA indoor meet.

Added to Wolfe's impressive list of achievements are his four Pacific-8 championships and five undefeated seasons in dual meet competition. The Trojans were named national collegiate dual meet champions in 1971 by Track and Field News.

The Trojans have always been near the top under Wolfe. They have scored among the top four teams in the outdoor championships eight of his 10 years, with four firsts, two second place finishes, a third and a fourth. They have never lost more than two dual meets in any one season.

The Trojan coach has a career record of 88-6-1 and a USC mark of 71-6-1. His collegiate record includes undefeated seasons at San Jose State in 1961 and Foothill Junior College in 1962.

During his tenure at USC, Wolfe has coached 19 athletes who have broken or tied 28 indoor and outdoor records. His 880-yard relay team twice bettered the world record last year, the second time by a full second with a time of 1:20-7. Unfortunately, relay records are accepted only if the four team members are from one nation and one Trojan runner, Don Quarrie is from Jamaica, so the mark does not count as a world record.

Wolfe's athletes have won 18 individual NCAA championships and have broken or tied every USC individual record of events regularly held at college meets. Last year long jumper Randy Williams and high hurdler Jerry Wilson won NCAA titles in their first year at USC.

School records were set by Williams in the long jump, Doug Lane in the shot put and Dean Owens in the high jump and

equaled by Edesel Garrison in the 440 and the mile relay team all in 1972.

Wolfe has been active in the international sphere of the sport. In 1966 he was named to assist Stan Wright with the U.S. national team which competed against Australian, British, New Zealand and other world class stars in Los Angeles. The previous year he spent part of his summer vacation training Rumanian athletes and holding clinics for Rumanian coaches as that country prepared for the Balkan Games.

His athletes have also done well on the international level. Twelve have competed in the Olympic Games, and four won gold medals—Rex Cawley (400-meter hurdles, 1964), Dallas Long (shot put, 1964), Bob Seagren (pole vault, 1968) and Randy Williams (long jump, 1972). Lennox Miller (100 meters, 1968) and Seagren (pole vault, 1972) collected silver medals and Miller won a bronze (100 meters, 1972).

But what the popular Wolfe is proud of most is that 90 percent of the track athletes he's coached have graduated from USC, far above the average for college students.

Wolfe was born in Garber, Okla., but moved west and went to Gardena High School in Los Angeles. He won honors as an All-Marine League back in football and in track as a pole vaulter.

He then entered USC, winning a letter with the 1941 frosh track team and the 1942 varsity squad, before being called to military duty. Following three and one-half years with the Paratroops, he was discharged in 1946 and came back to school. He vaulted for Cromwell again in 1946 and 1947 and also obtained his bachelor's and master's degree in education. Graduating in 1949, Wolfe began his coaching career in 1952 at Torrance High School. He was there three years, then moved on to North Phoenix High School in Arizona for the 1955 season. It was during his six-year reign at North Phoenix that he achieved recognition as one of the nation's most successful prep track and field coaches.

While at North Phoenix he coached Jim Brewer, the first prepster to clear 14 and then 15 feet in the pole vault, and Dallas Long, former national high school record holder and the first prep to break 60 feet with the 16-pound shot.

Wolfe moved on to San Jose State College as head frosh and varsity field event coach in 1961.

He took the head coaching post at newly established Foothill College for the 1962 season and won the Coast Conference title and finished fifth in the state junior college meet. USC hired him in June of that year.

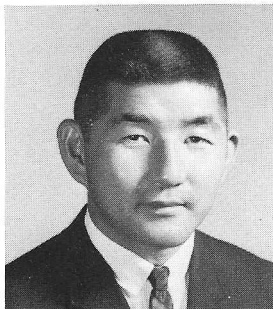

## KEN MATSUDA

### Assistant Track Coach

Vern Wolfe's right-hand man, and a respected coach in his own right, is Ken Matsuda, assistant track coach at USC.



The popular assistant also serves as the cross country coach and has a 39-5 career record.

Matsuda is now in his seventh season as assistant coach at USC. He came in the summer of 1966, following a successful coaching tenure at Foothill College in Northern California.

A graduate of San Jose State, Matsuda was one of Los Angeles' most sought-after prep athletes when he graduated from Westchester High School. At Westchester, Ken earned varsity letters in football, track and baseball, each of the four years he was in school.

After a brief stay at Santa Monica City College Matsuda transferred to San Jose State where he earned two letters as a Spartan halfback, also competing as a sprinter and long jumper on the track team.

Matsuda and Wolfe first worked together in 1961 when the Trojan head coach was on the staff at San Jose State.

## TOM VON RUDEN

### Assistant Track Coach

Middle distance standout Tom Von Ruden joins Vern Wolfe's coaching staff this season.

Von Ruden, who is also competing on the new pro track tour, will work with the Trojan middle and long distance runners.

The new Trojan assistant is from Idaho, where he was two-time state mile champion and state high jump champion his senior year at Notus High School.

He attended Oklahoma State from 1962 to 1966 and was the NCAA indoor champion in the 880 in 1965. After graduation, he ran for the U.S. Army team for two years.

Von Ruden won the 1967 Pan American Games 1500 meters and was a finalist in the 1968 Olympic Games 1500 meters at Mexico City. He holds win over many of world's top mile runners including Jim Ryun and Marty Liquori and currently has the indoor world record for 1,000 yards of 2:20.4.

He served as a graduate assistant coach at Oklahoma State before coming to USC.

## 1973 OUTLOOK

It will be hard to improve on a NCAA indoor title and Pacific-8 Conference championship plus a second in the national collegiate outdoor meet, but USC Coach Vern Wolfe will have a strong contender for national honors again this season.

"Our team as a whole has tremendous potential," says Wolfe. "We have our best crop of recruits while our returnees include two NCAA champions. We should be highly competitive in the Pacific-8 and a factor in the NCAA."

Wolfe has a very young team with only six seniors and six juniors on the 34-man squad. And only 15 have competed in four-year college competition.

"Our top proven performers are long jumper Randy Williams, high hurdler Jerry Wilson and sprinter Don Quarrie," says Wolfe.

Mr. Everything, Williams won the Olympic Gold Medal and the NCAA and Pac-8 Championships and set a collegiate record of 27-4¼ in the long jump. He also ran on the undefeated and NCAA champion sprint relay team.

Wilson equalled his lifetime best of 13.4 to win the NCAA 120-yard high hurdles. Quarrie, co-holder of the 200 meter world record of 19.8, was injured in the Pac-8 meet last year but ran a 9.4 100 indoors to indicate he's back in form.

Other leading holdovers are 17-foot vaulter Robert Pullard, decathlete Bo Sterner, school recordholder Dean Owens in the high jump and NCAA 440 finalist Earl Richardson.

"Pullard is among the top five collegians in the nation," says Wolfe, "while Sterner is a strong NCAA title contender off his 7648 point performance last summer and both Owens and Richardson are potential scorers in the NCAA."

Incoming juniors Jerry Culp, a transfer from San Diego State, and Ed Washington and James Baxter of Los Angeles City College are expected to help most, of the newcomers. Culp, former high school recordholder in the high jump, has a best of 7-1½. Washington leaped 50-8 in his first triple jump competition this season and has run 13.8 in the high hurdles, while Baxter has a best of 1:51.0 in the half mile and may run on the mile relay team.

"Something to watch will be the development of our mile relay team," says Wolfe. "We have as many as seven runners who have the ability to run under 47 seconds from the blocks."

Included among those seven are outstanding freshman prospects Trevor Campbell of Jamaica, Greg Jones of Lemoore, Claude Brown of Gardena and Ken Randle of Kansas City. Campbell was a member of the Jamaican Olympic team, Jones ran 47.3 for the best California high school time, Brown was the Los Angeles city 440 champion and Randle, on a football scholarship, can run the sprints as well as the quartermile.

Highlighting the 1973 Trojan schedule will be the first annual Trojan Invitational on April 14. Besides the Trojan team and other local college squads, club athletes such as Olympians Steve Smith, Al Feuerbach and Dwight Stones are expected to compete.

"Hopefully, we will expand this meet each year until it becomes a top meet nationally," says Wolfe. The Trojans will also face California as part of a double dual meet at the Coliseum with UCLA meeting Stanford.

## INDIVIDUAL BIOGRAPHIES

(Note: The following biographies are limited to those performers expected to see the most action this season. For each performer, the first mark is his 1972 best, the second is his lifetime best in the event indicated. Only one mark is shown when his 1972 and lifetime bests are the same.)

### TONY BAKER — Sr., Distances (8:54.6)

"Has one year of eligibility after transferring from El Camino Junior College," says Coach Wolfe. "If he regains his form of a year ago, he could help us in the distances." Baker ran everything from the 880 to the three-mile at El Camino the past two seasons with bests of 1:56.0, 4:12.8, 8:54.6 and 14:15.2. He attended Mira Costa High School where he ran 4:18.1 in the mile, 9:12.1 in the two-mile and 14:26 in the three-mile.

### JAMES BAXTER — Jr., 880 (1:51.3, 1:51.0)

"He's as good a prospect in the 880 as anyone in USC history, a transfer from Los Angeles City College," says Wolfe. "He also is a candidate for the mile relay team." Baxter was second in the California JC Championships in the 880 last year. He had a best of 1:51.3 but ran 1:51.0 as a prep. He helped Los Angeles High School win the city and state championships in 1969. James also has run the 440 with a high school best of 49.2 and JC mark of 48.2.

### CLAUDE BROWN — Fr., 440, 880 (47.4, 1:54.3)

"A super prospect, he has great range from the 100 to the 880," says Wolfe. "His strongest race will be the quarter. He is one of four freshmen who could run under 47 seconds." Brown was Los Angeles City champion in the 440 and finished second in the state championships. He has run a 9.8 100 and 21.8 220.

### STEVE BROWN — Jr., Distances (9:00.2; 13:54.2)

"Fine competitor, gives us strength in the two-mile and three-mile. With a year of Pacific-8 competition under his belt, he should have a good year," says Wolfe. Brown ran his lifetime best in the three-mile for a dual meet victory against California and had two-mile wins in the Stanford dual with a 9:03.6 time and against Texas El Paso with a 9:07.5 clocking. He transferred to USC last year from Los Angeles Valley College where he finished fifth in the state championship three-mile, running bests of 9:09 and 14.09. He was All-City at Poly High School and ran a 4:28 mile and 9:17.4 two-mile.

### MIKE BUDINCICH — Fr., Shot Put (62-9¼ h.s.)

"He's an outstanding frosh weight prospect, has size, speed and desire to become an excellent shot putter and should be into 60-foot range later this season," says Wolfe. Budincich had the tenth best prep put in the nation last year and seventh best in California. He finished second in the Los Angeles City championships. He was also a tackle and captain of the South Gate High School football team. He was a California Scholarship Federation gold seal bearer at graduation.

### NATHAN BURKS — Jr., 880 (1:50.3)

"His two years of collegiate seasoning should be of great value and I expected him to lower his time under 1:50," says Wolfe. "He has already run a 48.1 leg on our mile relay team indoors and is a contender for the mile relay team." Burks finished fourth in the Pac-8 880 and won his specialty in the Stanford dual. He ran his life best to place second in the UCLA dual. He ran a 48.8 440 and 1:52.2 880 at Castlemont High School and finished second in the state championship 880. He once ran a 46.8 leg on a mile relay as a prep.

### TREVOR CAMPBELL — Fr., 440 (46.3m)

"He made the Pan-American and Olympic teams for Jamaica while still in high school," says Wolfe. "He is an excellent 440 and 880 prospect with the ability to go under 46 seconds in the 440." He has run the 400 meters in 46.3. He attended Kingston College (which is the same as a high school in the U.S.) in Jamaica. He was senior champion in high school.

### ALLEN CARTER — So., Sprints (—, 9.6)

"He's a former state high school 100 champion with a best of 9.6," says Wolfe. "If he regains his old form, he can help us on the sprint relay team." Carter did not compete in track the last two years, playing football only. He was CIF 3A Division Player of the Year in football at Bonita High School and led the Trojan frosh in rushing in 1971. He was hampered in the 1972 football season by a series of minor injuries but is in good shape for track. Carter, also an All-CIF outfielder as a junior, went out for track after the baseball season and won five straight 100's, including the Southern Section CIF and state high school championships.

### MAURICE CLARK — Fr., Sprints (10.6m, 21.2m)

"He's a Jamaican who was his nation's junior sprint champion. If he can match his former times, he can be a factor this season," says Wolfe. Clark was a member of the Jamaican National Squad and has run 10.6 in the 100 meters and 21.2 in the 200 meters. He attended Dint Hill High School in Spanish Town, Jamaica and is following in the footsteps of former Trojan great Lennox Miller and present USC star Don Quarrie, both Jamaican sprint champions.

### BOB COFFMAN — Jr., Hurdles (13.9; 52.9, 52.5)

"He gives us great depth in the high hurdles, along with Jerry Wilson and Ed Washington," says Wolfe. "He's also counted on in the intermediates." Coffman finished third in the Pacific-8 high hurdles. He ran a lifetime best of 13.9 at the West Coast Relays. He attended Lamar High School in Houston where he ran 13.8 over high school high hurdles and 37.2 to lead the nation's preps in the 330 intermediates.

### TOM COCHEE — Fr., Triple Jump (50-1¼)

"He was the second leading prep triple jumper in the nation last year and has the potential to be near the school record his freshmen year," says Wolfe. The Trojan coach is counting on Cochee as his top triple jumper with the graduation of Henry Jackson. Tom also was a high hurdler at Oakland Technical High School with a best of 14.2. The triple jump is not held at the state high school championships.

**JERRY CULP — Jr., High Jump (7-1 ¼, 7-1 ½)**

"He's a consistent seven-foot high jumper with three years of eligibility and had a good fall season," says Wolfe. Culp sat out last year after transferring from San Diego City College. He jumped 7-1 ½ and was the Pacific Coast Athletic Association champion and record holder. He was the former national scholastic record holder with a jump of 7-0 ¼ at Oceanside High School. He placed second in the 1969 state championship meet and won the San Diego CIF championship and state title in 1970.

**GUNNAR DALEN — Fr., Steeplechase (9:27.0)**

"He will run the steeplechase and longer races—two and three miles," says Wolfe. "He has good size and is a hard worker. I think he will do a good job for us." Dalen has run everything from 800 to 5,000 meters with bests of 1:59.0, 3:58.8 in the 1500 meters, 8:30.4 in the 3,000 meters, 14:59.2 in the 5,000.

**BRUCE DOW — Fr., Javelin (247-11)**

"He is an excellent prospect and could be a contender for the NCAA title," says Wolfe. "He's dedicated and an exceptionally hard worker. He has all the tools to be a champion." Dow was the leading high school javelin thrower in the nation last year with a 247-11 toss at Hillsboro High School in Oregon. His throw is third on the all-time prep javelin list.

**ROBERT JAMES — Jr., Intermediates (52.9)**

"He ran under 53 seconds in the intermediates in junior college and can really help us strengthen a weak spot," says Wolfe. James also competed in the decathlon at Glendale Junior College and was fourth in the state decathlon championships with a best of 6,400 points. He was fifth in the 440-yard intermediates at the state JC championships. Won MVP honors on the Glendale team both years there. He was also MVP of his team at St. Francis High School where his bests were 14.6 in the highs and 19.3 in the lows.

**GREG JONES — Fr., Sprints, 440 (9.5, 47.3)**

"He is a 440 prospect although he ran the quarter mile only twice in high school. He ranks high in several events and will be an important member of our team," says Wolfe. The Trojan coach says Jones could compete in the sprints, 440, long jump and both relays, depending on the meet. Jones ran a 9.5 100 last year, as fast as any prep in California and only a tenth off the nation's best. His 440 time of 47.3 was the best among Cal high schoolers and sixth best in the nation while his 24-1 ¼ long jump ranked ninth in the state and 20th in the nation. Jones finished fourth in the state championship 220. He attended Lemoore High School. His brother, Larence, finished second in the NCAA 440 last year competing for N.E. Missouri State and won the state meet 440 while at Lemoore in 1969.

**BRIAN KIMBLE — Fr., Intermediates (18.9hs lows; 39.0 hs IH)**

"An intermediate hurdle prospect with good speed and hurdle ability and should develop into a good intermediate hurdler," says Wolfe. Kimble was Ocean League champion in the 120 highs and 180 lows and a finalist in the CIF Southern Section highs. His best performance in the highs was 14.2. Attended Inglewood High School.

**JOHN KWAN — Fr., Pole Vault (14-0)**

"As the season progresses John could develop into a 16-foot valuter," says Wolfe. Kwan attended Santa Ana High School and set a Sunset "C" Record in the pole vault. He was fifth in the "C" CIF Southern Section finals and second in the "B" finals the following year.

**TOM LIPSKI — Sr., Distances (4:08.2; 9:08.2)**

"Tom is our leading returning runner in the mile with the graduation of Rick Carr," says Wolfe. Lipski competed in both the mile and two-mile last season after transferring from Santa Ana Junior College. He was conference and state champion in the three-mile at Santa Ana with a best of 13:58.6. He attended Saddleback High School where his best was a 4:19.4 mile.

**DOUG MacLEAN — Fr., Mile (4:10.9)**

"He has been hampered by leg injuries most of the fall but has excellent potential to be one of our top milers this spring," says Wolfe. MacLean ran a 4:10.9 mile coming back from a broken leg his senior year at Costa Mesa High School. He has also run the two-mile in 9:08. He also competed in cross country and was All-Orange County and in basketball.

**DEAN OWENS — Jr., High Jump (7-0 ¾)**

"Our school recordholder, he is in his second year of using the flop method of high jumping. He has made great strides with it and the ability to score in the Pacific-8 and NCAA," says Wolfe. Owens broke Lew Hoyt's nine-year-old record of 7-0 ½ with a leap of 7-0 ¾ against Occidental last April. Using the flop, he improved 6 ¾ inches over the previous year. He also went seven feet even to set a meet record in the Stanford dual and 7-0 ¼ for a meet mark in the Cal dual. He finished third in the Pac-8 with a leap of seven feet even. He cleared 6-9 twice using the straddle method at El Cajon High School and was All-Grossmont League. He also made All-League in basketball and once scored 24 points against Bill Walton. He played on the Trojan frosh basketball team but has concentrated on track since his freshman year.

**ROBERT PULLARD — Jr., Pole Vault (17-0)**

"He has already made 17-0 twice indoors this year after only clearing that height twice all last season," says Wolfe. "Eighteen feet is his goal and with two seasons of collegiate experience behind him he could become our school record-holder." Pullard set a meet record in the Stanford dual last season by clearing 17 feet for the first time in his career. He also went 17-0 the next week to win in the Texas El Paso dual and 16-6 the following Saturday for a victory in the Cal dual. He finished second in the Pacific-8 with a 16-9 vault. Pullard attended Los Angeles High School where he set a national interscholastic record of 16-7 and led his team to the city and state championships in 1969.



**DON QUARRIE — Sr., Sprints (9.4, 9.3; 20.4, 20.2)**

"His 9.4 hundred indoors at the Astrodome shows he has completely healed from his leg injury last year," says Wolfe. "He's an established world class sprinter and should have his best year ever as a senior. He is counted on heavily in the sprints and anchoring the sprint relay." A member of the Jamaican Olympic team in 1972, Quarrie is the co-holder of the 200-meter world record of 19.8 set in 1971. He was ranked the No. 1 200-meter runner in the world for 1971, according to Track and Field News. Last year Don was hampered by a leg injury coming in the Pac-8 championships. He reinjured the leg in the NCAA Championships after running a wind-aided 9.9 100 meters in a heat. He tried to come back in the Olympics but pulled up in a heat. Still, Quarrie earlier twice anchored the USC 880 relay team to times better than the world record. He ran a 19.7 anchor at the Champions Meet when the Trojans first topped the world mark of 1:21.7 with a 1:21.1 clocking and then anchored the team to a 1:20.7 at the West Coast Relays. The latter effort was a new collegiate record but was not considered as a world record because relay records are accepted only if the four team members are from one nation. He also ran the third leg on the undefeated 440-yard relay team which set stadium records at Arizona State, Stanford and Texas El Paso and meet records in the Stanford and UCLA duals and West Coast Relays. The relay team of Lance Babb, Leon Brown, Quarrie and Willie Deckard ran the second fastest time ever of 38.8 against Texas El Paso, two-tenths off the world record held by USC. Quarrie set a new track record of 20.8 for the 220 at Arizona State and equaled the Cal dual meet record of 9.4 in the 100.

**KEN RANDLE—Fr., 440 (47.4)**

"Another one of the four freshmen that should go under 47 seconds in the 440," says Wolfe. "He is considered the best quarter mile prospect ever to come out of Missouri. He's a tough competitor, and if spring football does not take him away he will be up there in the Pacific-8 meet." Randle ran 47.4 the eight fastest prep 440 in the nation last year, although running in poor weather much of the season. He has run the 220 in 21.0 and the 100 in 9.5. Also a football star at Central High in Kansas City, he played on the Trojan junior varsity football team and caught two long touchdown passes while appearing in three games before moving up to the varsity.

**LEIGH REILLY—Fr., Mile (3:53.1m)**

"He could be a pleasant surprise in the mile and is thought of as a great prospect in South Africa," says Wolfe. Reilly was second in the South African Junior Championships in the 1500 meters and set a record in the Natal Sectional Championships. He attended Hilton College (same as a high school in the U.S.) and came to USC this spring.

**EARL RICHARDSON—So., 440 (46.5)**

"He was a finalist in the NCAA 440 as a freshman and now becomes the senior citizen on our mile relay team," says Wolfe. "His experience should prove valuable this season." Richardson had a best of 46.5 set in the Texas El Paso dual for one of the fastest times for a freshman in the nation. In the same meet, he ran the second leg of the mile relay as the Trojans equalled the school record of 3:07.6 and set a new UTEP stadium record to beat an outstanding Texas El Paso team of Kemp, Jackson, Harold Williams and Steve Williams. He won the Cal dual 440 in 47.8 and ran 46.7 to qualify for the NCAA finals. Attended Dunbar High School in Dayton, Ohio where he ran 47.2 as an 11th grader.

**FRED RITCHERSON—Sr., Distances (9:04.0; 8:52.8; 14:00.0, 13:45.5)**

"With his experience, he is expected to be the mainstay of our distance runners," says Wolfe. Ritcherson was USC's top cross country runner last fall and finished seventh in the Pac-8 Championships with a time of 31:02 for the six mile-410-yard course. He was the second fastest Trojan runner for both the two and three mile runs with bests of 9:04 and 14:00. Fred finished fourth in the NCAA six-mile as a freshman and then missed the following season because of a broken leg. Last year he finished seventh in the Pac-8 three-mile with a time of 14:00. His best six-mile time is 28:36.8. Attended Salesian High School where he ran 8:55 in the two-mile and 4:13 in the mile. He won the CIF cross country championship in 1967 and 1968 and was third in the state championship two-mile in 1968 and fourth in 1969.

**JEFF STEINBERG—So., Javelin (—)**

"He could be a pleasant surprise, a darkhorse prospect who is in only his second year of throwing the javelin, a hard worker," says Wolfe. Steinberg competed in the shot put at Beverly Hills High School as well as playing football. He has impressed Coach Wolfe with his throws in practice. Last year the Trojan coach had a javelin thrower with no collegiate experience in Rich Ram who improved enough to be a NCAA finalist and throw 240 feet.

**BO STERNER—So., Decathlon, Discus (7648; 161-8)**

"A definite threat for the NCAA decathlon crown, he scored over 7600 in pre-Olympic meets in Sweden last summer," says Wolfe. "He also should be our No. 1 discus thrower." Sterner qualified for the Olympics but did not compete for the Swedish team at Munich. He was doing well in the NCAA decathlon last season when he was disqualified in the 440 for stepping on the line.

**MARK STEVENS—So., Shot Put, Discus; (55-2; 158-6)**

"He is our most experienced weight man and is much heavier and stronger this year," says Wolfe. Stevens was the state champion in the shot put with a best of 67-3 with the 12-pound shot and threw the discus 170 feet in high school. He attended Newport Harbor High School. He was the second leading Trojan in both the shot put and discus last season.

**KEVIN TODD—Sr., Triple Jump (51-8)**

"He's our leading returning triple jumper and is in his fourth season on the Trojan squad after coming over from New Zealand," says Wolfe. Todd leaped his lifetime best of

51-8 to win the triple jump in the Cal dual. He had bests of 49-1½ and a 24-1½ long jump at Southland High School and finished second three straight year in the New Zealand Championships before coming to USC.

### ED WASHINGTON—Jr., High Hurdles (13.8)

"He is an excellent high hurdles and triple jump prospect from Los Angeles City College," says Wolfe. "He has all the tools—quickness, and is long-legged—and is a definite contender in the Pacific-8 and NCAA." Washington finished third in the high hurdles and fourth in the triple jump in the state JC championships last year. His bests are 24-8 for the long jump, 13.8 in the high hurdles and 49-11 for the triple jump.

### RANDY WILLIAMS — So., Long Jump (27-4¼)

"The returning NCAA champion in the long jump and leadoff man on the NCAA champion sprint relay team, he will be running the sprints in addition to the long jump this year," says Wolfe. "He had a fantastic freshman season and I look for him to top it. He matured so well as a freshman and his ability of concentration enables him to do so well. He could run 9.4 in the 100." Williams just about did it all in his first-ever season of national and international competition—won the Pacific-8, NCAA, U.S. Junior and U.S.-U.S.S.R. International long jump championships, ran the leadoff leg on USC's undefeated and Pac-8 champion sprint relay team, got off the year's longest legal jump in the Olympic Games qualifying of 27-4¼ and capped it all by coming back with another 27-foot leap to take the Olympic Gold Medal. And he was only a freshman! Williams, who just turned 19 years old at the Olympics, was ranked the No. 1 long jumper in the world for 1972 and was the youngest athlete to achieve a No. 1 ranking, according to Track and Field News. Randy won the long jump in the Santa Barbara Relays, the Stanford dual, the Texas El Paso dual and the Cal dual. The 440 relay team set West Coast Relays and UCLA dual records with Williams as the leadoff man. Randy's 27-4¼ leap in the preliminaries at Munich is the best ever by a 19-year-old, by a junior (under age 20) and by a college athlete. Williams was undefeated in his first eight indoor meets this season and won the National AAU Indoor Championship with the second longest indoor jump ever of 26-8½. He is national chairman for the Special Olympics for Mentally Retarded Children fund. He attended Edison High School in Fresno where his best of 25-4 topped the nation's preps his senior year in 1971. He also had a wind-aided jump of 26-3 to win the '71 state championship.

### JERRY WILSON — Sr., High Hurdles (13.4)

"Returning NCAA champion with a best of 13.4 and with normal improvement, he will again be the best collegian this season," says Wolfe. "He's a great competitor, always rises to the occasion in the big meets." Wilson is the only returning point scorer from last year's Indoor Championship team. He placed fifth in the high hurdles in the NCAA Indoor Meet. He won four of five high hurdle races in dual meets (Oxy, Stanford, UTEP and Cal) and won the high hurdles at the Santa Barbara Relays. He finished second in the Pacific-8 and equaled his lifetime best of 13.4 to win the NCAA championships. He was two-time state JC champion in the high hurdles and ran 13.4 in the AAU Championships while still at Fresno Junior College. He attended Roosevelt High School in Fresno and won both the high hurdles in 13.7 and 180-yard low hurdles in 18.3 at the 1969 state championships. His high school best was 13.6.

## HERITAGE

**NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS:** USC has won 27 out of 43 NCAA meets competed in since its beginning in 1921. On 10 occasions they have finished second. The Trojans won nine in a row (1935-1943), and seven straight (1949-1955). A total of 81 individual championships highlight the record.

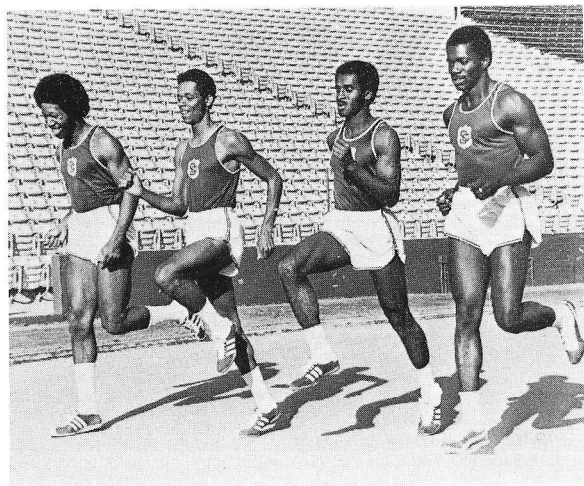
