

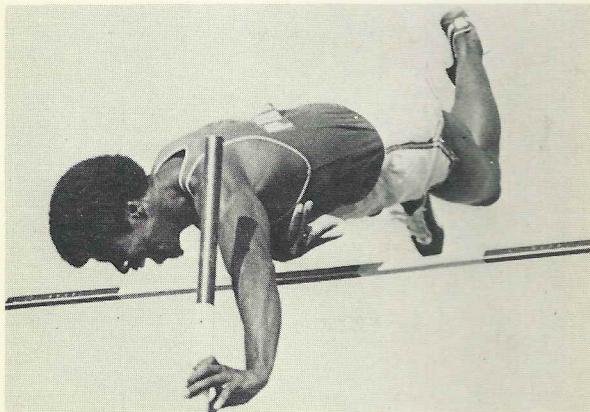

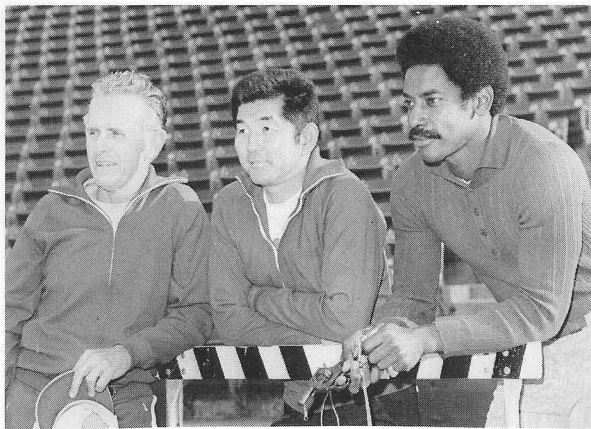

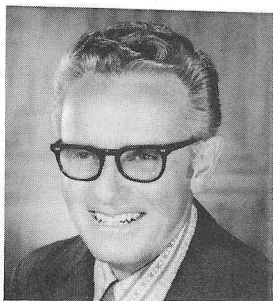

VERN WOLFE HEAD COACH



Vern Wolfe, in his 12th season at USC, is continuing the incredible success story of the Trojan track program. Only USC's fourth head track coach since 1916, he belongs in the company of the great former coaches Dean Cromwell (nine straight NCAA titles from 1935 to 1943 and a total of 12), Jess Hill (two titles in three years) and Jess Mortensen (seven in 11 years including five straight from 1951 to 1955) that have led USC to

a record 25 NCAA outdoor championships, five times as many as runners-up Illinois and UCLA

Wolfe, a former pole vaulter under Cromwell, returned to his alma mater as head track coach in spectacular fashion in 1963, winning the NCAA championship. He added another in 1965 and then pulled off the only double in history by capturing both the NCAA indoor and outdoor crowns in 1967. His team won the outdoors again in 1968 and collected another indoor title in 1972.

Thus, in 11 years, Wolfe's teams have won six NCAA team championships, a total that exceeds any other collegiate coach in history outside of USC. It also is more than any university except Kansas (which also has six)! His two indoor titles rank USC second behind Kansas' three in the nine year history of the NCAA indoor meet.

Added to Wolfe's impressive list of achievements are his four Pacific-8 championships and five undefeated seasons in dual meet competition. The Trojans were named national collegiate dual meet champions in 1971 by Track and Field News.

USC has always been near the top under Wolfe. The Trojans have scored among the top four teams in the outdoor championships eight of his 11 years, with four firsts, two second place finishes, a third and a fourth. They have never lost more than two dual meets in any one season.

The Trojan coach has a career record of 90-7-1 and a USC mark of 73-7-1. His collegiate record includes undefeated seasons at San Jose State in 1961 and Foothill Junior College in 1962.

During his tenure at USC, Wolfe has coached 19 athletes who have broken or tied 28 indoor and outdoor records. His 880-yard relay team twice bettered the world record in 1972, the second time by a full second with a time of 1:20.7. Unfortunately, relay records are accepted only if the four team members are from one nation and one Trojan runner, Don Quarrie is from Jamaica, so the mark does not count as a world record.

Wolfe's athletes have won 18 individual NCAA championships and have broken or tied every USC individual record of events regularly held at college meets.

Wolfe has been active in the international sphere of the sport, too. In 1966 he was named to assist Stan Wright with the U.S. national team which competed against Australian, British, New Zealand and other world class stars in Los Angeles. The previous year he spent part of his summer vacation training Rumanian athletes and holding clinics for Rumanian coaches as that country prepared for the Balkan Games.

His athletes have performed well on the international level. Twelve have competed in the Olympic Games, and four won gold medals—Rex Cawley (400-meter hurdles, 1964), Dallas Long (shot put, 1964), Bob Seagren (pole vault, 1968) and Randy Williams (long jump, 1972). Lennox Miller (100 meters, 1968) and Seagren (pole vault, 1972) collected silver medals and Miller won a bronze (100 meters, 1972).

But what the popular Wolfe is proud of most is that 90 percent of the track athletes he's coached have graduated from USC, far above the average for college students.

Wolfe was born in Garber, Okla., but moved west and went to Gardena High School in Los Angeles. He won honors as an All-Marine League back in football and in track as a pole vaulter.

He then entered USC, winning a letter with the 1941 frosh track team and the 1942 varsity squad, before being called to military duty. Following three and one-half years with the Paratroops, he was discharged in 1946 and came back to school. He vaulted for Cromwell again in 1946 and 1947 and also obtained his bachelor's and master's degree in education. Graduating in 1949, Wolfe began his coaching career in 1952 at Torrance High School. He was there three years, then moved on to North Phoenix High School in Arizona for the 1955 season. It was during his six-year reign at North Phoenix that he achieved recognition as one of the nation's most successful prep track and field coaches.

While at North Phoenix he coached Jim Brewer, the first prepster to clear 14 and then 15 feet in the pole vault, and Dallas Long, former national high school record holder and the first prep to break 60 feet with the 16-pound shot.

Wolfe moved on to San Jose State College as head frosh and varsity field event coach in 1961.

He took the head coaching post at newly established Foothill College for the 1962 season and won the Coast Conference title and finished fifth in the state junior college meet. USC hired him in June of that year.

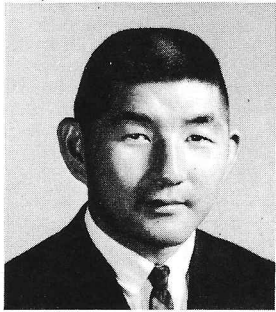

KEN MATSUDA

Assistant Track Coach

Vern Wolfe's right-hand man, and a respected coach in his own right, is Ken Matsuda, assistant track coach at USC.



The popular assistant also serves as the cross country coach and has a 39-5 career record.

Matsuda is now in his eighth season as assistant coach at USC. He came in the summer of 1966, following a successful coaching tenure at Foothill College in Northern California.

A graduate of San Jose State, Matsuda was one of Los Angeles' most sought-after

prep athletes when he graduated from Westchester High School. At Westchester, Ken earned varsity letters in football, track and baseball, each of the four years he was in school.

After a brief stay at Santa Monica City College Matsuda transferred to San Jose State where he earned two letters as a Spartan halfback, also competing as a sprinter and long jumper on the track team.

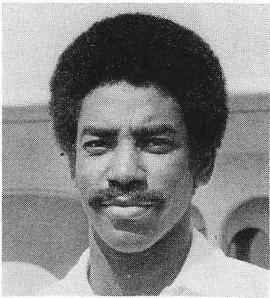
Matsuda and Wolfe first worked together in 1961 when the Trojan head coach was on the staff at San Jose State.

Seven of his long jumpers had bests over 25 feet—Mack Burton at San Jose State; Russ Hodge and Pete d'Eliscu at Foothill JC and Earl McCullough, Henry Jackson, Henry Hines and current protege Randy Williams at USC.

Matsuda has also coached the Trojan sprint relay teams to four NCAA titles and five Pacific-8 wins.

THEO VILTZ

Assistant Track Coach



Viltz, who handles the Trojan hurdlers, placed fourth in the 1964 high hurdles and third in 1965. He won the highs in the 1964 and 1965 Pacific-8 Championships.

A two-year varsity letterman too, Theo went on to play for the Houston Oilers for two years as a defensive back.

Besides his track duties, Viltz teaches at Long Beach Poly High School where he is an

assistant football coach under another former Trojan, Mike Scarpace.

He graduated from Serra High School in Gardena and attended Compton Junior College before transferring to USC where he majored in sociology. He is currently working toward a master's degree in secondary administration.

Theo and his wife, Stanley, have a daughter, Raven, 5.

1974 OUTLOOK

USC coach Vern Wolfe promises a very talented Trojan team with more depth and balance for the 1974 season.

But the coach warns, "We have to realize how youthful this team is and it would be foolish to predict a national championship and undefeated dual meet season. We have better balance and good depth and will be a better dual meet team."

The Trojans have 11 freshmen and 13 sophomores on the squad. They lost only two key performers from last year's Pacific-8 runnerup team and those two, Don Quarrie and Jerry Wilson, did not score in the NCAA championship.

Twenty-two lettermen return led by Olympic long jump champion Randy Williams, (27-4 1/4), who had the longest jump of the year and third longest of all-time with a wind-aided 27-9 last season. Williams will be out to regain the NCAA long jump title, finishing fourth last year after winning it as a freshman.

"The long jump should be our strongest event," Wolfe believes. Joining Williams are freshman Gerald Hardeman (26-0 1/4), the prep record holder, and Tody Hammond (25-6 1/4). Hardeman and Hammond had the best and second best high school marks in the nation last year.

A capsule look at the other events:

SPRINTS—A strong area traditionally and should be this year, too. Transfer Guy Abrahams (9.3, New Mexico JC) had the nation's fastest JC 100 time . . . David Thomas (9.4, 20.8, LACC) won the state JC title . . . Mike Shavers (9.5, 21.0) was the state prep 220 champ as a junior at Albany High . . . Armand Ross (9.4, LACC) took the state JC 100 race.

440—A lot of depth. NCAA finalist and Pac-8 runnerup as a freshman, Ken Randle (46.4) is the top returnee and veterans Trevor Campbell (47.0), Earl Richardson (46.5), Greg Jones (47.3) and Claude Brown (47.9) assure a great mile relay team.

880—Well-fortied with seniors James Baxter (1:48.6) and Nathan Burks (1:49.8) back.

DISTANCES—Weak area but Wolfe thinks senior Fred Ritcherson (8:52.8, 13:45.5) is back to his freshman form when he was sixth in NCAA six-mile. Senior Steve Brown (8:57.4, 13:47.8), South African Leigh Reilly (4:12.2) and sophomore Doug McLean (4:10.9), who missed his entire frosh year because of an injury, also return.

HURDLES—Solid with Ed Washington (13.8) and Bob Coffman (13.9, 51.4) back bolstered by newcomers Ogie Williams (13.9, Harbor JC) Tom Andrews (13.6hs) and Michael Johnson (13.6hs).

HIGH JUMP—Trojans may be first college team ever to open the season with three athletes who have cleared seven feet. School record holder Dean Owens (7-2 1/4) and Jerry Culp (7-1 1/2) return and freshman Hanspeter Habegger (7-1) from Switzerland enrolled this winter.

POLE VAULT—Improved with Robert Pullard (17-1), fourth in the NCAA meet last year, joined by newcomers Al Sandoval (16-2 3/4, Mt. SAC JC) and Russ Rogers (15-9 3/4), the freshman from Texas.

WEIGHTS—Relying on youth, sophomore Mike Budinich (58-5 12) and freshman Wayne Bouvier (63-8hs) from Michigan will be the shot putters while freshmen Ralph Fruguglietti (194-0hs) and John Owens (185-4hs) are the discus men.

TRIPLE JUMP—Thin with versatile Washington (50-11 1/4), third in the Pac-8, doubling to help sophomore Tom Cochee (50-0 3/4).

JAVELIN—Weaker this year with only transfer Mike Helsby (223-3, Portland JC) and decathlete Bo Sterner (210-3).

INDIVIDUAL BIOGRAPHIES

(Note: The following biographies are limited to those performers expected to see the most action this season. USC coach Vern Wolfe's comments are in quotation marks.)

GUY ABRAHAMS — Jr., Sprints

"A solid, proven sprinter with an excellent attitude, he should do well in the Pacific-8 and be a contender for the nationals." A transfer from New Mexico Junior College, Guy ran 9.3 for the nation's fastest JC 100 time last season. He also had a wind-aided 9.2 and his 220 best was 21.0. He was the national JC champion in the 60. Attended Washington High School in Los Angeles with a best of 9.6 but was injured his senior year.

TOM ANDREWS — Fr., Hurdles

"Should blossom in the intermediate hurdles because of his good quarter speed but needs experience and seasoning in collegiate ranks." Set a State meet high hurdles record of 13.6, the fastest prep time last year. The West Bakersfield High star also had the seventh longest triple jump of 49-4½ at the West Coast Relays. He ran 47.2 in the Bakersfield Classic 440 to show his intermediate hurdle potential and may be a member of the mile relay team.

JAMES BAXTER — Sr., 880

"His fall training and early indoor results indicate a promising senior year. He must acquire a stronger finishing kick to be a factor in the NCAA." Ran his lifetime best of 1:48.6 in NCAA heat, finishing just one spot out of qualifying for the final. Also had a 1:48.8 in winning UCLA dual. His 46.9 second leg helped the Trojan run a 3:07.1 mile relay in the Trojan Invitational last year, the fastest ever by a USC team. He transferred to USC last year from Los Angeles City College where he was second in State JC 880. Led Los Angeles High School to the city and state championships in 1969 with a best of 1:51.0 as a prep.

WAYNE BOUVIER — Fr., Shot Put

"He has many things going for him, especially size and strength. He has revamped his putting style and should break loose during the season. There is no limit to his potential." Had best of 63-8 at Eisenhower High School in Utica, Mich. for seventh longest mark in nation last year. Was two-time state shot put champion. Holds the state prep record in power lifting (460 pounds bench press, 650 squat and 650 deadlift) and won the senior and junior state powerlifting titles and the teenage national powerlifting crown last year. His 16-pound best in the shot is 55-10½ in his first collegiate meet this year when the team was in Hawaii over the semester break.

CLAUDE BROWN — So., 440

"A year of seasoning has helped Claude. He should be a vital factor in the quarter and mile relay." Had the fourth fastest time among the 440 runners last year with a best of 47.9. Ran on the mile relay team and had 47.7 opening leg on 3:07.1 mile relay last year, fastest ever by a Trojan team. Was the Los Angeles City 440 champion and finished second in the State meet as a senior at Gardena High School.

STEVE BROWN — Sr., Distances

"A hard worker with a good attitude, Steve must set high goals and dedicate himself to becoming a consistent winner. He has the ability. We need a strong year from him." His lifetime best of 13:47.8 placed him sixth in the Pac-8 three-mile. Twice ran under nine minutes in the two-mile with a best of 8:57.4 and also an 8:59.6 to win the UCLA dual. His two and three-mile times were Trojan bests last year. Attended L.A. Valley College for one year before transferring, running 9:09 and 14:09. Won Los Angeles City two-mile as a senior at Poly High School.

MIKE BUDINCICH — So., Shot Put

"He has the size and strength and should reach the 60-foot mark. I expect him to have a good sophomore year." Led the Trojans last year in both the shot put (58-5½) and discus (163-3) as a freshman. Placed seventh in the Pacific-8 shot put. Finished second in the L.A. City meet and had best of 62-9.3/4 at South Gate High School to rank 10th in the nation.

NATHAN BURKS — Sr., 880

"A veteran clutch performer who has the ability to get up for the big races. He needs to sharpen his stretch drive to score in the conference and national championships." Went under 1:50 with his lifetime best 1:49.8 to finish second behind teammate James Baxter in the UCLA dual half-mile. Finished fourth in the Pac-8 half-mile in 1972. Had bests of 48.8 in the 440 and 1:52.2 in the 880 at Castlemont High School in Oakland.

TREVOR CAMPBELL — So., 440

"He has had several international meets under his belt and is more mature this year. He will help the team in the 440 and could be a surprise in the half-mile." Ran 47.0 in Bakersfield Classic to rank second among Trojan quarter-milers last season. Entered USC in the spring semester and got off slowly without the benefit of fall training. A member of the Jamaican teams in the Pan American and Olympic Games in the 440 and mile relays. Has a best of 46.4 in the 400 meters. Was the Jamaican high school champion while attending Kingston High School.

TOM COCHEE — So., Triple Jump

"He has the size and speed to compete at any level. If he can shake minor injuries and dedicate himself totally, he will improve greatly this year." Was the second leading Trojan triple jumper last year with a 50-2 mark. His 50-1½ was the best high school mark in 1972. Also had prep bests of 23-6½ in the long jump and 14.2 high hurdles. Attended Oakland Technical High School.

BOB COFFMAN — Sr., Hurdles, Decathlon

"An experienced hurdler in both the highs and intermediates, Bob may have found his spot as a decathlon performer. He could score well in both the Pac-8 and NCAA decathlon." Finished second in the Pac-8 intermediates. Ran a lifetime best of 51.4 to finish second in UCLA dual. His high hurdle best was 14.0 last year but he has run 13.9, doing that in the 1972 West Coast Relays. He set a personal best of 7184 in the decathlon earlier this year. Attended Lamar High School in Houston where he ran 13.8 in the highs and 37.2 to lead the nation's preps in the 330 intermediates.

JERRY CULP — Sr., High Jump

"Competition by his own teammates should give Jerry the incentive he needs to bring out his best skills. Worked hard this fall." Was sixth in the Pac-8 last year and had a best of 7-0. Placed third in the NCAA indoor championships. His lifetime best is 7-1 1/2. Was the Pacific Coast Athletic Association champion and record holder at San Diego. Placed second in the 1969 State meet and won the San Diego State before transferring to USC last year. Held the national prep record of 7-0 1/4 while at Oceanside High School. Placed second in the 1969 State meet and won the San Diego CIF and State titles in 1970.

TOM DISTANISLAO — Fr., Pole Vault

"Has the size, strength and coordination to become a great pole vaulter. Needs experience to develop his skills and should blossom his freshman year." His lifetime best is 15-0 in the Beach Cities meet, although he cleared 15-6 in practice as a senior at Newport Harbor High School. Placed second in the Southern Cal CIF finals and won the Beach Cities and Chaffey Invitational meets, setting meet records.

RALPH FRUGUGLIETTI — Fr., Discus

"He could make our top ten list his freshman year. Only needs experience and the marks will come." His lifetime best of 194-0 placed him fifth among prep discus throwers last year. He's also thrown 193-10. Was a high school All-America and All-Northern California pick at Albany High School, setting East Bay and North Coast records. Also performed in the shot put with a best of 62-1.

HANSPETER HABEGGER — Fr., High Jump

"He's a promising flopper and his presence gives us tremendous depth in the high jump." A newcomer from Switzerland, he enrolled at USC this spring. He cleared 7-1 twice last year at meets in Switzerland and Finland for his lifetime best. His 7-1 is the Swiss record and he won both the Swiss national and junior championships. His top win was in the Helsinki Games last June. Also had wins representing Switzerland against Austria, Portugal and Yugoslavia.

TODY HAMMOND — Fr., Long Jump

"A good competitor, he should be one of three Trojans over 26 feet this year. May be even better as a triple jumper if he has the desire." A high school All-America, he was the second ranking prep long jumper in the nation with a best of 25-6 1/4. Finished sixth on the all-time high school list. His top jump won the CIF 4A finals last year. Jumps off either foot.

GERALD HARDEMAN — Fr., Long Jump

"An extremely talented long jumper, he has the height and the speed. By mid-season, he should be outstanding. With Randy Williams and Tody Hammond he gives USC the best 1-2-3 long jump punch in the school's history." He's the national prep record holder from Edison High School, the same school Randy Williams attended. His official prep record is 25-9 1/2 set in Porterville in 1972, his junior year. But last year he had his lifetime best of 26-0 1/4 at the High School Meet of Champions in Chicago.

MIKE HELSBY — So., Javelin

"A lot of weight rests on his shoulders, he is our No. 1 javelin thrower although he is a newcomer with only one year of college experience. Is bigger and stronger than a year ago." His best is 223-3 done at an All-Comers meet in Hillsboro, Ore. Attended Portland Junior College for one year after graduating from Hillsboro High School in Oregon. Finished sixth in the Ore. State meet his senior year.

MICHAEL JOHNSON — Fr., Hurdles

"Mike has the skills to become one of USC's all-time hurdle greats and we've had some good ones (Earl McCullough, Jerry Wilson, Lance Babb and Herman Franklin). He can double in the intermediates and has good quarter-mile speed." The brother of UCLA football star Kermit Johnson, Mike won the State meet high hurdles and the Golden West with a 13.6, equalling the nation's fastest prep time last year. He beat Tom Andrews, now his teammate at USC, and Carl Florant, who also had 13.6 bests. Also, his State meet time tied the state record. Had other big wins in the All-American Meet in Des Moines and the Southern Cal CIF 4A finals. Earned All-America honors. His other top marks are a 37.7 330 intermediates and a 48.7 440. Attended Pasadena High School.

GREG JONES — So., 440, 220

"He will be used primarily as a quarter-miler. Greg is far ahead of his progress a year ago at this time." Finished fifth in the Pac-8 220 and had a season best of 21.3. His prep 440 time of 47.3 is his lifetime best. That was the fastest 440 in California in 1972 and sixth best in the nation. Ran a 9.5 100 as a prep. His brother, Larence, was NCAA 440 runnerup in 1972. Attended Lamoore High School.

GLENN KERN — So., 880

"He has his work cut out as a half-miler but can really help the team if he can dip under 1:49.5. Must smooth out his style and work on his kick." Lifetime bests are 1:50.8 in the 880 and 49.3 in the 440. Transferred to USC this year from Spokane Community College. Prep bests were 1:53.0 880 and 50.0 440. Also played football and was All-Valley at Toppenish (Wash.) High School.

JOHN KWAN — So., Pole Vault

"He had a good frosh year and should break into the 16-foot club. Needs consistency but could be a bright spot for the Trojans." Had a best of 15-6 last year to be the second leading Trojan vaulter. It was a great improvement over his prep best of 14-0. Attended Santa Ana High School.

DOUG MacLEAN — So., Mile

"We really need his services this season. If he can get into shape after missing the entire 1973 season, we know he will do well." Recent foot surgery appears to have corrected the trouble that plagued Doug's freshman year. A 4:10.9 prep miler, he also ran 9:09 in the two-mile before suffering a broken leg during his senior year at Costa Mesa High School forcing him to miss the CIF championships.

DEAN OWENS — Sr., High Jump

"With two years of experience as a flop jumper, he should be even better this year. Must become more aggressive in meets." Dean twice last season broke his own school record of 7-0 3/4 set his sophomore year. He cleared 7-1 at the Claremont Relays and the next week went 7-2 1/4 in the California dual at the Coliseum. Finished second in the Pac-8 and sixth in the NCAA high jump. Changed to the flop after his freshman year and improved 6 3/4 inches as a sophomore. His prep best was 6-9 using the straddle jump. Also played basketball at El Cajon High School and made All-Grossmont League scoring 24 points in a game against Bill Walton. Played on the Trojan frosh basketball team but has concentrated on track since his freshman year.

JOHN OWENS — Fr., Discus

"He threw the discus just one year in high school and yet his fall training indicates he will also threaten the USC frosh record and be a consistent point winner." He won the Southern California CIF discus championship last year and had a best of 185-4. Also tossed the shot 60-9 in high school. Attended Inglewood High School.

ROBERT PULLARD — Sr., Pole Vault

"Robert needs consistency, a higher hand hold and mental toughness for the big meets. He has worked hard and deserves to be ranked among the nation's leading collegiate vaulters." Finished fourth in the NCAA with a 16-6 vault and fifth in the Pac-8 at 16-0. Ranks third on the all-time Trojan top ten in the vault with a best of 17-1. Also cleared 17-0 twice indoors in 1973. Was second in the 1972 Pac-8 meet with a 16-9 vault. Set a national interscholastic record of 16-7 and led Los Angeles High School, along with Trojan teammate James Baxter, to the 1969 state and city championships.

KEN RANDLE — So., 440

"His football orientation makes him especially strong on the track. Figures to be our top 440 man but may also run the 220." A split end on the football team, Ken is following in the tradition of Edesel Garrison, who also played split end and ran the quarter-mile. Finished second to Benny Brown in the Pac-8 440 and was an NCAA finalist. Ran his lifetime best of 46.4 that ranks fourth on the Trojan all-time list in the Trojan Invitational and did 46.6 at Pac-8 meet Like Garrison, he was a workhorse, running on both relays plus the open 440 and sometimes the sprints. Anchored the mile relay and had a final leg time of 46.1 when the Trojans ran 3:07.1 in the Trojan Invitational for the fastest time in the school's history. He also ran the sprints occasionally with bests of 21.1 and 9.9. Ran the third leg on the sprint relay that had a best of 39.6 (in NCAA semis) to rank 7th on USC all-time list. Had prep bests of 9.5, 21.0 and 47.4 (8th best in the nation) at Central High School in Kansas City in 1972.

LEIGH REILLY — So., Mile

"He needs meet experience and must become more aggressive. His good summer and fall training indicates an improved season for him." A native of South Africa, Leigh was the second best miler on the team last year with a best of 4:12.2. His fastest 1500 meters is 3:53.0. Finished second in the South African Junior Championships 1500 in 1972 and set a record in the Natal sectional championships. Attended Hilton High School and entered USC last spring.

EARL RICHARDSON — Jr., 440

"He must make best use of his talents quick or he will be involved in a tough fight for the quarter-mile positions. An NCAA finalist as a freshman, he did not improve last year. We are counting on his self-pride and experience to help us this year." Had only the third fastest 440 time on the team last year with a best of 47.3 after running his lifetime best of 46.5 in the Texas El Paso dual as a freshman. Also in his freshman year he ran the second leg of the mile relay that equalled the school record of 3:07.6 and set a new UTEP stadium mark in beating the great Texas El Paso team of Kemp, Jackson, Harold and Steve Williams. Last year he ran on even a faster Trojan mile relay team, running 46.4 on the third leg of a 3:07.1 relay. The time is not a school record because the Trojans finished only second to the San Diego Track Club in the Trojan Invitational. Attended Dunbar High School in Dayton, Ohio where he had a best of 47.2 as an 11th grader.

FRED RITCHERSON — Sr., Distances

"After a good frosh year and two frustrating years of injuries, Fred appears ready to run some great times in the three and six-mile runs. If he can drive himself and develop a winning attitude, he will become more consistent." Finished eighth in the Pac-8 three-mile, running a season best of 13:50.4. His two-mile best of 9:01.6 got him second in the UCLA dual as the Trojans went 1-2. Both marks were second fastest on the team behind Steve Brown. Fred finished fourth in the NCAA six-mile as a freshman and missed the following season because of a broken leg. Took seventh in the Pac-8 three-mile as a sophomore. His lifetime bests are a 8:52.8 two-mile, a 13:45.5 three-mile and 28:36.8 six-mile. Prep bests were a 4:13 mile and 8:55 two-mile. Won the CIF cross country championships in 1967 and 1968 and was third in the State meet two-mile in 1968 and fourth in 1969. Attended Salesian High School.

RUSS ROGERS — Fr., Pole Vault

"He has the speed, strength and size and appears to be a fierce competitor. With the competition from his teammates, we expect him to improve steadily." The Texas state champion as a sophomore in high school, he has a best of 15-9 3/4 that tied him for the third best prep mark in the nation. Has cleared 16 feet in practice. Earned All-America and three-time All-State honors at Pascal High School in Ft. Worth.

ARMAND ROSS — Jr., Sprints

"May be a key cog in our sprint relay team and hopefully will develop in the 220 as well. Must work harder in practice and gain more strength." A transfer from Los Angeles City College, he won the State JC meet 100 in 9.7 and finished fourth in the 220. Had 1973 bests of 9.4 and 21.4. Was Southern California Conference 100 champion as a freshman. Named MVP last year on LACC's state runnerup team. His prep bests were 9.7 and 22.0 at Crenshaw High School.

AL SANDOVAL—So., Pole Vault

"He has to smooth out the run, work for consistency and gain experience in our tough schedule. We can expect Al to do well in the big meets." Transferred to USC this year from Mt. San Antonio Junior College where he set a South Coast Conference record last season. He cleared 16-2 3/4 at the Mt. SAC Relays last season for his lifetime best. Has surpassed 16 feet three times with other vaults of 16-0 and 16-1. Coached by former UCLA vaulter Rick Sloan at Mt. SAC. Had a prep best of 15-7 which at the time was nation's highest prep vault in 1972. Attended West Covina High School.

MICHAEL SHAVERS—Fr., Sprints

"With a better training attitude and burning desire to win, he is becoming a top-flight sprinter. He should hold his own in any meet." His best prep win was beating Carl McCullough, now an Arizona State star, in the 1972 State meet 220 when he was only a junior and McCullough was a senior. Set a national age group record for 16 year olds and under by running 9.5, also as a junior. His prep bests were 9.5, 21.0 and a 49.0 440. Earned All-America honors at Albany High School.

JEFF STEINBERG—Jr., Javelin

"A hard working, dedicated athlete who could help us in the javelin. He has two years experience behind him now." Didn't throw the javelin in high school. Was a shot putter with a best of 55 feet. His best last year in his first year of competition was 193-4. Attended Beverly Hills High School.

BO STERNER—Jr., Decathlon, Javelin

"He was plagued with nagging injuries last year but could be a big factor in the Pac-8 and NCAA decathlon events." Finished fifth in the Pac-8 decathlon last year with 5978 points although fouling on all three throws for no points in the discus, his strongest event. Did not compete in the NCAA. His all-time best score is 7646 points in a pre-Olympic meet in Sweden in 1972. A native of Sweden, he qualified for the Olympics on the Swedish team but did not compete at Munich. Was doing well in the NCAA decathlon as a freshman when he was disqualified in the 400 meters for stepping on the lane line. His performances in his best decathlon are 10.9 100 meters, 21-2 3/4 long jump, 43-6 3/4 shot put, 5-11 5/8 high jump, 49.2 400 meters, 14.5 high hurdles, 155-2 discus, 13-11 1/4 pole vault, 187-0 javelin and 4:33.7 1500 meters. His best performances in decathlon competition only are 10.9 100 meters, 21-9 long jump, 43-6 3/4 shot put, 6-1 1/4 high jump, 49.2 400 meters, 14.5 high hurdles, 164-8 discus, 14-1 pole vault, 202-3 javelin and 4:33.7 1500 meters. In dual meets, he competes in the javelin. He's from Stockholm, Sweden.

DAVID THOMAS—Jr., Sprints

"He has the speed and the power to run on the major college level. If he can handle the pressure, work hard and improve his style, David will be one of our sprint mainstays." A transfer from Los Angeles City College, David won the State JC 220 in 21.2 and ran on LACC's winning sprint relay team to help his team finish second to San Francisco City College last season. He was conference champion in the 100 and 220 as a sophomore and the 220 his freshman year. He ran 9.4 at Golden West College and 20.8 at Santa Barbara College last year for his lifetime bests. He was L.A. City 220 champion and school record holder at Hamilton High School with prep bests of 9.6 and 21.1. Also competed in the long jump with a top mark of 23-0 1/2.

ED WASHINGTON—Sr., Hurdles, Triple Jump

"A good high hurdler, Ed could surprise everyone in the triple jump if he puts his mind to it. With normal improvement, we expect a great senior year from him." He was the only athlete to score in three individual events in last year's Pacific-8 meet, finishing third in the triple jump, fourth in the high hurdles and sixth in the long jump. His Trojan bests are a 50-11 1/4 triple jump, 13.8 high hurdles and 24-5 1/2 long jump. He has wind-aided 52-2 triple and 24-6 long jumps. Transferred to USC last year from Los Angeles City College where he finished third in the highs and fourth in the triple jump in the State JC meet as a sophomore. His lifetime best of 24.8 in the long jump came at LACC. Attended Fremont High School.

OGIE WILLIAMS—Jr., Hurdles

"An experienced high hurdler on the college level, he should give us good overall hurdle strength as he gains experience in the intermediates. He needs concentration on relaxation." A transfer from L.A. Harbor College, Ogie ran 13.9 to win the JC Division of the Fresno Relays last year for his lifetime best. That win made Williams the fastest JC high hurdler in the nation last season. His top intermediate time is 54.3. He had prep bests of 14.3 and a 19.4 180 low hurdles at Locke High School.

RANDY WILLIAMS—Jr., Long Jump

"Randy hopes to raise his personal best and work for consistency this year. There is plenty of competition on our team and throughout the country to bring out the best in him. He can do the job and will improve." The 1972 Olympic and NCAA champion, Randy had the longest jump of the year and third longest of all-time with a wind-aided 27-9 to win the Pac-8 long jump. His legal best was 26-9 1/4, short of his lifetime record of 27-4 1/4 in the Olympic Games qualifying round. His 1973 wins included the National indoor and outdoor championships, the NCAA indoor, the USA-Russia dual and the Pacific-8. He was fourth in the NCAA outdoor. He also ran the opening leg on the Trojan sprint relay team that won the Pacific-8 and had a best of 39.6, the second fastest collegiate time last year. Williams did it all as a freshman in his first season of national and international competition—winning the Pacific-8, NCAA, U.S. Junior and U.S.-U.S.S.R. and Olympic Games long jumps. His 27-4 1/4 jump in the Olympics was the world's longest in 1972. Also ran the leadoff leg on USC's undefeated NCAA and Pac-8 champion sprint relay team. He was ranked the No. 1 long jumper in the world for 1972, the youngest athlete to achieve a top ranking. Attended Edison High School in Fresno where his best of 25-4 led the nation's preps his senior year (1971). Also had a wind-aided jump of 26-3 to win the State meet.

HERITAGE

CHAMPIONS AND RECORD HOLDERS

WORLD RECORDS: 60 USC trackmen have equalled or bettered world records since 1912.

OLYMPIC GAMES: USC trackmen have won 18 individual Olympic titles and have shared in ten relay victories. Fifty-one men have won a total of 76 places on United States Olympic teams.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS: USC has won 25 out of 43 NCAA meets competed in since its beginning in 1921. On 10 occasions they have finished second. The Trojans won nine in a row (1935-1943), and seven straight (1949-1955). They have also won two NCAA Indoor Championships since its beginning in 1965. A total of 81 individual championships highlight the record.

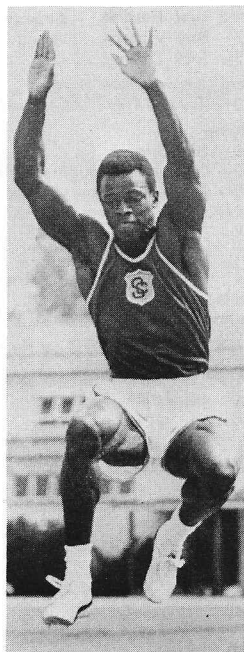
