ON THE COVER

A collage of Vern Wolfe during his career as USC's head track coach. Since coming to the university in 1963, Wolfe's name has become synonymous with NCAA championships and Olympic proteges. When he retires after this season, the Trojans will be without a truly great coach who gave so much to college athletics' most successful program.

His seven NCAA team titles tie him with another USC coach, Jess Mortensen, as the third winningest coach in NCAA Championship history. In addition, Wolfe has seen 15 of his lettermen go on to make the Olympic teams of five different nations. For a more complete sketch of Vern's career, turn to page 4.

1984 TRACK OUTLOOK

On his final team at USC, retiring head coach **Vern Wolfe** will not have any world-ranked athletes, but the quality athletes returning, along with some key recruits, will make this year's team a contender in the Pac-10 and NCAA championship meets.

"We have good scoring potential and could do much better with several other men in key events," said Wolfe. "If they perform to their potential and stay injury free, the 1984 Trojans are capable of doing well in Pac-10 and NCAA competition."

Wolfe, in his 22nd year at USC, and his top aide **Ken Matsuda** lost two 1983 NCAA scorers: Pole vaulter **Dave Kenworthy** (seventh, 17-2 $\frac{3}{4}$) and 800-meter runner **Mark Handelsman** (seventh, 1:47.23). The four other Trojans who scored at the NCAAs are returning.

Junior **Anthony Caire** (7-4) high jumped 7-3 for eighth place, while junior sprinter **Darwin Cook** (10.20, 20.87) ran 10.33 to place seventh in the 100 meters. Senior weightman **Hank Kraychir** (66-0 $\frac{1}{2}$, 203-8) threw his personal best to get fifth in the shot put and junior **Ed Tave** (25-10 $\frac{1}{4}$) soared 26-9 $\frac{1}{4}$ for fourth place in the long jump, with a wind that barely exceeded the limit for record purposes.

Along with Cook, the sprints will be in good hands with sophomore **Luis "Pancho" Morales** (10.21, 20.82) and high school sensation **Antonio Manning** (10.4, 21.05). Morales was sure to score at the NCAAs last year, but was sidelined by a pulled hamstring he sustained at the Pac-10 meet.

While at Hamilton High in Los Angeles, Manning was a double sprint champion at the City Championships in both 1982 and 1983. He was state champion in the 200 meters in 1982.

Redshirt freshman **Terry Ivey** (46.77), who sat out most of last year with a severe leg injury, is expected to be USC's leading 400-meter runner and **Dwight Williams** (48.44) should also be a scorer for the Trojans in that event.

The USC 1600-meter relay team will get a boost from Trojan football players **Ron Brown** and **Timmie Ware**. Brown, a reserve linebacker, was a high hurdler on last year's team before a broken ankle ended his season and Ware, the starting flanker, ran for Wolfe's 1982 team.

When he is not jumping, Tave (14.4) will be USC's primary competitor in the 110-meter high hurdles. Junior **Chris Crisman** (52.65) and sophomore **James Knowles** (52.09) will be handling the chores in the 400-meter intermediate hurdles. Crisman placed fifth at last year's Pac-10 Championships (53.00).

The middle distances got a tremendous lift when France's **Nicolas Thebault** decided to come to the United States and attend USC. His main race will be the 1500 meters (3:44.38), but occasionally may figure in the 800 (1:51.7) or the 5000 (14:47).

Sophomore **Jim Fisher** (1:50.6) returns from last year's squad with an excellent chance to become a conference and NCAA scorer. Sophomore **Don Young** (1:51.2, 3:58.3 1500), however, is still on the road back from a stress fracture that hobbled him in 1983 and his status for this year is uncertain. Freshman **Rob Briglia** (1:54.73), from Erie, Penn., could provide important depth to the Trojans in the 800.

In the jumping events the Trojans are strong, but not deep. Tave will concentrate on the long jump, (an event that may make him a surprise Olympian) but will also compete in the triple jump (51-0 $\frac{1}{4}$ w, 50-0 $\frac{1}{4}$).

Walk-ons **Jim Sweet** and **Robert Countryman** are expected to lend Tave some support in the horizontal jumps.

Caire has broken the USC high jump record in each of his two years as a Trojan and the prospect of more improvement makes Anthony a chance candidate for the U.S. Olympic Team.

The loss of Kenworthy (USC record holder, 18-2 $\frac{3}{4}$) put a dent in the Trojan pole vaulting corps. Sophomore **Mike Phipps** (16-0), senior **Lyle Esterkyn** (15-7) and junior **Doug Owens** (15-0) will be

ready to take up the slack, along with freshman vaulter-decathlete **Steve Klassen** from Boulder, Colo. Klassen's personal best vault of 16-0 was the eighth best in the U.S. by a prep.

Sophomore **Mike Gonzales** (7105) placed sixth in the Pac-10 decathlon last year with 7097 points. USC's leading decathlete in 1983, **Darren Hall**, has left school.

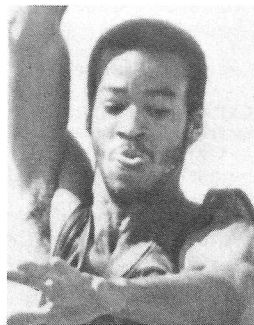
The weight events are in the able hands of Kraychir. He has shed 20 pounds since last season and has switched his shot putting style from the traditional "O'Brien" to the discus-like spin. He should also be effective in the discus this year, as well.

Sophomore **Walt DeJean** (56-1 $\frac{3}{4}$) is expected to improve into a regular scorer in the shot. Sophomore **Rick Luiten** (160-9), sidelined most of last year with a stress fracture of the lower left leg, will help in the discus.

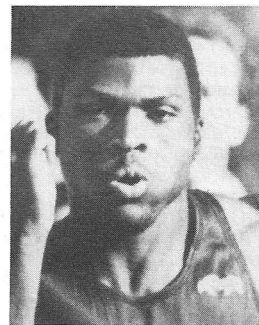
Gonzales (194-3) and senior **Mike Patellos** (189-10) will lead the Trojans in the javelin.

For the first time in many years, USC will have a hammer thrower on the team. **John Wolitarsky**, a transfer from Azusa Pacific, was 39th in the U.S. last year with a throw of 193-9. USC's school record is 142-10 $\frac{1}{2}$.

"We're still a little thin in some events due to the NCAA scholarship cutbacks, but I think we've added some quality athletes in places where we haven't had anybody," Wolfe said. "That change will really show when we get to the Pac-10 and the NCAAs."

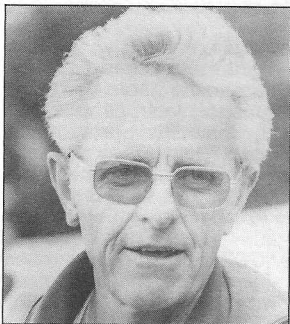

VERN WOLFE

Head Coach



The Olympic year of 1984 marks the end of an era for USC track and field. At the start of this season, Trojan head coach Vern Wolfe announced his plans to retire after the NCAA Championships in June.

When Wolfe took over the Trojans in 1963, the expectations were overwhelming. That's because USC has dominated track and field more than any one university has in any single sport. The Trojans have won 26 team titles in the 62-year history of the NCAA

Outdoor Track Championships, 30 Pacific Coast or Pac-10 titles (including a string of 15 straight), and 39 unbeaten and untied seasons (including a streak of 16 in a row).

First there was the legendary Dean Cromwell, who began the winning tradition with a record of 12 NCAA titles and a dual meet record of 109-48-1 in 38 years.

Then came the perfectionist, Jess Mortensen, whose Trojan teams never lost a dual meet in his 11 years and 64 meets and captured seven national outdoor crowns.

Jess Hill won two national championships in his three years as head track coach.

The end result of Wolfe's years at USC more than met the standards set by his predecessors. His teams have contributed seven NCAA titles (five outdoor, two indoor) to place Wolfe tied with Mortensen as the third winningest coach in NCAA championship history.

USC has always been near the top under Wolfe, if not winning. The Trojans have finished among the top four teams in the NCAA Outdoor Championships 13 of his 21 years — six firsts, two seconds, three thirds and two fourths. And with just a six-man squad at last year's NAAs, Troy finished an amazing 10th.

Wolfe has a career dual meet record of 104-15-1 (.871) at USC. He also coached undefeated seasons at San Jose State in 1961 and Foothill College in 1962. He has never lost more than two dual meets in any one year.

USC has won the team title in the Pacific-10 Conference, the nation's toughest track league, five of the last 12 years, giving Wolfe eight Pacific-10 crowns in his career. His 1976 team holds the conference record of 182 points in a Pac-10 Championship meet.

Wolfe has also led the Trojans to eight undefeated seasons in dual meet competition and four national collegiate dual meet championships (1971, 1976-78) since *Track & Field News* began those rankings in 1970. He was honored as Track and Field Coach of the Year in 1979 by both the Columbus Touchdown Club and *Runner's World*.

During his tenure at USC, Wolfe has coached 24 athletes who have broken or tied 30 indoor and outdoor world records. At every

Olympics since he became USC coach, except the 1980 Moscow Games, at least one of his athletes has won a gold medal. He's had six Olympic champions, including 200-meter champion Don Quarrie in 1976.

Vern's athletes also have won 29 individual NCAA championships and have broken or tied every USC individual record.

Wolfe was born in Garber, Okla. on July 14, 1922. He graduated from Gardena High School in Los Angeles and won honors as an All-Marine League back in football and in track as a pole vaulter.

He then entered USC, winning a letter with the 1941 frosh track team and the 1942 varsity squad, before being called to military duty. Following three and one-half years with the Paratroops, he was discharged in 1946 and came back to school. He vaulted for Cromwell again in 1946 and 1947 (with a best of 14-0) and also obtained his bachelor's and master's degree in education.

Wolfe began his coaching career in 1952 at Torrance High School. He was there three years, then moved on to North Phoenix High School in Arizona for the 1955 season. It was during his six-year reign at North Phoenix that he achieved recognition as one of the nation's most successful prep track and field coaches.

Wolfe has again taken up pole vaulting and competes in senior meets. He won his age division in the Senior Olympics in Georgia five years ago and placed second in the 55-59 age group at the Veterans Games in New Zealand in January of 1981 with a 10-foot vault.

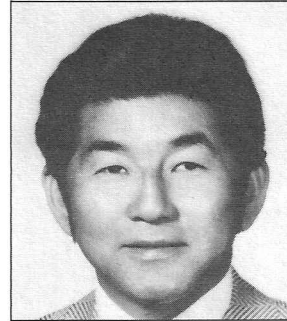

KEN MATSUDA

Assistant Coach



Wherever Ken Matsuda has coached, his track teams have enjoyed extraordinary success. Starting his 27th year of coaching, Matsuda has been on the losing side in dual meets only 13 times.

Matsuda is now in his 18th season as an assistant to Vern Wolfe at USC. He came to USC from Foothill Junior College where he was head coach for three years and his team members set four national JC records. Among his athletes was former decathlon record holder Russ Hodge.

A graduate of Westchester High School locally, Matsuda was a sprinter and long jumper at San Jose State and also earned two letters on the football team as a halfback.

He began his coaching career in 1957 as an assistant track coach at San Jose State to Bud Winter, who has been a U.S. Olympic coach. His freshman teams were ranked No. 1 in the nation twice during his four years there. He coached under Wolfe there when Vern became San Jose's coach in 1961.

Matsuda then became head track coach at Andrew Hill High School for two seasons where his teams went undefeated before moving to Foothill JC. His pole vaulter, Bill Fosdick, went on to USC and won an NCAA title.

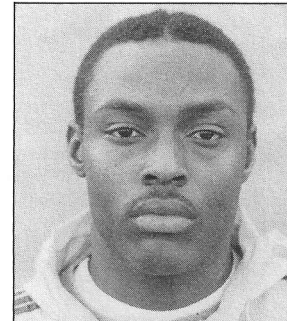
During his career, 12 of his long jumpers have bettered 25 feet. Matsuda has also coached the Trojan sprint relay teams to nine NCAA titles and 10 Pacific-10 wins.

In summer, 1982, he began work with the Korean National team and will assist them in preparation for the 1984 Olympics. He also guided the USA team to victory in the World Junior Championships at Seoul, South Korea in August, 1982.

He and his wife, Janet, have two children—a daughter, JoAnn, and a son, Mike.

JAMES PERKINS

Assistant Coach



A student at USC, James Perkins showed enough track know-how that Vern Wolfe decided to make him an assistant coach. Perkins transferred to USC last fall from Prince Georges Community College in Largo, Md.

After one year in the Navy, Perkins entered the U.S. Coast Guard Academy where he earned All-New England honors in the 110-meter high hurdles and the triple jump. His best time in the highs was 14.40.

Perkins later became assistant track coach at Largo High (Md.) while he attended Prince Georges. Largo's track team won the state championship both years Perkins was there.

As a prep at Fairmont Heights High in Maryland, Perkins ran a leg for the school's all-country and all-state 400-meter relay team.

He is majoring in public affairs at USC.

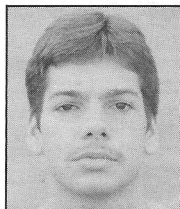

ATHLETE BIOGRAPHIES

(Note: The following biographies are limited to those performers expected to see the most action this season. USC Coach Vern Wolfe's comments are in bold face.)

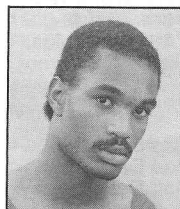


ROB BRIGLIA — 5-9½, 140, So., 800 — Rob has been at USC since last February and walked on the team in the fall. His background in the middle distance should give the Trojans some depth in those events.

"Rob is a good middle distance prospect and the 800 is his best event," said Wolfe. "He needs a strong conditioning base and enough time to develop. His heavy academic load may slow his progress."

At Strong Vincent High in Erie, Penn. Briglia set the school and team records for the 800 meters (1:54.73). He was also the school's Athlete of the year and the MVP of the track team.

Rob is a computer science major at USC.



RON BROWN — 6-5, 215, Fr., 400, 1600 Relay — A reserve linebacker on USC's football team, Ron was a hurdler for the Trojans last year, but, after only one meet his season was ended by a broken ankle sustained in practice. This year Brown will help USC's 1600-meter relay.

"Thanks to football coach Ted Tollner, Ron will be able to run for us this year," said Wolfe. "On top of being an outstanding prep hurdler, Ron did well in the quarter and should help us field a competitive relay team every week."

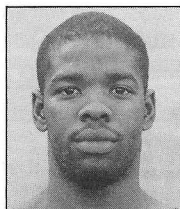
In his only meet last year, Brown placed third at the Bakerfield Relays (14.75). At Bishop Amat High in La Puente, Ron had the seventh fastest prep 110-meter high hurdles time (13.80) in 1982. It got him third at the California state meet.

He was instrumental in Bishop Amat's victory at the CIF 2-A Championships (along with Trojan teammate Jim Fisher) in 1982. Ron won the 200 meters (21.52w), placed second in the highs (14.22) and ran on Amat's winning 400 and 1600-meter relay teams.

Ron ran 14.04 in the highs at the CIF Masters meet to place second, and he ran a leg on Amat's second-place 1600 relay team at the state meet.

Last fall, Brown saw action at outside linebacker and on special teams for the Trojan gridders. Against Stanford he scored a safety when he sacked Cardinal quarterback Steve Cottrell in the end zone.

An engineering major, Ron likes to play the saxophone in his spare time.



ANTHONY CAIRE — 6-3, 180, Jr., High Jump — After enjoying an impressive freshman season in 1982, Anthony proved it was no fluke in 1983. He broke the USC high jump record for the second year in a row and bettered his third place finish at the 1982 Pac-10 Championships by placing second at last year's conference meet (7-3). He placed eighth at the NCAAs.

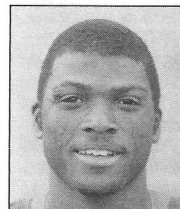
A consistent jumper, Caire went over the seven-foot barrier 11 times last year, including his last six meets. He seems to like jumping at UCLA's Drake Stadium because that was where he broke the school record both times in dual meets against the Bruins.

"Anthony is the best high jumper we've ever had and he can only get better," said Wolfe. "He just needs to mature and become more disciplined while in the air. His steady improvement might put him on the U.S. Olympic team. That high on his priority list."

Last year, Anthony had first place finishes at the USC quadrangular (7-0), the Northridge Relays (7-2), the Stanford dual (a meet record 7-0 3/4) and at the UCLA dual (school record 7-4). His victories at Northridge and UCLA were repeats of two of his 1982 first places.

Indoors, he cleared 7-0 at the Sunkist meet and 6-11 at the Times Indoor. Caire came to USC two years ago ranked as the No. 3 U.S. prep high jumper in 1981 by Track & Field News. As a senior at Downey's Pius X High, Caire jumped 7-1 to win the California state crown. He was 16 when he first cleared 7-0.

Anthony is majoring in communications at USC.



DARWIN COOK — 5-10½, 165, Jr., Sprints —

Only a junior, Darwin is already among the all-time great Trojan sprinters. He had a hard act to follow last year after finishing 1982 ranked 10th in the U.S. by Track & Field News. In the 100 meters. His best of 10.20 at that distance during his freshman year put him fourth on the USC all-time list. It happened at the California Relays in Modesto where he ran second to Carl Lewis (10.00).

Last year reinforced Cook's position as a quality sprinter. Often he was among the finest sprint fields at meets that attracted some of the fastest in the country. Although he did not improve his lifetime best in the 100 meters in 1983 (his best was 10.29), he did have a personal best in the 200 meters (20.87) against Stanford in Palo Alto. Darwin finished seventh in last year's NCAA 100 meters (10.33) and second at the Pac-10 Championships (10.44).

"Having two successful collegiate years under his belt, 1984 should be a good one for Darwin," said Wolfe. "He has the experience, speed and mental confidence necessary to run with anyone. He needs to develop his best running style with consistency and aggressiveness. When needed, Darwin delivers."

In all, Darwin won seven races last year—four in the 100 meters, two in the 200 meters and one in his only 400-meter race of the year (47.81) at the USC quadrangular last February. He was a double winner in the 100 and 200 at both the Stanford dual (10.43, 20.87) and the 7-Eleven Invitational (10.55, 20.95) in Dallas.

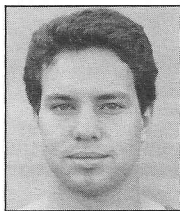
At the Times/TAC Summer Games last June at the Coliseum, Cook finished second in the 100 meters (10.40) against an international field.

The summer of 1982 was a busy one for Darwin. He ran on the 400-meter relay team for the U.S. National team which competed in meets against the USSR, East Germany, West Germany and Africa. Against the East German team in Karl Marx-Stadt, East Germany the U.S. team ran 38.22, fourth fastest time ever recorded in the event.

Darwin also runs well indoors. He placed fifth in the 60-yard dash at the NCAA Indoor Championships (6.21) last year and repeated that clocking at the Times Indoor and San Diego Invitational meets. The year before Darwin won the Times Indoor 60 (6.18) and had a best of 6.15 at the Jack in the Box meet in San Diego.

An All-American sprinter at Woodson High in Bowie, Md., Cook had prep bests of 10.3 in the 100 meters and 21.4 for 200 meters, plus the fastest prep indoor 60-yard dash clocking (6.23) in 1981. He missed most of the 1981 outdoor season with a torn muscle in this right thigh.

Born in Washington, D.C., Darwin is a business major at USC.



CHRIS CRISMAN — 5-11, 161, Jr., Hurdles — After chopping off more than a second off his personal best in the 400-meter intermediate hurdles in 1983, Chris expected to improve even more this year.

In his last two meets of 1983, Crisman ran lifetime bests. Against UCLA he ran a hand timed 52.6, good for second place in the 400IH. His performance at the Pac-10 Championships, however, was his greatest thrill.

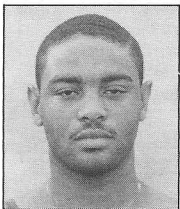
"I was supposed to get last place in the prelims and I ended up fifth in the finals," Crisman said of his finish at the Pac-10 meet. He ran 52.65 in his heat and came back in the finals to run the race in 53.00.

"Fall workouts indicate a good year for Chris," said Wolfe. "His speed and strength appear to be good and his hurdling is snappy. We need a strong season from Chris."

As a freshman, Crisman recorded his then-PR (53.82) at the USC Invitational and also won a 400IH heat at the Martin Luther King Games that year (53.99).

Chris came to USC after a fine prep career at Riverside Poly High. His winning time of 36.25 at the CIF Masters meet was fourth fastest prep 300-meter lows time in 1981. His best time in the highs also came at the Masters where he finished third (14.01).

An excellent student, Chris has a 3.73 grade point average in business administration at USC.



WALT DeJEAN — 6-4, 240, So., Shot Put — If anyone on the USC track team last year experienced great improvement, it was Walt. When he joined the team as a walk-on and brought a personal best of only 57-9 with a 12-pound shot with him, nobody expected what was in store for Walt.

His best effort of 1983 with a 16-pound shot (56-1 3/4) came very close to equalling what he had done with a prep implement.

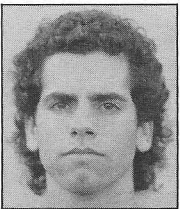
That mark was good enough for second place at the Stanford dual last year. Among his other top performances were first place at the Aztec Invitational (52-7 1/4) and second place at the Northridge Relays (54-1 1/2). His second best throw of the year came at the USC Invitational (54-9 3/4).

"Walt had a good freshman year and he will get better," Wolfe said. "To score consistently in the Pac-10 and against other competition, he must work 12 months a year and be injury free. If he puts his mind to it, he can go far in the shot."

At Serra High in Gardena, DeJean was the Camino Real League shot put champ in both 1981 (53-4) and 1982 (56-6). His 57-9 came at the North Yosemite Invitational. He placed fourth at the CIF 1-A Championships (50-10).

Walt also played tackle for the Serra football team.

A business major at USC, Walt had a 3.28 grade point average in high school.



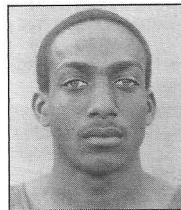
LYLE ESTERKYN — 5-10, Sr., Pole Vault — A walk-on, Lyle was over 15-0 in the pole vault at every meet he entered in 1983. Before last year, he had never vaulted in the 15-foot range.

His personal best came at the Stanford Invitational, where he took second place (15-7). Esterkyn reached 15-6 at the Northridge Relays, the Martin Luther King Games and the UCLA dual, and cleared 15-0 at the USC quadrangular, the USC Invitational and the 7-Eleven Invitational.

"Lyle has been plagued by injuries, but he has the potential to be a consistent scorer," said Wolfe. "He has his sights on the 17-foot mark and that would really help the team. We can use his talent."

As an unattached entry at the USC Invitational in 1982, Lyle cleared his career best at the time (14-6). He attended Bella Vista High in Fair Oaks and won the Capital Athletic League pole vault title in 1979 (13-9).

He's a psychology major at USC.



JIM FISHER — 5-10, 156, So., 800 — With the graduation of USC 800-meter record-holder Mark Handelsman, Jim will have the task of filling the void.

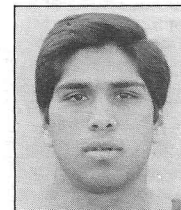
"The big thing about Jim is that he always comes to run," said Wolfe. "He's a competitor and a very hard worker. We need a good year from Jim. I'm sure he'll crack 1:50 this year."

Fisher came close to breaking the 1:50 mark when he ran a personal best 1:50.5 at an all-comers meet in Long Beach last May. Jim won his first collegiate 800 at last year's USC quadrangular (1:53.3).

At Bishop Amat High in La Puente, Fisher won the CIF 2-A 800 title while running for Bishop Amat's 1982 2-A Championship team. He also ran fourth at the CIF Masters meet (1:53.13) and turned in his prep PR at the Mt. SAC Relays (1:52.84). Jim was a member of Amat's 1600 relay team which placed second in the state meet (3:14.11) and first at the 2-A Championships (3:16.73).

Fisher was also an outstanding basketball and football player at Bishop Amat. He won All-Angelus League first-team honors and was his team's defensive MVP in basketball.

An honor student in high school, Jim has a 3.17 grade point average in business at USC.



MIKE GONZALES — 6-1, 192, So., Decathlon — Mike passed up a scholarship to play football for Oregon last year in order to come to USC and compete in the decathlon. Now he is part of a strong duo of Trojan decathletes.

In two decathlons last year, Gonzales exceeded 7000 points both times (7105 at the Martin Luther King Games and 7097 — good for sixth place — at the Pac-10 Championships).

When Mike wasn't competing in decathlons, he would enter as many as five different events at a track meet.

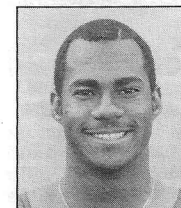
"The decathlon is Mike's first love and he does it well," said Wolfe. "He's a tough competitor and he has nowhere to go but up."

Gonzales set a national record (6505) for the decathlon in the 16-and-under age group as a sophomore at Bishop Montgomery High in Torrance. That mark came at the AAU National meet at Porterville and was only Mike's second decathlon ever.

In 1982, he finished third in the 300 low hurdles (37.44), fifth in the 110 highs (14.52) and tied for sixth in the high jump (6-2) at the CIF 2-A Championships. He finished fourth in the highs (14.18) at the CIF Masters meet.

Mike was an all-league fullback in football at Bishop Montgomery and played in the Lions All-Star game as a senior. He went to Taiwan in the summer of 1982 as part of an international sports exchange program and competed in a meet with the Taiwanese and Koreans.

His major is undeclared at USC.



TERRY IVEY — 6-0, 167, Fr., 400 — A redshirt freshman, Terry sat out last season with a severe leg injury he sustained at the Aztec Invitational last year. Now at full strength, the Trojans hope Terry can regain the form he exhibited as a junior in high school.

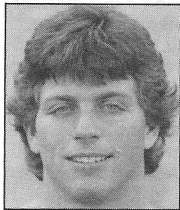
In 1981 at Ribault High in Jacksonville, Fla., he was both a National Coaches and Adidas All-American. He had career bests of 10.45 in the 100 meters, 21.3 for 200 meters, 46.77 for 400 meters and 1:54.3

for 800 meters. Although a football knee injury hampered his senior year, he still managed bests of 10.6, 21.4 and 47.2.

His 46.77 in the 400 was a Florida state record and the sixth fastest U.S. prep mark in 1981.

"Terry really wants to do well and if he's healthy, watch out!" said Wolfe. "He's untested but blessed with natural ability. Our overall team strength would definitely get a lift if Terry runs to his full potential."

An honor student in high school, Ivey is a business major at USC.



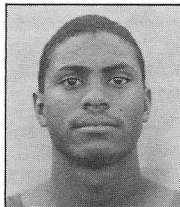
STEVE KLASSEN — 5-11, 165, Fr., Pole Vault, Decathlon — Steve had the third best prep mark in the U.S. in the decathlon (6905) and was No. 8 in the pole vault in 1983 (16-0). He also ran 14.08 in the prep 110-meter high hurdles.

"Steve's fall workouts indicate a bright future for him as a Trojan," said Wolfe. "He has shown great physical ability and could help us in events other than the pole vault. He has excellent potential in the decathlon."

At Fairview High in Boulder, Colo., Klassen was state champ in the pole vault and All-American in the decathlon. In 1981, he was the decathlon champion at the Junior Olympics.

Steve also played football and soccer at Fairview.

Born in Santa Monica, Klassen's major at USC is undeclared.



JAMES KNOWLES — 6-0, 170, So., Hurdles — James was USC's top intermediate hurdler in 1983, and ran a lifetime best of 52.09 at the Mt. SAC Relays. He had first place finishes at Mt. SAC, the USC Invitational (52.0 hand time) and the Stanford dual (53.17). He ran a commendable 52.87 at the 7-Eleven meet, finishing fifth against a fast field.

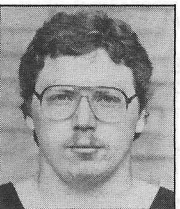
"He must control the finish of his race in order to improve," Wolfe said. "If he's successful, look for a pleasant surprise because James can run. He has learned to alternate his lead leg, which should help him with his finish. We need a good year from James."

Knowles received an additional year of eligibility when he suffered a stress fracture of the tibia in his right leg early in the 1982 season. That year he competed in only three meets and had a best of 54.54.

As a senior at Blair High in Pasadena in 1981, James had the third fastest U.S. prep time in the 300-meter low hurdles (36.09). That came in the heats of the California state meet.

He was CIF 3-A champion in the lows (36.47) and 100 meters (10.68) and ran second in the high hurdles (14.12).

James is a public administration major at USC.



HANK KRAYCHIR — 6-1, 250, Sr., Shot Put, Discus — A national record-holder on the junior college level, Hank is now among the top weightmen in the U.S. after one year at USC. His success in the shot put was expected but his marks in the discus last year opened some eyes in the world of track and field.

Hank set a new personal best at the NCAA Championships (66-0½, 46th in the world in 1983) while placing fifth in the shot put. He won the shot at the Husker Invitational, the USC quadrangular, the Aztec Invitational, the USC Invitational and the Stanford dual. His throws exceeded 62 feet in every meet but one and were beyond 64 feet five times.

As a part of his training, Kraychir makes as many throws in practice with his left arm as he does with his more natural right arm. After reading about Al Feuerbach's world record for the

ambidextrous shot put (121-6), Hank decided to take a shot at the mark. He made attempts with each arm at all three meets at USC last year and came up with totals of 113-11¼, 112-9¼ and 116-0. Although he didn't match Feuerbach's total mark, Kraychir's best left-handed throw (52-5) is better than Feuerbach's.

In preparation for the Olympic year, Kraychir has changed his shot putting style from the "O'Brien" to the spin.

The way Hank came around in the discus was a pleasant surprise for the Trojans. He didn't compete in the event until late March when he took second at the USC Invitational (193-6) behind John Powell's 212-2, a Cromwell Field record. Two weeks later, Kraychir served notice that he found a new event by throwing the discus 203-8 17th in the U.S. last year at the Stanford dual. He also threw 200-5 at the California Relays in Modesto and in seven meets was over 190 feet.

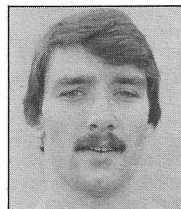
His best marks in the shot and discus are both No. 2 on USC's all-time lists.

"Hank trains very hard," said Wolfe. "He competes well so expect him to take over the top spots in both weight events. Our destiny depends on how well Hank does in the big meets, a challenge he thrives on."

While at Long Beach City College, Kraychir set the national JC shot put record at the 1982 California Junior College Championships in Sacramento with a toss of 65-4. It broke his own mark by one-half inch, and gave him the 17th best mark in the U.S. that year. He also won the State JC discus title (178-6).

At San Jacinto High, Hank threw the 12-pound shot 61-8 and the discus 188-7. He was the California prep discus champ in 1979.

He's a physical education major at USC.



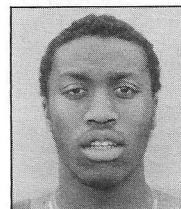
RICK LUITEN — 6-6, 250, So., Discus — Rick had just started to make a move last year when a stress fracture just below his left knee ended his season. He was improving and threw a lifetime best 160-9 in the discus at the USC Invitational, is final meet of the year.

The extra 25 pounds he is carrying this year should help him become a major factor for the Trojans.

"Rick's injury put a damper on what could have been a very good season for him in 1983," said Wolfe. "Now that he's completely healed, you can expect big things out of this big man. Rick can do just about anything he wishes if he puts his mind to it."

Luiten's prep best of 193-8 was the winning toss at the 1982 Arcadia Invitational. He also finished second at the CIF Masters meet (183-0) and third at the California state meet (186-3). Rick won the Mt. SAC and Bishop Amat Invitationals and was Football League champion for three consecutive years at Monrovia High.

Rick carries a B average in Biological Sciences and wants to become a veterinarian. His hobby is collecting exotic animals.



ANTONIO MANNING — 5-11, 179, Fr., Sprints — The Trojans found another fine sprinter in their own backyard when Antonio decided to come to USC. The speedster from Hamilton won the City championships in the 100- and 200-meter dashes in both 1982 and 1983.

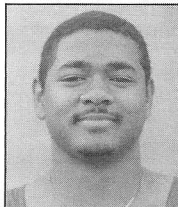
Manning won the state 200-meter dash in 1982 but a pulled hamstring prevented him from defending his title last year.

His prep bests are 10.4 and 21.05.

"There is no doubt that Antonio will one day have his name recorded in our great sprint heritage," said Wolfe. "He needs to build a little more strength and gain some experience against collegiate competition. He can run the 100, 200 and the 400 and score in any of them. Antonio makes our sprint team strong."

Antonio advanced to the finals in the 100 and 200 at the Southern California Championships but he pulled his hamstring 50 meters from the tape. Earlier in the year, Manning won the 100 (10.6 hand timed) and placed third in the 200 (22.19) at the Arcadia Invitational. He was leading the field in the 200, but he injured his ankle with about 50 yards to go.

In addition to athletics, Antonio was the president of his senior class and was on the honor roll. He is a biology major at USC.



LUIS "PANCHE" MORALES — 5-7, 150, So., Sprints — If not for a pulled hamstring he sustained at the Pac-10 Championships, Pancho would have been in the thick of things at the NCAAs.

At the California Relays last May, Morales won his flight of the 100 meters (10.21) and ran a wind-aided 10.16 in the heats. He also won the 100 meters at the USC quadrangular (10.65), the Martin Luther King Games (10.66) and at an all-comers meet at Mt SAC (10.4 hand-timed).

In the 200 meters, Pancho was first to hit the tape in a hand-timed 20.9 at the USC Invitational. His season best was 20.98 (at the California Relays), along with a wind-aided 20.85 for fourth place against UCLA.

"Pancho has made slight adjustments in his basic running style so I expect to see some definite improvement," said Wolfe. **"He loves to run. He's aggressive and exciting and he hates to lose. He will give 100 percent and if you want to beat him, expect a dogfight."**

Luis was a Track & Field News 1982 High School All-American in the 100-meter dash. He had nine races of 10.3 or better and his 10.41 clocking was the second fastest U.S. prep time two years ago. He also ran a 20.82 200, his career best and the fifth fastest by a prep in 1982.

Morales picked up some valuable international experience in the summer of 1982. He won the 100 (10.35w) at the junior international meet in Houston, Tex., and was third in the 100 (10.43) and ran on the gold medal-winning 400 relay team (39.42) at the Pan-Am Junior Championships in Barquisimeto, Venezuela.

At the World Junior Championships in Seoul, Korea, Luis won gold medals in the 100, 200, 400 relay and 1600 relay.

Indoors, Morales placed fourth (5.41) in the 50-yard dash at the Sunbelt meet and ran 6.35 in a 60-yard heat at the Time Indoors.

Born in Washington, D.C., Luis is a business major at USC. Pancho is a boyhood nickname.



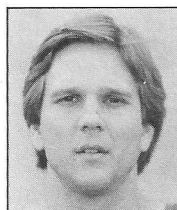
DOUG OWENS — 5-11, 162, Jr., Pole Vault — A walk-on, Doug competed in seven meets last year for the Trojans and vaulted his career best (15-0) four times. His top finish was third at the USC quadrangular last February.

"Doug must be a consistent 16-6 vaulter in order to score in our league and he's got the tools to do it," Wolfe said. **"He trains hard and he should have a good year in 1984."**

As a freshman in 1982, Owens competed in only one meet, clearing 14-6 at the USC Invitational that year.

Doug cleared his prep best, also 14-6, as a senior at Bakersfield's Highland High, placing fifth at the state qualifying meet.

An outstanding student, Doug has a 3.98 grade point average in petroleum engineering at USC.

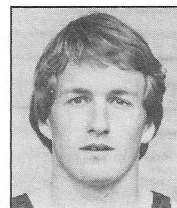


MIKE PATELLOS — 5-9, 170, Sr., Javelin — Mike returned to track competition last year after transferring from American River Junior College in Sacramento and sitting out the 1982 season. The walk-on added almost 25 feet to his previous lifetime best when he threw the javelin 189-10 at the USC quadrangular last February.

"Look for another big improvement in Mike this year," said Wolfe. **"If Mike can throw near the 215-foot range — and I think he can — he'll score in most meets."**

Patellos attended Cordova High in Rancho Cordova where he was a pole vaulter with a best of 12-0. He didn't start throwing the javelin until junior college. Mike also played soccer in high school.

A psycho-biology major at USC, Patellos has an outstanding 3.79 grade point average. He was born in Rome, N.Y.



MIKE PHIPPS — 5-10, 160, So., Pole Vault — As a freshman last year, Mike equalled his prep best (14-6) in the first two meets before breaking the 15-foot barrier. He was over 15 feet eight times in 1983, including his career best of 16-0 while winning the open division at the Northridge-Nike Invitational the walk-on also tied for first place at the Aztec Invitational (15-0).

"Don't be surprised if you see Mike make 17 feet this year," Wolfe said. **"He's a tough competitor, but he has to be consistent to score in every meet. He'll help fill the void left by the graduation of Dave Kenworthy."**

Phipps won the CIF 4-A vault title (14-6) in 1982 as a senior at Westlake High. He also placed fifth (13-8) at the CIF Masters meets.

He was the co-field event Athlete of the Year in the Marmonte League in 1982. Beside pole vaulting, he long jumped 21-4, triple jumped 40-8½ and ran on the 1600 relay team.

Mike's grandfather and both his parents are USC graduates. Born in Tacoma, Wash, Phipps is majoring in geology at USC.

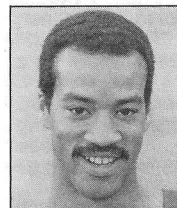


JIM SWEET — 6-2½, 165, So., Triple/Long Jump — A transfer from Long Beach City College, Jim will help the Trojans in the long jump and triple jump.

"Jim definitely has the size and the talent to score some points for us this year," said Wolfe. **"With a little experience he could be a pleasant surprise."**

At Corona Del Mar High, Sweet was the Seaview League champion in 1980 in the triple jump and placed fourth in the triple jump at the 1980 TAC Age Group National Championships.

Jim is an english major At USC.



ED TAVE — 6-3½, 165, Jr., Long/Triple Jump, Hurdles — When Ed peaked last year, he made sure it happened at the NCAA Championships.

With a wind slightly more than allowable for records at his back, Tave jumped 26-9¼ to place fourth in the collegiate ranks. He had another wind-aided jump of 26-8½ in the same series.

He was also fourth at the Pac-10 Championships (25-1½).

Ed won the long jump in seven meets last year, including the UCLA meet (26-3¼w). He exceeded 25 feet in seven meets in 1983. His career best legal jump (25-10¼) has him No. 7 on the all-

time USC long jump list.

In the triple jump, Tave had a wind-aided best of 51-0¼ and a legal best of 50-0¼. He won both jumps at the Northridge Relays (24-5 3/4, 50-0), the Stanford dual (24-10½, 48-4 3/4) and the UCLA meet (26-3½w, 51-0¼w).

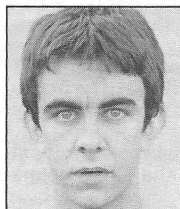
Tave ran the 110-meter high hurdles only three times last year and had a hand-timed best of 14.4. His freshman bests were 25-9½ (set at the Pan-Am Junior Championships in Barquisimeto, Venezuela), 47-8¼ and 14.92.

He won a gold medal in the long jump and a silver in the high hurdles at the 1982 World Junior Championships in Seoul, Korea.

"Ed is a definite threat to capture the school record in the long jump (27-4¼) this year," Wolfe said. "He really finished with a bang last year and there's more to come in 1984. Ed has gained good experience in his two years as a Trojan. Don't count him out as a candidate for the Olympic team, because he just might make it."

Tave came to USC from Muir High in Pasadena where he was the top-ranked prep long jumper by Track & Field News in 1981. He won the state title with a 25-0½ leap, the third best prep mark in the U.S. in 1981. He had a wind-aided mark of 25-9 3/4 to win the Golden West Invitational. His best in high school in the triple jump and the highs were 49-7 3/4 (second in the state) and 13.7 (hand-timed) jumping prep hurdles.

Ed is a business major at USC.



NICOLAS THEBAULT — 5-10, 140, Fr., 1500, 1500 — Nicolas, from Versailles, France, can become one of USC's great distance runners the first time he steps on the track as a Trojan.

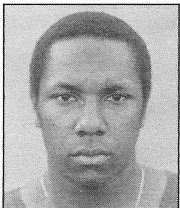
His best in the 1500 (3:44.38) would place him second on the all-time USC list, and his personal record in the 5000 (14:47) would be good enough for seventh on the list.

If given the chance to run the mile during his career, Nicolas is almost sure to become the first USC runner to break four minutes at that distance.

"Nicolas is a welcome addition to this team," Wolfe said. "He will give us respectability in the distance races. If he handle all the adjustments of living in another country, being far away from home, look for a big year from him. He has the talent."

Thebault (pronounced Tee-Bo) was a member of the French National Team in 1983 in the 1500 meters and ran on the Junior National Team in 1980 and 1981.

In 1978, he was the French Junior champion in cross country. His major at USC is undeclared.



TIMMIE WARE — 5-11, 170, So., 400, 1600 Relay — USC football's big-play man last fall, Timmie is expected to help the Trojan quartermilers and run on the 1600-meter relay.

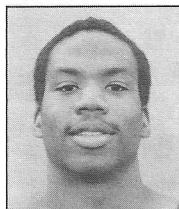
"Timmie is a very talented young man and could really make us go in the 1600-meter relay," Wolfe said. "He hasn't run competitively in a while, but his athletic ability should help him make up for it. Thanks to Ted Tollner, he will help us this year."

Ware ran in two meets for the Trojans in 1982, recording a career best of 47.69 in the 400 in Dallas.

Timmie caught 23 passes as starting flanker for the USC football team in 1983, averaging 20.9 yards per catch and scoring five touchdowns. His speed makes him dangerous on deep patterns, and he had receptions covering 65, 55, 42, 41 and 37 yards.

At Centennial High in Compton, Timmie ran a leg on the 1600 relay team that set a national prep record in the spring of 1980. His sprint bests were 9.7 in the 100-yard dash, 21.4 in the 200 meters and 48.1 in the 400. He even long jumped 23 feet.

Ware is a public administration major at USC.



DWIGHT WILLIAMS — 5-10, 155, So., 400 —

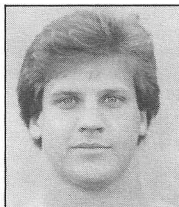
After transferring from Prince George Community College in Largo, Md., Dwight ran in seven meets last year for the Trojans. His personal best came in a 400-meter heat at the Pac-10 Championships (48.44).

Williams came in second at the Stanford dual last April (49.29)

"He had some nagging injuries last year, but his late-season performance indicated that Dwight can run and contribute to the team," said Wolfe. "We're thin in the quarter so we really need him this year."

Williams was Darwin Cook's teammate at Woodson High in Bowie, Md., in 1981. His best prep time in the 440-yard dash was 48.8. He ran mostly relays and had legs of 21.2 in the 800 and 48.4 in the 16.00.

Born in Washington, D.C., Dwight is a business economics and finance major at USC.



JOHN WOLITARSKY — 6-0, 220, So., Hammer — John will help the Trojans in an event that is often neglected by other collegiate track teams, including USC.

The USC school record for the hammer is 142-10½, set almost 20 years ago. Wolitarsky's personal record (193-9) is more than 50 feet beyond that standard, almost assuring him a spot in the Trojan record books.

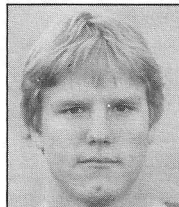
"To recruit a hammer thrower is surely a first for USC," said Wolfe. "If he can move into the 200-foot club, look for John to surprise the other throwers in the Pac-10. He can score in all our meets and in the big ones as well."

John's career best was 39th in the U.S. last year.

At Azusa Pacific in 1982, Wolitarsky earned NAIA All-American honors in the hammer (180-4) and the shot put (54-1). He was second in the 35-pound weight throw (54-9) at the NAIA Indoor Championships.

John holds Culver City High's school record for the shot put (58-1), a mark he achieved while placing second at the state meet. He was also an all-league linebacker at Culver City.

He is majoring in business at USC.



DON YOUNG — 6-2, 175, So., 800 — A stress fracture of the right femur prevented Don from running after only three meets in 1983. He showed promise at a USC Invitational last year when he posted a time of 1:51.1 for third place.

The lingering effects of the injury have hurt Young's endurance base for this year.

"He has the size, speed and desire to run," Wolfe said. "Unless he shakes his injuries, Don will have a tough time in 1984."

At Saint Joseph High in Los Alamos, Don ran the 10th fastest 800 meters by an American prep in 1982 (1:52.0). He also set a CIF 1-A Championship meet record in the 800 with a 1:54.23 clocking and finished fifth in the 1600-meter run (4:26.97).

Young was also an All-CIF and All-Los Padres League football player in high school as a wide receiver and defensive and defensive back.

Born in San Juan, Puerto Rico, Don has a B average in exercise science at USC.

HERITAGE**CHAMPIONS AND RECORD HOLDERS**

WORLD RECORDS: 61 USC trackmen have equalled or bettered world records since 1912.

OLYMPIC GAMES: USC trackmen have won 23 individual Olympic titles and have shared in seven relay victories. Fifty-seven men have won a total of 86 places on United States Olympic teams.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS: USC has won 26 out of the 62 NCAA Outdoor meets since its beginning in 1921. On 10 occasions they have finished second. The Trojans won nine in a row (1935-1943), and seven straight (1949-1955). They have also won two NCAA Indoor Championships since its beginning in 1965. A total of 96 individual outdoor championships highlight the record.

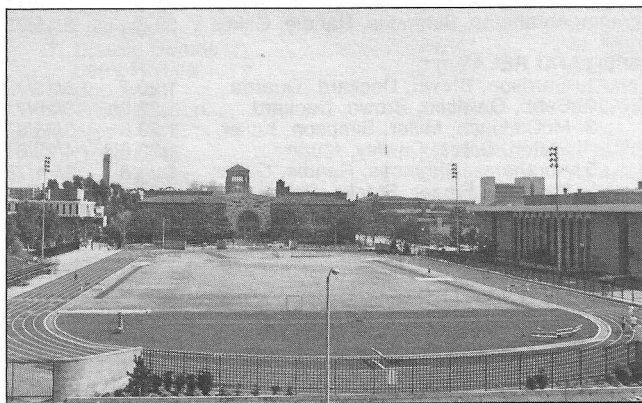

CROMWELL TRACK AND FIELD

To be used as a training and warm-up facility during the 1984 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles, Cromwell Track and Field underwent a complete refurbishing last fall. Not only was the track resurfaced, but a new drainage system was also added.

A brand new Rekortan surface, the same as the Olympic track in the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum, has eight, 42-inch lanes. The high jump area is larger than before and there are two new sand pits for the horizontal jumps.

Cromwell Field has been renovated as recently as 1979, but all that remains from the first facelift is the equipment storeroom and weightroom on the track's southwest perimeter. Although there are no permanent grandstands yet, a \$1.8 million fundraising drive is on and when that financial goal is reached, a doubledeck stadium capable of holding 5,000 people will be constructed.

TROJANS IN WORLD RANKINGS

USC athletes have earned more places in the top ten in the world (and top 15 between 1975 and 1978) than any university in the nation. The rankings are compiled by *Track & Field News*, the bible of the sport. Since the rankings were begun in 1947, 66 different Trojans have placed among the world's best 241 times.

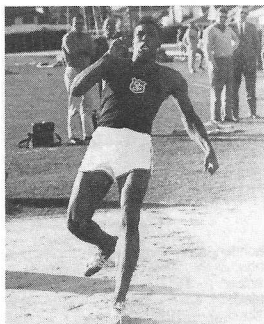

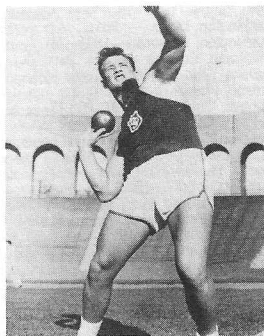

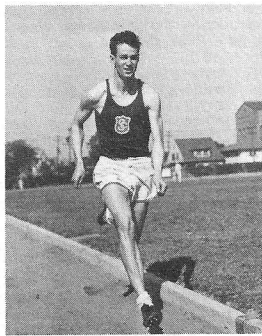
