1988 USC MEN'S TRACK AND FIELD OUTLOOK

The mode of competition for the USC track team may be changing a bit this year, but the primary goals are still the same — to prepare the strongest team possible for the Pac-10 and NCAA championship meets. That's even if it means the extinction of scored dual meets for the Troians.

It used to be that dual meets against some of the nation's top college track teams were the best preparation for the big meets at the end of the year. Now, fourth-year head coach **Ernie Bullard** believes, invitationals and relay meets that feature the best athletes in both college and club ranks are the best way to ready his troops for the

Pac-10s and NCAAs.

"Nobody likes a good dual meet more than I do, but our lack of numbers makes duals very hard on the athletes we do have," said Bullard. "We don't want to wear out our guys before we even get to the most important meets. Invitationals give our athletes a chance to face high quality competition on a weekly basis without doing four or five events each time out."

Although Bullard is without five of last year's NCAA competitors (the Trojans finished 44th a year ago), including sprinter **Luis Morales** (10.21, 20.44) and pole vaulters **Steve Klassen** (18-0½) and **Eric White** (18-0½), he has enough quality athletes to make USC's presence felt at the Pac-10 and NCAA meets. The Trojans are particularly strong in the middle distances, hurdles and throws.

Here's a closer look at the 1988 Trojan tracksters:

Sprints — Senior Antonio Manning (10.29, 20.41) is back for his fifth year after redshirting last season with a knee injury. Manning has clocked the fifth fastest 200 and 10th best 100 in USC history. Junior Bert Fuller (10.61w), the starting leg on USC's third-place Pac-10 400 relay team last year, also lends solid quality to the Trojan sprint corps. Thanks to USC football coach Larry Smith, the USC sprinters will benefit from the presence of three gridders — freshman Calvin Holmes (10.50), second in last year's state 100 meters while at Carson (Calif.) High; freshman Ricky Ervins (10.69), eighth in the state 100 representing Muir High in Pasadena, Calif.; and redshirt freshman Gary Wellman (10.67), a fifth-place finisher in the 1986 state 100. Holmes and Ervins are running backs, and Wellman is a flanker for USC's football team.

Hurdles — Troy's quantity — or lack of it — in the hurdle department amounts to two competitors, but most colleges throughout the country would be hard-pressed to equal the quality of junior high hurdler **Robert Reading** (13.64) and sophomore intermediate hurdler **George Porter** (50.44). Reading, the second place finisher in the

1986 Pac-10 high hurdles, has the fourth-best time ever by a Trojan and Porter, the national prep record holder in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles, is No. 7 on USC's all-time list for his specialty.

Distances — How many schools can boast four 800-meter runners with personal bests under 1:48.7? The Trojans can with seniors Joey Bunch (1:46.8) and Eric Schermerhorn (1:48.23), and juniors Ray Griffin (1:48.62) and Ibrahim Okash (1:46.54). Bunch, who redshirted last year, was the Pac-10 champ and fourth in the NCAA 800 in 1986. Schermerhorn finished fourth in the 1987 Pac-10 800. Griffin has the ninth best Trojan 800 time ever, but will probably see more action in the 1500 and 5000. Okash, a transfer from George Mason who competed for Somalia in the 1984 Olympics, placed fifth in the 1985 NCAA 800. Senior Romney Mawhorter (8:52.5) gets another shot at the USC steeplechase record (8:52.1) that narrowly eluded him last year. Two-time Pac-10 scorer Fredson Mayiek (14:10.0, 29:59.10), a junior, is USC's school record holder in the 10,000 meters. Senior Angel Silva (14:56.0, 30:43.0) will give track a try after starring on USC's cross-country team the last two years.

Jumps — Bullard again reached into USC's football roster and pulled out a long jumper — junior Chris Hale (24-0). Hale hasn't competed in outdoor track since high school, but he did some indoor track while at Nebraska. Junior Greg Harper (52-0¾) has improved nearly three feet in the triple jump since high school and placed fifth at last year's Pac-10 meet. Senior David Watts (49-1) is Troy's other returning triple jumper. Senior Leland Farrar (6-10) is USC's lone high jumper this year. Senior Lance Betson (15-10), a holdover from the 1987 team, and freshman Brooks Morris (15-7), son of former Trojan Olympian Ron Morris, will try to maintain USC's proud tradition in the pole yault.


Throws — This is another department where the numbers are down, but the performances should be top-rate. Sophomore hammer thrower **Andy Tolputt** (213-7) scored a sixth place in his specialty at last year's NCAA meet. Senior **Peter Michaels** (60-1½, 169-3) is back to full strength after off-season knee surgery and will handle the chores in the shot put and discus throw.

ERNIE BULLARD

Head Coach



Ernie Bullard is a man living a dream — if you don't believe it, just ask him.

Ever since his days as a Trojan pole vaulter (his best was 14-4½) under Jess Mortensen (1957-59), Bullard's goal was to return to USC as the head coach of the men's track team. He realized his goal when he inherited the job from longtime USC coach Vern Wolfe. Wolfe retired at the end of the 1984 season after 22 years at the helm of the Trojans and Bullard was picked

as his successor. Coincidentally, Wolfe was also a vaulter at USC (in the 1940s) and coached Bullard at North Phoenix (Ariz.) High in 1954.

Bullard, 50, is the ninth head track coach at USC, which has won more NCAA team titles in the sport (26 outdoor and two indoor) than any other school.

"This is the successful culmination of my career," says Bullard. "Ever since I was an athlete at USC, my primary professional goal was to return to my alma mater as its track coach. My experience at San Jose State certainly prepared me well for that."

Bullard posted a stellar 84-22 dual meet record at San Jose State (.792 winning percentage) and six of his teams finished in the Top 10 in *Track & Field News*' national dual meet rankings.

When he took over at San Jose State in 1971, Bullard maintained the national prominence that the Spartans had enjoyed under the late Bud Winter. Ernie's 1973 team was 9-0 and ranked sixth by *Track & Field News*, and three of his later teams also went undefeated (11-0 in 1975, 10-0 in 1977 and 6-0 in 1979). The 1975 squad placed fourth in the NCAA meet. His teams won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association (PCAA) championship seven times and were runners-up five

Four of Bullard's athletes at San Jose State won seven NCAA titles between them — triple jumper Ron Livers (1975-77-78), high hurdler Dedy Cooper (1976), javelin thrower Curt Ransford (1980) and pole vaulter Felix Bohni (1983 indoor and outdoor). Two others, John Powell in the discus and Dan Ripley in the pole vault, have held world records.

The Spartans won the NCAA title in 1969 while Bullard was an assistant (1969-70) under Winter.

Internationally respected, he has been a member of the U.S. Olympic Development Committee since 1978, is the NCAA District VIII track representative and coached the U.S. junior team against the USSR in 1975.

Bullard was also a successful junior college head coach, serving two years (1967-68) at Mesa (Ariz.) Community College and three years (1964-66) at Orange Coast College in Costa Mesa (Calif.). His 1968 Mesa team won the national JC meet (and earned him national JC Coach of the Year honors) after placing second in 1967. His Mesa pupils included several national JC individual champions, JC record holders and Olympic competitors, including Mark Murro, the first American to throw the javelin 300 feet.

He also coached in the high school ranks. He was the head coach at Tolleson (Ariz.) High in 1961, then served as an assistant at Arcadia High in Phoenix in 1962 and 1963. In 1960, he was a student teacher under Vern Wolfe at North Phoenix High.

Before Bullard came to USC as a student-athlete, he was the national JC pole vault champion in 1956 at Phoenix College and was the Arizona state champ in 1954 at North Phoenix High as a senior under Wolfe.

Bullard received a bachelor's degree in education from USC in 1959 and a master's degree in physical education from Arizona State in 1961. He is the author of four books on track (a fifth is being written) and is in demand as a guest at track clinics and camps.

Born on July 30, 1937, he has a son, Denton, 28, and a daughter, Kari, 21, a student at USC.

100 yard, 100 meter, 200 meter, 220 yard hand times are converted to automatic "equivalents" by adding a factor of 0.24; 400 meter flat and hurdles, add 0.14; 400 relay, add 0.14 hand-timed yards to automatic metric equivalent; 440 yards flat and hurdles, subtract 0.16; 440 relay, subtract 0.06; hand-timed decathlons are worth about an extra 75 points compared to an automatically timed teneventer.



LARRY KNUTH **Distances**



When Ernie Bullard was named head track coach at USC, he called on his old friend and book collaborator, Larry Knuth, to rebuild the USC distance program. The 46year-old Knuth worked quickly and has impressively rebuilt Troy's distance program.

Bullard found Knuth working as a journalism advisor at Saddleback (Calif.) College where he was from 1977 to 1984. During a three-year stint as cross-country coach at UC Irvine. Knuth took a team that finished in last place in the conference

during his first year (1979) and won the PCAA title the following year (1980). He was named PCAA Coach of the Year for the turnaround.

In his 14 years as a cross-country coach, Knuth's teams have won more than 80 percent of their meets. In 1967 his team at Pasadena (Calif.) City College won the California state JC championship.

Among the other California community colleges where Knuth has coached are Palomar, Glendale and Fullerton. In the first four years of his JC coaching career, he had eight runners who clocked 4:12 or better in the mile, two of which were Southern California champions.

At UCI in 1981, one of his runners, John Gerhardt, won the PCAA cross-country individual title and another, Joe Young, was the conference 1500 champion. Gerhardt also finished eighth at the 1981 TAC cross-country championships.

A fine instructor in the classroom, Knuth teaches courses in USC's sports information academic program.

A three-sport letterman at California High in Whittier, Calif., Knuth went on to compete for Jim Bush at Fullerton College and Cornelius Warmerdam at Fresno State. Bush went on to build one of collegiate track's finest programs at UCLA and Warmerdam was the first man to clear 15 feet in the pole vault.

Knuth and his wife June have two daughters, Lindsay, 11, and Cameron, 5.

GEORGE MEHALE Assistant Coach



George Mehale has had considerable success as a distance runner.


As a student at the University of Texas-El Paso, Mehale competed on four NCAA outdoor track and field national championship teams. During that span, UTEP also captured three national indoor titles (and placed second once) and won three more cross country championships.

After earning his bachelor's degree in physical education at UTEP, the 31-year-old native of

Pretoria, South Africa, worked as a graduate assistant for Oklahoma State's successful track program. He worked with the middle distance runners there before coming to USC in the fall of 1985, when he assisted Larry Knuth with the men's cross country team.

KEVIN COYNE

Throws



A well-respected authority on the throwing events of track and field on the East Coast, Coyne moved West in spring of 1985 and took over the coaching chores for USC's throwers. For the previous two years he had been the head track coach at Boston University. His first team at Boston U. took fifth at the 1984 NCAA Indoor Championships.

Before becoming head coach, Coyne was an assistant at Boston IJ from 1978 to 1983. He was the

head coach at Tufts College in Medford (Mass.) for three years before moving on to Boston U.

Coyne was a United States Olympic Committee staff member in 1979 and again in 1984 and was also the head event clinician at the National Learn-By-Doing Clinic in 1983. Among the athletes he coached at Boston U. were Art McDermott (211-7 in the discus, 65-2 in the shot put) and Declan Hegarty of Ireland, who has thrown the hammer 255-3.

BYRON HANSEN Trainer



In his ninth year at USC, Hansen handles the duties as trainer for the men's track team, as well as other intercollegiate sports at Troy.

The 32-year-old Hansen came to USC in 1980 after serving as assistant trainer at Colorado from 1978 to 1980. He received his master's degree in physical education from Colorado in 1981.

Byron also served as a trainer for basketball at the 1984 Olympics in Los Angeles.

A native of Albany, Oregon, Hansen received his bachelor's degree from Oregon in 1978 in Health Education. At South Albany High, Hansen played football and was one of the top running backs in the area.

Byron and his wife, Laurie, have a two-year-old daughter, Kelly.

JUNIOR COLLEGE: One of the top JC middle distance runners in the nation in 1985 while at Taft College near Bakersfield (Calif.) . . . He defended his 1984 state JC championship in the 800 meters (1:47.47, his career best) and ran a leg (46.7) on Taft's winning 1600-meter relay in 1985 . . . Bunch was also the conference titlist in the 800 and on the 1600 relay in 1985 . . . In 1984 he won the Junior National title for 800 meters and repeated his performance at the Junior Pan-American Games in Nassau, Bahamas . . . He is Taft's record holder in the 800 and has run 1500 meters in 3:51.9 and a 400-meter relay leg in 46.4 . . . Was a two-time All-Conference pick in cross-country at Taft . . . He won both the 800 and 1500 at the 1984 conference meet. HIGH SCHOOL: Joey was the three-time state champion for 800 and 1500 meters as a prep at Radford High in Honolulu, Hawaii . . . CAREER BESTS: 1:46.8, 800 meters; 3:50.36, 1500 meters.






RICKY ERVINS — 5-9, 185, Fr., Sprints

(39.95) . . . As a frosh in 1986. Fuller ran a windy 10.61 for third place at the USC Collegiate Relays . . . He also had a best for 400 meters of 48.96 two years ago ... Bert came to USC in the fall of 1984 but did not compete his first year.

HIGH SCHOOL: As a prep at Loyola High in Los Angeles, Fuller starred in track and football . . . A starter in six of USC's 12 games last year at cornerback, Hale had 2 interceptions and 23 tackles for Troy's Rose Bowl squad ... Chris began his college career on a track scholarship at Nebraska in the fall of 1984 and also walked on the Cornhusker

football team . . . A jumper and sprinter at Nebraska, he had indoor bests of 6.39 for 60 yards and 23-11 in the long jump ... He later enrolled at Glendale (Calif.) College and played football in 1986, but did not compete in track . . . As a gridder at Glendale, Hale earned J.C. Grid-Wire All-American honorable men-

tion and All-State first team acclaim.

HIGH SCHOOL: A two-time CIF 2-A long jump champ while at Monrovia (Calif.) High, Hale had a prep personal best of 24-0 (24-2 wind aided) . . . Hale soared 23-71/2 for his second CIF title in 1984 . . . Chris' winning mark in the 1983 CIF meet was 23-8 . . . Also finished third in the long jump in the 1984 state meet (23-21/4) . . . Consistently better than 50 feet.

Harper surpassed that mark in six meets last year... Took second in the UCLA dual with a windy $50-5\frac{1}{2}$... Also had a wind-aided $51-1\frac{1}{2}$ at the Jenner Classic in San Jose... Harper's 1986 best of $51-0\frac{3}{4}$ was good for third place at the USC Collegiate Relays... He took sixth in the state qualifying meet (Masters) at Mt. SAC in 1985 (47-11/2)... His prep PR was the ninth best effort in California in 1985... Also a fine basketball player, Greg played guard for Santa Fe and earned first team All-Whitmont League honors... He was the basketball team's MVP two years in a row and once scored 30 points in a game.

CAREER BESTS: 52-03/4, triple jump.





CAREER BESTS: 10.50 (10.36w), 100 meters; 21.43, 200 meters.




ANTONIO MANNING — 5-11, 190, Sr., Sprints COLLEGE: After missing the entire 1987 season with a knee injury, Manning is back for his fifth year with the USC sprint corps . . . He injured his knee right before last year's first meet and underwent surgery . . . Although hindered most of the 1986 track season by a chronic hamstring injury, Manning still provided the Trojans with steady sprint performances . . . Some of his

best outings two years ago were when he handled the baton on the second leg of USC's 400-meter relay . . . Antonio's quick coverage of the back straightaway helped the Trojans to the third fastest collegiate sprint relay time of 1986 (38.90, third all-time USC team) while taking third at the NCAA championships in Indianapolis . . . Manning ran his fastest 100 of 1986 at San Jose State with a winning time of 10.37 (wind aided) . . . Also logged his fastest 200 of 1986 in the same SJS dual (20.90w) . . . Against UCLA, Manning was second in the 200 (21.13) and third in the 100 (10.41) . . . Emerged in 1985 as one of the nation's top collegiate sprinters while clocking 10.29 in the 100 meters and 20.41 for 200 meters . . . His 200 time equaled the 16th best performer in the world in 1985 . . . He is the fifth fastest Trojan ever at 200 meters and is No. 10 on the USC 100 list . . . Only ran the 100 twice in 1986, clocking 10.29 and 10.30 . . . Won six out of nine races two years ago ... Manning qualified for the 1985 Pac-10 finals in both sprints, but pulled up in the 100 with a cramp and scratched from the 200 . . . He anchored the winning 400-meter relay team at the 1984 Pac-10 meet in Pullman. Wash . . . Has run 47.79 for 400 meters.

HIGH SCHOOL: A fine sprint talent from Hamilton High in Los Angeles, Manning won the L.A. City championship in the 100- and 200-meter dashes in both 1982 and 1983 . . . He was the state 200-meter champion in 1982, but a hamstring injury prevented him from defending his title as a senior . . . His prep bests were a hand-timed 10.4 and 21.05 . . . Also played basketball at Hamilton.

PERSONAL: Antonio was born in Los Angeles on June 23, 1965... He is an exercise science major at USC... In high school, Manning was the senior class vice president and made the honor roll.

ROMNEY MAWHORTER — 5-9, 129, Sr., Distances

COLLEGE: The No. 2 steeplechaser in USC track history, Mawhorter narrowly missed breaking the USC record in the steeplechase (8:52.1) by posting a time of 8:52.5 at last year's UCLA dual meet . . . A three-time Pac-10 meet competitor, Mawhorter ran a subpar 9:23.8 for 11th place last spring in Corvallis. Ore Romney

also dabbled in the 1500, clocking a best of 3:50.6 at the Mt. SAC Relays (11th best USC performer) . . . won three races last year (two in the steeplechase, one in the 1500) ... Mawhorter ran a thenpersonal-best 8:58.71 while taking eighth at the 1986 Pac-10 championships . . . Clocked 9:04.51 and finished sixth at the 1986 Sun Angel Classic in Tempe, Ariz. . . . Mawhorter took second in meets with San Diego State and New Mexico (9:08.3), and UCLA (9:08.79) . . . In his lone attempt at 5000 meters in 1986, Romney won the event against San Jose State in 15:14.8 ... Mawhorter was a pleasant surprise early in 1985 when he set the USC freshman record in the steeplechase (9:04.8) during a four-way meet at USC . . . He qualified and competed at the 1985 Pac-10 meet, but did not qualify for the finals . . . He also ran 5000 meters in 14:56.2 (ninth best ever at USC) . . . Was one of USC's top cross-country runners the last three years . . . Started his collegiate career at Occidental College during the fall of 1984 and ran on the cross-country team before transferring to USC . . . Because he did not receive financial aid at Oxv. Romney was eligible to join the Trojans immediately . . . He took fourth in the Southern California Conference and sixth in the NCAA Division III western regionals for Oxy.

HIGH SCHOOL: Two-time Arrowhead League cross-country champ at Lutheran High in La Verne, Calif. . . . Also a pole vaulter at Lutheran, he was the team's MVP two straight years . . . His prep PRs were 4:00.0 for 1500 meters and 14:55.0 for 5000 meters . . . Mawhorter played point guard on the basketball team and was its MVP, too . . . He served as Lutheran's student body president as a senior in 1984.

PERSONAL: Romney was born in Glendale, Calif., on March 13, 1966... He is a business major at USC.

CAREER BESTS: 3:50.6, 1500 meters; 8:52.5, steeplechase; 14:55.0, 5000 meters.



FREDSON MAYIEK — 5-10, 126, Jr., Distances

COLLEGE: Although Mayiek competed in only five meets last year, he saved the best for last by taking second in the Pac-10 10,000 meters in Corvallis, Ore. (30:13.97) ... Ran a seasonbest of 14:21.7 last year for 5000 meters ... Also clocked 9:16.5 for two miles and ran a 1500 in 3:56.24 ... Finished second three times last

year... One of the top cross-country runners in the Pac-10, Mayiek finished 13th in last fall's conference meet... Mayiek bettered USC's 30-year-old record for the 10,000-meter run three times in 1986, the best mark coming in a first-place performance at the Southern Pacific TAC meet at UCLA (29:59.10) ... A week earlier at the Pac-10 championships, Fredson scored in the 10,000 with a then-school record 29:59.14 (sixth place) and in the 5000 (fifth), clocking 14:19.18, third best ever at USC ... First broke the Trojan 10K mark at the 1986 Mt. SAC Relays, winning the university division race in

30:15.2 . . . Mayiek's 1986 cross-country highlights included a second-place finish at the Stanford Invitational and 11th at the Pac-10 championships, also at Stanford . . . Prior to coming to USC, Mayiek registered a PR of 14:10.0 in the 5000.

PERSONAL: Fredson was born in Bungoma, Kenya, on April 4, 1966

His major at USC is accounting.

CAREER BESTS: 14:10.0, 5000 meters; 29:59.10, 10,000 meters.



PETER MICHAELS — 6-3, 270, Sr., Throws COLLEGE: A transfer from Cal Lutheran College in the fall 1985, Michaels came off his redshirt year in impressive fashion, achieving significant personal bests in the shot (60-1½) and discus (169-3) . . . Michael's PRs going into last season were 55-5 and 157-0 . . . Although a knee injury hindered his performance and consistency during the season, Peter managed to

throw 57-4 or better in his last four meets of 1987 . . . After throwing 58-9½ early in the year at the Long Beach Relays, Michaels' knee condition kept him from bettering that mark until he threw 59-3 for second place in the UCLA dual meet . . . Michaels took sixth in the shot (57-4¾) at the 1987 Pac-10 meet in Corvallis, Ore . . . His discus PR came at the USC Invitational and he later threw 165-10 at the SMU Invitational in Dallas, Tex . . . Peter underwent reconstructive knee surgery after last season and should be ready for 1988 . . . While at Cal Lutheran, he placed third in the 1985 NAIA meet in the shot put with a then-personal best of 55-5 . . . Also won the conference shot title in 1985 with a throw of 54-8 . . . Competed for two years at Cal Lutheran in track (1984 and 1985) and also started at offensive guard on the school's football team in the fall of 1984 . . . Has a PR of 157-0 in the discus . . . Attended Citrus College for a semester out of high school before transferring to Cal Lutheran.

a personal-best 1:46.54 in the prelims . . . Last year, while representing Somalia, Okash got to the quarterfinals of the 800 at the World Championships in Rome . . . At the World University Games in Zagreb, Yugoslavia, Okash took fifth place in the 800 . . . A three-time competitor in the African Games, Okash's best finish was fourth in 1985 (1:48.7) . . . Ran a 1986 best of 1:46.70 in a meet in Stockholm . . . Ran second behind teammate Abdi Bile (1987 world champion at 1500 meters) at the 1985 IC4A meet . . . Competed at the 1986 NCAA meet in Indianapolis, but did not qualify for the finals . . . Competed in the 400 for Somalia at the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles.

He ran a personal-best 50.44 in Fresno and qualified for the NCAA meet . . . George competed in the national meet in Baton Rouge, La., but failed to advance to the finals . . . Porter was

leading his qualifying heat at the Pac-10 meet in Corvallis, Ore., last May, but fell over the last hurdle and did not finish . . . In his first try at the 400-meter intermediate, Porter ran an impressive 51.06 while winning at the USC Invitational . . . Also clocked 50.82 at the SMU Invitational and 50.90 at the UCLA dual meet last spring . . . In another unlucky instance, Porter was leading a formidable field at the Jenner Classic when he fell over the eighth hurdle . . . He clocked 1:56.2 in his lone try at 800 meters . . . Porter anchored the second-place Trojans in the 1600-meter relay at last year's Pac-10 meet. HIGH SCHOOL: The national high school record holder at Cabrillo

HIGH SCHOOL: The national high school record holder at Cabrillo High in Lompoc, Calif., in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles (35.32) ... Porter's national record is superior to the 300-meter low hurdles

... Porter's national record is superior to the 300-meter low hurdles national mark set in 1983 by eventual Olympic silver medalist Danny Harris (35.52) ... He was undefeated during his senior year in 1985, including the league, CIF 1-A, state and International Prep Invitational titles ... Ran six races under 36.0 in 1985 ... George was *Track and Field News'* top-ranked intermediate hurdler among the nation's preps last year and was No. 3 in 1984 ... Had the third best time in the U.S. in the 300 hurdles as a junior (36.10) while winning the state title in his specialty... Porter was named the state's Athlete of the Year last year by Cal-Hi Sports ... A fine high hurdler, Porter has run 14.0 over prep high hurdles ... Porter won the CIF 1-A 110-meter highs at last year's CIF meet (14.29, the race was rerun during the following week because it was originally run over a short course) ... A star basketball player, Porter averaged 21 points per game for Cabrillo's cagers in 1985.

PERSONAL: George was born in Topeka, Ks., on Dec. 19, 1966 . . . His major at USC is urban planning.

CAREER BESTS: 50.44, 400-meter intermediate hurdles.



ROBERT READING — 6-4, 195, Jr., Hurdles COLLEGE: Reading proved his surprising freshman campaign was no fluke by turning in a new personal best of 13.64 in the 110-meter high hurdles, the fourth best ever by a Trojan... Robert's hurdle PR came at the Modesto Relays last spring... In the UCLA dual meet, Reading managed a second against the formidable Bruin hurdle corps and clocked a 13.89... Qualified for

the Pac-10 meet last year, but a leg injury kept him from competing ... Finished first four times and was third or better seven times ... As a freshman, Reading ran 13.83 while taking second in the 1986 Pac-10 110-meter high hurdles after running an identical time in the league prelims ... Narrowly missed qualifying for the NCAA finals in his specialty, clocking 13.88 in the heats (he missed by .06 of a

second) . . . Perhaps his breakthrough race was at the 1986 Pepsi Invitational at UCLA when, despite finishing seventh, Robert clocked a then-PR 13.85 against the likes of former Trojan Tonie Campbell, Greg Foster and Roger Kingdom . . . He won the high hurdles against UCLA in 13.96 . . . Took fourth at the Jenner Classic with a respectable 13.92 . . . Ran wind-aided times in the San Jose State dual of 13.9 (hurdles) and 10.59 (100).

HIGH SCHOOL: One of three 1985 California State champions on USC's track team this year (George Porter and Roman Gomez are the others), Reading won the state title in the 110-meter high hurdles in 13.88 as a senior at St. Mary's College High in Berkeley, Calif. . . . His PR at the state meet was the fourth best time ever by an East Bay prep . . . He was the third St. Mary's hurdler in six years to win the state title . . . At the 1985 North Coast Section 2-A South meet, he won the highs (13.9), 300 intermediates (37.9), the long jump (23-4½) and 200 meters (21.3) . . . His career best in the long jump is 23-6¼ and he has run the 300 IH in 37.41 . . . St. Mary's never lost a dual meet during Reading's career . . . His effort at the North Coast meet got him the Oakland Tribune's Prep Athlete of the Week honors . . . He also played wide receiver in football and forward on his school's basketball team.

PERSONAL: Reading (pronounced RED-ing) was born in Buffalo, New York on June 9, 1967.

ERIC SCHERMERHORN — 6-1, 160, Sr., Mid-Distances

COLLEGE: Schermerhorn ran a season-best 1:48.74 while taking fourth in the 800 at last year's Pac-10 meet in Corvallis, Ore... Eric ran 1:50.0 or better on four occasions last year, including 1:49.05 for first place in the UCLA dual meet... Took first four times and improved each time he lined up for the 800... Also ran 47.13

for 400 meters, his fastest time for one lap since high school . . . Took his place on USC's all-time list for 800 meters by running 1:48.23 against UCLA in 1986 (second place behind teammate Joey Bunch), ranking him the eighth fastest Trojan ever . . . Eric ran 1:49.40 in the 1986 Pac-10 prelims and followed it with a seventh place finish in the finals (1:49.71) . . . Missed qualifying for the NCAA meet by only .12 of a second . . . Schermerhorn clocked 1:49.3 in the 800 at the Jenner Classic in San Jose last year while finishing third . . . Won his specialty at USC's tri-meet with San Diego State and New Mexico with an impressive early-season mark of 1:50.37 . . . Had a top time as a freshman of 1:50.36 during qualifying at the 1985 Pac-10 meet . . . Eric won four out of eight races in 1985 . . . Took third versus UCLA in 1:51.0.

HIGH SCHOOL: Rated the top prep 800-meter runner in the nation by *Track & Field News* in 1984 as a senior at Woodbridge High in Irvine, Calif... Earned All-American honors and won the 800 meters at the California State meet and the Southern California Championships in 1984... Also won the CIF 3-A titles as a senior for 400 and 800 meters ... Eric ran prep bests of 1:49.21 for 800, 47.09 for 400, 22.0 for 200 and 38.8 in the low hurdles... Runner-up at the Golden West Invitational against the best preps in the U.S... Eric ran better than 1:52 eight times and broke 1:50 three times in 1984... Placed third in the state 400 two years ago (47.74)... Listed in *USA Today*'s Best in the USA for middle distances in 1984.

PERSONAL: Eric was born in Lynwood, Calif. on Jan. 19, 1966... His father, Fred, was a standout miler at Compton College and at Oklahoma State in the early 1950s and is a member of OSU's sports hall of fame... Eric's major at USC is communications.

CAREER BESTS: 1:48.23, 800 meters.





ANGEL SILVA — 5-8, 139, Sr., Distances COLLEGE: One of USC's top cross-country runners the last two years, Silva will run track this spring for Troy... Finished 36th at last fall's Pac-10 cross-country championships, clocking 32:11 at the Stanford 10-kilometer course... On the same course, Silva was 38th (out of 100 runners) at the Stanford Invitational, also held last fall (he was the No. 2 Trojan)... In 1986, Silva was 17th

at the Fresno State Invitational in 31:42 and 37th at the Pac-10 meet (32:56).

JUNIOR COLLEGE: Before transferring to USC in the fall of 1986, Silva ran track and cross-country at Ventura (Calif.) College from 1984 to 1986 . . . Won the conference title for 10,000 meters in 1986 and was sixth in the same race at the Southern California junior college championships . . . Ran his 10K personal-best at the 1986 Mt. SAC Relays (30:43.0) . . . Has also clocked 14:56.0 in the 5000 . . . He was one of three Ventura College runners to earn All-State honors in cross-country in 1985 . . . Narrowly missed making the state JC meet in both track and cross-country as a freshman in 1984-85 (he finished seventh in the Southern California track meet in the 10K). HIGH SCHOOL: Silva didn't run track as a prep at Oxnard (Calif.) High, but was a two-time All-Ventura Country pick in cross-country (1982 and 1983) . . . Angel won the Channel League title in cross-country as a senior and then finished sixth at the CIF championships at Mt. SAC.

PERSONAL: Silva participated in boxing as a youth and competed in the Golden Gloves . . . It was boxing, and all the road work that goes with it, that steered Angel to running . . . He was born in Port Hueneme on May 1, 1965 . . . Silva's major at USC is public administration.

CAREER BESTS: 14:56.0, 5000 meters; 30:43.0, 10,000 meters.



ANDY TOLPUTT — 6-1, 210, So., Hammer COLLEGE: USC's lone returning NCAA scorer, Tolputt finished sixth in the hammer at last year's national meet in Baton Rouge, La., with a heave of 207-10... Threw his personal best of 213-7 in a meet at Cal State Los Angeles last year... Had marks of 200 feet or better in eight meets, including each of his last six college meets of 1987... Finished first seven times last year...

Won the hammer at the UCLA dual with his second-best throw of the year (210-6).

HIGH SCHOOL: One of the top junior hammer throwers in the world in 1986, Tolputt won the English Schools hammer title six times, an unprecedented feat in any event in English Schools track and field... Tolputt's prep personal best in the hammer was 209-5 and he holds the Boys, Youth and Junior classification records for the 16-pound hammer in Great Britain (196-9)... Tolputt won the Amateur Athletic Association championship last year with a toss of 204-1... Andy's brother, Russell, also throws the hammer and has a PR of 204-8. PERSONAL: Tolputt was born in Slough, England on Oct. 12, 1967. CAREER BESTS: 213-7, hammer.



GARY WELLMAN — 5-9, 170, Fr., Sprints COLLEGE: A flanker on USC's 1987 Pac-10 champion football team, Wellman is joining track this spring after opting for spring football a year ago . . . He caught 1 pass for 9 yards and returned 2 kickoffs for 29 yards for the Trojans this past fall.

HIGH SCHOOL: One of the top prep sprint talents in the state two years ago while at Westlake

High in Westlake Village, Calif., Wellman finished fifth at the 1986 state meet in the 100 meters (10.67) . . . He also took second at the CIF 4-A meet (10.77) and third at the CIF Masters meet (10.68) in 1986 . . . Wellman was the double sprint champ of the Marmonte League in 1986, winning the 100 in 10.5 and the 200 in 21.8 . . . CHAMPIONS AND RECORD HOLDERS

WORLD RECORDS: 61 USC trackmen have equalled or bettered world records since 1912.

OLYMPIC GAMES: USC trackmen have won 23 individual Olympic titles and have shared in seven relay victories. Fifty-seven men have won a total of 86 places on United States Olympic teams.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS: USC has won 26 out of the 63 NCAA Outdoor meets since its beginning in 1921. On 10 occasions they have finished second. The Trojans won nine in a row (1935-1943), and seven straight (1949-1955). They have also won two NCAA Indoor Championships since its beginning in 1965. A total of 96 individual outdoor championships highlight the record.

CROMWELL TRACK AND FIELD

Used as a training and warm-up facility during the 1984 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles, Cromwell Track and Field underwent a complete refurbishing in fall, 1983. Not only was the track resurfaced, but a new drainage system was also added.

A new Rekortan surface, the same as the Olympic track in the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum, has eight, 42-inch lanes. The high jump area is larger than before and there are two new sand pits for the horizontal jumps.

Cromwell Field has been renovated as recently as 1979, but all that remains from the first facelift is the equipment storeroom and weightroom on the track's southwest perimeter. Although there are no permanent grandstands yet, a \$1.8 million fundraising drive is on and when that financial goal is reached, a doubledeck stadium capable of holding 5,000 people will be constructed.



"B & B and the Apprentices" is not the name of an up-and-coming rock group, but a nickname, coined by USC women's track coach Fred LaPlante, that aptly describes a group that could shake up the national scene in women's collegiate track and field this year.

The Women of Troy finished third at the 1987 NCAA Championships, second at the Pac-10 Championships and were ranked No. 2 in the nation in dual meets by Track & Field News. Despite the loss of six key seniors (five of whom scored at the NCAA meet) and the absence of junior hurdler Leslie Maxie (she is redshirting this Olympic year), the 1988 USC women's track team boasts a lineup capable of a third-straight top 10 NCAA finish.

"B & B" stands for Yvette Bates, 1987 NCAA Indoor triple jump champ, and Wendy Brown, All-American jumper/heptathlete, both going into their senior seasons. "The Apprentices" are a collection of returning athletes, along with some key recruits, who will be counted on to step forward and make their mark.

"Wendy and Yvette are finishing off what have been incredible college athletic careers already," said LaPlante, in his fifth year at Troy. "We have quite a challenge with all the losses off last year's team, but this year's team has worked harder in the offseason than any group I've ever had at USC. We can be a top 10 team, which would be quite an accomplishment with only three seniors."

Here's how the 1988 Women of Troy look in each department:

Sprints — Junior Michelle Taylor (53.51) is the lone returnee from both of USC's relay teams that scored at the 1987 NCAA meet (including the national champion 1600-meter relay) and her improvement has been substantial. Sophomore Louan Guialdo (11.7, 24.10, 55.4) and Noelle Chapin (55.8) have also improved and will add quality depth. Freshman Ronda Brooks (11.73, 23.95, 53.8) from Oakland (Calif.) High, one of LaPlante's ace recruits, was a member of the U.S. Junior national team last year.

Hurdles — Although Maxie (NCAA runner-up in the 1987 NCAA 400-meter hurdles) left a large void until she returns in 1989, LaPlante has another top-notch recruit who may step right in and take over — freshman Effie Daetz (13.89, 41.86 in the 300-meter hurdles) from Leigh High in Los Gatos, Calif. Daetz was the second fastest prep in both hurdles in 1987. The multi-talented Brown (13.88) is tough competition in the short hurdles and junior Karen Koellner (59.84) scored at the Pac-10 meet last year in the 400 hurdles.



Lesley Noll

Distances — LaPlante likes the improvement shown last fall by junior Lesley Noll (2:06.81), who scored in the 1987 Pac-10 800. Taylor's range allows her to be effective at 800 (2:07.6) as well as the sprints. Sophomore Shannon Clark (2:10.30, 4:22.06, 9:41.41), had personal bests in her three events last year and broke USC records in the 1500 and 3000 in the process. Junior Elise Lyon (2:07.0, 4:16.12, 9:32.0), a Pac-10 scorer in the 1500, will concentrate on longer distances this year. Irish Olympian Monica Joyce (who happens to be LaPlante's wife) brings her world-class expertise to the Trojan runners as USC's new distance coach.

Jumps — Bates (21-2½, 45-3 indoors) and Brown (21-5¼, 44-11¾, 6-2¼) simply make the USC jumps department the best in women's college track. Both have set U.S. and World bests in the triple jump, one has an NCAA title (Bates), the other a TAC crown (Brown). They've also scored in the NCAA long jump (Bates twice, Brown once). Guialdo (20-5¼) gives USC yet a third 20-foot plus long jumper. LaPlante hopes sophomore high jumper Yleana Carrasco (6-0) has healed sufficiently from an ankle injury to regain her prep form.

Throws — Two experienced juniors — discus thrower Claudia Paris (170-4) and shot putter Heidi Adams (46-11½, 149-0 discus) — will be counted on to fill the substantial void left by three-time All-American Diana Clements, USC record holder in the shot put (55-8¼) and javelin (168-8). Paris, an NCAA competitor as a freshman in 1986, had a subpar collegiate season last year, but came back and threw her personal best the following summer. Brown picked up the javelin, literally, just last year and threw an impressive 150-1, mostly on arm strength. Freshman Rugina Hendricks (39-0, 135-7) is an unproven entity with solid potential.

Heptathlon — As if the jumps and hurdles aren't enough, Brown is also one of the top heptathletes in the nation (she scored a school-record 5,896 points) having finished fifth at the NCAA meet, TAC Championships and World University Games last year. She became a multi-eventer just last year and the prospects of improvement give her a legitimate chance to make the U.S. Olympic team.

FRED LaPLANTE **Head Coach**



Considering Fred LaPlante's wealth of ability in coaching and recruiting, it's no secret why the 38year-old women's track coach has vaulted the Trojans' program into

national prominence.

Since LaPlante took over in 1984, USC has turned in consecutive school-best performances at the NCAA Outdoor Championships, including a third place finish at last season's meet.

LaPlante, the coach of 41 All-Americans (including 15 national champions) in his career, also guided Troy to an eighth place finish at

the NCAA Indoors and a 5-0 dual meet record, good for No. 2 in the nation as ranked by Track and Field News. Among the wins was a second straight 69-67 triumph over crosstown rival UCLA. LaPlante is now 22-2 (.917 winning percentage) in duals in his four years at USC.

In LaPlante's first year at the school, USC finished 24th at the 1984 NCAA championships. That was followed by a 16th place tie at the NCAAs and a stellar 12-1 mark in duals in 1985. Two years ago, Troy went 5-0 in duals and beat UCLA for the first time, won the Pac-West title, finished third at the NCAA Indoors and placed fourth at the Outdoors.

A native of Toledo, Ohio, LaPlante has had 14 years of success as a coach following a fine athletic career at Eastern Michigan Universitv. where he earned NCAA-CD All-American honors at 1500 meters in 1972 and competed on two NCAA-CD national championship teams.

Then, after spending 1973 as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, LaPlante had one-year coaching stints at Hoover Junior High (Mich.), Garden City East High (Mich.), Washtenaw Community College (Mich.) and Columbia (N.Y.) before settling at San Diego State for five years (1979-83). He established winning programs at each institution, highlighted by a 24-1 career dual record at San Diego State in which his teams were ranked nationally by Track & Field News sixth (1979), fifth (1980), ninth (1981), fifth (1982) and 10th (1983). His achievements were rewarded by his induction into San Diego State's athletic hall of fame last year.

Great teams have great athletes and LaPlante has produced an uncanny number of world-class performers, including eight Olympians, 16 national record breakers, and 18 internationalists.

His accomplishments have not gone unnoticed as he was named NCAA District VIII Coach of the Year in both 1982 and 1986 and WCAA Coach of the Year in 1982 (the season in which he won the WCAA Championship to end UCLA's five-year reign). He was previously awarded the WCAA Coach of the Year honor in 1981 when his cross country team finished seventh at the AIAW Championship.

Having traveled the European circuit for several years coaching not only U.S. athletes, but also top stars from Ireland, England, Sweden and Canada, LaPlante was named to coach the U.S. Women's Senior team at the World Championships in Holland in 1980, the U.S. Junior Women's team (as assistant) against the Soviet Union in 1982 the U.S. Senior Women's team against East Germany in 1983, and the U.S. team in the U.S.-Canada Heptathlon in 1987.

In addition, LaPlante served as the U.S. National Hurdle Coordinator from 1980 to 1982 and the WCAA Coordinator for cross country from 1978 to 1982. An excellent administrator as well, he codirected the Aztec cross country and track meets for five years.

Fred is married to world class distance runner and current USC assistant coach Monica Joyce.

MIKE BAILEY **Assistant Coach**



Bailey, last year's throws and multi-event coach, adds the responsibilities of jumps coach and chief office assistant in this his second year at USC. Last year, he tutored Pac-10 champions and All-Americans Diana Clements (shot and Wendy Brown put) (heptathlon).

A decathlete himself, the 31year-old Bailey has scored 7,621 points in the 10-eventer, even though he never competed in track in college. Instead, he started for

four years at middle linebacker at Utah and continued for two years in the Canadian Football League with Calgary and Saskatchewan.

After retiring from football, Bailey went on to coach at Judge Memorial High in Salt Lake City, Utah, for four years. He also has two years of collegiate coaching experience while an assistant at Idaho State. Mike and his wife, Cindy, have a 11-year-old son, Michael.

MONICA JOYCE **Assistant Coach**



A world-class runner, Joyce brings her international expertise in distance running to the USC women's track program for the first time this year. She has, however, worked with the Trojan women in an unofficial capacity in the past while training under head coach Fred LaPlante, who happens to be her husband.

The 29-year-old Joyce is one of Ireland's greatest female runners, holding national records in five events (1500 meters, one mile,

2000 meters, 3000 meters and 5000 meters). She represented Ireland in the 3000 at the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles and also competed at the 1983 World Championships in Helsinki, Finland. An accomplished cross-country and road racer. Joyce place eighth at the World Road Racing Championships in 1983 and 1984, and 12th at the 1985 World Cross-Country Championships.

A four-time All-American as a collegian at San Diego State, Joyce is the former NCAA record holder in the 3000 (8:53.21) and she currently holds the NCAA standard for the 2000 (5:43.96). Joyce completed an impressive double at the 1982 NCAA meet, finishing second in the 1500 and fourth in the 800.

In addition to her coaching chores, Monica is currently training for the upcoming Olympic Games in Seoul, Korea.



TOM WALSH Graduate Assistant



Walsh, 24, impressed Fred LaPlante enough while serving as manager for the USC women's track team in 1986 that LaPlante elevated him to graduate assistant in 1987 and left him in charge of Troy's talented middle distance runners. This year, he'll work exclusively as Recruiting Coordinator.

Walsh transferred to USC in the fall of 1985 after spending three years at Cal State Northridge, helping the men's track program. He received his bachelor's degree in

sports information from USC in 1987.

He has also worked for track promoter Al Franken, assisting with some of the major track meets in the country.

A talented athlete, Walsh lettered in track, cross-country and baseball as a prep at Loyola High in Los Angeles, where he graduated in 1982.

HELAINE CLAYMAN

Trainer



A 1980 graduate of USC, Clayman serves as the trainer for the Women of Troy track squad.

In her eighth year on USC's training staff, the 29-year-old Clayman also works with all other women's sports at Troy, as well as men's volleyball. She earned her bachelor's degree in sports medicine and is currently working on her doctorate in exercise physiology.

Clayman was a swimmer as a prep and graduated from Venice (Calif.) High in 1976.

Her 1987 best in the discus came in a winning effort at USC's Heptathlon Plus meet (138-5, No. 7 on USC's

all-time list) . . . Finished third or better six times last year, including two thirds during USC's 69-67 win over UCLA . . . Hindered most of her freshman year in 1986 by a broken toe. Heidi came back to throw a personal best 46-111/2 in the shot, the second best effort ever by a Troian . . . That PR was well-timed because it gave her precious second place points while helping USC to a 69-67 victory in the 1986 USC-UCLA dual . . . Adams took sixth in the 1986 Pac-West shot put (46-51/4).

HIGH SCHOOL: One of the nation's top preps in the shot put in 1985 while at Mission Viejo (Calif.) High, Adams had the fifth best throw in the U.S. (46-9)... Took second place in the California state meet and in the South Coast League Championships in 1985 . . . Also a fine discus thrower, Heidi had a best of 149-0 and took first in the league and fifth in the state in 1985 . . . Won the shot at the prestigious Mt. SAC Relays and the Arcadia Invitational . . . Picked by the Los Angeles Times Orange County section as the Female Track Athlete of the Year in 1985 . . . The MVP of her team in 1984 and 1985, Adams won the league shot put title as a junior and took second that year in the discus . . . Heidi's coach in high school was former USC trackman Hugo DeGroot, who also coached national prep shot put record holder Natalie Kaaiawahia . . . Heidi has bench pressed 225 pounds.

PERSONAL: Adams was born in National City, Calif., on June 30, 1967 . . . Her major at USC is biology.

COACH BAILEY: "Heidi has shown as much commitment to improving this year as anyone on the team. She's on her way to her best season ever."

YVETTE BATES — 5-8, 140, Sr., Jumps, Hurdles

COLLEGE: Along with teammate Wendy Brown. Bates is part of the best triple jump tandem in women's track and field . . . Yvette won the NCAA indoor triple jump last year with a world best mark of 45-3 . . . A three-time triple jump and two-time long jump outdoor All-American, Bates took second in the triple jump and

third in the long jump at the 1987 NCAA outdoor championships in Baton Rouge, La... Triple jumped farther than 42 feet in five out of seven collegiate meets last year... Long jumped better than 20 feet in six consecutive competitions in 1987 . . . Her outdoor personal best (44-71/2) came at last year's NCAA meet . . . Bates has also long jumped 21-21/2 (third all-time Trojan) and clocked 14.18 in the 100meter hurdles (fifth best mark ever at USC) . . . Competed at the 1987

TAC Championship meet in San Jose, but a nagging leg injury hindered her performance . . . Took third in both the long jump and triple jump at the 1987 Pac-10 meet in Corvallis, Ore . . . Finished first eight times in 1987 out of all the events she entered and no worse than third in any jumping competition she entered (most of which included Brown) . . . Ranked third in the nation in the triple jump two years ago, Bates took second at the 1986 NCAA meet in Indianapolis with a then-PR 44-6 . . . She soared 20-101/2 in the 1986 NCAA long jump to finish sixth . . . Bates won the 1986 Pac-West long jump (19-101/2), took second in the triple jump (40-101/2, behind Brown) and was fourth in the 100 hurdles (14.38) ... Bates helped USC to a third-place showing at the 1986 NCAA indoor meet by scoring in both the long jump (fourth, 20-61/2) and triple jump (third, 43-13/4) . . . She lived up to her promise coming out of high school as she long jumped 20-71/2 and went 43-1 in the triple jump (at the time a world indoor best, set at the Times Indoor meet) as a freshman in 1985 . . . Also registered a 14.24 in the 100-meter hurdles while placing sixth in the conference . . . One of three 20-foot-plus long jumpers at USC in 1985, she did it in two meets . . . Triple jumped past 40 feet in six of seven competitions . . . Took third in the triple jump (40-93/4) and sixth in the long jump (19-10) in the 1985 WCAA championships.

HIGH SCHOOL: As a prep at Berkeley (Calif.) High, Yvette was the nation's No. 2-ranked triple jumper in 1984 behind Brown . . . Bates had prep bests of 42-63/4 (TJ), 19-93/4 (LJ) and 13.74 (high school hurdles) . . . Placed second in the 1984 California state meet in the triple jump and third in the long jump . . . Was third in the country in the triple jump as a junior in 1983 (40-63/4) . . . Finished second at the Junior Nationals in 1982 and represented the United States at the Junior Pan American Games that year.

PERSONAL: Born in Oakland, Calif., on Dec. 28, 1965 . . . Yvette's first name is Dorothea, but prefers to be called by her middle name . . . Her major at USC is elementary education.

COACH BAILEY: "Since the triple jump is not an Olympic event, Yvette will concentrate more on the long jump this year. She has already qualified for the U.S. track trials and few people compete better under pressure than Yvette."

CAREER BESTS: 45-3 (indoors), 44-71/2 (outdoors), triple jump; 21-21/2. long jump; 14.18, 100-meter hurdles.



RONDA BROOKS — 5-8, 144, Fr., Sprints, Hurdles

HIGH SCHOOL: One of the nation's top sprinters last year as a prep at Oakland (Calif.) High, Brooks was the eighth best performer in the U.S. at 100 meters (11.73) and No. 7 nationally in the 200 (23.95) ... Both sprint marks were the fastest run by a California prep in 1987 . . . Her 100 PR came during a third place performance

at the International Junior meet last summer in Pullman, Wash., and her top 200 was registered in the heats at the 1987 California State meet . . . Impressive during qualifying at the state meet, Brooks faltered a bit in the finals but still took seventh in the 100 (12.12) and fifth in the 200 (24.53) . . . She was the San Francisco/Oakland regional sprint champ in 1987, running 11.84 and 24.45 in that meet . . . Took fourth in the 100 (12.01) and third in the 200 (24.06) at last year's TAC Junior Nationals in Tucson, Ariz . . . Also placed fourth in the 200 at the International Junior meet (24.54) and anchored a United States 400-meter relay team to a stadium record (44.56) . . . An outstanding hurdler before changing to the sprints last year, Brooks placed second in the 300-meter hurdles at the state meet in both 1985 (42.25) and 1986 (42.58) . . . Her 300 hurdles PR of 41.78 made her the third best performer in the country in 1985 (redshirting USC hurdler Leslie Maxie was the fastest that year) . . . She was No. 4 in the nation in

1986 with a best of 42.58 in the 300 hurdles . . . Won the San Francisco/Oakland regional title in the 300 hurdles two years ago (43.84) . . . The versatile Brooks has also long jumped 19-7 and clocked 53.8 on a leg of the 1600-meter relay . . . Named Oakland Tribune female Athlete of the Year in 1986.

PERSONAL: Ronda was born in San Pablo, Calif., on June 6, 1969. COACH LaPLANTE: "Ronda is an exciting athlete with a great future. We think enough of her ability to put her on the anchor leg of the sprint relay as a freshman, and she'll handle it. She's going to get some people's attention."

CAREER BESTS: 11.73, 100 meters; 23.95, 200 meters; 41.78, 300meter hurdles.



WENDY BROWN — 5-10½, 155, Sr., Jumps, Hurdles, Heptathlon

COLLEGE: Already established as one of college track and field's top three-way jumpers, Brown added the heptathlon to her repertoire last year with outstanding results . . . The 1987 Pac-10 heptathlon champion, Brown took fifth at the NCAA meet in Baton Rouge, La., and again at the TAC Championship meet in San Jose . . .

Her school-record 5896 points came at the TAC meet, where she was the No. 2 collegiate performer . . . Also placed fifth at the World University Games in Zagreb, Yugoslavia, scoring 5830 points ... Brown finished off a fine year with a second-place performance at the U.S.-Canada meet in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan . . . In her individual specialty, the triple jump, Brown finished fourth at the Pac-10 meet (44-2), third at the NCAAs (44-2) and second at the TAC meet (44-4) . . . Took second to teammate Yvette Bates in the 1987 NCAA indoor triple jump (44-8) ... Set the American triple jump record (later broken) of 44-113/4 during the 1987 USC-UCLA dual meet . . . Brown competed in five events against the Bruins last year, taking first in the triple jump and high jump (5-81/2), third in the long jump (20-10) and javelin (136-3), and fourth in the 100-meter hurdles (13.7 wind-aided) ... Had a season best in the high jump of 6-0 in Canada . . . Brown's collegiate bests place her on USC's all-time top 10 lists in eight events — heptathlon (5896, first), high jump (6-0, first), long jump (21-

51/2, second), triple jump (44-113/4, second), 100-meter hurdles (13.88, third), javelin (150-1 fourth), shot put (40-3, ninth) and 100 meters (12.09, 10th) . . . Wendy became the first woman ever to triple jump more than 45 feet in any conditions while winning the 1986 TAC triple jump with a wind-aided 45-21/2... She was Track & Field News' top ranked U.S. triple jumper two years ago . . . Brown's 1986 bests in the long jump (20-111/4) and triple jump (44-03/4) earned her fourth place in both events at the NCAA meet in Indianapolis . . . She was the 1986 Pac West champ in the triple jump (43-111/2 and the hurdles (14.08), and took third in the high jump (5-10) ... Wendy placed fourth at the 1985 NCAAs in the long jump (21-31/4) and the triple jump (42-11) and even high jumped 5-11, though she failed to qualify for the finals in that event ... Enjoyed an outstanding freshman year despite missing the early track season to play basketball on Linda Sharp's squad . . . Had marks of at least 40 feet in every triple iump competition in 1985.

HIGH SCHOOL: One of the nation's top recruits as a prep at Woodside High in Atherton (Calif.), Brown was the No. 1 prep in the long jump (20-93/4) and triple jump (and still the national record holder at $42-10\frac{1}{2}$) and was second in the high jump $(6-2\frac{1}{4})$... She was also ranked third in the nation in the 100-meter hurdles (13.59hs) in 1984 ... Won the California state meet in 1984 for Woodside singlehandedly by winning all three jumps (with state-record marks) and taking

second in the hurdles . . . Took sixth in the long jump at the U.S. 59



Olympic Trials in Los Angeles . . . Finished third in the high jump and second in the 100-meter hurdles at the U.S. Junior Nationals in 1984 . . . The Northern California High School Athlete of the Year in 1984, Brown was featured in *Sports Illustrated's* "Faces in the Crowd" and as *USA Today's* Athlete of the Week . . . Also played basketball at Woodside.

PERSONAL: Wendy was born in Ocala, Fla., on January 28, 1966 ... She is a communications major at USC.

COACH BAILEY: "Wendy is a very focused person and she is intent on making 1988 her best year ever. Training for the heptathlon will help her other events. She won't let anything stop her in her guest to make the Olympic team."

CAREER BESTS: 12.09, 100 meters; 24.78, 200 meters; 2:27.0, 800 meters; 13.88, 100-meter hurdles; 6-21/4, high jump; 21-51/4, long jump; 44-113/4, triple jump; 40-3, shot put; 150-1, javelin; 5896 points, heptathlon.



YLEANA CARRASCO — 5-9, 130, So., High Jump

COLLEGE: Hampered by an ankle injury most of the season, Carrasco managed a best of 5-5 (tying for second at the UCI-Cal Poly Pomona trimeet), but was far short of her 6-0 personal best ... Was limited to just four meets in 1987 ... Yleana also plays for USC's women's volleyball team and earned Pac-10 All-Freshman honors

in 1986.

HIGH SCHOOL: A three-time prep All-American while at Anaheim (Calif.) High, Carrasco won the California State high jump title in 1987 at 5-10 . . . She set her personal best of 6-0 while beating eventual state champ Latrese Johnson at the Arcadia Invitational in 1985 . . . She finished third as a sophomore and junior in the state high jump . . . Yleana won the 1986 CIF 2-A title and was second in the Masters meet, both at 5-8 . . . She also won the CIF high jump as a sophomore and junior, and was a four-time Orange League champ in that event . . Carrasco ran the 100 hurdles and finished second at the 1987 CIF meet (she was third in 1985 and fourth in 1984).

PERSONAL: An excellent student, Yleana had a 3.5 grade point average in high school and is now majoring in business at USC . . . She was born in Anaheim on May 5, 1968.

COACH BAILEY: "Even though volleyball takes most of her time, she's talented enough to help us anytime she jumps. We'd certainly like to see her get back to her high school form." CAREER BESTS: 6-0, high jump.



NOELLE CHAPIN — 5-91/2, 146, So., 400

COLLEGE: A valuable 400 and 1600-meter relay runner, Noelle ran a season-best 56.0 last year, good for eighth on USC's all-time list for 400 meters . . . Her best electronic time was 56.37 for first place at the USC Twilight meet . . . Ran three 400s faster than 56.5 . . . She ran the third leg of the USC 1600 relay team that took second at the Pac-10 Championships last year

in Corvallis, Ore. (3:40.09) . . . Noelle also logged a 1987 best of 25.2 for 200 meters.

HIGH SCHOOL: Although a hamstring injury cut her 1986 senior season short, Chapin still managed to register a 55.8 personal best in the 400 at the Maryland Invitational while at South Lakes High in Reston, Va. . . . As a junior in 1985, Chapin took third in the Virginia state 400 (56.7) after taking first in the regional 400 and 200 (she was second in the 100) . . . Noelle took sixth in the state 400 in 1984 (57.0) . . . She also ran a leg on South Lake's mile relay team that took fourth in the state in 1986.

PERSONAL: Chapin was born in San Diego on July 16, 1968 . . . Before high school, Noelle was an accomplished junior swimmer for the Solotar Swim Club in Virginia (she had a best of 29.9 in the 50-meter freestyle).

COACH LaPLANTE: "Noelle is one of our most improved athletes and has worked very hard on her strength and her start. She has deceptive speed and I see her being a factor this year in the Pac-10 400."

CAREER BESTS: 55.8, 400 meters.



SHANNON CLARK — 5-6½, 118, So., Mid. Distances

COLLEGE: Clark burst onto the scene last year as a freshman and set two USC records in the process (4:22.06 for 1500 meters, 9:41.41 for 3000) . . . Her school mark in the 1500 was a winning effort at the USC Heptathlon Plus meet last year . . . Shannon's best 3000 was also her only 3000, achieved at the USC Twilight meet

... She also ran a best of 2:10.30 in the 800 at the Aztec Invitational, good for fifth on USC's all-time list... In her first race as a collegian at the UCI-Cal Poly Pomona tri-meet, Clark ran an impressive 4:23.8 for 1500 meters and took second place ... Finished seventh at last year's Pac-10 meet in Corvallis, Ore.

HIGH SCHOOL: A two-time California state champ in the 1600 as a prep at Mountain View (Calif.) High, Clark was one of the nation's top milers for three years while in high school . . . Clark ran her 4:47.20 personal best while winning the state 1600 as a sophomore in 1984 . . . She repeated as state champ in 1985 (4:49.14) and finished third in 1986 (4:48.54) . . . Clark has covered the 1500 in 4:28.96 . . . Also won the Central Coast Section 1600 title in 1984 as a soph . . . A solid cross-country performer during her prep career, Clark took second in the Northern California championships for three straight years (1983-84-85) and was third in 1986 . . . She won the CCS cross-country title in 1983 and 1984 . . . At the end of her sophomore year, Shannon finished third at the U.S. Junior championships in the 1500 (4:31.00) at the Los Angeles Coliseum.

PERSONAL: Shannon's father, Marshall Clark, is the head track coach at San Jose State (where he served as an assistant under current USC men's coach Ernie Bullard) and is also a former Trojan trackster... An excellent student, Shannon had a 3.69 grade point

average in high school and is majoring in communications at USC... She was born in San Jose on October 30, 1968.

COACH LaPLANTE: "Shannon was a factor in every race she ran last year and she made a very smooth transition to college track. She has excellent racing instincts and as her strength develops, she will become more competitive on the national level."

CAREER BESTS: 2:10.30, 800 meters; 4:22.06, 1500 meters; 9:41.41, 3000 meters.



EFFIE DAETZ — 5-8½, 150, Fr., Hurdles HIGH SCHOOL: One of the best prep hurdlers in the nation last year while at Leigh High in Los Gatos, Calif., Daetz ran personal bests of 13.76 in the 100-meter hurdles and 41.86 in the 300-meter hurdles . . . Also ran a windy 13.63 while winning the 100 hurdles at the Central Coast Section championships . . . Effie's legal PRs came at the 1987 State meet, taking third in the

100 hurdles and second in the 300 hurdles (also second best performer in the nation last year) . . . Ran the fourth fastest prep time over 33-inch hurdles (international height) at the TAC Junior Championships in Tucson and took second in the process (13.89) . . . Daetz was a double champion at the Central Coast Section Championships (13.63w, 43.00), Central Coast Section Regionals (13.91, 42.72) and at the CCS Top 8 meet (13.82, 43.35) . . . Won the 100 hurdles at the Bruce Jenner meet in San Jose two years in a row (13.76w in 1987, 14.00 in 1986) . . . Although hampered by injuries for most of her junior year in 1986, Effie still won the Central Coast Section 100 hurdles (14.0) and took second in the 300 hurdles (44.42) . . . A versatile athlete, Daetz earned All-West Valley League honors in basketball last year.

PERSONAL: Daetz (pronounced DATES) Was borrn in Swedit; Ghana on Feb. 14, 1969 . . . Her first name is Efua . . . An honor student in high school, Effie carried a 3.41 grade point average and was a member of the California Scholastic Federation . . . Her major at USC is biology.

COACH LaPLANTE: "Effie simply has all the attributes and intangibles to become a top-flight hurdler. She is tough with excellent hurdle speed. When she learns to tap her power, her start and technique will have great improvement."

CAREER BEST: 13.89, 100-meter hurdles; 41.86, 300-meter hurdles.



LOUAN GUIALDO — 5-8, 118, So., Jumps, Sprints

COLLEGE: Added quality depth to USC's jump corps last year and posted a season best of 19-2 in the long jump . . . Guialdo's speed helped her post sprint bests of 24.8 (at USC's Heptathlon Plus meet) for 200 meters and 12.21 (third place at the Stanford Invitational) in the 100 last year . . . Finished third or better seven times in 1987.

HIGH SCHOOL: Although Guialdo (pronounced "Ghee-ALL-doe") did not compete for her high school team at Childs High in Bronx, N.Y., she was one of the top prep-age long jumpers in the nation while competing for the Dynamite Track Club . . . Her 20-5½ long jumpersonal best (fourth best national prep mark in 1986) placed her fourth in last year's TAC Junior Championships . . . She also placed fifth in the TAC Junior 200, clocking 24.52 in the finals (24.10 in qualifying) . . . Set a meet record of 19-8 when she won the Empire State Games long jump in 1986 . . . Took second in the 1985 TAC

Junior meet with a 19-8 effort . . . Louan won the Junior Olympics long jump title in 1985 (19-10) . . . She first jumped 19 feet at the age of 15, and won the East Coast Invitational that same year (1983) at 19-6 . . . She has also been timed in 11.7 for 100 meters and 55.4 in the 400. **PERSONAL:** Born in San Juan, Trinidad, on May 1, 1968, Louan recently received her U.S. citizenship . . . Her mother, Pollina Joseph, held the West Indies record for the 80-meter hurdles during her competitive days . . . Louan is a nursing major at USC.

COACH LaPLANTE: "Louan had a rough freshman year, but has prepared for this year like a true champion. She's very determined to make up for it and she will lend some solid versatility to our team. But watch out for her in the 200 and long jump."

CAREER BESTS: 20-5¹/₄, long jump; 11.7, 100 meters; 24.10, 200 meters; 55.4, 400 meters.



RUGINA HENDRICKS — 5-10, 180, Fr., Throws

HIGH SCHOOL: An All-City pick in the discus last year while at Cass Technical High in Detroit, Mich., Hendricks will throw the discus and the shot at USC . . . Rugina has personal bests of 39-0 in the shot put and 135-7 in the discus.

PERSONAL: Hendricks was born in Detroit, Mich., on July 1, 1969 . . . An outstanding high

school student, Rugina had a 3.77 grade point average and earned membership in the National Honor Society . . . Her major at USC is business.

COACH BAILEY: "Rugina has good size and oustanding speed and with some work in the weightroom, she'll really improve. Her primary event is the shot, but we're not ruling out the discus or javelin."

KAREN KOELLNER — 5-7, 139, Jr., Hurdles, 400

COLLEGE: One of the most improved athletes on USC's track roster, Koellner (pronounced "KELL-ner") came to Troy as a walk-on and has progressed to being the No. 2 all-time 400-meter hurdler (59.84 for third place against UCLA) . . . She is also listed among USC's top 10 in the 400 (56.64 in 1986, ninth all-time) and 800 (2:11.34

in 1986, eighth) . . . Dabbled in the heptathlon last year, scoring 4247 points at USC's Heptathlon Plus meet . . . Took sixth at last year's Pac-10 Championships in the 400 hurdles (1:00.89) . . . Ran faster than 1:01.0 in the 400 hurdles three times in 1987 . . . She won her division of the 400 hurdles at the 1987 Mt. SAC Relays, clocking 1:00.78 . . . Her 800 PR represents a clutch third place performance during Troy's narrow 69-67 win over UCLA in 1986 . . . At the 1986 Pac West Championships in Tempe, Ariz., Karen took third in the 400 (56.82) and 400 hurdles (1:01.02), and ran a leg on the winning 1600-meter relay.

HIGH SCHOOL: Koellner was the lowa state champion in the 400 hurdles while at Ames High in 1985... Has a best of 1:01.5 in the 400 hurdles... She also ran 800 meters in 2:12.2, 400 meters in 55.5 and the 100-meter hurdles in 14.40... She earned All-American honorable mention and All-Conference honors as a senior... Played forward on Ames' basketball team.

PERSONAL: Karen was born in Ames, Iowa, on Oct. 2, 1966.

COACH LaPLANTE: "This is the first year in Karen's career that she has one event to concentrate on and she knows what it is.



Without the heptathlon to worry about, her improvement in the 400 hurdles will be noticeable. I wouldn't be surprised if she made it to the Olympic trials this year."

ELISE LYON — 5-6, 129, Jr., Mid. Distances COLLEGE: Ran a season-best 4:26.10 for 1500 meters while taking third against San Diego State and lowa . . . A Pac-10 meet qualifier, Lyon finished fifth in the conference championships, clocking 4:27.38 . . . Ran four 1500 races in under 4:28.0 and finished third or better four times (including a win in the 800 at the UCI-Cal Poly Pomona tri-meet, 2:13.2) . . . Also ran the 3000

at the USC Twilight meet, taking sixth in 9:48.69 (second best all-time Trojan) . . . Took third against UCLA last year in the 1500 (4:27.57) . . . A native of Great Britain, Lyon established a then-USC record for 1500 meters (4:22.75), since broken by teammate Shannon Clark . . . In the 1986 USC-UCLA dual, Lyon took second in the 3000 (9:54.19) and followed it with another second in the 1500 (4:25.84). Then, the gutty Lyon put herself in the 800, but finished out of the scoring in fifth (2:14.64) . . . At the 1986 Pac West meet, Lyon took second in the 1500 (4:26.00) and fourth in the 800 (2:12.76), and also ran a leg on the winning 1600 relay.

HIGH SCHOOL: Lyon was England's junior and intermediate national champion in 1985. . . Has run 2:07.0 (800 meters), 4:16.12 (1500) and 9:32.0 (3000).

PERSONAL: Born in Tadworth, Surrey, England on April 23, 1966 . . . She is a communications major at USC.

COACH LaPLANTE: "Elise will put more emphasis on the longer races this year and the change should be good for her. She has solid natural talent that needs to come out and the 3000 might be her race."

CAREER BESTS: 2:07.0, 800 meters; 4:16.12, 1500 meters; 9:32.0, 3000 meters.



LESLEY NOLL — 5-4, 124, Jr., 800

COLLEGE: The second fastest 800-meter runner ever at USC, Noll posted a personal-best 2:06.81 while placing fourth at the 1987 Pac-10 Championships . . . Noll won the 800 against UCLA for the second year in a row last year, clocking 2:07.87 . . . Also ran 2:07.66 for third place at the USC Twilight meet and won her specialty against San Diego State and lowa ear-

ly in the season (2:11.33) ... Noll won the Pac West 800 title as a freshman in 1986 (2:07.59), helping the Trojans to the conference team crown ... Ran a then-PR 2:06.88 against UCLA in 1986, the first time she faced the Bruins ... Her collegiate best in the 400 is 57.0 in 1986 ... Lesley missed qualifying for the NCAA Championships by just more than a second in both her years of collegiate competition.

HIGH SCHOOL: One of San Diego's top prep runners at 400 and 800 meters, Noll ran the fourth fastest 800 in the nation in 1985 (2:08.00) ... At the 1985 CIF San Diego Section championship meet, Lesley broke the meet and section records in the 800 and 400 (55.8) and anchored the 1600-meter relay for Mt. Carmel High, which also broke the meet and section records ... She earned Athlete of the Year honors from the Palomar League, the Escondido Times-Advocate and Mt. Carmel.

PERSONAL: She was born in Orange City, Calif., on May 22, 1967 . . . She is a sports information major at USC.

COACH LaPLANTE: "Lesley has a lot of energy and in past years we've tried to bottle it up and save it for the big meets. This year we're confident that she can carry it through from the first meet to the summer."

CAREER BESTS: 55.8, 400 meters; 2:06.81, 800 meters.



CLAUDIA PARIS — 5-11, 189, Jr., Discus COLLEGE: Paris became the second Trojan to throw the discus past 170 feet when she threw 170-4 at a meet last summer in her native Italy ... During the 1987 collegiate season, Paris threw 165-10 twice, first for second place in the USC-UCLA dual, and then for sixth at the Pac-10 Championships at Corvallis, Ore . . . Finished third or better in six meets last year, including two firsts . . . Paris became the No. 2 all-time USC

discus thrower as a freshman with a mark of 169-4 (third place at the 1986 Mt. SAC Relays)... Claudia qualified for the 1986 NCAA meet, but failed to advance to the finals with a throw of 164-1... Took fifth in the 1986 Pac West discus (160-7).

HIGH SCHOOL: One of Italy's top discus throwers, Paris was the Italian champion in that event in 1985 ... In 1984 she won Italy's junior title . . . She won the national title in 1985 on her last throw . . . Has also thrown the shot 41-9.

She placed third at the Pac-10 Championships at Corvallis, Ore., in the 400, clocking 53.51 (third best ever by a Trojan) . . . Michelle also competed at the TAC Champion-

ship meet in San Jose and ran an impressive 53.52 during the qualifying heats . . . In the 800, Taylor is also the No. 3 all-time Trojan with a 2:08.92 effort at USC's Twilight meet last year. . . Her 24.3 clocking in the 200 at the Heptathlon Plus meet is tied for 10th on USC's list . . . Finished third or better six times last year . . . Taylor was also a valuable member of USC's two relay teams and the lone returnee from the 1987 NCAA 1600-meter relay titlists . . . She ran the third leg at the NCAA meet in Baton Rouge, La., in 52.0.

JUNIOR COLLEGE: In her only year at Mt. San Antonio College in Walnut, Calif., Taylor won the 1986 Southern California JC 400 (54.66) and then finished second in the state meet at 53.95 . . . A strong runner with impressive range. Taylor has also clocked 2:07.6 in the 800 and 58.06 in the 400 hurdles.

COACH LaPLANTE: "If there is a key to our track events, Michelle is it. She has outstanding range, anywhere from the 100 to the 800. The 400 is her best event and with the combination of her speed, strength and experience, she'll be capable of beating anyone she faces this year in the 400."
