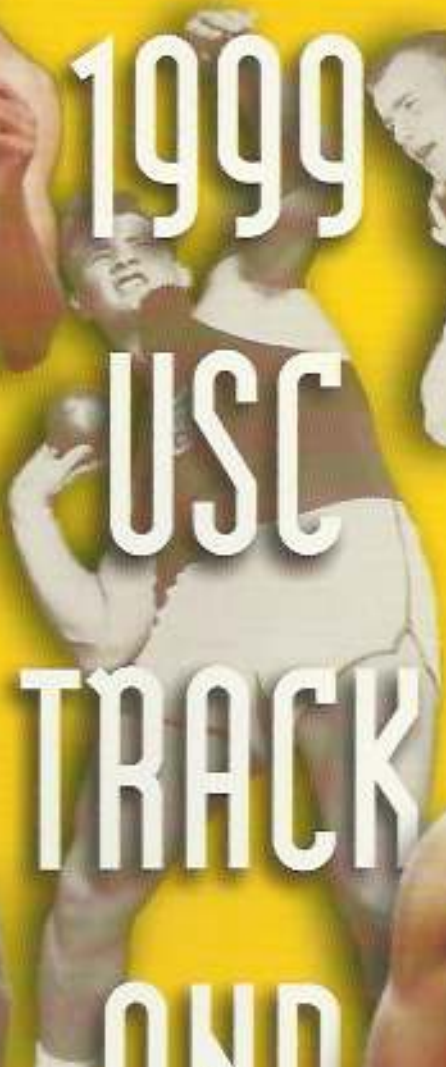
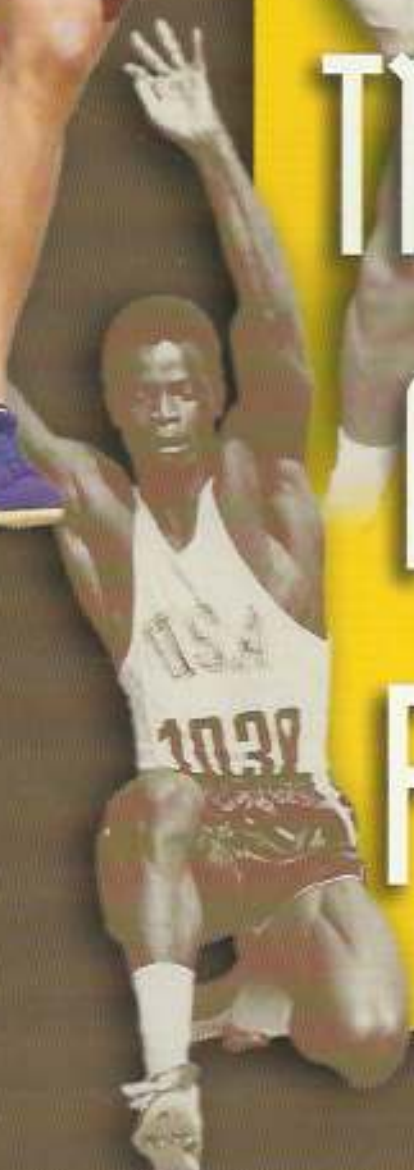
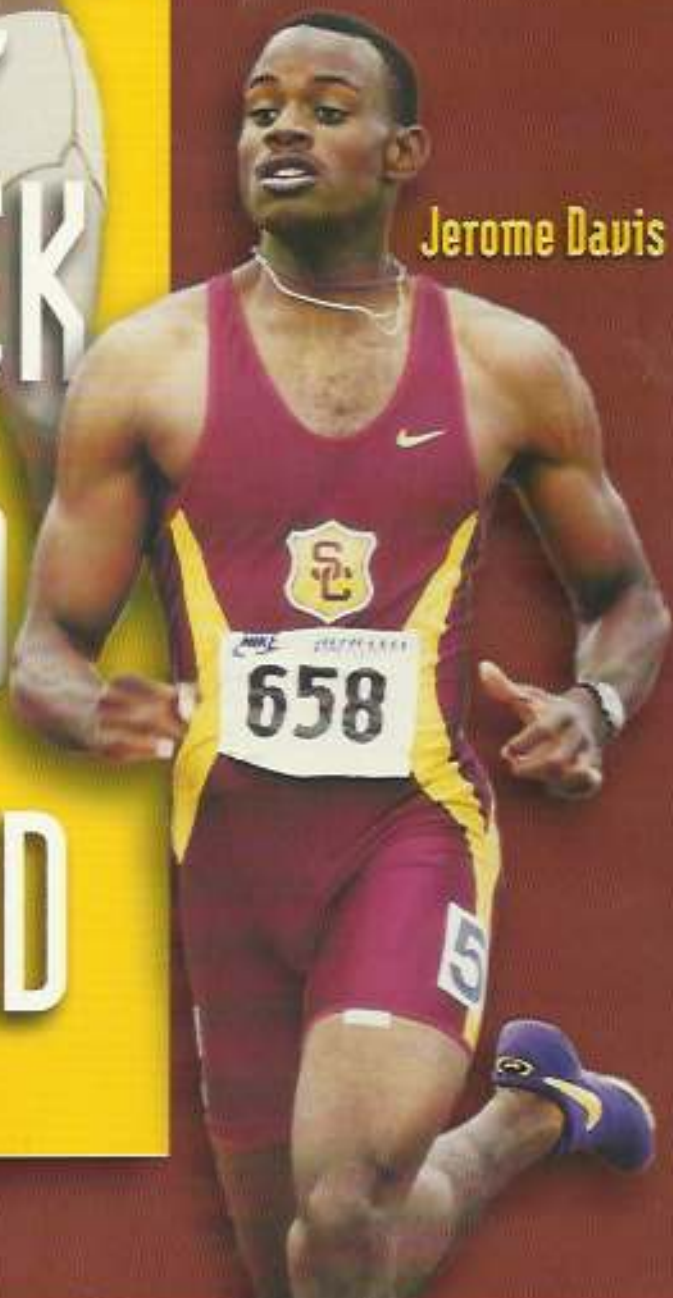

USC TRACK & FIELD HISTORICAL ACHIEVEMENTS

WORLD RECORDS:

Sixty-one USC athletes have equalled or bettered world records since 1912.

OLYMPIC GAMES:

USC athletes have won 25 individual Olympic titles and have shared in nine relay victories. Seventy-four Trojan men and 13 Women of Troy have won a total of 117 places on national Olympic teams.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS:

USC has won 26 out of the 75 NCAA Outdoor meets since its beginning in 1921. On 10 occasions Troy has finished second. USC once won nine in a row (1935-1943) and seven straight (1949-1955). They have also won two NCAA Indoor crowns since its beginning in 1965. A total of 104 individual outdoor championships highlights the record.

NATIONAL USA CHAMPIONSHIPS:

USC trackmen have won 86 individual senior USA (formerly AAU and TAC) outdoor championships.

Trojans Return to Glory

Following in the footsteps of USC's legendary track and field coaches is no easy task.

Names like Dean Cromwell, Jess Mortensen and Vern Wolfe are household names in the world of track and field. And along with them come memories of championships by the truckload.

Ron Alice, who was hired as Troy's Director of Track and Field in June of 1994, knows this all too well.

"My office is like the collegiate track and field Hall of Fame," says Alice, sitting among piles of trophies in his Heritage Hall office. "I always say that I have an obligation, a responsibility and a mandate to develop a total program at USC. That means balanced programs with depth on both the track and field."

Nowhere else in the country is the measure of success higher than in Troy. Consider USC's past successes in track and field: 28 NCAA men's championships (including two indoor titles), 61 world records, 87 Olympic team members, 34 Olympic gold medals and 14 inductees in the U.S. National Track and Field Hall of Fame.

"It is our goal and aspiration to maintain the tradition that was established before us," Alice says. "There is such great history and tradition here at USC in track and field and we are always trying to live up to the goals that are expected of us."

Alice has done very well for himself so far, pointing the Trojan men's and women's programs toward future glory that will remind many of years past.

In his first four seasons in Troy, Alice has breathed considerable life back into USC's most successful athletic program.

Last season, he led the Trojan men's team to a seventh-place finish at the NCAA Outdoor Championships and the Women of Troy to fifth. As a combined men's and women's program, that performance ranked USC behind only two schools at the 1998 NAAs.

In 1997, he led the Trojan men's team to its first Pacific-10 Conference title since 1977 (and 30th overall) before finishing third at the NAAs. In his second season in 1996, Alice guided the USC women's team to its first-

ever Pac-10 championship and directed the men's squad to a 10th-place finish at the NAAs. And in his first year at USC in 1995, he led the men's team to a fourth-place finish at the NAAs.

"We have been going in the right direction and are demonstrating growth," Alice says. "However, you are only as good as the people around you. So I like to surround myself with quality coaches and we've done that here, putting together an outstanding staff to work with our athletes."

Alice, a prep standout at Long Beach (Calif.) Poly High, is well known for his ability to win. His overall dual meet coaching mark is 171-29-1 in 31 years at five schools, including 11 state championships in 16 years at Long Beach City College, his previous stop before landing at Troy. Alice's programs have produced more than 200 All-Americans, plus 16 Olympians, four world record holders and seven American record holders. He has coached at his high school, junior college and college alma maters on the way to compiling his outstanding coaching statistics.

This year, Trojan fans can expect more of the same and maybe even a strong run at USC's first track and field national championship — on either the men's or women's side — in more than 20 years.

The Trojan men's team is led by 1998 NCAA 400m champion Jerome Davis, who is just one of many quality sprinters on the USC squad.

Davis is also the three-time defending Pac-10 400m champ and a premier 200m and relay runner. Along with All-Americans William Erese (1997 Pac-10 110m HH champion), Charles Lee (100m and 200m), Marques Holliwell (100m) and DeJon Joyner (400m IH), 1998 redshirt Felix Sanchez (400m IH), junior college transfer Vince Williams (100m and 200m) and a vastly improved LeRoy Jordan (400m), Troy will be well represented in the sprints, hurdles and relays.

"Over the years at USC, the sprint corps has been the main focus and that will always be our mainstay here," Alice says. "However, I have a mandate to develop

balance in this program. It says track and field, and that's what it will be."

The Trojans are also strong in the field. The Mambo brothers — Kedjeloba and Djeke — excel in the horizontal jumps. Kedjeloba won the 1997 Pac-10 triple jump title (52-11) two seasons ago as a true freshman. Younger brother Djeke, who is powerful in the long and triple jumps, also teams with Erese in a lethal one-two punch combo in the 110m HH.

Troy's efforts in the field are also bolstered by several veterans, including javelin thrower Henrik Kjaereng, pole vaulter Dennis Kholev (17-6), decathlete Daniel Haag (7,623), discus thrower Gordon Hovey and hammer thrower Szabolcs Maroti.

A shoulder injury kept Kjaereng out for the entire season last year, which proved to be a tremendous blow for USC. As a freshman in 1997, he established himself as one of Troy's best-ever javelin throwers.

Kholev, who spent three years serving in the Israeli Defense Forces, is USC's best pole vaulter in more than a decade and could be one of the better pole vaulters in the Pac-10.

Haag, who set a USC freshman record last season in the decathlon, could also score crucial points for USC in several individual events as well.

A couple of newcomers — hammer thrower Norbert Horvath (234-9 [71.56]) and shot putter Van Mounts (69-3 1/2 HS) — also will have an immediate effect in the field.

"This is what this program has been targeting for the past four years," Alice says. "This team represents four years of recruiting, coaching and development and hopefully it all comes to fruition in 1999."

The Women of Troy, fielding perhaps the school's strongest team ever, have their sights set on getting back the Pac-10 title they won in 1996 and then contending for the big prize at season's end. One would be foolish to

count out the Women of Troy, who have been built up by some outstanding recruiting classes.

USC has a mix of seasoned veterans and talented newcomers who fully cover the sprints, hurdles and intermediate distances impressively.

Led by Torri Edwards (three-time All-American — 1996 Pac-10 champion in the 100m and 200m), Esi Benyarku

(1997 Pac-10 100m champ), Malika Edmonson, Candace Young, Carla Estes, redshirt freshmen Kinshasa Davis and true freshman Angela Williams (100m PR of 11.11 — national prep record), USC could be as formidable in the sprints and relays as anyone in the country.

Over the longer distances, the Women of Troy are in good hands with seniors Grazyna Penc (three-time All-American — four-time Pac-10 champion) and Kristie Johnston, and sophomores Anna Lopaciuch of Poland and Brigita Langerholc of Slovenia.

"We are extremely strong at 800m, having four women who have run 2:06 or better," Alice says. "USC has never been this strong in the middle distances. They also have the versatility to swing down to the 400m and help us in the 4x400m relay or swing up to the 1,500m and possibly the 3,000m."

In the hurdle events, Natasha Danvers (USC record holder in the 400m IH at 55.69) and Myriam Tschomba-Fariala (No. 4 all-time at USC in the 100m HH) are back after impressive showings the past two seasons.

In the field, the Women of Troy are also no slouches. Junior Pam Simpson was the 1997 Pac-10 champion in the long jump

(20-11 1/4). Jennifer Vail, who was USC's top performer in the shot put last season, could be a vital point-scorer in as many as three events as a sophomore (shot put, discus, hammer). She finished second in the hammer at the Pac-10s with a mark of 179-8 (54.76), a week after setting a new USC freshman record in the hammer with a throw of 184-5 (56.22). And redshirt freshman Cynthia Ademiluyi was the 1997 California state champion in the shot put.

"This is potentially one of the best women's teams USC has ever had," Alice says. "In the field we are not as strong as we have been, but our depth is extremely good all the way from 100 to 1,500 meters. We are as talented as anyone on the track."

RON ALLICE

USC Director of Track & Field

Following in the footsteps of USC's legendary track coaches, Ron Allice has made quite an impression during his first four seasons in Troy as the Director of Track and Field. At last year's NCAA Outdoor Championships, he led the USC men's team to seventh place and the Women of Troy to fifth (as a combined men's and women's program, that performance ranked USC behind only two schools at the 1998 NAAs and was the best in school history). In 1997, Allice directed the Trojan men's team to its first Pacific-10 Conference title since 1977 (and 30th overall) before finishing third at the NAAs. In 1996, Allice guided the USC women's team to its first-ever Pac-10 title and directed the men's squad to a 10th-place finish at the NAAs. And in his first year at USC in 1995, he led the men's team to a fourth-place finish at the NAAs.

USC's past successes in track and field are well known: 28 NCAA men's championships (including two indoor titles), 61 world records, 87 Olympic team members, 34 Olympic gold medals and 14 inductees in the U.S. National Track and Field Hall of Fame.

And now, the future of Trojan track and field lies in the good hands of Allice and his staff, and they are restoring deep luster to USC's most successful athletic program.

Allice, a prep standout at Long Beach (Calif.) Poly High, is well known for his ability to win. His overall dual meet coaching mark is 171-29-1 in 31 years at five schools, including 11 state championships in 16 years at Long Beach City College, his previous stop before landing at Troy. Allice's programs have produced more than 200 All-Americans, plus 16 Olympians, four world record holders and seven American record holders. He has coached at his high school, junior college and college alma maters on the way to compiling his outstanding coaching statistics.

Clearly, Allice has enhanced the performance of athletes at each stop along his coaching career, a fact not lost on Trojan Athletic Director Mike Garrett.

"This is one of the most exciting appointments I've made since I've been here at USC," Garrett said upon hiring Allice in June of 1994. "I look for great things from our track and field program in the years to come."

Allice was equally excited.

"I'm extremely happy to be here because the tradition at USC is second to none," Allice said after joining the Trojan Family. "When I was growing up, to be a part of the Trojan Family was the pinnacle of the profession."

Allice has certainly reached the top echelon of his career, although he has not forgotten the beginnings of his coaching days. In his first coaching job, he guided the Long Beach Comets, a girls' and women's AAU program, for four years (1964-68), expanding the squad from just five girls to more than 150 competitors. During that time, he was also a graduate assistant at Long Beach State in 1964, an assistant at Compton (Calif.) High in 1966 (the team was second at the CIF championships) and the head coach for track and cross country for two years (1967-68) at Wilson High in Long Beach.

The next three seasons (1969-71), he was the track and cross country coach at Poly High in Long Beach. His track teams went 23-4 and captured the Moore League title each year. His 1971 squad was ranked as California's top dual meet team and was fifth at the state meet.

Allice was then Cal Poly Pomona's track and cross country head coach for two years (1972-73). Again, the success he had enjoyed at previous stops followed him — the Broncos lost only one dual meet, won two CCAA titles (a first in school history) and finished fifth in 1972 and sixth in 1973 at the NCAA College Division championships.

He spent the next five seasons (1974-78) as the track and cross country head coach at Long Beach State. Despite being a new Division I program and having just three scholarships, four of his squads placed among the nation's Top 15 dual meet teams. He won one Pacific Coast Athletic Association title and his teams finished second twice. Two of his cross country teams won the PCAA crown (two others were runners-up).

In 1979, Allice went to Long Beach City College. During his tenure (1979-94), his men's teams won the conference championship all 16 years and lost only one dual meet (78-1) in that time. Besides the 11 state crowns (including five in a row), his Vikings had five state runner-up finishes and won 14 Southern California championships (with two second-place finishes). In 1980, his team was selected by Track & Field News as the best junior college team in history. He was named the 1992 Coach of the Year by both the California Community College Coaches Association and the California Coaches Association (CCA). He also coached LBCC's cross country teams, including the 1990 state titlist and the 1991 state runner-up. He was the 1992 CCA Cross Country Coach of the Year.

Allice's achievements have not only been limited to the coaching ranks. He prepped at Long Beach Poly High (where he was a CIF finalist in the 440-yard dash), then went to Long Beach City College before attending Long Beach State, where he set the school record in the 440-yard dash. He was inducted into Long Beach State's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1993.

Allice received his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1962 and his master's in physical education in 1970, both from Long Beach State.

He and his wife, Sharlene, have three children: Lance (31, who is a sports and marketing agent), Melinda (29, a USC graduate who is a director of social services for a large convalescent hospital in the Bay Area) and Sean (22, who is a senior in the USC School of Cinema).

BARBARA EDMONSON **Women's Coach/Sprints**



One of the finest women sprinters of all time, Barbara Edmonson is in her eighth season at USC. She is currently the women's head coach and works with all of USC's sprinters.

Last year, the Women of Troy broke into the elite group at the top of collegiate track and field, finishing fifth at the NCAA Outdoor Championships (and third at the Pacific-10 Conference Championships). In 1997, the Women of Troy finished second at the Pac-10s and beat 10-time defending

NCAA champion LSU in a dual meet on their way to a 14th-place showing at the NCAAs. In 1996, Edmonson helped direct the Women of Troy to their first-ever Pac-10 championship, outlasting UCLA in a dramatic competition at Drake Stadium in Westwood.

Edmonson took control of the women's team in April of 1992 and led the Trojans to a third-place finish in the Pac-10. In 1993, the Women of Troy were fifth in the Pac-10 and finished in a tie for 49th at the NCAAs. In 1994, the Women of Troy, racked by injuries to key personnel, finished fourth in the Pac-10 and 27th at the NCAAs.

Edmonson came to USC in 1991 and in the process became one of the few, if any, female coaches to handle both the men's and women's sprinters at a Division I program.

Edmonson is a former world record holder in the 50m, 100m and 200m and, competing under her maiden name of Ferrell, was a member of the 1968 and 1972 United States Olympic teams. In fact, she was a member of the gold medal-winning 4x100m relay team and also won the 200m silver at the 1968 Olympics in Mexico City. She was recognized for several years as the United States' top performer in her specialties. In addition, Edmonson is a member of the U.S. National Track and Field Hall of Fame (1988 inductee). She is one of 14 Track and Field Hall of Fame members to be associated with USC.

Edmonson, a member of the California Black Sports Hall of Fame, was an elementary teacher in the Los Angeles Unified School District for eight years (1968-76) and continued to compete on an international level for much of her teaching career. In 1976, she moved on to become the United Teachers of Los Angeles union representative. At the same time, she returned to track as a coach for the Beyond Athletics Track Club. In 1980, she stepped up to the college ranks, coaching the sprinters at West Los Angeles Junior College. Edmonson became the head boys' and girls' coach at St. Bernard High in Playa Del Rey, Calif., in 1988 and led both teams to the league title.

She is the wife of past UCLA sprint great Warren Edmonson, the 1972 NCAA 100m champion. Her daughter Malika, who set a USC freshman record in the 400m (53.02) last season, is currently a sophomore on the Women of Troy squad.

JOHN HENRY JOHNSON **Sprints/Decathlon/ Recruiting Coordinator**



John Henry Johnson enters his fifth year as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator. He works specifically with USC's sprinters and decathletes, and is the team's strength coach. Troy's past four men's and women's recruiting classes rank among the best in the nation and bodes well for the future of USC track and field.

Johnson, who was a state champion in the decathlon for Ron Alice at Long Beach City College (1987), also earned

All-Pacific-10 Conference honors while competing at UCLA. After surpassing the 7,000-point mark in the decathlon for the Bruins, he graduated with a degree in international relations in 1990.

A track and football star at West Technical High in Cleveland, Ohio, Johnson became an assistant coach at Long Beach State from 1990-92, where he worked with sprinters and throwers. He also served as a strength coach for the 49ers. In 1993, John studied abroad, spending time in Mexico and Spain, as well as the Center for Intensive Language Studies in Costa Rica.

His father John Henry Johnson, Sr., who played fullback for four NFL teams, was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1987.

Johnson is single and is currently working on his master's degree at USC in international relations.

DAN LANGE **Throws/Heptathlon**



In his ninth year of coaching the Trojan throwers, Dan Lange is one of the nation's most respected teachers. In addition to his duties as throws coach he also serves as the heptathlon coordinator.

The 33-year-old Lange guided former Trojan and 1996 Olympic gold medalist Balazs Kiss to four consecutive NCAA hammer throw championships (and a collegiate record) and aided USC throwers across the board with his vast knowledge in the sport. In 1997, despite the departure of Kiss, Lange made it five in a row, coaching Bengt Johansson to the 1997 NCAA hammer title.

Lange, who has coached athletes to All-American honors 19 times, led Troy's throwers to extremely successful campaigns for the past eight seasons. On the women's side, he has coached Nicole Haynes (the 1996 Pac-10 heptathlon champion and NCAA runner-up) and Leslie Coons (a former American record holder in the hammer).

Lange is also currently coaching U.S. Olympians Todd Reich (javelin) and Adam Setliff (discus).

A four-year letterman at Cal State Northridge and three-time NCAA Division II championship meet qualifier, Lange also earned All-American honors in the hammer.

Lange studied exercise physiology at Cal State Northridge and also works as a sports fitness consultant.

He and his wife Darcy (Arreola), who is one of America's finest middle distance runners and a former NCAA champion, got married this past fall and reside in Valencia, Calif.

TOM WALSH **Women's Cross Country/ Distance Running**



Tom Walsh is in his fifth year as the distance coach and head women's cross country coach at USC.

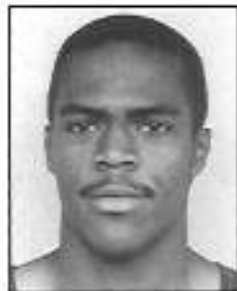
In a short period of time, Walsh has helped rebuild the middle and long distance program at USC into one of the finest squads in the nation.

In 1996 and 1997, Women of Troy distance runners Grazyna Penc and Emebet Shiferaw earned All-American honors in track and field. Shiferaw was the NCAA runner-up in the 3,000m final in

1996 and finished fourth last year. Penc, a three-time All-American and four-time Pacific-10 Conference champion, placed third in the 1,500m at the 1996 NCAA Outdoor Championships, fourth in 1997 and third again last season.

Walsh graduated from USC in 1988, and served as a graduate assistant at USC for three years in the late 1980s. He also served as a track and field consultant for ABC and NBC during the 1988 and 1992 Olympic Trials.

MIKE PULLINS **Jumps**



Mike Pullins is in his first year at USC. His main responsibility is coaching the jumpers on both the men's and women's squads. Pullins was a triple jumper at USC in 1985 and 1987 (he sat out the 1986 season due to injury). He jumped more than 51 feet in 11 of the 12 meets he competed in during the 1985 season and went past 52 feet on six occasions.

He is now attending the Los Angeles Fire Department Academy. Pullins previously worked as an investigator for

the California Bar Association.

EDDIE PERALES **Track & Field Operations**



Eddie Perales is in his third year working with the USC track and field program. Perales, who received his master's degree from USC in 1979, was the head track and field coach at Montebello (Calif.) High from 1993 to 1996.

Perales has worked and coached in every level of education — elementary, junior high, high school and college.

Born on Jan. 11, 1956, he and his daughter Ashley reside in Montebello, Calif.

JOE LANNING **Hurdles**



Joe Lanning is in his first year at USC after coming out of retirement. His main responsibility is coaching the hurdlers on both the men's and women's squads.

Lanning, the former head coach at Long Beach City College, was Ron Alice's mentor in his undergraduate days and later assisted Alice there for 16 years.

During his time as the head coach at Long Beach City College, Lanning won 15 state championships and 22 Southern California titles. In addition, 41 of his

athletes won individual state titles and 60 Southern California championships, including hurdler Earl McCullough, who later became a Trojan and world record holder.

He is a member of the California Community College Track & Field Hall of Fame, and the Long Beach Century Club Hall of Fame.

TYRUS DEMINTER **Men of Troy**



Tyrus Deminter is in his fourth year as a club coach at USC and is the head of the Men of Troy Distance Running Club.

Deminter is a former Junior College All-American and graduated from Long Beach State with a degree in speech communication. He is currently one of the Southern California area's best and most consistent road racers.

His best time in the marathon is 2:19, and he qualified twice for the U.S. Olympic Trials (1988, 1992).

BILL TISDALE **Statistics and Newsletter**

Bill Tisdale, the meet director for all of USC's home meets for the past four years, works on the Trojan Force web site (www.ez2.net/trojanforce) and publishes the Trojan Force Newsletter quarterly. He has been working with Ron Alice for the past 25 years.

Tisdale ran for Long Beach City College in 1954 and returned the next year as a student assistant to Mel Patton. He then followed Patton to the University of Wichita as an assistant coach in 1956. In 1957, he returned to California to assist Jack Rose at Long Beach State. Following two years in the U.S. Army, Tisdale again served as Rose's assistant in 1960.

From 1961 to 1974, Tisdale left the coaching ranks to work in private business. In 1974, he rejoined Rose to help him at the National Track and Field Hall of Fame. At that time, Rose introduced him Ron Alice, and Tisdale has been with him ever since, working as a volunteer assistant.

From 1979 to 1986, Tisdale also served as the SID at Long Beach City College. He and Alice collaborated on "The ARCO Jesse Owens Games Clinic Manual" in 1992.

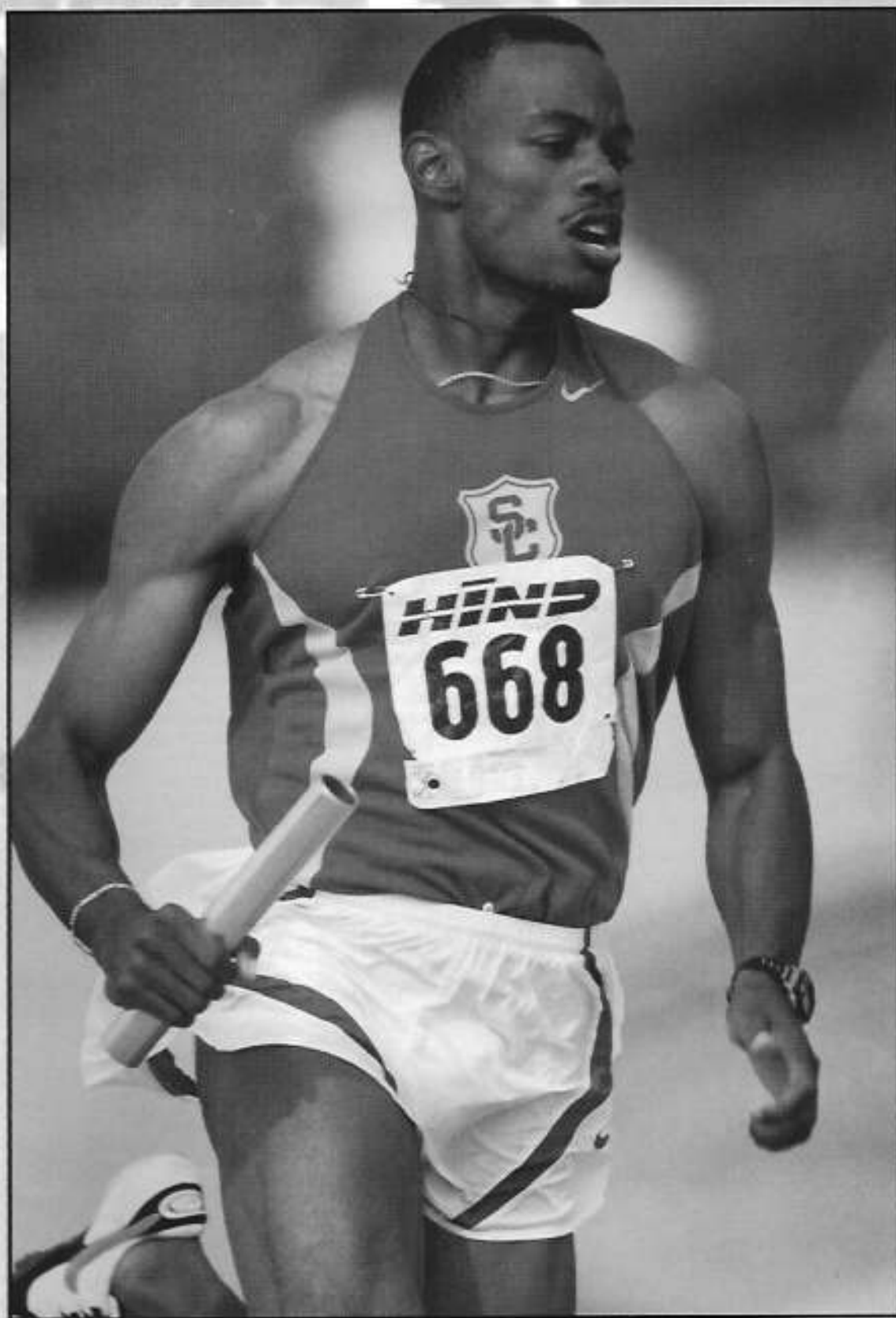
Tisdale is now in semi-retirement in Sun City, Calif.

Paths of Glory

The Story of USC's Unmatched Track & Field History

USC is well known as one of the most successful athletic programs in the history of the NCAA, with 92 men's and women's national championships. The Trojans have won far more NCAA team and individual titles combined than any other university. However, the most dominant force in USC's slate of athletic programs is not the baseball team (12 College World Series titles) or the football squad (eight national championships) but the men's track and field program, with an unprecedented 28 NCAA titles (including nine straight, 1935-43).

Trojan athletes have dominated the track and field scene for decades. From the exploits of sprinter Charlie Paddock and thrower Clarence "Bud" Houser in the 1920s and 1930s, sprinter Mel Patton in the 1940s, thrower Parry O'Brien in the 1950s, sprinter Lennox Miller and pole vaulter Bob Seagren in the 1960s, sprinter Quincy Watts in the 1980s and continuing on to four-time NCAA hammer champion Balazs Kiss (only the fifth collegian to win four in a row) in the 1990s, USC is synonymous with track and field excellence.

THE CROMWELL YEARS: 1909-1948

The roots of Troy's preeminence date back to 1926, when coach Dean Cromwell brought the first NCAA track and field championship to USC. Cromwell, who led the Trojans from 1909-48, also served as head coach of the football team for five seasons. However, the foundation he laid was not on the gridiron but the cinderpaths. Cromwell's track squads won 12

NCAA championships and featured 34 NCAA individual champions. In addition, Cromwell was unanimously selected as head coach of the victorious 1948 U.S. Olympic team, a group which featured five Trojans (Mel Patton, Bob Chambers, Roland Sink, Wilbur Thompson and Cliff Bourland). In fact, Patton, Thompson and Bourland brought home gold medals in their respective events from London, the Olympic site.

From 1935-43, USC experienced a streak of unequalled track and field success. No other university has come close to matching Troy's string of nine consecutive NCAA championships, all under Cromwell's watchful eye. Nicknamed the "Maker of Champions," he fashioned Trojan athletes into a powerhouse. At the 1936 Olympics in Berlin, USC trackmen scored enough points (37 1/2) to have finished among the top five in the world. Cromwell's influence

extended far beyond the USC campus to the corners of the world. He personally tutored champions in every Olympic Games from 1912 to 1948, and upon his retirement in 1949, "The Dean" remained involved as a regular figure in various Southland sporting events until his death in 1962.

TWO JESSES, NINE NATIONAL TITLES: 1949-1961

Jess Hill and Jess Mortensen, both integral parts of USC's proud athletic heritage, carried the track and field torch after Cromwell's retirement. Both men are still considered among the finest all-around athletes in USC history, and their accomplishments did not end after their playing days were over.

Hill, who lettered in three sports at USC (football, baseball and track), served as head coach of Troy's track and field program in 1949 and 1950, leading the Trojans to an undefeated season and national championship in both seasons. From 1951-56, Hill coached the football team, and in 1957, he began his tenure as USC athletic director, a position he held until 1972.

Mortensen's reign at USC also began as an undergraduate. The talented athlete lettered in track, basketball and football, winning the NCAA javelin title as a junior. After a 14-year coaching stint at Riverside Junior College, he returned to become coach of the Trojan track and field team in 1951, leading Troy to seven NCAA championships in his 11-year tenure. Mortensen's Trojan teams never lost a dual meet, going 79-0 between 1951 and 1961. He developed some of Troy's best-known track men, including Parry O'Brien and Max Truex. Sadly, "Mort" died suddenly at the age of 54 from complications caused by a blood clot. Hill, his longtime friend and teammate, stepped in as interim head coach for the 1962 season, and a new chapter in Trojan track and field history was about to begin.

THE WOLFE YEARS: 1963-1984

The prospect of succeeding three consecutive coaching legends would be a difficult task for anyone, but Vern Wolfe answered the challenge.

During his 21 years at the helm of the Trojan track and field program, USC captured five outdoor NCAA championships, including back-to-back titles in 1967 and 1968. A former pole vaulter for Cromwell's Trojan teams, Wolfe also won indoor titles in 1967 and 1972. At the time of his retirement in 1984, he was the third-winningest coach in U.S. track history, all despite reductions in scholarships and the lack of a top-flight on-campus facility.

Wolfe, who competed in senior events as a pole vaulter, attacked all problems with a straight-ahead approach. He continued to win throughout his career and towards the end oversaw the modernization of Cromwell Field, USC's track facility which served as a training site for the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles. And so, after 21 years on the job, Wolfe retired and gave way to Ernie Bullard.

BULLARD AND BUSH: 1985-94

Another in the line of former Trojan athletes to become head coaches at USC, Ernie Bullard came to Troy from San Jose State, where he helped build the Spartans into a national contender. It didn't take long for Bullard to continue Troy's winning ways, recruiting athletes like sprinter Quincy Watts, a two-time gold medalist at the 1992 Olympic Games.

Jim Bush was the man picked to replace longtime friend Bullard in 1991. After all, who better to rebuild the USC program than the man who guided UCLA to five national championships?

Bush helped stabilize the program and recruited some of Troy's stars, like Balazs Kiss of Hungary, the 1993, 1994, 1995 and 1996 NCAA champion in the hammer throw. Consequently, he helped lay the foundation for the latest in the distinguished line of Trojan head track coaches: Ron Alice.

RON ALLICE, THE NEW ERA: 1995 —

Ron Alice, who prior to the 1995 season was named the Director of Track and Field for USC's combined men's and women's program, is no stranger to success. He has distinguished himself at every level of competition, all in the Southland, and is well-known not only as a master builder, but a man who can keep a program at the highest level year after year.

Alice came to Troy with impeccable credentials: 11 state championships in 16 years at Long Beach (Calif.) City College, where his 1980 squad was called "the best junior college team in history" by Track & Field News. During his tenure at Long Beach C.C., his teams lost just one dual meet.

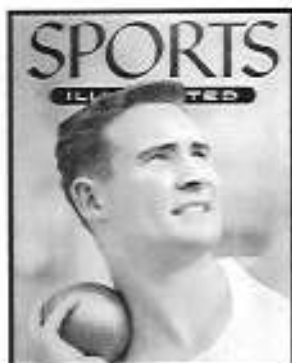
He quickly went to work, guiding the USC men's team to a fourth-place finish at the 1995 NCAA Outdoor Championships. In 1996, his Women of Troy won their first-ever Pac-10 title. In 1997, he led the Trojan men's team to its

first Pac-10 title since 1977 and a third-place showing at the 1997 NAAs. At last year's NAAs, he led the USC men's team to seventh-place and the Women of Troy to fifth (as a combined men's and women's program, that performance was the best in school history).

Alice has a career dual meet record of 171-29-1 at five schools, and he has coached more than 200 All-Americans, 16 Olympians, four world record holders and seven American record holders. He takes the storied history of USC track and field very seriously.

"I have a mandate to bring this program to its rightful place," Alice said. "This university is a special place to us all, and we are ready to add another chapter to USC's illustrious history."

Now ready to return to the heights of athletic achievement, USC track and field, as has been the case for nearly a century, is in good hands.

Early in the spring of 1966, USC assistant track coach Willie Wilson was found to have terminal cancer. USC's two-mile relay of John Link, Dennis Carr, Bruce Bess and Dave Buck vowed to give him something special to remember and ran 7:17.4 to set a new world record at the Los Angeles Coliseum on May 13, 1966.

Was a Track & Field News High School All-American in both the 200m and 400m ... Ran the nation's second-fastest time in the 200m (23.47) ... Won the state championship in the 100m and 200m and ran the second-fastest 400m time in the country (52.95) as a junior in 1996. **PERSONAL:** Malika was born in Melbourne, Australia, on April, 13, 1979 ... Finished fourth at the Pac-10s in the 100m and eighth in the 200m, while fighting a hip injury. **1996:** Had the best freshman season in Women of Troy history ... Won both the 100m (11.48 - 11th fastest time in the world at the time) and 200m (23.1h) Pac-10 titles and set USC freshman records in both events (she ran a 23.60 in the 200m during qualifying) ... Anchored USC's 400m relay team, which ran a 44.26 at the NCAA's (sixth place), and was on the 1,600m relay team that finished second (3:38.75) at the Pac-10s ... The 1998 USC Women of Troy Cross Country Team

The USC women's cross country nearly broke into the Top 10 at the 1998 NCAA West Regional Championships at Woodward Park in Fresno, Calif., finishing 11th with 334 points. Junior Grazyna Penc led the way for the Women of Troy, placing 10th in 17:14 (5:33 mile pace). Fellow juniors Anna Lopaciuch and Kristie Johnston finished 22nd (17:48) and 44th (18:16), respectively.

At the 1998 Pacific-10 Conference at Alton Baker Park in Eugene, Ore., the Women of Troy finished seventh, beating eighth-place UCLA at the conference meet for the first time in history. Penc (seventh, 17:41) and Lopaciuch (eighth, 17:43) both finished in the Top 10 to lead USC.

Penc also won the individual title at the UC San Diego Triton Invitational with a time of 17:42 (six seconds ahead of runner-up Lopaciuch), leading the Women of Troy to a second-place team finish.

Senior Tina Kefalas, sophomores Brigita Langerholm and Katie McGraw, and freshman Erika Hanson also made major contributions in 1998.

Lopaciuch, who carries a 4.0 GPA as an international relations major, was also named to the Pac-10 All-Academic first team (Penc earned second team honors).

Things look very bright for the Trojans and their fifth-year coach Tom Walsh, as they lose only one senior from this past year's team. They will have everyone else back as they look to improve on their strong cross country showings of 1997 and 1998.

In 1997, the Women of Troy were the most improved team in the toughest conference in the nation — the Pac-10. USC won three of the six invitationals that it competed in, taking the team title at meets hosted by Biola, UC San Diego and Pepperdine. The Women of Troy then placed 13th at the District VIII Meet in Tucson, Ariz.



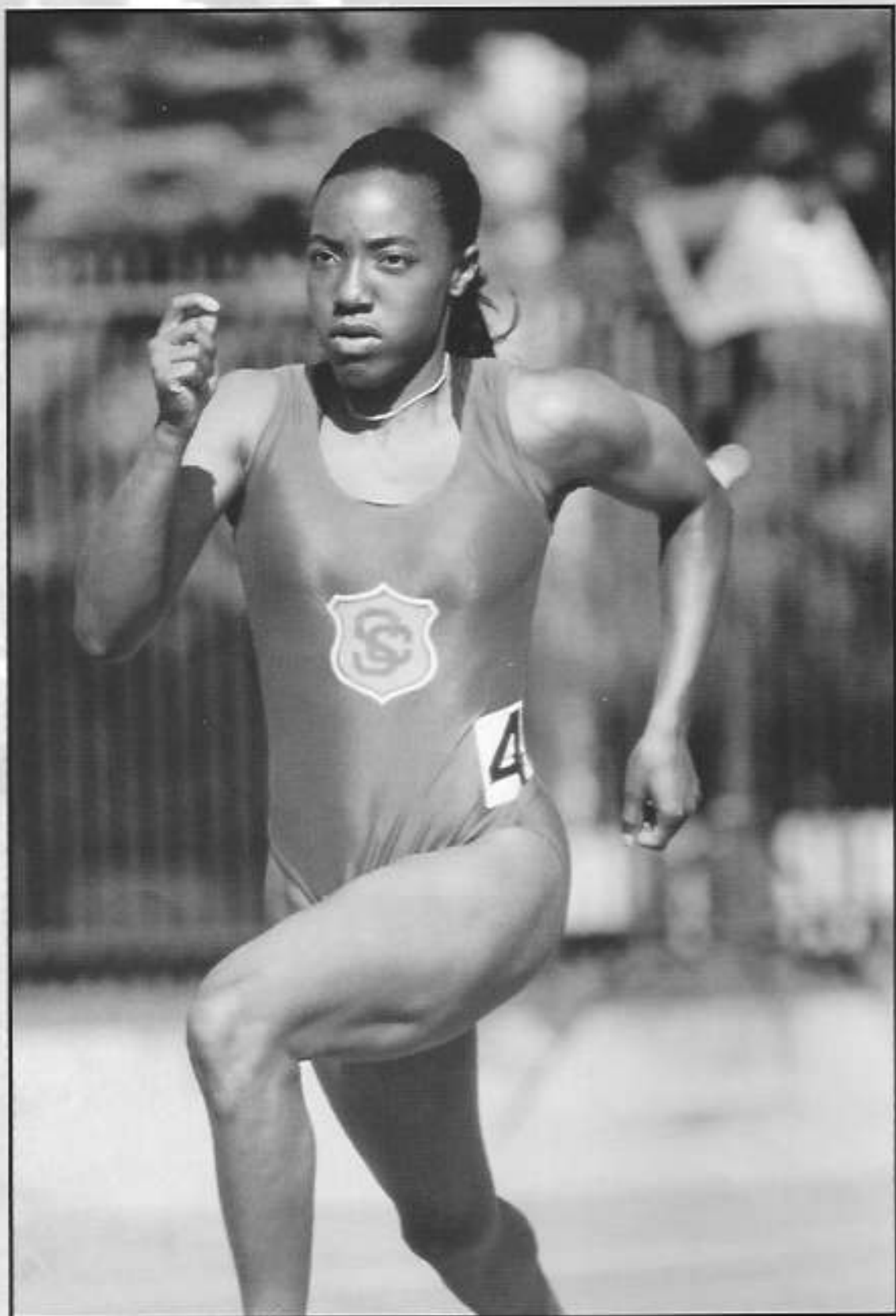

DEAN CROMWELL TRACK & FIELD KATHERINE B. LOKER STADIUM



Cromwell Track & Field, which is named after legendary Trojan coach Dean Cromwell who led USC track teams to 12 NCAA Championships, will soon be expanded to include a new 3,000-seat stadium (complete with offices and locker rooms), which will be named after Katherine B. Loker, who made the project possible through a generous gift to the University. Construction is expected to begin this June.

Cromwell Track & Field was used as a training and warm-up facility during the 1984

Olympic Games in Los Angeles. It underwent a complete refurbishing in fall of 1983. Not only was the track resurfaced, but the high jump area was expanded, two new sand pits for the horizontal jumps were installed and a new drainage system was also added.

The track's Rekortan surface, the same one that was installed for the Olympic competition at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum, has eight, 42-inch lanes.

In the summer of 1991, the track was

resurfaced again.

Cromwell Track & Field Stadium had been renovated in 1979, but all that remains from the first facelift is the equipment storeroom and weightroom on the track's southwest perimeter.

Cromwell Track & Field Stadium was the site of the first USC-UCLA Dual Meet held on the USC campus in 1995. The meet was also held there in 1997 and the Trojans and Bruins will meet at Cromwell again this season on May 1.

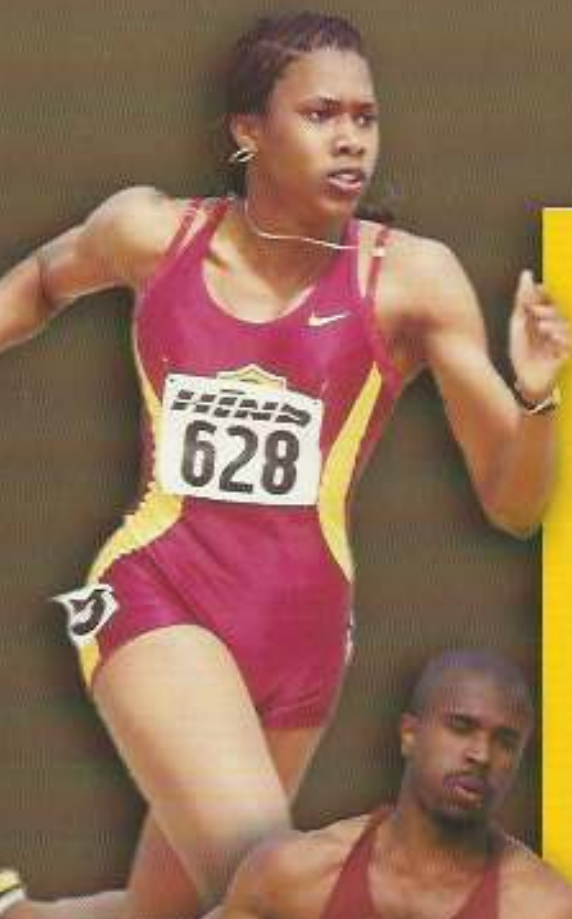

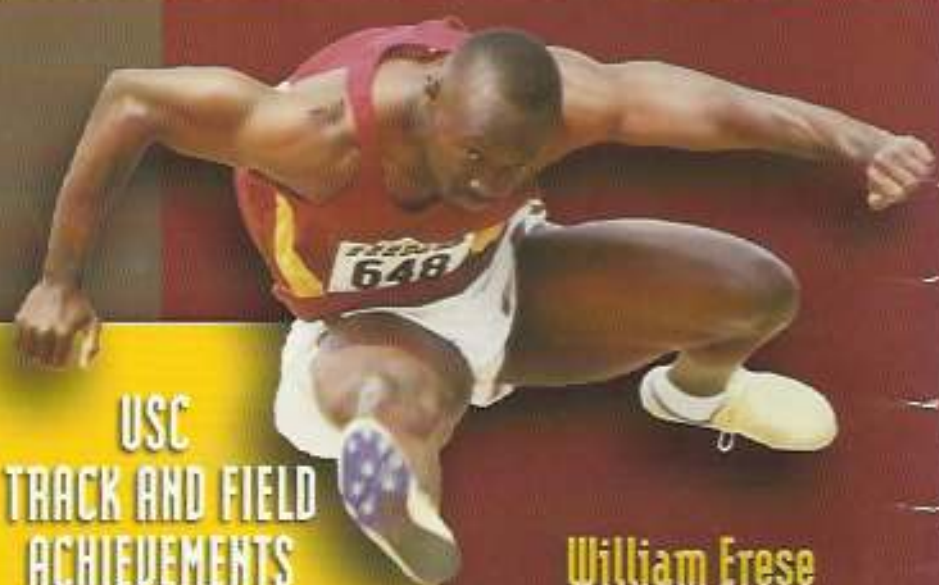
