1955 Varsity Prospects

The 1955 SC track and field team will be a powerful dual meet outfit, a strong national entry and a good bet to win the National Collegiates for the seventh year in a row.

Coach Jess Mortensen will find it hardest to replace the '54 co-captains, Jim Lea and Will Wright. Lea won the NCAA 440 for the second straight year and tied the school record of 46.6 in winning the National AAU. Wright was a close second in the NCAA high hurdles and had a best time of 14.0. Otherwise, Mort has 28-17-20 points returning from the winning total of 66-17-20 that took last year's title at Ann Arbor. These are represented by Ernie Shelton, defending high jump champion; Jon Arnett, second in broad jump; Des Koch, second in discus; Mike Larrabee, fifth in 440; Walt Levack, tie for fifth in pole vault; Jack Findley, tie for sixth in high jump.

A healthy Howard Bugbee will give the Trojans one of the nation's top sprinters. Bugbee, after returning from a Coast Guard hitch, ran 9.7 and 21.0 early in the year, then hurt a leg and was not at his best up to the time he was forced to quit for the year. He's strong and powerful and toughest in the furlong. Behind him is Chuck Swinden, Santa Ana JC transfer. Chuck did 9.7 and 21.0 two years ago and didn't run last year. Also available are Pat Coyle and Darryl Ellingson.

Mike Larrabee, surprise NCAA placer and a much-improved runner, heads the 440. He did 47.8 last season and was off slowly because of mononucleosis. Behind him are Lanny Quigley, Howard Smith, Ellingson and Darel Griffin. Quigley was hurt most of last year but did run a 48.9 relay leg. Smith has run a relay in 48.3. Ellingson is a 9.7 and 21.3 prep sprint star who is moving up; and Griffin ran 48.7 two years ago.

The 880 lost its best man when Sophomore Murray Coburn was hit by the same disease that almost felled Larrabee last year. He set a new frosh record of 1:52.7 a year ago. Returnee Bill Taylor has done 1:54.1 and should show good improvement. Others include Marshall Clark (1:57.0) from Muir JC, Bert Purdue (1:56.7) from the frosh and Phil White (1:57.8 relay), also from the freshman.

Fernando Ledesma should shake the case of "sophomoritis" that plagued him last year and go to be a top distance runner. He did do 4:12.9 and 9:10.6 last season but was an up-and-down performer. Marty Montgomery, 4:14.2, and with lots of potential, plus Sid Wing, Fullerton JC transfer, back up Ledesma.

Two-milers Dave Bungay (9:29.8) and Dick Adams (9:34.5) are back for what should be their best year. Ledesma will also run here and Sophomore Chuck Tobias (9:54.8) might be a surprise.

No real experienced high hurdler is available to step in for Wright. Floyd Jeter, the great high jumper, ran 14.6 at East Los Angeles JC last year and he might be the best. Sophomore Wayne Bithell (14.9) was hurt most of the frosh year but seems to have the greatest potential. John Morgan (14.9) may catch fire in his last season.

Large Leon Clarke, the rugged football end, returns to the low hurdles after a year's absence. He's done 23.6 and should go faster. Ron Loy (23.9) is also available, as is Morgan, who ran 23.1 with the Texas wind.

The high jump is a loaded event with Shelton, Jeter, Findley and Rock Burgoyne. Shelton eased over 6'11" last year, figures to go

7 feet or better this year and is unbeaten in 55 straight meets. Findley has a 6'5 $\frac{3}{4}$ " jump. Jeter set a National JC record of 6'8 $\frac{3}{4}$ " last year. Sophomore Burgoyne is a respectable 6'3 $\frac{3}{4}$ " man. Jon Arnett is a likely NCAA broad jump winner off his 24'8 $\frac{3}{4}$ " leap, which earned him a second last year. Behind him there is little. Smith has done 22'6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " and could help, and Jim Kaufman, up from the frosh, should improve on his 22'1 $\frac{1}{2}$ ".

Five good pole vaulters are available, with Ron Morris, the frosh record breaker, and Walt Leveck, varsity returnee, leading the group. Morris has done 14'1", and Leveck 14'5 $\frac{3}{8}$ ". Twig Chambers, with a best of 13', looks like he'll be close to the 14' mark too. Others are Leroy Cox (13'9") and Dick Richards (13'6").

Ray Martin, Valley JC transfer, will be one of the best in collegiate ranks. He fired one 55'2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " in early February. Gridder Chuck Griffith looks good for 52'. Versatile Des Koch returns to the discus, where he won NCAA runnerup honors and did 177'5 $\frac{1}{2}$ ". Behind him is Howard Smith, 160'6" and a potential near 170-footer.

Koch is the leading javelinist with a 213' mark and he'll be supported by Bob Voiles, ex-frosh, who looks like a comer. Doug Majjala, last year's best until he was hurt, is staying out to let his sore elbow fully heal.

The mile relay team will sorely miss Lea but may still be a top combo. Larrabee, Quigley and Smith look to be three-fourths of the foursome, with Ellingson, Taylor and Griffin the top contenders for the other place.

All in all, it looks like a successful season is in store. The usual one or two surprises that come from nowhere to stardom on SC track teams should strengthen the depth situation in needy events.

TROJAN CHAMPIONS AND RECORD HOLDERS

WORLD RECORDS: 44 SC trackmen have equalled or bettered world records since 1912. The names of 10 Trojans—Mel Patton, Dick Attlessey, Parry O'Brien, Lee LaFond, Mickey Anderson, Payton Jordan, Adrian Talley, George Pasquall, Ron Frazier and Norm Stocks—appear in the current record book.

OLYMPIC GAMES: SC trackmen have won 12 individual Olympic titles and have shared in nine relay victories. 35 men have won a total of 57 places on United States Olympic teams. Three Olympic records are currently held by SC men: Jack Davis, high hurdles; Parry O'Brien, shot put; and Sim Iness, discus.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS: SC has won 18 out of 25 NCAA meets competed in since its beginning in 1921. On five occasions they have finished second. The Trojans won nine in a row (1935-1943) and the last six straight (1949-1954). A total of 49 individual championships and seven current meet records highlight the record.

NATIONAL AAU CHAMPIONSHIPS: SC men have won 45 senior titles since 1905 and 35 individual junior championships before the meet was discontinued after 1951.

IC4A CHAMPIONSHIPS: SC competed thirteen times from 1924 to 1939, winning on nine occasions. The Trojans won 37 individual championships and still hold two meet records although membership was resigned following the 1939 meet.

PACIFIC COAST CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIPS: SC has been undefeated in the meet since 1928, and has won the last 14 times. This included 95 individual championships while 8 of the 15 meet records are held by SC.

BIOGRAPHIES

DICK ADAMS, two-mile

HS: Salem, Ore., 1951. Ran mile in 4:25.8 for his best high school effort. Eligible for the varsity as a frosh but had only slight success. Turned in 9:37.0 two-mile as a soph before injured foot sidelined him for the year. Improved to 9:34.5 at the end of his junior season. Called the "Horse" by teammates.

JON ARNETT, broad jump

HS: Manual Arts (Los Angeles), 1952. Jon was an upset winner in the Los Angeles City high school meet at 23'8¾" despite a painful leg that threatened to keep him out of the competition. Leaped 23'11" as a Trobabe. Had six meets over 23' mark. Last year as a sophomore he got in two meets before reporting to spring practice which caused him to begin all over in mid-April. Jumped in two meets while out for football and fell below 22'. Got back in stride in May and won PCC crown at 24'6¾" and then came from fourth in prelims to gain second in NCAA with best leap of 24'8¾". Found himself a non-qualifying eighth in final round of prelims but passed four men to make finals. Knee injured in football last fall may get him off to a slow start but is sturdy-legged and should recover satisfactorily. Has great competitive attitude. Should better 25' this spring. WAYNE BITHELL, high and low hurdles

HS: South (Salt Lake City, Ut.), 1953. Wayne was twice State champion in the hurdles with 14.9 and 19.8 bests. Got off to a good start as a frosh with 14.9 and 24.4 races in third meet. Pulled a muscle the following week and was out for three weeks before returning for two meets, including a double against UCLA. At Fresno he pulled it again quite badly and was through for the year. Now fully recovered.

HOWARD BUGBEE, 100 and 220.

HS: Redondo, 1948. Howard was an All-America high school sprinter in the century. Recorded best marks of 9.6 and 21.2 with wind-aided clockings of 9.5 and 21.0. Won the CIF (So. Section)

100, took third in the 220 and placed second and fourth in the State meet. Attended Stanford as a frosh in '49, transferred to SC and put in a year of residence before going into the Coast Guard in 1951. Returned last year after a three-year hitch and started off extremely fast. Raced a 21.0 furlong around a turn at Tucson and won the Oxy century in 9.7. From that time he was hobbled with a bad leg but continued to run amazingly well. After running a pair of fine legs in winning 440 and 880 baton events over Texas in the Coliseum Relays, he broke down. Was unable to run in the PCC or NCAA, where he would have been a 220 title contender if healthy.

DAVE BUNGAY, two-mile

HS: Glendale, 1951. Dave ran the mile in 4:41.2 as a prep and went to Glendale JC as a frosh, where he concentrated on two-mile. Ran second in State JC meet with best of 9:51.6. Illness slowed him down as soph and he ran only 9:56.4. Showed fine improvement last spring and won Stanford meet in 9:29.8, his best. Also ran a 4:18.7 mile at Modesto.

MARSHALL CLARK, 880

HS: South Pasadena, 1950. Marshall was only a class B runner as a prep with a 660 best of 1:30.5. Last year at Muir JC, after returning from the Coast Guard, he got down to 1:57.0 in Conference meet.

LEON CLARKE, low hurdles

HS: Venice, 1951. Leon took the Western League title in 19.6 but a twisted ankle kept him from placing in All-City meet. As a frosh eligible for the varsity he earned a letter with a best of 23.9. Though running behind Jack Davis as a sophomore, he turned in a 23.6 and placed fourth in the PCC. Head injury kept him out last year.

LEROY COX, pole vault

HS: Franklin (Portland, Ore.), 1948. Leroy was All-City champion and had a best vault of 12'9". As a frosh he went 12'6", was ineligible as a sophomore and couldn't break into the meet scoring the following year. His best vault in 1952 was a 13'9" effort to win the Texas-Texas A&M triangular and he tied for sixth in the NCAA. He returned last fall after two years in the Air Force.

PAT COYLE, 100 and 200

HS: Redondo, 1952. Pat sprinted 9.8 and 21.5 as a high schooler but failed to place in CIF (So. Section) finals. Ran non-winning 9.7 and 21.4 races as frosh and reached finals in West Coast Relays 100, though unplaced. Turned in 9.8 and 21.7 times in few appearances and won points in Oxy, Stanford, California and UCLA meets.

DARRYL ELLINGSON, 100 and 220

HS: Dorsey (Los Angeles), 1953. Darryl was Los Angeles City sprint titlist and placed second in both State meet races, his best times being 9.7 and 21.3. As a frosh he ran 9.9 in the third meet, pulled up two weeks later against Oxy and was through for the year. Is big and strong and seemingly has the stuff to run a fine 440.

JACK FINDLEY, high jump

HS: Glendale, 1951. Jack had a prep jump of 6'2" but was not considered a top prospect. Didn't compete in his first two years but last year was "drafted" for high jump after the basketball team returned from the NCAA playoff. He began at 6' and improved steadily to a 6'5¾" leap in the Coliseum Relays and a tie for sixth in the NCAA.

CHUCK GRIFFITH, shot put

HS: Placer (Auburn), 1952. Chuck won the Sac-Joaquin section title with a best prep toss of 53'6". Before reporting for spring practice he put 48'½" as a freshman in 1953. Didn't compete last year but won the Inter-Fraternity shot put by putting the 12-pound shot 59'9½" without benefit of practice or a hop. Put 16-pounder 50 feet in practice early this season.

FLOYD JETER, high hurdles and high jump

HS: Roosevelt (Los Angeles), 1952. Floyd was a good prep athlete with a 14.8 high hurdle mark and a 6'4¼" high jump. At East Los Angeles JC as a freshman he jumped 6'7⅞" and ran the highs in 15.2. Last year he improved to 6'8¾" to break Conny Johnson's National JC record. This came in the National AAU when he placed second to Ernie Shelton. He improved his high hurdle time to 14.6. Floyd is expected to rank behind Ernie in collegiate ranks and may be SC's top high hurdler.

DES KOCH, discus and javelin

HS: Reed (Shelton, Wash.), 1950. Des tossed the prep platter 165'10" and won All-America high school honors in the event. As a frosh he turned in weight marks of 47'10¼", 151'6" and 178'11". Moving up to the varsity he improved to 49'9", 166'3" and 181'2". He placed third in the PCC discus behind Sim Iness and Parry O'Brien and seventh in the NCAA in 1952. The pair returned the following year so Des decided to stay out of competition. Though only semi-active that season he improved to 166'10⅝". Coming back to competition as a Trojan last year he became the greatest collegiate three-event thrower in history with marks of 52', 177'5¼" and 213'. Won the PCC title and placed second in the NCAA. Threw javelin only twice after great 213' cast at Berkeley that beat Cal's Dick Richter on final throw.

MIKE LARRABEE, 440

HS: Ventura, 1952. Mike was a prep sprinter with 10.1 and 21.5 bests and placed third in CIF (So. Section) 220. Best quarter was a modest 51.2. First Trababe run was 51.4 but wound up year with breezing 49.0 at UCLA. Ran 220 in 21.2 in same meet. Got a late start last season as a siege of mononucleosis threatened to keep him out entirely. Races through mid-April were disappointing and it wasn't until late May that he could run a good relay leg after the open quarter. Placed fourth in the PCC and almost didn't go to NCAA. At Ann Arbor he shocked all with a 47.9 semi-final race and followed it up with a 47.8 that was good for fifth in the finals.

FERNANDO LEDESMA, mile and two-mile

HS: Compton, 1952. Fernando won State meet in record 4:23.2 as senior after having placed second as junior. Broke both fresh distance records with 4:16.8 and 9:16.4 runs. Anchored sprint

medley team to National Freshman record with 1:56.1 stint. Was an off-and-on performer last spring while dividing time in both races. Managed three sterling efforts, which saved the year. Ran a fine 3:02.3 1320 at Modesto in medley relay and followed up the next week with a 9:10.6 two-mile in the PCC behind Denny Meyer's record run. After the heat forced him and many others to drop out of the NCAA two-mile, Ledesma ran a sparkling 4:12.9 for fourth in the National AAU to whip such men as Russ Bonham, Bob Seaman and Bill Squires.

WALT LEVACK, pole vault

HS: Manual Arts (Los Angeles), 1952. Good high school vaulter at 12'9". Did 13'6" four times as frosh. As sophomore had best of 14'½", a tie for second in the PCC and a tie for fifth in the NCAA. Is considerably stronger this year and ready for 14'6".

RAY MARTIN, shot put and discus

HS: Van Nuys, 1953. Ray took the All-City meet with his prep best of 58'. Tossed the 16-pound weight 49'2" in open competition that year. Spent his frosh year at Valley JC, where he was undefeated in JC competition, dimaxing the season with a National JC record of 53'8½". Beat UCLA Frosh Don Vick twice in seven meetings. Also threw the discus 147'2". After he and Coach Martensen worked with a new form and corrected many faults, Ray produced a great 55'½" put in an early AAU meet on February 5 of this year. Considering that Parry O'Brien didn't better 55' until late April as a soph and only twice during the year, it would appear that Ray has quite a future.

MARTY MONTGOMERY, mile

HS: Chaffey (Ontario), 1950. Marty ran a 4:28.4 mile for his prep best and placed fourth in the State meet. Improved to 4:25.9 as a frosh and ran fast 1320 on distance medley team that set National Frosh record. Cut time to 4:20.8 as a sophomore and then was ineligible in 1953. Came back last season to run 4:14.2 against UCLA and placed third in the PCC meet.

RON MORRIS, pole vault

HS: Burroughs (Burbank), 1953. Ron was twice State high school champion. Broke a 14-year-old National Interscholastic mark with 13'11⅝", won the SPAAAU title at 13'11½" while in high school. Broke Trababe record with a 14'1" climb but injured an ankle the following week and wasn't the same after that. Missed the National Frosh record by one inch. Also topped 14' in the Coliseum Relays and Compton Invitational. Is lots stronger and looks ready for 14'6".

LANNY QUIGLEY, 440

HS: Downey, 1953. Lanny was a good 440 man as a schoolboy with a 50.2 mark. After running a few frosh meets with a bad foot he discovered a broken bone and had to lay off for a month. Upon his return he was unable to place in dual meets and ran poorly. However, he kept working and showed his true potential with a 48.9 relay carry at Modesto.

ERNIE SHELTON, high jump

HS: Washington (Los Angeles), 1951. Ernie was a standout high school jumper with two marks of 6'5⅞" and three others of 6'5". Placed second in National Junior AAU. Spent frosh year at Valley JC where he won State JC meet and jumped 6'4½". Off slowly as a sophomore in 1953, he hit his stride with a 6'7½" jump at Fresno and then defeated Walt Davis the next week in the Coliseum Relays with 6'7¾". Wound up a fourth in NCAA meet when a heel spike on his jumping shoe broke off while attempting the winning height. Redeemed himself the following

Tuesday at Ann Arbor in the PCC-Big Ten meet with a 6'9 $\frac{3}{4}$ " ascent to break Johnny Wilson's school record. Tied for second in the National AAU behind Davis' world record and since has been unbeaten in 55 straight outdoor meets. Toured Europe two summers, with 22 meets in 1953 (better than 6'7 $\frac{1}{2}$ " average) and eight meets in 1954 (6'8 $\frac{3}{4}$ " average). Defeated Sweden's Bengt Nilsson in all five meetings. Average for 34 meets last year was 6'8 $\frac{3}{4}$ ". Cleared 6'11" in an All-Comers meet at John Muir College for a new Trojan record and has jumped 6'10" or better nine times—more than anyone else in history. Took the NCAA with 6'10 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", the PCC-Big Ten at 6'10 $\frac{1}{2}$ " and the National AAU at 6'9 $\frac{3}{4}$ ". Shelton believes he cleared 7 feet in NCAA. When gust of wind knocked off bar as he was landing in pit. Goal for this year is 7'2".

HOWARD SMITH, 440 and discus

HS: Marshall (Los Angeles), 1951. Howard was an average high school hurdler with 15.8 and 20.6 times, ran no 440's. Took up the discus at Los Angeles City College, where he did 143'11" in second year. Best relay leg was 49.5. Came to SC last season and improved to 160'6", placed fourth in the PCC meet and ran many fine relay laps, including best of 48.3 in Coliseum Relays. Best of few open 440's was 49.4. Could be help in broad jump, where he has reached 22'6 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", and should be close to 170' with the disc.

CHUCK SWINDEN, 100 and 220

HS: Lincoln (San Jose), 1948. Chuck was a mediocre prep sprinter with bests of 10.3 and 23.2. After high school he went into the Marines and did some good running at El Toro. Following his discharge he went to Santa Ana JC in 1953 and turned in marks of 9.7 and 21.0. Hurt leg after winning heat in 9.7 at Fresno and was sub-par for the rest of the year. Stayed out of competition last year.

BILL TAYLOR, 880

HS: North Hollywood, 1951. Bill was a mediocre prep 880 man with a best time of 2:06.9. Went to Valley JC where he improved to 2:00.0. Made a big drop in his second JC season to 1:54.7. Bad cold hit him last year when he appeared primed for top effort. Finest race was upset win of Cal's Lon Spurrier at Berkeley, while fastest was 1:52.8 relay stint at Modesto. Ran best open 880 of 1:54.7 at Compton. Showed fine improvement in cross-country and was elected team captain.

SID WING, mile

HS: Hollywood, 1948. Sid had a best of 4:37.0 as a prep. After a tour in the Army he ran at Fullerton JC last year and placed second in the State JC meet with his best mark of 4:27.4. A hard worker and very fast, he may be the big surprise of the distance runners.

Coaching Staff

HEAD COACH JESS MORTENSEN

In his fifth season as SC's track and field coach, Jess Mortensen has won four straight NCAA titles and has not lost a meet of any kind.

One of Troy's greatest all-around athletes in the 1927-30 period, Mort took over the head coaching duties in 1951 when Jess Hill was made head football coach. He was serving in a similar position at West Point at the time.

Born in Thatcher, Arizona, on April 16, 1907, he attended Gila Academy and Gila Junior College where he had a fine athletic record. Competing in football, basketball and track, he once scored 26 points in a single afternoon in the 100, high hurdles, high jump, shot put, discus and javelin.

He won two letters in football at SC, as a right halfback, playing behind Lloyd Thomas in 1928 and Erny Pinckert in 1929. As a cager he earned three awards and was an All-PCC choice in 1928, his sophomore year.

As a trackman he lettered in 1928-30 as a javelin thrower. Though a sore arm hampered him in his first season, he got off a throw of 203'7 $\frac{3}{4}$ " to win the NCAA in 1929. The following year he captained the team, finished third in the NCAA and won the National AAU with his all-time best of 204'11 $\frac{3}{4}$ ".

Mort also won fame as a decathlon man, placing fifth in the Final Olympic Tryouts in '28. In 1931, while coaching at Riverside JC, he competed in his last decathlon and won the National AAU title at Lincoln, Nebraska, with a world record tally of 8166.663 (under the old point table which has since been revised three times.) That is worth 6545, on the current scoring table.

Following that performance he was declared ineligible for further amateur competition because of his coaching position and therefore lost a chance to compete in the 1932 Olympic Games in which he had an excellent chance to win.

He handled football, basketball, baseball and track while at Riverside during his fourteen year stint, taking time off during World War II to serve as a physical education instructor for the Navy. He was discharged in 1946 as a lieutenant (senior grade).

Upon return to Riverside he was appointed dean of men and resumed his duties as head football coach. Probably his most famous track athlete at Riverside was Clyde Jeffrey, the great sprinter who tied the world's record of 9.4 at Stanford in 1940. Jeffrey anchored an 880 relay team of Havis Bess, Finley Culpepper and Bryant Allen that set a still-existing JC record of 1:25.6.

In 1947 he moved to the University of Denver as frosh football and head track coach. Mortensen turned out two unbeaten frosh grid teams. He also gave Denver its first Skyline Conference track championship in 1949 and developed Jerome Biffie, NCAA broad jump champion in 1950 and Olympic Games winner at Helsinki.

From there he went to West Point in a similar capacity in January, 1950. In his only season at the Point he developed the late Dick Shea, an outstanding distance and cross-country runner. Then, when his longtime friend and coaching partner Jess Hill was named to replace the late Jeff Cravath, Mort returned home in February, 1951.

No doubt one of his biggest thrills was at the Olympic Games in Helsinki where he watched four of his Trojans win medals, including Gold Medals by Sim Iness in the discus and Parry O'Brien in the shot put, both with new Olympic records. High hurdler Jack Davis was a Silver Medal winner, Art Barnard won a Bronze Medal in the same race while ex-pupil Biffle also was a Gold Medal winner.

Jess is married to the former Irene Ross of Riverside, and they have two children—Anne 16 and Ross 13. They live in South Pasadena.

ASSISTANT COACH WILL WRIGHT

Will is volunteering his services as freshman coach as he intends to represent the Los Angeles Athletic Club and continue his hurdling this spring.

Wright was runnerup in last year's NCAA high hurdles to Illinois' Willard Thomson in a very close finish. He ran his best race in getting second to Jack Davis at Compton when he turned in a 14 flat performance behind Davis' 13.6.

He came to SC from Redlands High School where he had best marks of 14.2 and 19.3. As a frosh he ran 14.7 and 23.8.

Though his high school times were good, Will was not considered a top prospect because of his lack of ground speed. Whereas the top hurdlers were all 10 flat or better men, Wright's best time for the 100 has never improved beyond 10.4. He has overcome lack of speed with near-perfect form and plenty of hard work.

He was fifth in the NCAA as a soph. Though unplaced in the NCAA as a junior, he finished fifth in the National AAU. Last year after a slow start he came on to run top races in May, dead-heated for the PCC title, placed second in the NCAA and third in the AAU.

As coach of the Trojan hurdlers he'll have a willing but untried group. If he can impart some of his knowledge, then it will not be one of the Trojans' questionable events.

FRESHMAN COACH JIM LEA

Jim is coaching the freshmen on a voluntary basis this year so that he may retain his amateur standing. He is considered a strong contender for the Olympic Games 400-meter title next year at Melbourne.

Lea was a two-time NCAA 440 winner and co-captain of last year's team with Will Wright. In addition to the collegiate championships he won the National AAU crown last June in 46.6 to tie Hubie Kerns' thirteen-year-old school record, and was undefeated all season.

He came to SC from Seattle's Roosevelt High School where he was a 9.8 and 21.1 sprinter but had never run the 440. After a very successful freshman season in those events Mort decided to make a quartermiler out of him.

His success was not immediate, his best 440 time prior to the 1952 NCAA being a modest 48.5 and he hadn't made the trip to the PCC meet. As the meet was in Berkeley he went along for experience and surprised everyone by running a bangup third behind George Rhoden and Ollie Matson in 47.2 (for 400 meters).

A certainty to be selected on the Pan-American Games team, Jim has set his sights on the world record of 46 flat this year and with his added strength he feels that he can do it.

FRESHMAN PROSPECTS

If high school records mean anything, SC should have one of its strongest frosh teams in history. Co-coached by Jim Lea and Will Wright, 1954's co-captains, the Trobables engage in the toughest schedule ever offered a yearling team, and lack of depth in certain events may be responsible for a few losses.

In Long Beach, Compton, Santa Ana and Mt. San Antonio the team will face the four strongest junior college teams in the State. In addition, traditional meets with potent frosh teams from Occidental and UCLA spice the schedule.

A host of sprint candidates—none outstanding—is available, the three best being Dan Sweet, Syd Field and Dave Peterson. Sweet (10.2, 22.2), from L.A. High, seems to be showing the most, though the stocky Field (10.1, 22.6) from Hollywood and Peterson (9.9, 22.2) from Tulare are close behind.

Lea has his protege Bruce Kitchen in the 440. Kitchen, State prep winner from Riverside, is young and maturing. Lea thinks he can shave a second off his 48.7 best. Bob Harman, L.A. High, was a halfmiler as a prep but ran 49.7 in his only real attempt, and Lea thinks he may rival Kitchen.

In the 880, Harman (1:55.8) was runnerup in both All-City and State meets. Tom Anderson (1:55.2) from Van Nuys won the All-City and looks like a potential great. He is very strong, very fast and loves to run.

The frosh have two fine distance prospects in Max Truex and Wes McLeod. Truex, from Warsaw, Ind., broke the National Interscholastic record with 4:20.4 and followed it up with a 4:18.5 in the National AAU. He was the best cross-country man in the California as a frosh, won the Indiana harrier title twice and should run a rapid two-mile. McLeod hails from Bathurst Heights in Toronto, Ont., where he ran 1:58.0, 4:24.0 and 9:36.0.

Hurdler Bob Lawson looks like another Jack Davis in build and won three firsts while at Aberdeen, Wash., in his State meet last year. His marks of 14.5 and 19.6 don't rate with California preps of last spring but in his rainy hometown they show promise. He's high-jumped 6'4½" with weird form and is the only entrant in the event.

Broadjumper Don Buckley, ex-L.A. High and San Diego NTC leaper, recorded a 23' effort in the service and should improve this season. Russ Harling did 22'6½" at Colton before hurting his takeoff leg, so he, too, may improve.

Only polevaulter is Rich Virtue, fourth place finisher in the All-City meet. Virtue did 12'3" as a Washington High prep. Dick Bronson, the husky State champ from Grossmont, is the team's shotputter. Bronson had a prep best of 60'4½" and in his first competitive collegiate appearance early this year boomed one 53'2¼". Both he and Lawson will spin the discus.

The team has two top javelinists in Gene Orowitz and Ray Taylor. Orowitz, a slightly-built southpaw, threw 197'8" while at Collingswood, N. J., and Taylor won his State title with 185'¾" at Salem, Ore.

National frosh records should be threatened in the mile, two-mile and distance medley relays. The mile team will be composed
