TROJANS READY FOR A STEP UP IN CLASS IN 2003

After two years of rebuilding, the USC men's track team has a foundation as sturdy as the walls of ancient Troy.

It's a foundation made up of talented jumpers, hurdlers, sprinters and throwers.

Some of them have been through the battles of NAAs past. Others are looking wide-eyed, yet undeterred, at the prospect of future collegiate greatness.

Last season saw the Trojans score 21 points to tie for 11th at the NCAA Championships in Baton Rouge, Louis. Nineteen of those points return, a year wiser and stronger. They are joined by one of the top incoming recruiting classes in the nation.

One thing is for sure: USC won't be satisfied looking at the top 10 from the outside for much longer.

"We're no longer rebuilding, but we are still young," said USC Director of Track and Field Ron Alice, now in his ninth year at Troy. "I think we have good talent. It's how our youth can mix with our veterans that will determine where we end up."

The three goals of the Ron Alice era at USC remain the same: win the dual meet, the Pac-10 meet and the NAAs. This year, after finishing second and third, respectively, the last two years at the Pac-10s, the Trojans are in good position to once again challenge for the conference title.

"Depending upon how matchups are created, we definitely have a shot at the conference title," said Alice, who has won three Pac-10 titles at USC.

If the Trojans need any extra motivation come May, they will need to look no farther than their own backyard. That's because the 2003 Pac-10 Outdoor Track and Field Championships will be held at USC's Katherine B. Loker Stadium on May 17-18. Putting on a first class event will be paramount in importance to Alice.

"The Pac-10 Championships have never been held on this campus," he said. "It is very significant to us. We now have a venue that is ideal for viewing track and field. We will be showcasing the strongest conference in America at this facility. USC has not hosted at any location since 1986. So I'm very excited about that."

Added to the mix this season are the new rules for qualifying for the NAAs. Athletes will no longer be asked to qualify by meeting pre-set standards. Instead, there will be four qualifying regionals from which an athlete must advance to go to the NCAA Championships. Obviously, traditional strategies for getting to the NAAs will undergo some serious revision.

"It is now one man against the other instead of seeding people based on performances met during the season," said Alice. "In some ways, this will help us. More will have an opportunity to make it to The Big Show."

With 28 national titles and 107 individual titles in its 103-year history--not to mention 32 Pac-10 titles, 61 world records and 40 Olympic gold medals--no track and field program in the nation has been a bigger star at The Big Show than the University of Southern California.

Squad Breakdown

After an inconsistent year last season, the Trojan sprint crew has all the makings of an elite unit. However, it must replace four-time All-American Sultan McCullough, 2002 All-American Kareem Kelly and Devon Ward before it can take it to the next level. Early indications reveal that the Trojans should be able to do just that. Leading the way in the 100 meters will be senior **Darrell Rideaux** (10.27), a steady veteran who has twice been a relay All-American in his career. He had a solid season for the Trojan football team as a cornerback and will be preparing for the NFL draft during the early parts of the season, so he will likely not join the Trojans until late spring--a ritual that he is used to by now. Also making an impact will be hard-working senior **Miguel Fletcher** (10.31), another former football player who was a 1999 relay All-American. The next most experienced sprinter for USC is sophomore **Wes Felix** (10.48/20.89), a 2002 400-meter relay All-American who was quite busy this past summer, as he won the U.S.A. Junior 200-meter title and the World Junior bronze in the 200 meters and also ran a leg on the U.S. squad that set a world junior record in winning the 400-meter relay. Needless to say, he is a rising star for the Trojans. Two newcomers should provide an instant spark for the sprint corps: sophomore **Phillip Francis** and freshman **Garry Jones**. The talented Francis (10.48/21.10) sat out all of last season and may sit out most of this season due to eligibility issues. The hope is that he will be ready to go for Pac-10s. Jones (10.45/21.64) is one of the fastest incoming freshmen in the country and has a lot of potential down the road. Eventually, Rideaux, Fletcher, Felix, Francis and Jones--should be able to comprise an excellent sprint relay squad. Redshirt freshman **Justin Tolliver** (10.6) could be part of the mix, too.

"Darrell Rideaux's contribution at the NAAs in the relay was hellacious," said Alice. "His leadoff leg destroyed the field. Wes Felix is one of the most improved sprinters in the country who was also an All-American on that relay. That experience helped him when he went on to help set that junior world record. He can be as good as any sprinter in the conference at 200 meters and can even help us in the 1600-meter relay. But his focus will be the sprints. For the first time, Fletcher comes to us without having played football, so we are in the process of slimming him down into a track man. But he can also be a contributor. Francis and Garry Jones are 100-200 guys. Both of them are technically underdeveloped in terms of strength and technique, but both have a tremendous upside and potential.

In the 400 meters, junior **Brandon Matlock** (47.30) had a good fall and should begin to show why he was so highly regarded coming out of junior college. Backing him up will be senior **David Biesek** (47.51). Athletes from other areas--namely Felix, hurdlers Jeff Garrison and Ryan Wilson and 800-meter runner Rafael Asafo-Agyei--will likely make up variations of the 1600-meter relay squad.

"Matlock had an injury-plagued season last year, but he did well this fall," said Alice. "We think he is going to have a good year. David Biesek has good experience. In the relay, if you throw Felix and Wilson and Garrison and our super newcomer, Asafo-Agyei, then we look pretty good.

"Overall, our sprints are talented, but young. They will need to come through for us to challenge for the conference title."

The departed Kevin Elliot was a warrior in the middle distances, but incoming freshman **Raphael Asafo-Agyei** (1:50.70 as a junior in high school) has the talent to be a very good 800-meter runner at USC. Sophomore **Anthony Heckman** (1:50.96) returns after a solid freshman year that saw him advance to the Pac-10s in the 800 meters. Sophomore **John Peschelt** adds solid depth in the 800 meters as well. The 1500 and 5000 meters will be the domain of another freshman phenom, **Thomas Babsikiewicz** (3:42.70), who has a chance to score early and often in his USC career. Junior **Ivan Bannon** and senior **Justin Neems**—the hero of the 2001 UCLA dual meet—will shoulder much of the rest of the load in the middle and long distances.

"With Heckman, Babsikiewicz and Asafo-Agyei, our middle distances are as strong as they've been in a while," said Alice. "Asafo-Agyei was hurt his senior year in high school, but as a junior he was the No. 2 800-meter runner in the country. So we feel he has a tremendous upside and that he will make a contribution and impact right off the bat. Heckman, I think he's going to be a big surprise. Babsikiewicz is something I have been trying to find for a while—that right combination of someone who is a pure 1500-meter runner with the ability to go up to 5000 meters. Ivan Bannon and Justin Neems help us out, too."

The hurdles are once again a strength for the Trojans, with two-time All-American **Ryan Wilson** (13.55/50.89) leading the way. Wilson, a senior, is also a team co-captain. He should challenge for the NCAA title in the 110-meter high hurdles this season. Coming over to help from football once again will be senior **Marcell Allmond** (13.89), who is a two-time Pac-10 finalist in the high hurdles. He has the ability to be one of the best hurdlers in the conference. Sophomores **Kenneth Thomas** (14.32/53.22) and **Jeff Garrison** (14.69/52.25) are emerging young hurdlers who are equally adept at both hurdle events. Freshman **Blake Frazier** (14.28) is a fantastic athlete, but he has been bothered by an injury this past fall and is a possible redshirt candidate. Another freshman, **Jenson Wayne** (37.59 300m IM) adds depth.

"We are strong in the hurdles," said Alice. "We have a two-time All-American in Wilson, who is in great shape heading into the season. Once we get Allmond, who is a great athlete and seasoned veteran, we will really be set with a good one-two punch in the high hurdles. I was highly impressed with Garrison and Thomas as freshmen. They need to pick up the slack this year so Wilson doesn't have to do double duty all the time. Frazier has really good potential, but has been hurt all fall. We'll see if he recovers in time to help us. Wayne can also help us."

It would take a great memory to remember when USC last had a jump corps as strong as the one it will field this season. In the horizontal jumps, there is senior All-American **Julien Kapek** (55-8 1/2), who last season broke the 25-year old USC triple jump record in just his first home meet and then later went on to finish third at the NCAAs. He also has a best of 24-7 in the long jump. He is joined in the triple by sophomore **Allen Simms** (55-1), a transfer from George Mason who, as a freshman, was fourth in the triple jump both indoors and outdoors at the NCAAs. What's more, Simms is also an excellent long jumper (26-3), so he has the potential to score in both horizontal jumps this season. The sleeper of the group is junior **Andre Serrette** (24-2 1/4), who finished fifth at the Pac-10s in the long jump and is a potential 25-footer.

"This is the best jumps corps since I've been here," said Alice. "We have in Kapek someone who is world class in the triple. He is a very good technician. His strength is far better than it was a year ago. And Simms is going to scare a lot of people with his jumping. He is so efficient, yet explosive. Both Kapek and Simms have worked really hard in the fall. Serrette should have a banner year. We think he is ready for bigger and better things."

Senior **Dawid Jaworski** tied for second in the high jump at last year's NCAA meet--and he almost won it, losing only on number of misses. In the process, though, he tied the school record of 7-4 1/2 set by Anthony Caire in 1983. Considering he had been bothered by a bad back for much of the season, it was an amazing performance. He has had a strong fall and could challenge for the NCAA title in the high jump. Kapek (6-8 3/4) can also high jump in a pinch.

"What else can you say about Jaworski? He's our school record-holder," said Alice. "He was one miss away from being the NCAA champ. If he can stay healthy--and he's pretty fit right now--he's as good as anybody."

The throws have been slightly down the last couple years for USC, but look for a solid rebound in 2003. The last decade saw Troy dominate in the hammer and some semblance of that may be returning. Juniors **Michael Murray** (199-10) and **Harrison Lee** (195-11) give the Trojans a good one-two punch that could provide some solid points come Pac-10 time. But the one to look out for could be heralded freshman **Adam Midles** (242-1 HS), a prep All-American who brings with him the second-best high school hammer throw in history. He has also thrown the college hammer 201-9. Look for him to land in the USC top 10 lists before too long. Midles also throws the shot (57-11 3/4), an area in which fellow freshman **Noah Bryant**--another prep All-American--excels. Bryant (67-6 1/2) was the California state shot put champ in 2002. Freshman **William Denbo** (64-0 1/4) is another incoming shot putter with talent. Both Midles (191-3 HS) and Bryant (170-3 HS) can throw the discus as well. In the javelin, freshman **Dennis Rice** is ready to be unleashed after redshirting last season. He could be the best javelin thrower at USC in quite some time. Junior **Corey Fitzgibbon**--a former decathlete--will also throw the javelin.

"It's a young, but talented throws group," said Alice. "Coming in, we've got the California state champ in Noah Bryant and another 60-footer in Denbo. In the hammer, we've got the best in the country out of high school in Midles. He is way ahead of the game right now for a freshman. Add him with Murray and Lee and you have a very good hammer group. In the javelin, Rice has a big arm and we expect good things from him. Fitzgibbon will help us out there, too."

The pole vault is solid with senior **Jeff Ryan**, who has a best of 17-3. Depth behind Ryan will have to be developed within the program. In the decathlon, senior co-captain **Shelton Davis** (7,122) returns after improving his PR by over 400 points in 2002. Last season, he was fourth at the Pac-10s in the decathlon. Newcomer **Jonas Hallgrimsson** will also compete in the decathlon.

"Ryan is solid for us in the pole vault," said Alice. "Davis is a 7,000-point guy and is very talented. We also have Hallgrimsson, who can be another 7,000 point guy. So we'll have two good decathletes."

As the starter's gun rises on USC's season, it is clear that there is talent--both young and old--at Alice's disposal. The Trojans are balanced enough to compete at every level of competition--dual, conference and national--which is always an Alice requirement.

"We are a pretty balanced team," he said. "We're young with some veteran leadership. I think it has a chance to be good."

USC Director of Track & Field • Ninth Season

Like a phoenix rising from the ashes, USC track and field has reemerged as a force on the collegiate scene thanks to the work of Director of Track and Field Ron

Alice and his coaching staff.

Under the guidance of Alice and company, the Trojan men went on a run of seven consecutive top 10 finishes—a feat last accomplished during the late 1960s and early 1970s under Verne Wolfe—from 1994-2000 and have won three Pac-10 titles in the last six years. The hallmark of an Alice team is balance—after all, the sport he coaches is called track and field—and his tenure has been marked by squads that have been able to compete for championships at the national, conference and dual meet level. Last season, his young men's team finished third in the Pac-10 and tied for 11th at the NCAAs. The previous season—2001—the Trojans were 12th at the NCAA meet and 2nd in the conference, while snapping crosstown rival UCLA's dual-meet win streak at 22. The seven seasons prior to 2001, Troy finished no lower than seventh at the NCAAs (including three top-5 finishes) and won three Pac-10 titles. During his tenure, Trojan men have won six NCAA individual titles, garnered All-American acclaim 67 times and set six school records—not an easy task considering the glorious track and field history at USC.

Alice also runs perhaps the top women's program in the country. The Women of Troy are the only team in the country to finish in the NCAA top three each of the last four years while winning at least one NCAA team title. Last year, his squad finished third at the NCAAs. It was led by the most celebrated sprinter in collegiate history, Angela Williams, who won an unprecedented fourth NCAA 100m title and later was awarded the Honda/Broderick Cup given to the nation's top female collegiate athlete. In 2001, the Women of Troy put on a near-perfect meet to win their first NCAA team title. In 2000, USC took second—at the time, their best-ever showing at the NCAAs. In 1999, USC was the only program that finished in the top five in both men's and women's track and field, as the women were third and the men fifth. In 1998, the women's team finished in fifth place. In 1997 they placed 14th, but that came on the heels of their first-ever Pac-10 title and a seventh-place NCAA finish in 1996. Alice's women's teams are feature powerhouse athletes who go on to shine on the national and world stages, including such stars as Williams, Natasha Danvers, Brigita Langerholm and Torri Edwards.

USC's past successes in track and field are well known: 29 NCAA championships (including two indoor titles), 61 world

records, 87 Olympic team members, 40 Olympic gold medals and 16 inductees in the U.S. National Track and Field Hall of Fame - all encapsulated in 103 years of a rich and storied tradition.

And now, with the second century of Trojan track and field already well underway, Ron Alice and his staff continue to work hard to maintain the luster of USC's most successful athletic program.

Alice, a prep standout at Long Beach (Calif.) Poly High, is well known for his ability to win. His overall dual meet coaching mark is 211-41-1 in 34 years at five schools, including 11 state championships in 16 years at Long Beach City College, his previous stop before landing at Troy. Alice's programs have produced more than 237 All-Americans, plus 16 Olympians, four world record holders and seven American record holders. He has coached at his high school, junior college and college alma maters on the way to compiling his outstanding coaching statistics.

- USC's track and field programs had more points combined at the 2001 NCAA Championships—64 by the women and 22 by the men for a grand total of 86 points—than any other university.

Alice has certainly reached the top echelon of his career, although he has not forgotten the beginnings of his coaching days. In his first coaching job, he guided the Long Beach Comets, a girls' and women's AAU program, for four years (1964-68), expanding the squad from just five girls to more than 150 competitors. During that time, he was also a graduate assistant at Long Beach State in 1964, an assistant at Compton (Calif.) High in 1966 (the team was second at the CIF championships) and the head coach for track and cross country for two years (1967-68) at Wilson High in Long Beach.

The next three seasons (1969-71), he was the track and cross country coach at Poly High in Long Beach. His track teams went 23-4 and captured the Moore League title each year. His 1971 squad was ranked as California's top dual meet team and was fifth at the state meet.

Alice was then Cal Poly Pomona's track and cross country head coach for two years (1972-73). Again, the success he had enjoyed at previous stops followed him — the Broncos lost only one dual meet, won two CCAA titles (a first in school history) and finished fifth in 1972 and sixth in 1973 at the NCAA College Division championships.

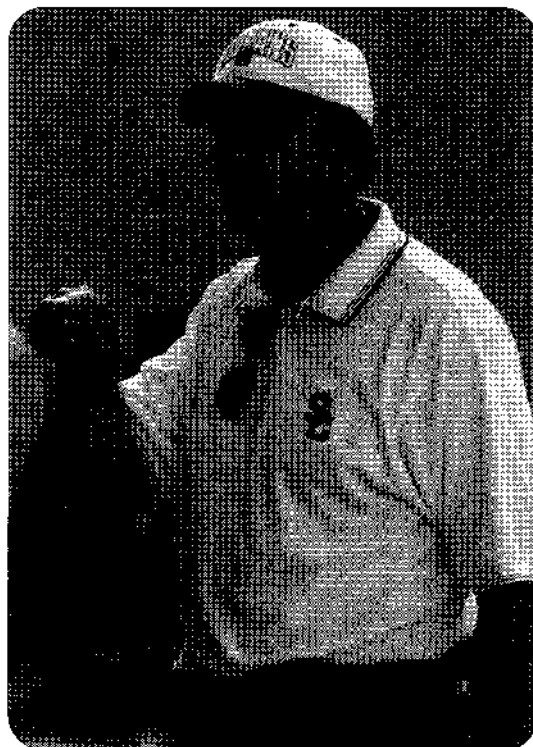
He spent the next five seasons (1974-78) as the track and cross country head coach at Long Beach State. Despite being a new Division I program and having just three scholarships, four of his squads placed among the nation's Top 15 dual meet teams. He won one Pacific Coast Athletic Association title and his teams finished second twice. Two of his cross country teams won the PCAA crown (two others were runners-up).

In 1979, Alice went to Long Beach City College. During his tenure (1979-94), his men's teams won the conference championship all 16 years and lost only one dual meet (78-1) in that time. Besides the 11 state crowns (including five in a row), his Vikings had five state runner-up finishes and won 14 Southern California championships (with two second-place finishes). In 1980, his team was selected by Track & Field News as the best junior college team in history. He was named the 1992 Coach of the Year by both the California Community College Coaches Association and the California Coaches Association (CCA). He also coached LBCC's cross country teams, including the 1990 state titlist and the 1991 state runner-up. He was the 1992 CCA Cross Country Coach of the Year.

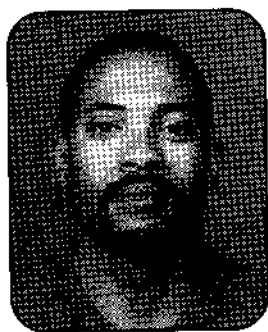
Alice's achievements have not only been limited to the coaching ranks. He prepped at Long Beach Poly High (where he was a CIF finalist in the 440-yard dash), then went to Long Beach City College before attending Long Beach State, where he set the school record in the 440-yard dash. He was inducted into Long Beach State's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1993.

Alice received his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1962 and his master's in physical education in 1970, both from Long Beach State.

He and his wife, Sharlene, have three children: Lance (35, who is a sports and marketing agent as well as a substitute teacher at Long Beach Poly High), Melinda (33, a USC graduate who is a worker in the field of geriatric and special patient care in the Bay Area) and Sean (27, a graduate of the USC School of Cinema who works in film production).

JOHN HENRY JOHNSON, Jr.

Sprints/Decathlon/Recruiting Coordinator

John Henry Johnson enters his ninth year as one of the top assistant coaches in the nation. He works specifically with USC's sprinters and decathletes, and is the team's strength coach, but it is his prowess on the recruiting trail that has been the most instrumental in putting Troy back on the map.

Each of USC's past eight men's and women's recruiting classes have ranked among the best in the nation, and his 2004 women's class promises to be a blockbuster. Johnson has brought into the Trojan fold such superstars as Jerome Davis, Felix Sanchez, Denis Kholev, Charles Lee, Ryan Wilson and Julien Kapek on the men's side, and Angela Williams, Natasha Danvers, Brigita Langerholc, Grezyna Penc and Inga Stasiulionyte on the women's side. His extensive knowledge of the world amateur track scene—bought by a degree in international relations—has proved invaluable to USC and has established Johnson as perhaps the preeminent recruiter of foreign track and field athletes in the last quarter century.

Johnson has coached USC's last three sprint All-Americans. In the 100m, Sultan McCullough captured such honors in 2000 and Jason Shelton did so in 1996. In the 200m, Charles Lee was an All-American in 1998 and 1999. Johnson also leads one of the top decathlon programs in the country, with five of his athletes scoring over 7,000 in the past three years.

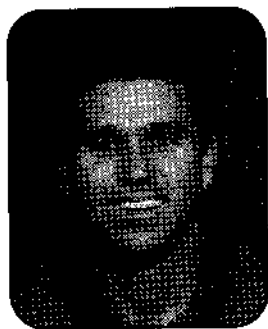
Johnson, who was a state champion in the decathlon for Ron Allice at Long Beach City College (1987), also earned All-Pacific-10 Conference honors while competing at UCLA. After surpassing the 7,000-point mark in the decathlon for the Bruins, he graduated with a degree in international relations in 1990.

A track and football star at West Technical High in Cleveland, Ohio, Johnson—who is the son of former NFL-great John Henry Johnson—became an assistant coach at Long Beach State from 1990-92, where he worked with sprinters and throwers. He also served as a strength coach for the 49ers.

In 1993, Johnson studied abroad, spending time in Mexico and Spain, as well as the Center for Intensive Language Studies in Costa Rica. His hobbies include writing, playing and recording music.

DAN LANGE

Throws

After 13 years of coaching the Trojan throwers, Dan Lange is one of the nation's most respected teachers, having coached his athletes to All-American honors 31 times.

The 37-year-old Lange guided former Trojan and 1996 Olympic gold medalist Balazs Kiss to four consecutive NCAA hammer throw

championships (and a collegiate record) and aided USC throwers across the board with his vast knowledge in the sport. In 1997, despite the departure of Kiss, Lange made it five in a row, coaching Bengt Johansson to the 1997 NCAA hammer title. Johansson was runner up in the hammer in 1998, as was Norbert Horvath in 1999 (Horvath also finished fifth in 2000 and third in 2001). At the 2000 Pac-10 Championships, USC continued its men's hammer domination, sweeping the top four spots to key the Trojans' title run. In 2001, Horvath captured his third straight Pac-10 hammer title and third straight All-American honor. In 2002, Lange guided walk ons Michael Murray and Harrison Lee into the Pac-10 finals.

On the women's side, he has coached 2001 NCAA javelin champ and Pac-10 record-holder Inga Stasiulionyte, 2001 All-American and current school hammer record-holder Julianna Tudja, 2002 hammer All-American L'Orangerie Crawford, 2001 shot put All-American and school discus record holder Cynthia Ademiluyi, two-time hammer All-American Jennifer Vail, 1996 Pac-10 heptathlon champion and NCAA runner-up Nicole

Haynes and Leslie Coons (a former American record holder in the hammer).

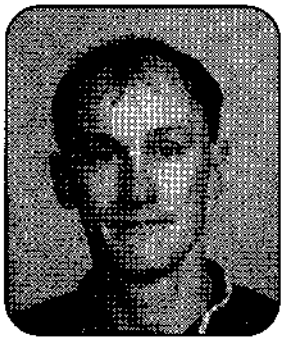
Lange is also currently coaching two-time U.S. Olympian Adam Setliff (the No. 1 discus thrower in the U.S.) and nationally-ranked hammer thrower Lisa Misipeka.

A four-year letterman at Cal State Northridge and three-time NCAA Division II championship meet qualifier, Lange also earned All-American honors in the hammer. Lange studied exercise physiology at Cal State Northridge and also works as a sports fitness consultant.

He and his wife Darcy (Arreola), who was one of America's finest middle distance runners and a former NCAA champion, reside in Valencia, Calif., with their son, Dylan, age two.

TOM WALSH

Distances/Women's Cross Country

Tom Walsh enters his ninth year as middle and long distance coach at USC. He also serves as the head women's cross country coach.

During his tenure, the Women of Troy middle and long distance program has consistently been one of the best in the country. In fact, no other middle-distance program in the country in the last decade--except for USC's under Tom Walsh--has had a four-time All-American in both the 800m and the 1500m at the NCAA Championships.

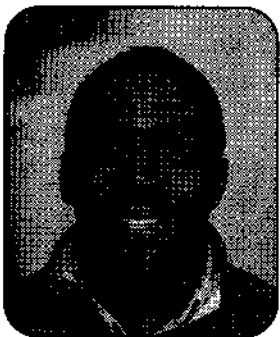
During the last seven years, USC middle and long distance runners have captured All-American honors 17 times, including an NCAA 800m championship by four-time All-American Brigita Langerholc in 2001. Langerholc also finished a surprising fourth in the 800m at the 2000 Olympics in Sydney in a school-record time of 1:58.51. Walsh also coached Grazyna Penc, a four-time All-American in the 1,500m. Penc finished third in 1996 and 1998,

fourth in 1997 and was runner up in 1999. Emebet Shiferaw was a two-time All-American in the 3,000m in 1996-97. Her best NCAA finish was second place. Anna Lopaciuch twice earned All-American honors in the 1500m, finishing fifth in 1998 and third in 2000. Last season, Aleksandra Deren placed seventh in the 800m at the NCAAs. This past cross country season, Brooke Thomas became the second Woman of Troy athlete in as many years to qualify for the NCAA Championships, joining 2001's Sarah Ellis as two of only four Trojans ever to qualify for the NCAA Cross Country Championships.

Walsh graduated from USC in 1988, and served as a graduate assistant at his alma mater for three years in the late 1980s. He also served as a track and field consultant for ABC and NBC during the U.S. Olympic Trials.

MIKE PULLINS

Jumps

Mike Pullins is in his fifth year as jumps coach at USC. Coach "Mike," as he likes to be called, is responsible for coaching both the women and men's jumpers.

Under his tutelage, the USC jumpers have been mainstays on the honors podium at the NCAA Championships.

In 2002, Julien Kapek set a school triple jump record with a jump of 55-8 1/2 and then went on to place third at the NCAAs. The year prior, Djeke Mambo became the first Trojan to win both the long jump and triple jump at the Pac-10s since Luther Hayes in 1961.

On the women's side, he guided Tatyana Obukhova to her third-straight Pac-10 triple jump championship and a fourth-place finish at the NCAAs in 2002. The year before, Obukhova was third at the NCAAs. In his first year, he coached Pam Simpson to a third-place finish at the 1999 NCAAs.

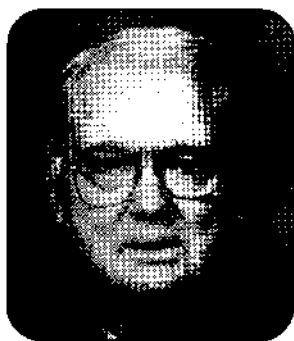
He also helped Disia Page and Stephanie Jones land on the USC top 10 charts in the long jump. In fact, four of the 10 women on USC's long jump chart were coached by Pullins.

A 1987 graduate of USC, his name is still among the top ten triple jumpers on the all-time Trojan charts. As a high school senior Mike qualified for the CIF Championships in four individual events and went on to win the triple jump, in which he placed fifth in the 1982 state meet. Mike starred at Cal State Northridge and Pasadena City College before coming to Troy. A three-time USA Track & Field outdoor qualifier (he qualified for the 1992 Olympic trials), he was forced to set track aside due to injuries and four ankle surgeries in 1994.

Mike is single and currently working on his master's degree in education.

JOE LANNING **Hurdles/Heptathlon**

Joe Lanning is in his fifth year at USC after coming out of retirement. His main responsibility is coaching the hurdlers on both the men's and women's squads as well as the women's heptathlon.

Lanning is currently out and recovering after suffering a serious fall. Ron Alice is coaching the hurdlers until Lanning returns.

In 2002, Ryan Wilson placed sixth in the 110m HH at the NCAAs, following a third-place finish in 2001. Natasha Neal also placed sixth last year in the 100m HH. But 2000 was a season to remember for Lanning, as two of his proteges came away with NCAA glory. Natasha Danvers and Felix Sanchez each won the NCAA 400m hurdles title in school-record times. Danvers went on to the finals of the 400m hurdles at the Sydney Olympics, while Sanchez reached the semifinals and went on to win the 400m IH at the World Championships in 2001 (he is currently

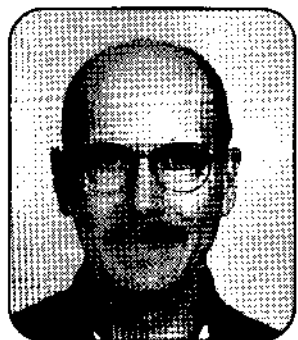
ranked No. 1 in the world). Lanning also guided then-freshmen Ryan Wilson and Marcell Allmond to a 1-2 finish in the 110m HH at the 2000 Pac-10 Championships.

Lanning, the former head coach at Long Beach City College, was Ron Alice's mentor in his undergraduate days and later assisted Alice there for 16 years. During his time as the head coach at Long Beach City College, Lanning won 15 state championships and 22 Southern California titles. In addition, 41 of his athletes won individual state titles and 60 Southern California championships, including hurdler Earl McCullouch, who later became a Trojan and world record holder.

He is a member of the California Community College Track & Field Hall of Fame, and the Long Beach Century Club Hall of Fame.

High.

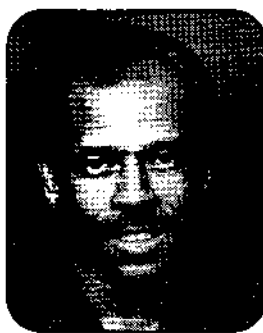

Paths of Glory

The Story of USC's Unmatched Track & Field History

USC is well known as one of the most successful athletic programs in the history of the NCAA, with 92 men's and women's national championships. The Trojans have won far more NCAA team and individual titles combined than any other university. However, the most dominant force in USC's slate of athletic programs is not the baseball team (12 College World Series titles) or the football squad (eight national championships) but the men's track and field program, with an unprecedented 28 NCAA titles (including nine straight, 1935-43).

Trojan athletes have dominated the track and field scene for decades. From the exploits of sprinter Charlie Paddock and thrower Clarence "Bud" Houser in the 1920s and 1930s, sprinter Mel Patton in the 1940s, thrower Parry O'Brien in the 1950s, sprinter Lennox Miller and pole vaulter Bob Seagren in the 1960s, sprinter Quincy Watts in the 1980s and continuing on to four-time NCAA hammer champion Balazs Kiss (only the fifth collegian to win four in a row) in the 1990s, USC is synonymous with track and field excellence.

THE CROMWELL YEARS: 1909-1948

The roots of Troy's preeminence date back to 1926, when coach Dean Cromwell brought the first NCAA track and field championship to USC. Cromwell, who led the Trojans from 1909-48, also served as head coach of the football team for five seasons.

However, the foundation he laid was not

on the gridiron but the cinderpaths. Cromwell's track squads won 12 NCAA championships and featured 34 NCAA individual champions. In addition, Cromwell was unanimously selected as headcoach of the victorious 1948 U.S. Olympic team, a group which featured five Trojans (Mel Patton, Bob Chambers, Roland Sink, Wilbur Thopson and Cliff Bourland). In fact, Patton, Thomson and Bourland brought home gold medals in their respective events from London, the Olympic site.

From 1935-43, USC experienced a streak of unequalled track and field success. No other university has come close to matching Troy's string of nine consecutive NCAA championships, all under Cromwell's watchful eye. Nicknamed the "Maker of Champions," he fashioned Trojan athletes into a powerhouse. At the 1936 Olympics in Berlin, USC trackmen scored enough points (37 1/2) to have finished among the top five in the world. Cromwell's influence extended

far beyond the USC campus to the corners of the world. He personally tutored champions in every Olympic Games from 1912 to 1948, and upon his retirement in 1949, "The Dean" remained involved as a regular figure in various Southland sporting events until his death in 1962.

TWO JESSES, NINE NATIONAL TITLES: 1949-1961

Jess Hill and Jess Mortensen, both integral parts of USC's proud athletic heritage, carried the track and field torch after Cromwell's retirement. Both men are still considered among the finest all-around athletes in USC history, and their accomplishments did not end after their playing days were over.

Hill, who lettered in three sports at USC (football, baseball and track), served as head coach of Troy's track and field program in 1949 and 1950, leading the Trojans to an undefeated season and national championship in both seasons. From 1951-56, Hill coached the football team, and in 1957, he began his tenure as USC athletic director, a position he held until 1972.

Mortensen's reign at USC also began as an undergraduate. The talented athlete lettered in track, basketball and football, winning the NCAA javelin title as a junior. After a 14-year coaching stint at Riverside Junior College, he returned to become coach of the Trojan track and field team in 1951, leading Troy to seven NCAA championships in his 11-year tenure. Mortensen's Trojan teams never lost a dual meet, going 79-0 between 1951 and 1961. He developed some of Troy's best-known trackmen, including Parry O'Brien and Max Truex. Sadly, "Mort" died suddenly at the age of 54 from complications caused by a blood clot. Hill, his longtime friend and teammate, stepped in as interim head coach for the 1962 season, and a new chapter in Trojan track and field history was about to begin.

THE WOLFE YEARS: 1963-1984

The prospect of succeeding three consecutive coaching legends would be a difficult task for anyone, but Vern Wolfe answered the challenge.

During his 22 years at the helm of the Trojan track and field program, USC captured five outdoor NCAA championships, including back-to-back titles in 1967 and 1968. A pole vaulter for Cromwell's Trojan teams, Wolfe also won indoor titles in 1967 and 1972. At the time of his retirement in 1984, he was the third-winningest coach in U.S. track history, all despite reductions in scholarships and the lack of a top-flight on-campus facility.

Wolfe, who competed in senior events as a pole vaulter, attacked all problems with a straight-ahead approach. He continued to win throughout his career and towards the end oversaw the modernization of Cromwell Field, USC's track facility which served as a training site for the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles. And so, after 21 years on the job, Wolfe retired and gave way to Ernie Bullard.

BULLARD AND BUSH: 1985-94

Another in the line of former Trojan athletes to become head coaches at USC, Ernie Bullard came to Troy from San Jose State, where he helped build the Spartans into a national contender. It didn't take long for Bullard to continue Troy's winning ways, recruiting athletes like sprinter Quincy Watts, a two-time gold medalist at the 1992 Olympic Games.

Jim Bush was the man picked to replace longtime friend Bullard in 1991. After all, who better to rebuild the USC program than the man who guided UCLA to five national championships?

Bush helped stabilize the program and recruited some of Troy's stars, like Balazs

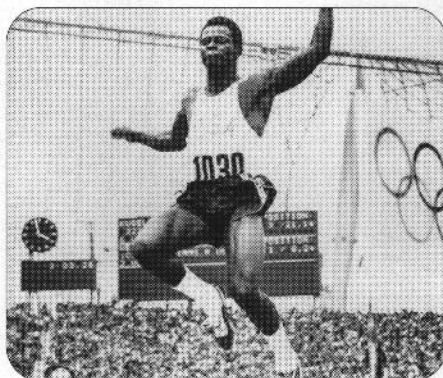

Kiss of Hungary, the 1993, 1994, 1995 and 1996 NCAA champion in the hammer throw. Consequently, he helped lay the foundation for the latest in the distinguished line of Trojan head track coaches: Ron Alice.

RON ALLICE, THE NEW ERA: 1995 —

Ron Alice, who prior to the 1995 season was named the Director of Track and Field for USC's combined men's and women's program, is no stranger to success. He has distinguished himself at every level of competition, all in the Southland, and is well-known not only as a master builder, but a man who can keep a program at the highest level year after year.

Alice came to Troy with impeccable credentials: 11 state championships in 16 years at Long Beach (Calif.) City College, where his 1980 squad was called "the best junior

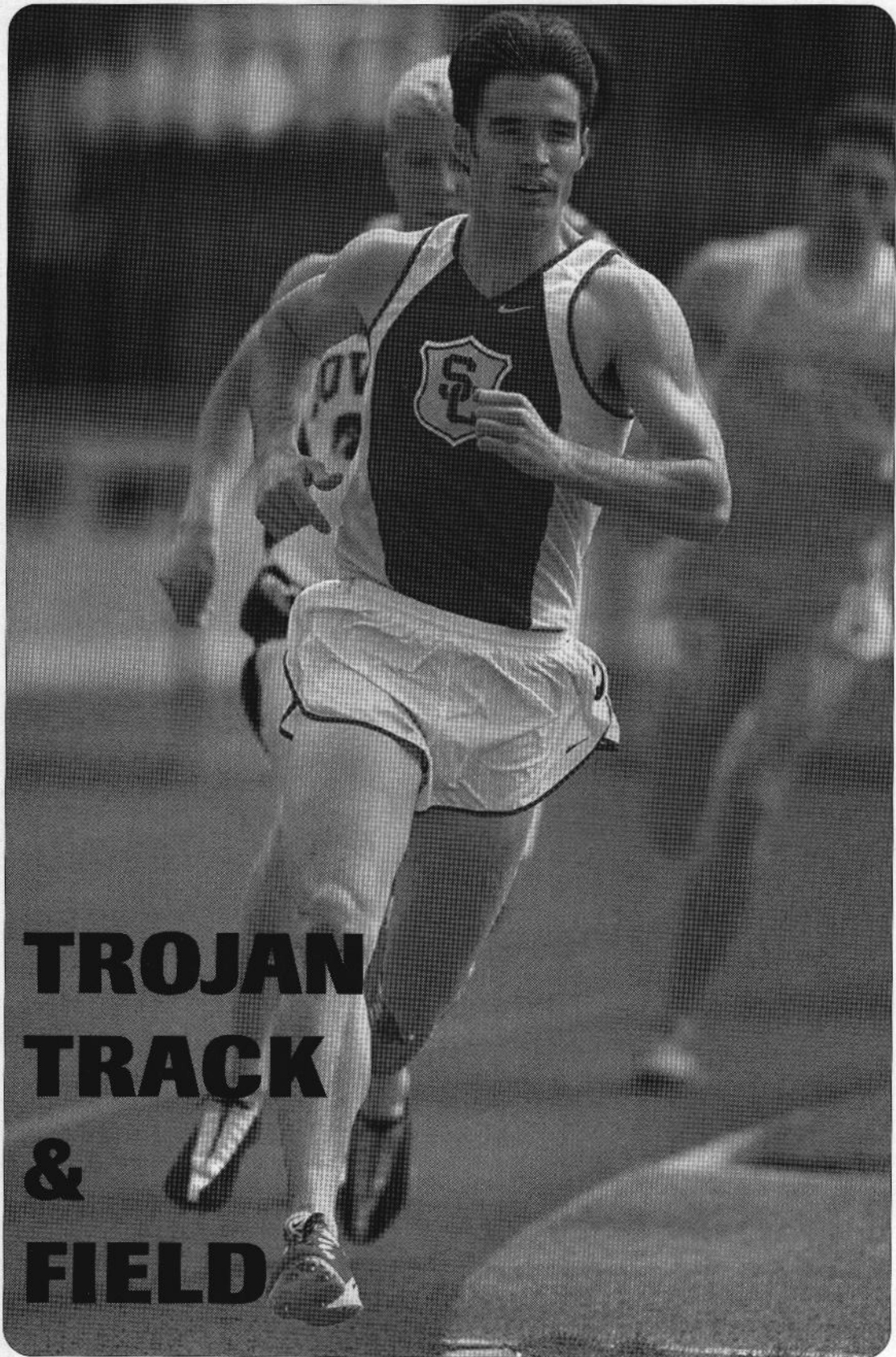
college team in history" by Track & Field News. During his tenure at Long Beach C.C., his teams lost just one dual meet.

He quickly went to work, guiding the USC men's team to a fourth-place finish at the 1995 NCAA Outdoor Championships. In 1996, his Women of Troy won their first-ever Pac-10 title. In 1997, he led the Trojan men's team to its first Pac-10 title since 1977 and a third-place showing at the 1997 NCAAs. At the 1998 NCAAs, he led the USC men's team to seventh-place and the Women of Troy to fifth. In 1999, the men won their second Pac-10 title in three years. At the NCAAs, the women finished third and the men fifth (as a combined men's and women's program, this was the best finish in school history). In 2000, the men finished seventh—their seventh consecutive top 10 finish—while the women placed second—their highest finish ever. In 2001, Alice guided the Women of Troy to their first-ever NCAA team championship while the men tied for 12th. Last season, the women were third and the men tied for 11th at the NCAAs.

Alice has a career dual meet record of 211-41-1 at five schools, and he has coached more than 237 All-Americans, 20 Olympians, four world record holders and seven American record holders. He takes the storied history of USC track and field very seriously.

"I have a mandate to bring this program to its rightful place," Alice said. "This university is a special place to us all, and we are ready to add another chapter to USC's illustrious history."

Now ready to return to the heights of athletic achievement, USC track and field, as has been the case for 103 glorious years, is in good hands.

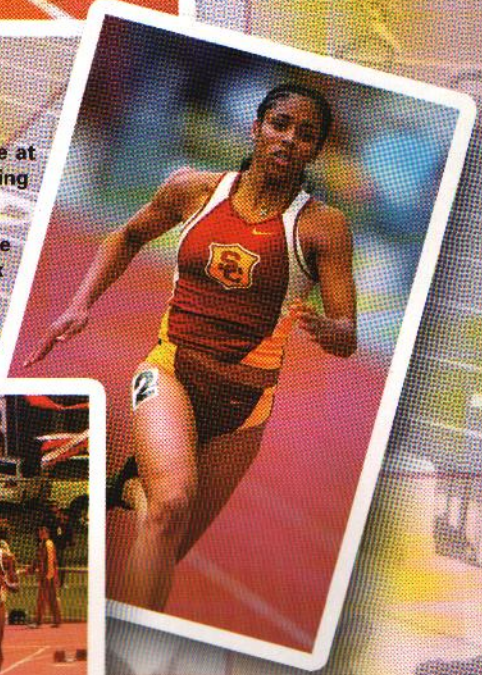

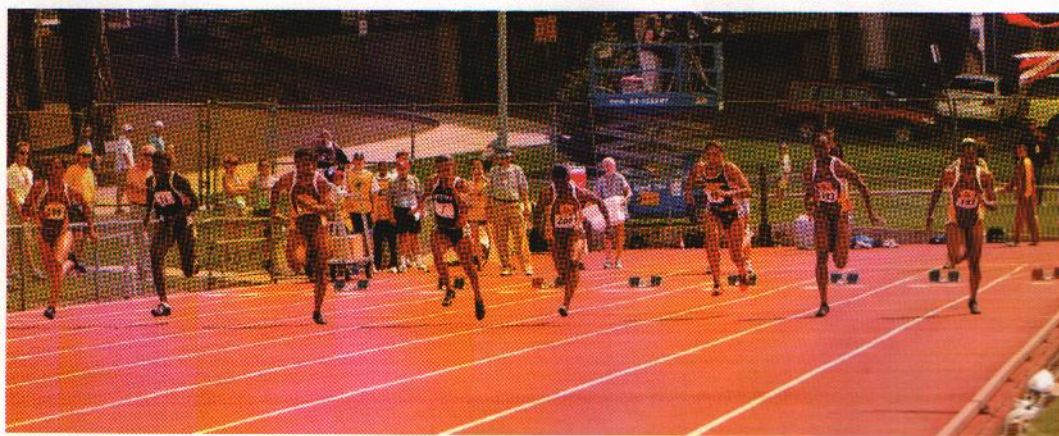

WOMEN OF TROY REBUILDING, BUT STILL DANGEROUS

For the USC women's track and field team, the last four seasons have been like a dream.

That's because in the last four years, USC is the only team to finish in the top three at the NCAA meet each year while also winning a national title at least once.

Hence, the Women of Troy can now lay claim to being the preeminent program in women's track and field.

In the past few years, the best athletes in the country have passed through Troy, including Angela Williams, Torri Edwards, Natasha Danvers, Brigita Langerholc, Cynthia Ademiluyi and Tatyana Obukhova.

In 2003, those names are all gone, so it will be a rebuilding year of sorts. But plenty of big names also return and, with the addition of yet another fine recruiting class, this year's version of the Women of Troy can not be counted out at the NCAA meet.

That's because of USC's 57 points scored at the 2002 NCAA Championships held in Baton Rouge, Louis., 29.5 points will return in 2003. And while USC likely won't duplicate its electrifying one-two finish in the 100 meters, there are plenty of potential points to be scored in other areas.

"There are definitely some voids to fill," said USC Director of Track and Field Ron Alice. "I like the overall attitude of this group in terms of work ethic. How that translates into results this season is a question mark.

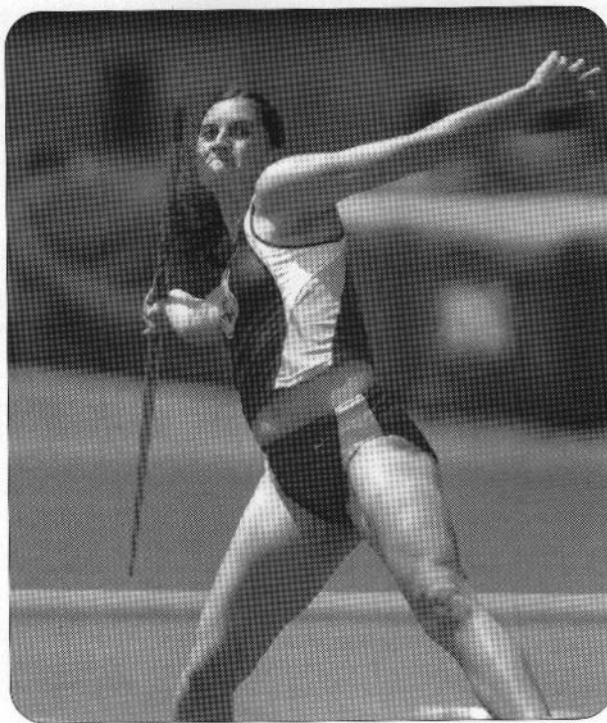
"We are rebuilding. We are young and we will stay young for the next two years. It's difficult to lose the people we did and recover. But the cupboard is not bare. We've got an NCAA champion returning and some All-Americans in the throws, as well as some people who made the semifinals in their events."

For once, the Women of Troy won't have to travel very far in May and June, as the 2003 Pac-10 Championships will be at USC's Katherine B. Loker Stadium on May 17-18, the NCAA West Regionals are at Stanford on May 30-31 and the NCAA Championships are in Sacramento on June 11-14.

The addition of the regionals adds a new twist to what is already a hectic last month of the season.

"It's a different game now with the regionals," he said. "You can be left at home if you are not at your best. Regionals will be cut throat time."

It should make for an exciting season of track and field at USC.

Squad Breakdown

USC's sprint corps had a banner season in 2002, as senior Angela Williams won her record fourth-consecutive NCAA 100 meter title, while newcomer **Natasha Mayers** won the 200-meter title and placed second to Williams in the 100 meters. It will be nearly impossible to replace Williams, who is the greatest sprinter in USC history, but Mayers--now a senior--showed in a flash last season why she was so highly regarded coming out of junior college. Last year, she had bests of 11.09 in the 100 meters and 22.80 in the 200 meters and scored a team-high 18 points at the NCAAs--the second most in Women of Troy history at one championship meet. This year, she is aiming to become the first USC woman ever to win both those events at the same NCAA meet. After Mayers, look for sophomore **Alexis Weatherspoon** (11.76/24.13) and juniors **Tiffany Bennett** (11.86/24.01) and **Miya Edmonson** (11.89/

24.17) to step up a level. Weatherspoon and Edmonson were two of five USC women in last year's Pac-10 100-meters final. Also, keep an eye out for freshmen **Tracee Thomas** (11.5/23.2). Between these five athletes, plus freshman hurdler Virginia Powell, there is the makings of a pretty good 400-meter relay squad.

"Mayers is an elite sprinter who has a great competitive fire," said Alice. "She exploded onto the scene at the NCAAs and hasn't looked back. We expect her to continue to perform at a high level and take her place among the all-time greats at USC. Weatherspoon, Bennett and Edmonson are all up-and-coming, but are in need of more competitive exposure. We will need them to perform when the pressure is on. Thomas is a tough runner who has good range from the 100 meters on up to the quarter."

The quarter is where senior co-captain **Nakiya Johnson** (52.17) reigns as the defending Pac-10 400-meter champ. She advanced to the 400-meter semifinals at last year's NCAAs and should be back in the thick of it once again. She is also fourth on the all-time USC 400 meters chart. Thomas and intermediate hurdler Aleksandra Pieluzek might also see time in this event.

"Johnson is an excellent quarter-miler," said Alice. "She is a team leader whose experience will be invaluable to us at the big meets. I expect her to have a great season. Backing her up will be Thomas and maybe Pieluzek at times."

Johnson, Pieluzek and Thomas will likely make up three-fourths of the 1600-meter relay squad. The fourth spot is undetermined at this point, though freshman hurdlers Tunisia Johnson and Virginia Powell are possible candidates.

Like the sprints, the middle distances are a traditionally strong area for USC. Last season, Aleksandra Deren was an All-American in the 800 meters. This season, however, the Women of Troy do not have a scholarship athlete in either the 800 or 1500 meters. So it will be up to sophomores **Gina Clayton** (2:12.82) and **Crystal Becker** (2:14.94) to come through in the 800 meters, while seniors **Danielle Morrell** (4:32.40)—a Pac-10 qualifier—and **Brooke Thomas** (4:36.31)—an NCAA qualifier in cross country—will be the main stalwarts in the 1500 meters. Beyond the 1500, it is pretty much the same story. Walk ons **Holly Peters** (12:45.12) and **Hariye Maya** (18:45.36) will compete in the steeplechase and 5000 meters, respectively. Thomas (17:38.05) will also run the 5000 meters—she is third on the all-time USC 5000-meter chart.

"The middle distance area is one in which we've had an All-American nearly every year, but it's not as strong this year," said Alice. "The people we have improved last year, though. Morrell is a good, solid athlete who will make a contribution. Thomas did a great job in cross country and that should carry over into track. Clayton and Becker are developing and could help us down the road. Peters and Maya, as well as several of our other people down the depth chart, are tough competitors."

The hurdles lose All-American Natasha Neal, who was sixth in the 100-meter hurdles at the NCAAs, but 400-meter IM hurdler **Aleksandra Pieluzek** (57.58) returns. Pieluzek, a senior, advanced to the semi-finals in her event at the NCAAs last season. She had a great fall program and will be joined in the 400-meter hurdles by freshman **Tunisia Johnson** (42.32 HS), a freshman with great potential who also runs the 100-meter hurdles. Another dynamite freshman, prep All-American **Virginia 'Ginnie' Powell** (13.39 HS) will be featured in the 100-meter hurdles. Big things are expected of Powell, who may also run a leg on the 400-meter relay team. Senior high jumper Spring Harris (14.32) also runs the short hurdles.

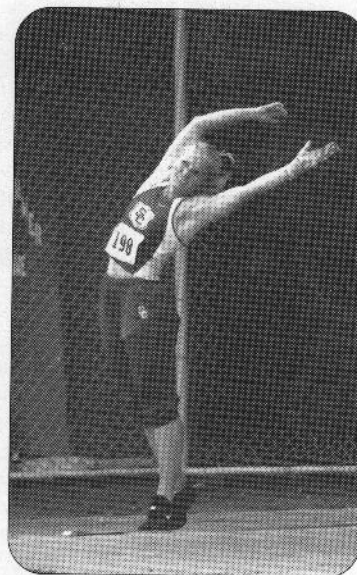
"We don't have a lot of depth in the hurdles," said Alice. "We're maybe a year away from being really strong. Pieluzek has looked great in practice and should do well come NCAA time. Powell is a great athlete who has the ability to help us in a number of events. If Johnson, who was one of the best high school hurdlers in California last year, can adjust to the 400 hurdles, she'll be able to help us right away."

There is another void to fill in the jumps area, where two-time All-American and three-time Pac-10 Champion in the triple jump Tatyana Obukhova departs, as does two-time Pac-10 long jump finalist Disia Page. Senior **Erin Williams** (19-0) is the leading returning long jumper. She'll be backed by senior **Karen Ota** (18-7 3/4) and sophomore **Tiffany Jones** (17-10 3/4). In the triple jump, Ota (36-3 1/2) is the leading returner. The high jump is in good shape with senior **Spring Harris** (5-10 1/2), who has the potential to break the six foot barrier.

"The jumps are another area in which we are not as strong going into the season, but we will see how they develop by conference time," said Alice. "It is very difficult to replace jumpers of the caliber that we had the last couple years. This year, we just have to hang on and do the best we can. It helps to have Harris there. She is a veteran high jumper who has scored points at the Pac-10s for us in that event, as well as in the heptathlon. She is concentrating on the high jump this year. She has shown she can jump at a high level, so if she comes through again, that will really help us. Our other jumpers are going to have to develop this season."

Though All-American Cynthia Ademiluyi departs, USC once again has a star-studded throws program. Returning is 2002 NCAA javelin runner-up **Inga Stasiulionyte** (186-10), a junior who won the 2001 NCAA title as a freshman. The Pac-10 record holder, she is as good as any other javelin thrower in the nation. It took an American record by Purdue's Serene Ross to defeat her last season, but this season, she will be a favorite to recapture the crown. Backing her up normally would be another outstanding javelin thrower, junior **Leslie Erickson** (168-11). However, Erickson has an elbow injury and will miss the season. Freshman **Andrea McBride** (178-9) should more than pick up the slack, though. She has the potential to make quite an immediate impact at USC. In the hammer, USC has the dynamic one-two punch of senior **Julianna Tudja** (210-11) and junior **L'Orangerie Crawford** (205-5). Tudja is the school record holder, while Crawford is No. 2 all time. Tudja placed third in the hammer at the NCAAs as a 2001 sophomore, while Crawford was sixth as a sophomore last season. The combo gives USC two of the best hammer throwers in the nation. Not to be counted out is versatile senior Amy Thiel (187-5), who was seventh in the hammer at the Pac-10s and is currently fifth on the all-time USC hammer chart. Thiel also throws the shot (47-10) and discus (159-10), while the aforementioned Crawford (53-8 1/4) is an all-star performer in the shot put as well and has the potential to be the best in USC history in that event.

"Stasiulionyte is a great athlete who has been exceptional for us since day one," said Alice. "McBride is another great athlete in the javelin. She played volleyball and basketball in New Zealand. We hope she can help us right away. We are very strong in the hammer with Tudja and Crawford. Tudja owns the school record and Crawford is right behind her. They both give us great experience and talent in the hammer. I expect Crawford to also improve in the shot, where she has loads of potential. Thiel is an all-around thrower. She helps us in three events, so she is invaluable."

The women's pole vault had its inaugural season at USC in 2002. Sophomore **Melissa Astete** (12-6) is the cornerstone of the program and she turned in a solid freshman season, finishing ninth at the Pac-10s. She certainly has the potential to be one of the best pole vaulters in the conference. Sophomore **Shannon Lewallen** (11-7) backs up Astete.

"Astete just missed scoring at the Pac-10s last season," said Alice. "She has the talent to score some points for us this year. Lewallen gives us a bit of depth there."

With Spring Harris concentrating on the high jump, USC will not have a competitor in the heptathlon.

Though the Women of Troy have lost a lot of starpower, Alice is confident that his team will perform at a high level when it counts.

"A lot of it has to do with how our people develop," said Alice. "Like I said before, we have some voids in the distances and horizontal jumps. But we are solid in the throws and sprints. We have enough NCAA points stored to fair well at that level, but as for the conference and dual meets, we will have to wait and see."

Alice runs perhaps the top women's program in the country. The Women of Troy are the only team in the country to finish in the NCAA top three each of the last four years while winning at least one NCAA team title. Last year, his squad finished third at the NCAAs. It was led by the most celebrated sprinter in collegiate history, Angela Williams, who won an unprecedented fourth NCAA 100m title and later was awarded the Honda/Broderick Cup given to the nation's top female collegiate athlete. In 2001, the Women of Troy put on a near-perfect meet to win their first NCAA team title. In 2000, USC took second--at the time, their best-ever showing at the NCAAs. In 1999, USC was the only program that finished in the top five in both men's and women's track and field, as the women were third and the men fifth. In 1998, the women's team finished in fifth place. In 1997 they placed 14th, but that came on the heels of their first-ever Pac-10 title and a seventh-place NCAA finish in 1996. Alice's women's teams are feature powerhouse athletes who go on to shine on the national and world stages, including such stars as Williams, Natasha Danvers, Brigita Langerholc and Torri Edwards.

Under the guidance of Alice and company, the Trojan men went on a run of seven consecutive top 10 finishes--a feat last accomplished during the late 1960s and early 1970s under Verne Wolfe--from 1994-2000 and have won three Pac-10 titles in the last six years. The hallmark of an Alice team is balance--after all, the sport he coaches is called track and field--and his tenure has been marked by squads that have been able to compete for championships at the national, conference and dual meet level. Last season, his young men's team finished third in the Pac-10 and tied for 11th at the NCAAs. The previous season--2001--the Trojans were 12th at the NCAA meet and 2nd in the conference, while snapping crosstown rival UCLA's dual-meet win streak at 22. The seven seasons prior to 2001, Troy finished no lower than seventh at the NCAAs (including three top-5 finishes) and won three Pac-10 titles. During his tenure, Trojan men have won six NCAA individual titles, garnered All-American acclaim 67 times and set six school records--not an easy task considering the glorious track and field history at USC.

USC's past successes in track and field are well known: 29 NCAA championships (including two indoor titles), 61 world

records, 87 Olympic team members, 40 Olympic gold medals and 16 inductees in the U.S. National Track and Field Hall of Fame - all encapsulated in 103 years of a rich and storied tradition.

And now, with the second century of Trojan track and field already well underway, Ron Allice and his staff continue to work hard to maintain the luster of USC's most successful athletic program.

Alice, a prep standout at Long Beach (Calif.) Poly High, is well known for his ability to win. His overall dual meet coaching mark is 211-41-1 in 34 years at five schools, including 11 state championships in 16 years at Long Beach City College, his previous stop before landing at Troy. Alice's programs have produced more than 237 All-Americans, plus 16 Olympians, four world record holders and seven American record holders. He has coached at his high school, junior college and college alma maters on the way to compiling his outstanding coaching statistics.

- USC's track and field programs had more points combined at the 2001 NCAA Championships--64 by the women and 22 by the men for a grand total of 86 points--than any other university.



Alice has certainly reached the top echelon of his career, although he has not forgotten the beginnings of his coaching days. In his first coaching job, he guided the Long Beach Comets, a girls' and women's AAU program, for four years (1964-68), expanding the squad from just five girls to more than 150 competitors. During that time, he was also a graduate assistant at Long Beach State in 1964, an assistant at Compton (Calif.) High in 1966 (the team was second at the CIF championships) and the head coach for track and cross country for two years (1967-68) at Wilson High in Long Beach.

The next three seasons (1969-71), he was the track and cross country coach at Poly High in Long Beach. His track teams went 23-4 and captured the Moore League title each year. His 1971 squad was ranked as California's top dual meet team and was fifth at the state meet.

Alice was then Cal Poly Pomona's track and cross country head coach for two years (1972-73). Again, the success he had enjoyed at previous stops followed him — the Broncos lost only one dual meet, won two CCAA titles (a first in school history) and finished fifth in 1972 and sixth in 1973 at the NCAA College Division championships.

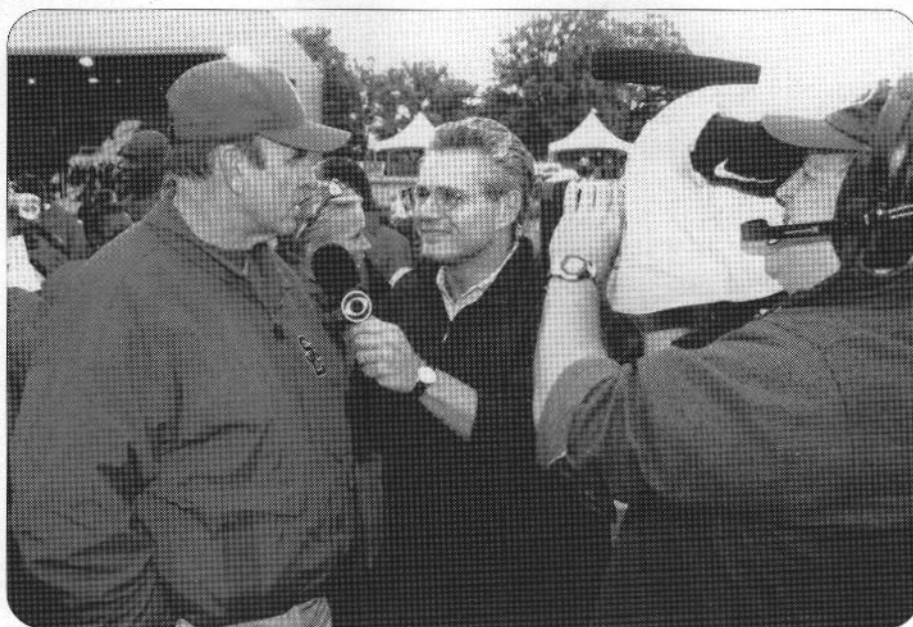
He spent the next five seasons (1974-78) as the track and cross country head coach at Long Beach State. Despite being a new Division I program and having just three scholarships, four of his squads placed among the nation's Top 15 dual meet teams. He won one Pacific Coast Athletic Association title and his teams finished second twice. Two of his cross country teams won the PCAA crown (two others were runners-up).

In 1979, Alice went to Long Beach City College. During his tenure (1979-94), his men's teams won the conference championship all 16 years and lost only one dual meet (78-1) in that time. Besides the 11 state crowns (including five in a row), his Vikings had five state runner-up finishes and won 14 Southern California championships (with two second-place finishes). In 1980, his team was selected by Track & Field News as the best junior college team in history. He was named the 1992 Coach of the Year by both the California Community College Coaches Association and the California Coaches Association (CCA). He also coached LBCC's cross country teams, including the 1990 state titlist and the 1991 state runner-up. He was the 1992 CCA Cross Country Coach of the Year.

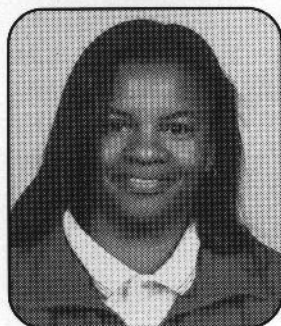
Alice's achievements have not only been limited to the coaching ranks. He prepped at Long Beach Poly High (where he was a CIF finalist in the 440-yard dash), then went to Long Beach City College before attending Long Beach State, where he set the school record in the 440-yard dash. He was inducted into Long Beach State's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1993.

Alice received his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1962 and his master's in physical education in 1970, both from Long Beach State.

He and his wife, Sharlene, have three children: Lance (35, who is a sports and marketing agent as well as a substitute teacher at Long Beach Poly High), Melinda (33, a USC graduate who is a worker in the field of geriatric and special patient care in the Bay Area) and Sean (27, a graduate of the USC School of Cinema who works in film production).

Women's Sprints

Tina Fernandez is in her fourth year as the women's sprint coach at USC.

Under her guidance, the USC women's sprint crew has been the best in the nation the past few years.

Last season was a banner season as senior Angela Williams won an unprecedented fourth NCAA 100m title. Williams also went on to win the prestigious Honda/Broderick Cup honoring the nation's top female collegiate athlete, joining basketball's Cheryl Miller as the only USC athletes to win the award. But it wasn't just Williams who achieved excellence in 2002. Natasha Mayers became the first USC woman ever to win the NCAA 200m title, and she nearly stole the 100m as well, as Williams out-leaned her at the tape. Kinshasa Davis finished eighth in the 200m, while the 400m relay squad finished third at the NCAAs. At the 2002 Pac-10s, five USC sprinters made the final of the 100m--a dominating tour de force for the Women of Troy sprint corps. In 2001, Angela Williams won her unprecedented third consecutive NCAA 100m title, while Kinshasa Davis took third in the 200m at the NCAAs and the women's 400m relay placed second.

At the 2000 NCAAs, the 400m relay squad finished undefeated on the season by winning the NCAA title in a school-record 43.14, while Davis, who had run a nation-leading 22.69 earlier in the year, took second in the 200m. Williams won her second-straight NCAA 100m title.

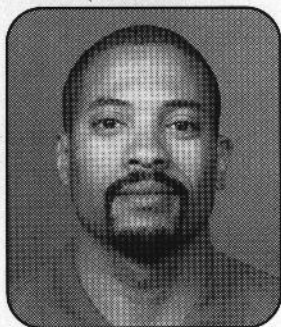
A fine sprinter herself in college, Fernandez competed at Long Beach City College and later at Fresno State.

She is currently Co-Coordinator of the Physical Education Elementary Program at Lynwood Unified school district and is working on her second Masters Degree in education from Argosy University.

Her husband, Sean, is the defensive coordinator at Lynwood high school. They have two children: one boy, Twin, age 11, and one girl, T'lcis, age eight.

Men's Sprints/Decathlon/Recruiting Coordinator

John Henry Johnson enters his ninth year as one of the top assistant coaches in the nation. He works specifically with USC's men's sprinters and decathletes, and is the team's strength coach, but it is his prowess on the recruiting trail that has been the most instrumental in putting Troy back on the map.

Each of USC's past eight men's and women's recruiting classes have ranked among the best in the nation, and his 2004 women's class promises to be a blockbuster. This season's women's and men's classes were ranked in the top five by Track and Field News. Johnson has brought into the Trojan fold such superstars as Jerome Davis, Felix Sanchez, Denis Kholev, Charles Lee, Ryan Wilson and Julien Kapek on the men's side, and Angela Williams, Natasha Danvers, Brigita Langerholc, Grezyna Penc and Inga Stasiulionyte on the women's side. His extensive knowledge of the world amateur track scene--bought by a degree in international relations--has proved invaluable to USC and has established Johnson as perhaps the preeminent recruiter of foreign track and field athletes in the last quarter century.

Johnson has coached USC's last three sprint All-Americans. In the 100m, Sultan McCullough captured such honors in 2000 and Jason Shelton did so in 1996. In the 200m, Charles Lee was an All-American in 1998 and 1999. Johnson also leads one of the top decathlon programs in the country, with five of his athletes scoring over 7,000 in the past three years.

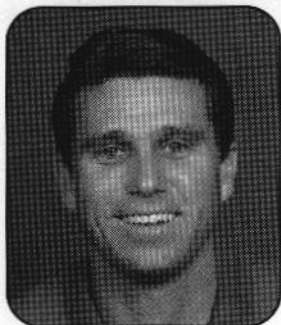
Johnson, who was a state champion in the decathlon for Ron Allice at Long Beach City College (1987), also earned All-Pacific-10 Conference honors while competing at UCLA. After surpassing the 7,000-point mark in the decathlon for the Bruins, he graduated with a degree in international relations in 1990.

A track and football star at West Technical High in Cleveland, Ohio, Johnson--who is the son of former NFL-great John Henry Johnson--became an assistant coach at Long Beach State from 1990-92, where he worked with sprinters and throwers. He also served as a strength coach for the 49ers.

In 1993, Johnson studied abroad, spending time in Mexico and Spain, as well as the Center for Intensive Language Studies in Costa Rica. His hobbies include writing, playing and recording music.

DAN LANGE

Throws

After 13 years of coaching the Trojan throwers, Dan Lange is one of the nation's most respected teachers, having coached his athletes to All-American honors 31 times.

The 37-year-old Lange guided former Trojan and 1996 Olympic gold medalist Balazs Kiss to four consecutive NCAA hammer throw championships (and a collegiate record) and aided USC throwers across the board with his vast knowledge in the sport. In 1997, despite the departure of Kiss, Lange made it five in a row, coaching Bengt Johansson to the 1997 NCAA hammer title. Johansson was runner up in the hammer in 1998, as was Norbert Horvath in 1999 (Horvath also finished fifth in 2000 and third in 2001). At the 2000 Pac-10 Championships, USC continued its men's hammer domination, sweeping the top four spots to key the Trojans' title run. In 2001, Horvath captured his third straight Pac-10 hammer title and third straight All-American honor. In 2002, Lange guided walk ons Michael Murray and Harrison Lee into the Pac-10 finals.

On the women's side, he has coached 2001 NCAA javelin champ and Pac-10 record-holder Inga Stasiulionyte, 2001 All-American and current school hammer record-holder Julianna Tudja, 2002 hammer All-Ameri-

can L'Orangerie Crawford, 2001 shot put All-American and school discus record holder Cynthia Ademiluyi, two-time hammer All-American Jennifer Vail, 1996 Pac-10 heptathlon champion and NCAA runner-up Nicole Haynes and Leslie Coons (a former American record holder in the hammer).

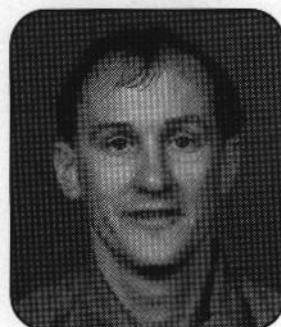
Lange is also currently coaching two-time U.S. Olympian Adam Setliff (the No. 1 discus thrower in the U.S.) and Lisa Misipeka, the No. 3 hammer-thrower in the world.

A four-year letterman at Cal State Northridge and three-time NCAA Division II championship meet qualifier, Lange also earned All-American honors in the hammer. Lange studied exercise physiology at Cal State Northridge and also works as a sports fitness consultant.

He and his wife Darcy (Arreola), who was one of America's finest middle distance runners and a former NCAA champion, reside in Valencia, Calif., with their son, Dylan, age two.

TOM WALSH

Distances/Women's Cross Country

Tom Walsh enters his ninth year as middle and long distance coach at USC. He also serves as the head women's cross country coach.

During his tenure, the Women of Troy middle and long distance program has consistently been one of the best in the country. In fact, no other middle-distance program in the country--except for USC's under Tom Walsh--has had a four-time All-American in both the 800m and the 1500m at the NCAA Championships.

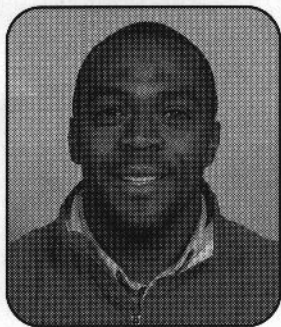
During the last seven years, USC middle and long distance runners have captured All-American honors 17 times, including an NCAA 800m championship by four-time All-American Brigita Langerholc in 2001. Langerholc also finished a surprising fourth in the 800m at the 2000 Olympics in Sydney in a school-record time of 1:58.51. Walsh also coached Grazyna Penc, a four-time All-American in the 1,500m. Penc

finished third in 1996 and 1998, fourth in 1997 and was runner up in 1999. Emebet Shiferaw was a two-time All-American in the 3,000m in 1996-97. Her best NCAA finish was second place. Anna Lopaciuch twice earned All-American honors in the 1500m, finishing fifth in 1998 and third in 2000. Last season, Aleksandra Deren placed seventh in the 800m at the NCAAs. This past cross country season, Brooke Thomas became the second Woman of Troy athlete in as many years to qualify for the NCAA Championships, joining 2001's Sarah Ellis as two of only four Trojans ever to qualify for the NCAA Cross Country Championships.

Walsh graduated from USC in 1988, and served as a graduate assistant at his alma mater for three years in the late 1980s. He also served as a track and field consultant for ABC and NBC during the U.S. Olympic Trials.

MIKE PULLINS

Jumps

Mike Pullins is in his fifth year as jumps coach at USC. Coach "Mike," as he likes to be called, is responsible for coaching both the women and men's jumpers.

Under his tutelage, the USC jumpers have been mainstays on the honors podium at the NCAA Championships.

In 2002, Julien Kapek set a school triple jump record with a jump of 55-8 1/2 and then went on to place third at the NCAAs. The year prior, Djeke Mambo became the first Trojan to win both the long jump and triple jump at the Pac-10s since Luther Hayes in 1961.

On the women's side, he guided Tatyana Obukhova to her third-straight Pac-10 triple jump championship and a fourth-place finish at the NCAAs in 2002. The year before, Obukhova was third at the NCAAs. In his

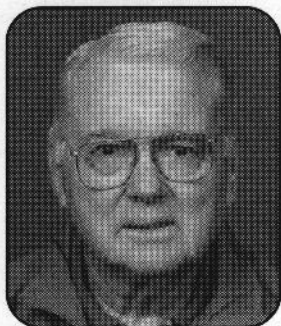
first year, he coached Pam Simpson to a third-place finish at the 1999 NCAAs. He also helped Disia Page and Stephanie Jones land on the USC top 10 charts in the long jump.

A 1987 graduate of USC, his name is still among the top ten triple jumpers on the all-time Trojan charts. As a high school senior Mike qualified for the CIF Championships in four individual events and went on to win the triple jump, in which he placed fifth in the 1982 state meet. Mike starred at Cal State Northridge and Pasadena City College before coming to Troy. A three-time USA Track & Field outdoor qualifier, he was forced to set track aside due to injuries and four ankle surgeries in 1994.

Mike is single and currently working on his master's degree in education.

JOE LANNING

Hurdles/Heptathlon

Joe Lanning is in his fifth year at USC after coming out of retirement. His main responsibility is coaching the hurdlers on both the men's and women's squads as well as the women's heptathlon.

Lanning is currently out and recovering after suffering a serious fall. Ron Allice is coaching the hurdles until Lanning returns.

In 2002, Ryan Wilson placed sixth in the 110m HH at the NCAAs, following a third-place finish in 2001. Natasha Neal also placed sixth last year in the 100m HH. But 2000 was a season to remember for Lanning, as two of his proteges came away with NCAA glory. Natasha Danvers and Felix Sanchez each won the NCAA 400m hurdles title in school-record times. Danvers went on to the finals of the 400m hurdles at the

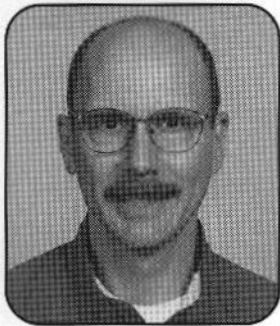
Sydney Olympics, while Sanchez reached the semifinals and went on to win the 400m IH at the World Championships in 2001 (he is currently ranked No. 1 in the world). Lanning also guided then-freshmen Ryan Wilson and Marcell Allmond to a 1-2 finish in the 110m HH at the 2000 Pac-10 Championships.

Lanning, the former head coach at Long Beach City College, was Ron Allice's mentor in his undergraduate days and later assisted Allice there for 16 years. During his time as the head coach at Long Beach City College, Lanning won 15 state championships and 22 Southern California titles. In addition, 41 of his athletes won individual state titles and 60 Southern California championships, including hurdler Earl McCullouch, who later became a Trojan and world record holder.

He is a member of the California Community College Track & Field Hall of Fame, and the Long Beach Century Club Hall of Fame.

That's because the Women of Troy, for the second year in a row, sent one of its athletes to the NCAA Cross Country Championships.

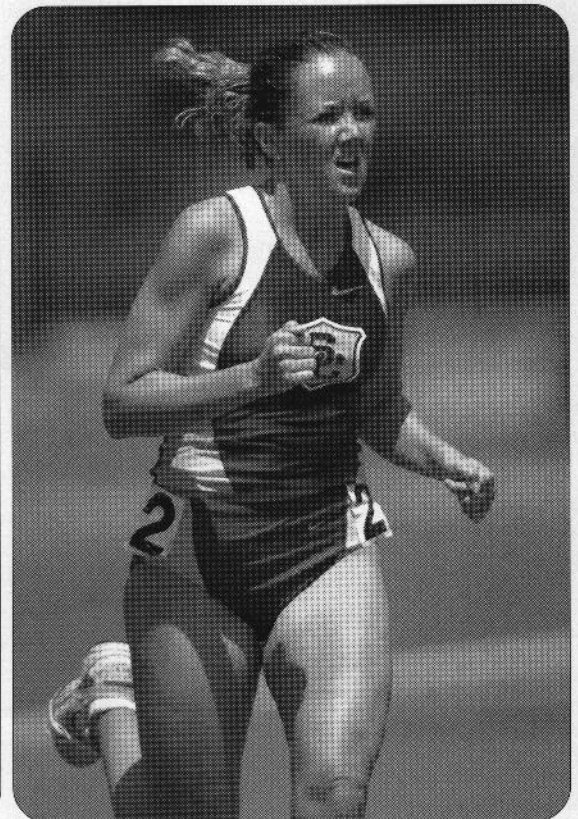

The 100-meter dash is the glamour event of track and field and the standard by which human speed is measured. To win one of these championships at the NCAA level is itself a remarkable feat. To do so twice requires amazing skill and mental toughness. Winning three times when the gun goes off is very rare—in the history of the NCAA Division I track and field championships, there have been only four athletes, male or female, who have won three 100-meter dash titles. They are Ralph Metcalfe of Marquette (1932-34), Mel Patton of USC (1947-49) and Charlie Greene of Nebraska (1965-67).

Only one athlete in NCAA history at any level has ever won four 100-meter dash titles.

*That athlete's name is **Angela Williams***

In doing so, Williams surpassed the collegiate feats of such track greats as Merlene Ottey, Florence Griffith, Gwen Torrance, Inger Miller and Gail Devers.

And in the process, she has achieved sports immortality.

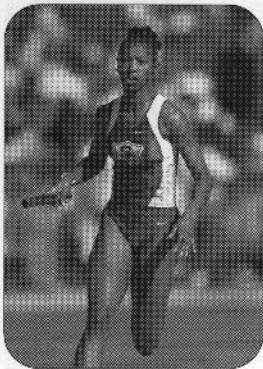

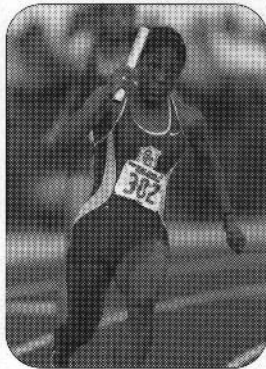

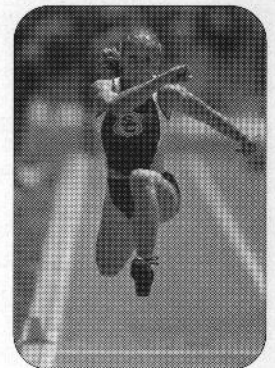
