The Simple Meaning of Grandparents Day

"A day for young and old to honor each other, and an opportunity for civic engagement for all generations." -- The Legacy Project

The woman who diligently worked to establish and promote what would become National Grandparents Day had the simple desire to make the day solely about family and the enduring ties that families have within themselves and the communities around them. Her work started in 1970, appealing to business, church, civic, and political leaders to eventually getting the day recognized in West Virginia in 1973 and ultimately leading to the national proclamation recognition in 1978 by then president, Jimmy Carter, to be celebrated the first Sunday following Labor Day.

Although the day does not garner the fanfare of other holidays like Mother's Day or Father's Day, the purpose and subject of the day is equally important to give "us a chance to publicly affirm the identity and importance of grandparents, that they do play a vital role in families. It is also a day of giving – giving of self; sharing hopes, dreams, and values; and setting an example and advocating for future generations."

Uncovering African American Family Records

On August 26, a venture between Wake County's Register of Deeds and Shaw University officially began, and its mission of "shining a light on the area's dark history of slavery" hopes to be fulfilled by uncovering records of area African American families.

With the popularity of genealogy sites, many African Americans have found that it is difficult or nearly impossible to locate ancestor records. The Enslaved Persons Project hopes to change some of that by cataloging and creating a centralized database of searchable records and digitized images. The deeds are part of a larger Digital Library on American Slavery. The other parts are the Race and Slavery Petitions Project, the North Carolina Runaway Slave Advertisements Project, and the Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade Database.
