Que Syrah Syrah

In a world where bigger is often considered better, Syrah definitely delivers. Maybe even bigger and better than, do I dare say, Cabernet Sauvignon? Well, it is darker than Cabernet Sauvignon and produces some of the most full-bodied red wines in the world. Syrah, aka Shiraz, packs a punch of flavor plus it contains high amounts of health-invigorating antioxidants...just what the doctor ordered! So, what is the difference between Syrah, Shiraz and Petite Sirah? Syrah is what it's called in France's Rhone Valley where it is known by the names of the various Rhone villages (i.e. Hermitage, Cote-Rotie, St. Joseph) and Shiraz is what winemakers in Australia (and New Zealand and South Africa) typically call it. And to clarify, Petite Sirah is an entirely different grape, not to be confused with Syrah/Shiraz.

Syrah, which means 'princess' in Arabic, is anything but delicate. It produces concentrated, intense, powerful, age-worthy red wines with dark fruit flavors ranging from sweet blueberry to savory black olive. Most Old World Syrah's have more acidity and earthy-herbaceous aromas while the New World styles are more fruit-driven with lots of spice. Some of the most highly regarded and expensive styles are from the 340+ acre appellation called Hermitage in the Northern Rhone Valley of France, prized for their floral and smoky aromas of blackberry and grilled meat.

The Northern Rhone Valley is where most New World producers have taken inspiration and have realized that Syrah is most suited to cool climates. And terroir is the reason for the high-quality Syrahs coming from Washington state. The varied geography, soil and climate has put Washington on the Syrah map, but it took some time and understanding to get to that point. Early on, many young winemakers misunderstood the grape and produced styles similar to Cabernet Sauvignon, using too much oak that crushed the nuances of the grape. Much has changed over the years and now high-quality Syrah is being made and is considered a standout varietal in Washington. Washington Syrahs are savory yet fruit and floral, very much like Northern Rhone wines.

Tenet Wines is a project between the iconic Washington state winery Chateau Ste. Michelle, the acclaimed Rhone winemaker Michel Gassier, and famed Rhone enology consultant Philippe Cambie. It establishes a parallel between Syrahs from the renowned Rhone Valley and its tremendous potential in Washington state.

"I love the elegance, balance and the strong sense of place Washington Syrah has," says Gassier. "The goal of the project is to focus on that sense of place. We want The Pundit to be a measuring stick for Rhone varieties in Washington."

I would say, mission accomplished!

Tasting Notes:

90% Syrah, 4% Grenache, 4% Mourvedre, 2% Viognier

Style: complex, fragrant, medium-bodied, rich

Nose: dark berry fruits, pepper, subtle smoky meat note

Palate: ripe blackberry, raspberry, blueberry, spice

Finish: smooth, fine tannins, long silky finish

Pairing:

Syrahs from Washington can easily be enjoyed on their own. However, if you

are looking to pair it with your next meal, look for rich roasted or grilled foods like herb-crusted lamb, steak with chimichurri sauce, beef stew, braised short ribs, or even some BBQ.

Where to buy:
