
Ahoy to The Hoys

Didja Know???

Let's take a break from our Old Saybrook history lessons and have some ice cream, specifically some Dairy Queen. What resident of Saybrook Manor has not been to OS DQ...presumably not many. It is an institution here in town. And as you may recall from the very first "Didja Know???" way back in October, 2024, Dairy Queen is technically within the boundaries of Saybrook Manor.

Cones, Sundaes, Dilly Bars, and "Blizzards" aside what do we really know about Dairy Queen?

The first Dairy Queen was owned and operated by Sherb Noble and opened on June 22, 1940, in Joliet, Illinois. The company became International Dairy Queen (IDQ) in 1962. In 1987, IDQ purchased the old mall-staple Orange Julius, and in 1998, Warren Buffet's Berkshire Hathaway purchased IDQ. The rest is history, and...(oops, I promised no history)...so let's talk about Blizzards!!!

How many of you turn a Blizzard upside down after you purchase one, just to be sure it is packed in as tightly as concrete? It may be an urban legend, but supposedly, DQ employees must "flip the Blizzard" before they serve it to you, or your next one is free. But who knows for sure.

What is the least healthy item to order at DQ? A large Royal Reese's Brownie Blizzard. This deliciously lethal concoction contains 1,500 calories (75% of one's RDA), 72 grams of fat (that's a full day's worth), 149 grams of sugar (you don't even want to know), and almost as much sodium as an 8-ounce bag of potato chips. But as Pope Francis used to say, "Who am I to judge?"

The largest US DQ is in Bloomington, Illinois, where the company headquarters is currently located. And the largest DQ in the world is located in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia. There are 6,800 locations worldwide. And there is a DQ in every state except Vermont.



These are from the Tennis Courts. I am not sure where they were but guess that they were close to the Club House. I cannot place the background house or garage. I can identify only four people in this picture. Mary Kirk is the lady on the far right of picture and her brother at far left. (Editor's note: Mary is mother of Francine Kindl and our current SMA Treasurer, Kathy Bennetto, who along with their sister Maureen, comprised the wild SMA Cosgrove Girls from way-backwhen...and they are still pretty wild). His house is the one in back of the Cosgrove home. Lucy Vasquez Wadsworth is in the back row peeking over the shoulder. The man in the rear, middle, is Peter Buoniuto.

In 1873, Carlo Viggiano emigrated to the US. He and his wife Julia raised four children, daughters Mary, Katy, Lucia and one son Antonio. Antonio used to sell produce to locals off the back of a truck. His produce was of such high quality that his customers included the likes of Kathryn Hepburn and Art Carney. The original farm stand relocated to the Post Road, next to Atlantic Seafood, and is currently operated by Carlo's grandson, David Viggiano. It's an Old Saybrook institution for sure, and the produce is still great.

"I Can See Clearly Now"




After a huge downpour, blue skies and puffy cumulus clouds adorn the skies over the L.I. Sound, making for a beautiful scene.
