

Old Saybrook used to encompass not only the current town of Old Saybrook, but Westbrook, all "The Lymes", Chester, Essex, and Deep River. As these settlements grew in population, it became more difficult to travel to Old Saybrook for services, so they founded their own stores and churches, which ultimately turned into separate towns.

Had they remained a part of Old Saybrook, our town would currently have 60,820 residents, and would be the 14th most populated town in the state, just 30 residents shy of Meriden.

Old Saybrook would encompass a whopping 191.1 square miles, more than three times the size of the largest town in Connecticut (New Milford), and just 9 square miles shy of Brooklyn/Manhattan/Queens, with a whopping 6.8 million residents.
