

Hurricane Carol - 1954

Editor's Note: These pictures are from 1954, just before and after the Hurricane Carol, a Category 3 hurricane with winds gusts as high as 135 mph. Storm surges exceeded 14 feet in some places. Total damages were approximately \$460 million 1954 dollars, (roughly \$5.3 billion dollars in 2025). Thousands of homes, cars and boats were destroyed, and 65 lives were lost.



(above) This was taken a few days before from the front yard of the Dooley/Bonvino cottage. The cottage in the background sits on the left side of Cove Beach. It and all the cottages across the channel in the far background were totally destroyed. Those across the channel were rebuilt essentially as they were only raised and of sturdier construction. Note, in 1954, there were no cottages on the left side of Middletown Ave (from Appleby cottage to the beach).



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The picture above was taken in the eye of the storm. No one, in those days, knew what it was. Everyone thought the hurricane was over. The young boy in the foreground is Charles Nigrelli.

Note that the pier was still intact at that time. The Maynard book has a good picture of the pre-1938 pier. That one had stairs at the end going down on the Hartford Ave side of the pier. The pier after 1938 had the stairs at the end going straight off the end into the channel. Also, large rocks were under the new pier mostly to the Hartford Ave side and under the pilings of the rest area and those rocks were separated from the swimming area by a jetty on the Hartford Ave. side that went the length of the pier. The eye later passed and the greater storm hit.



(above) After the eye passed this is what the beach, looking from Middletown Ave over Cove Beach. The flow from the Oyster and Back Rivers going past the beach was tremendously fast and furious.

The roof to the rest area on the Pier is seen. Where the TV (it is huge for the time) came from is unknown.

The large block of concrete was the pedestal for the fireplace for the cottage that was lost in 1939. To get a feeling on how much the beach changed, the top of that pedestal was nearly even with the ground the day before. Part of the dune, covered with sea grass, shows how much more sand was removed in years since 1954. The wall that was in front of the house and still standing in 1954 was completely gone as well.



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(above) This is the beach front, Harford Ave. side. Here the waves had broken through the windows and doors, damaged and flooded the first floors. The two houses on the end of Middletown Ave had flooding damages but were less damaged overall. The two houses now in the middle of the beach where the inner wall has been removed may have been built post 1954. If they were there, I did not notice any real damage.

Didja Know???

When you hear the word "block," the first thing you probably think of is a building block, a football block, a stumbling block, "New Kids on the Block," or 'a chip off the old block.' Perhaps Block Island. Permit us to introduce Adriaen Block, renowned nautical Dutch explorer.

After hearing about Henry Hudson's exploration of what would eventually be called the Hudson River, the Dutch decided to explore the New World looking for lucrative beaver pelts. Captain Block was considered the first European to enter the Long Island Sound and the Connecticut River in 1614. His maps ultimately established Manhattan and Long Island as actual islands. He explored the Connecticut River up to Enfield. A Dutch settlement was established near Hartford, well before Thomas Hooker and his gang of Puritans came to settle the area. Adriaen also named Block Island (after himself), Rhode Island (after the red clay he encountered) and the Housatonic River (the river of red hills).

But what does all of this have to do with Old Saybrook? Well, in 1623, fearing that the English were going to take over the area, he deposited a small number of men and women settlers at the mouth of the river, near Saybrook Point, in the approximate area of Ye Olde Block & Dine, where they resided for a few months, before they froze their proverbial blocks off and returned from whence they came. And had not Lords Saye and Brooke (refer to past "Didja Know" article) come along to rename the area, we might all be living "Olde Block."
