Pastor's Note

Having looked last month at the first of three local church relationships in 1 Thessalonians 5:12-15, that of the I) the congregation toward the leadership, I now want to spend some time considering the second relationship, that of II) the leadership toward the congregation. Next month we will wrap up this series by looking at c) the relationship of each member to other members.

- I. Congregation toward the leadership, 1 Thessalonians 5:12-13.
- II. Leadership toward the congregation, 1 Thessalonians 5:13.

The passage of our focus reads, "But we request of you, brethren, that you appreciate those who diligently labor among you, and have charge over you in the Lord and give you instruction, and that you esteemed them very highly in love because of their work. Live in peace with one another." – 1 Thessalonians 5:13-13.

Turning to the relationship of the leadership to the congregation, we read of three principles: "diligently labor," "have charge," and "give instruction." That the same Greek article connects all three participles implies that these three

responsibilities are required of each church leader.

To begin, a leader is to "diligently labor" among his flock. These two words are a translation of the Greek word, kopiao.

The commentator, Fredrich Hauck writes,

"In secular Greek *kopos* means a) beating, weariness as though one had been beaten, and b) the exertion or trouble which causes the state. In prose, it is the proper word for physical tiredness induced by work, exertion, or heat. Expressing severe labor, it is synonymous with *kopos*, which signifies the most tense or strenuous effort, e.g., of the soldier in battle, or the exertions of messengers or manual workers."

If leaders desire their church's respect, they will have to work for it. Let us not forget the admonition, "if any man aspires to the office of overseer, is a fine work [not office] he desires to do" (1 Timothy 3:1). Church leaders need to be in their study early devoting a large part of each day to the task. In the words of John Wesley, "Either read or get out of the ministry!"

The second responsibility of leaders, and perhaps the most basic, is that of having "charge" over a congregation (see Hebrews 13:7, "Remember those who led you, who spoke the word of God to you, and considering the result of their conduct, imitate their faith"). It carries the idea of guarding, protecting, supporting, or being concerned. An interesting study of the word is its uses in 1 Timothy 3:4–5 & 12, where the new American Standard translates it as "manage" and compares it to managing a household and family.

It was said earlier that a congregation is to support its leadership with more than just weekly attendance and financial backing; likewise, a church leader needs to be more to a congregation than just a "preacher." There needs to be a deep—and deepening—relationship, something tantamount to a covenant. Such a relationship gives leaders the ability to discern problems in their infancy as well as convey love and understanding to those who may someday need a leader's guidance and admonition.

Next, we read of giving "instruction." This is another of the fundamental activities of a church leader. Being "able to teach" is a requirement of an overseer in 1 Timothy 3:2, and is to be one of his goals when dealing with people who oppose the work, cf. 2 Timothy 2:24–25. Teaching is so woven into the pastoral role that in Ephesians 4:11 the spiritual gift is referred to as "pastor—teacher."

One Greek lexicon has this comment on the word translated as "instruction": "Instruction is one way to translate the Greek word *noutheteo*, used in this section twice (as instruct and admonish) the word is a combination of *nous* (mind) and *tithemi* (put into). So the idea is to admonish, exhort, instruct, or warn with an emphasis on influencing the will and disposition and not only the mind."

The instructing work of a church leader is one of the most encouraging, and at the same time, most discouraging work he will do. It is here that real ministry takes place and real opposition can be expected. Instruction, by its very nature, demands changes take place in a person's life and this is often difficult work.

Space does not allow for many illustrations of such work in action, but one example is found in Acts 20:31 where Paul says, "Therefore be on the alert, remembering that night and day for a period of three years I did not cease to admonish each one with tears." It is evident that this ministry was not just academic, but emotional (it was with tears), nor was it only in a corporate worship setting (it was with "each one"). Paul's tears were no doubt sometimes tears of joy at seeing a life turned around and sometimes tears of heartache as he witnessed people self-destruct in disregard to his admonitions.

Back in the early 1990s, a Fuller Institute survey noted that 40% of pastors surveyed reported a clash with a church member at least once a month, 50% felt ill-suited for the difficulty of the pastorate, 70% had a lower self-image than when they begin the ministry, and a whopping 90% felt inadequately trained for ministry. In the wake of covid restrictions, political turmoil, and shifting cultural winds against the church during the past thirty years, these statistics have not improved. Considering such conditions, it seems long past the time for church leaders and church members to take seriously the principles presented in this passage

The benefits of being a pastor or member of a healthy congregation are unending. The pastor becomes stronger and better able to exemplify a godly lifestyle to those watching, and the individual members will be healthier and more satisfied as they sense themselves being blessed in doing the work of God (John 13:17, "If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them").

Next month we will wrap up this series by looking at a set of God-given instructions that address the relationship of each believer to the other members of his/her church.
