- **Mozambique** (*Human Develop. Index*, <u>HDI</u> 185<sup>th</sup> out of 190 countries, 2021)
- 834,304 IDPs and 420,200 returnees across Northern Mozambique (IOM DTM)



#### **ASSISTANCE**

- +1 million people assisted in 2022 with lifesaving support across all partners
- 750,000 people targeted to receive food assistance in July-August (caseload decreasing after the start of VBT in April)



1. Muidumbe (85,706); 2. Mocimboa da Praia (71,409); 3. Mueda (50.568)









### IPC - Food Insecurity Map Cabo Delgado November 2022 – March 2023



- The highest number of people facing Crisis (IPC Phase 3) or Emergency (IPC Phase 4) acute food insecurity are found in the districts of Cabo Delgado, Gaza and Nampula.
- A total of over **690K people are in IPC3+** (high acute food insecurity Cabo Delgado.
- Due to lack of data and low accessibility, 8 of the 17 districts in Cabo Delgado Ibo, Macomia, Meluco, Mocímboa da Praia, Muidumbe, Nangade, Palma, Quissanga – could not be analysed. These districts are the most affected by insecurity and displacement of people.



# **FEWSNET Food Security Outlook**


- According to the FEWSNET Food Security

# TRANSFORMATIVE AGENDA & THE CREATION OF THE CLUSTER SYSTEM

- The cluster approach was adopted in 2005 to address gaps and to increase the effectiveness of humanitarian response by building partnerships.
- It ensures that international responses to humanitarian emergencies are predictable and accountable and have clear leadership by making clearer the division of labour between organizations, and their roles and responsibilities in different areas.



# **CLUSTER ACTIVATION: WHEN & WHY?**


- **1. Response and coordination gaps** exist due to a *sharp* deterioration or significant change in the humanitarian situation.
- 2. Existing national response or coordination capacity is unable to meet needs in a manner that respects humanitarian principles, due to the scale of need, the number of actors involved, the need for a more complex multi-sectoral approach, or other constraints or ability to respond or apply humanitarian principles

## Which activities do Food Security Cluster coordinate?



**Food assistance:** general food distribution, cash based transfers (incl. vouchers), food for assets, food for work



**Agriculture and livelihoods:** Agricultural inputs (seeds, tools), livestock, fisheries



**Rehabilitation/building of productive infrastructure:** rural institutions, ag. land, markets, etc



**Nutrition:** Nutrition-sensitive food security interventions in coordination with the Nutrition Cluster



### **COVERAGE** and ACCESS

- Most of the partners of FSL cluster are present in the southern districts (blue);
- In the northern districts only WFP, FAO, UNDP and UNOPS and a selected group of NGO/INGO's are present (SI, ACF and AMA);
- Food assistance is done by WFP implementing partners and with a few exceptions directly by WFP or via the GoM;
- Livelihoods & Resilience activities mostly based on agriculture and fisheries components;
- Assistance increasing due to returnee movements.




