## An Update on the Government SHUTDOWN

On January 25, 2019, President Trump signed a bill to end the longest government shutdown in history 35 days, allowing the federal government to reopen for three weeks. As of January 20, 800,000 government workers were working without pay because of the government shutdown, which began on December 22, 2018. Though the second longest government shutdown was over taxation during Bill Clinton's presidency in 1995, this government shutdown hinged on funding for the border wall within the federal budget. Because of this, politicians and citizens alike were searching for a compromise to help government workers, who were left working without pay.

The divide in Congress that prolonged the government shutdown stemmed from the inherent wedge between Democrats and Republicans in Congress. The initial bill by President Trump asked for $\$ 5.7$ billion to fund the wall's creation. After thorough debate in Congress, President Trump had to sign the recent bill, which enabled federal government funding for three weeks. Had he not signed it, hundreds of thousands of government workers would have worked without pay for two consecutive paychecks. Similar to previous government shutdowns, the Postal Service, military, Department of Veterans, and entitlement programs were unaffected; unfortunately, the partial government shutdown culminated in ten of the fifteen departments facing a lack of funding.

As a result, the government shutdown also had an effect on national parks, federal prisons, the justice system, and the economy. Because the Department of Agriculture was affected, national parks lacked the funds necessary to continue running. Furthermore, the amount of people showing up to work without pay halved during this shutdown, resulting in prison workers taking double shifts to make up for employee absence. The justice system was altogether halted -- thousands of immigration cases went unresolved. In addition, the government shutdown had detrimental effects on the economy, with JPMorgan estimating a $\$ 1.5$ billion loss per week, and the Congressional Budget Office estimating an $\$ 11$ billion loss total.

Though the government shutdown is technically over, its lingering threat remains. This shutdown exhibited the necessity of the Trump administration to try to overcome their differences and reach a compromise. While the recent bill allots three weeks for federal funding, President Trump stated he would enact another government shutdown if the upcoming budget fails to include funding for the wall. While the government stands shakily to its feet, the question of what comes next still sows doubt in public opinion.

## Pro Sports Refs: Love to Hate Them

The beauty and entertainment of sports is possible due to its rules, set by a rule book and enforced by officials. That is the main reason why a pick-up game outside feels so much more different than the BASIS Homecoming game - pick-up games lack officials and defined guidelines. The referees moderate the game without unfairly changing its outcome. But in recent memory, it seems that they have become a larger talking point than the games themselves. Although fans have always unleashed their anger for poor officiating, tensions reached a new peak in the NFL, with the NFC Championship game between the Saints and Rams, as well as in the NBA, with James Harden's unfair foul calls.

With one minute and forty-nine seconds left in the NFC Championship game, quarterback Drew Brees sailed a pass to open receiver Tommylee Lewis, who was slammed by Rams cornerback Nickell Robey-Coleman well before the ball arrived. The entire stadium was in uproar, looking for a flag, but there was none to be found. This crucial third down blunder by referee Bill Vinovich resulted in a 23-26 loss for the Saints, ending their season in heartbreak once more.

The outrage from this game-altering call has pressured NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell for weeks, being the pinnacle of frustration for all of the terrible calls by refs throughout the season. Take, for example, when Chiefs linebacker Dee Ford received a "roughing the passer" penalty for merely tapping Tom Brady's shoulder on a play in the AFC Championship game. Controversially officiated moments have been plentiful throughout the season, reminding fans of the season when NFL referees went on strike and replacements refs missed call after call. As the satisfaction of NFL games diminishes due to gamechanging calls, it's up to the NFL to find a solution to its controversial penalties issue fast.

James Harden, or "The Beard," is having a historic season. The All-Star is averaging an absurd thirty-five points per contest, but that otherworldly statistic is marred by the twelve free throw attempts he is receiving per game, which result in roughly ten easy points a night. Recently, rival fans have been frustrated with the amount of foul calls Harden has been receiving on a nightly basis, as opposed to other players. This is where referees let the stars of the NBA control them. Harden is a powerhouse driving to the basket, yet any defender who makes miniscule contact to stop him will get called for a foul. In addition to his ability to draw the unfair fouls, Harden uses
his iconic, impossible-to-guard stepback, which raises questions as to what a travel really is. In a game against the Utah Jazz, Harden tested the refs with an illegal double step back move on Ricky Rubio, which went uncalled by officials. Upon further inspection, Harden took almost five to seven steps before getting his shot off, which is far more than the league's "maximum" of two and a half steps. This gaffe went unaddressed; other stars such as Stephen Curry and Kyrie Irving attempted the same move, yet were called for a travel. Harden is one of the top five players in the league regardless, but the NBA referees' seeming favoritism hovers like a dark cloud over all of basketball.

## Esther Eats: BubbleBee

BubbleBee is a boba tea shop that recently opened in Scottsdale Quarter, located off of Scottsdale Road. It's tucked away between Elan Style and HPE Activewear, across from Obon Sushi Bar Ramen. Open from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. from Monday to Saturday, and noon to 6 p.m. on Sundays, it's the perfect drink place to visit for after-school cravings.

The drink shop is mainly white, with yellow as an accent color, and giant honeycombs line the walls to accompany the bumblebee theme. While the space is small, the bright white walls give the illusion of a larger room, and the simple, modern design creates a relaxing atmosphere that's perfect for pictures.

The menu is split into sections based on the different drinks offered at the restaurant, categorized as creamy, fruity, sparkling, coffee, 0 cal, hot, and pure tea. Although the menu stood out from other boba shops, with names such as Ice Age and Cali Girl, I thought the sheer quantity was unnecessary, as it only confused me, and the
menu barely kept up with the bee theme, other than the "Honey Boba" flavor. Despite that, the packaging of the boba was not only adorable, but also unique because of the cups' wider base and shorter height.

When I visited, I ordered the drink called "Craving" with honey boba, which featured passion fruit, strawberry, peach, and white tea. Although, the drink was a bit too sweet for me, but that shouldn't deter anyone with a sweet tooth. The honey boba was similar to offerings at most other boba shops and tasted fruity, but had nothing distinguishable about it. I also tried "King Taro" with honey boba, which contained coconut, taro (the sweet and slightly nutty root of the taro plant) and black tea. I preferred this drink over "Craving" because it had a better texture, like a smoothie. I also sampled mango popping boba, which was delicious, but I prefer chewy tapioca in these kind of drinks.

Overall, I wasn't too impressed by BubbleBee as it was similar to other modern boba shops, but it did provide refreshing drinks that many students would enjoy. I recommend BubbleBee for any student looking for new drink places to try out as the weather gets warmer in Arizona.

However, the president isn't as different from the rest of us as you might think. Many presidents enjoy simple foods that are easy to make in the comfort of your own home. Here are some of those down-to-earth presidents and their favorite recipes in honor of Presidents' Day.

## James Buchanan: Moss Rose Cake

This recipe was one of James Buchanan's favorite because of its subtle almond flavor. Although it may not look as pretty as other cakes, the cake is perfect for small parties and celebrations.

## Ingredients:

2 cups of Sugar
4 eggs
1 cup of milk
$1 / 2$ teaspoon of almond flavoring
2 cups of sifted cake flour

## Directions

-Step 1: Beat the sugar and eggs for 12 minutes.
-Step 2: Heat the milk to boiling and add $1 / 2$ teaspoon of almond flavoring. Set aside.
-Step 3: Stir sifted cake flour into sugar-egg mixture.
-Step 4: Slowly add milk-almond flavoring mixture.
-Step 5: Beat complete mixture for three minutes
-Step 6: Grease and flour two circular cake pans, and then pour mixture evenly into the pans
-Step 7: Bake in oven at $375{ }^{\circ}$ F for $20-25$ minutes

## Bill Clinton: Chicken Enchiladas

Although this isn't the healthiest meal one can have, it sure is one of the tastiest. Also, it's perfect for almost every occasion.

## Ingredients:

2 tablespoons of cooking oil
24 -oz. cans of green chiles
1 minced garlic clove
$128-$ oz. can of tomatoes
2 cups of chopped onions
2 teaspoons of salt
$1 / 2$ teaspoons of oregano
3 cups of shredded cooked chicken
2 cups of sour cream
2 cups of grated cheddar cheese
$1 / 3$ cup of cooking oil
15 corn tortillas

## Directions:

-Step 1: Preheat 2 tablespoons of oil in a skillet.
-Step 2: Chop chiles and sauté with minced garlic in cooking oil.
-Step 3: Drain and break up tomatoes, saving $1 / 2$ cup of the remaining liquid.
-Step 4: Season tomatoes with 1 teaspoon of salt, $1 / 2$ teaspoon of oregano, and the reserved tomato juice.
-Step 5: Let simmer until thick (about 30 minutes). Then, remove sauce from skillet and set aside.
-Step 6: Combine chicken with sour cream, cheese, and rest of salt
-Step 7: Heat $1 / 3$ cup of oil until warm.
-Step 8: Dip tortillas in oil until limp, and dry well with paper towels.
-Step 9: Fill tortillas with chicken mixture.
-Step 10: Roll filled tortillas and arrange side by side, seam side down, in a $9 \times 13 \times 2$-inch baking dish.
-Step 11: Pour chili sauce over enchiladas and bake at 250 degrees Fahrenheit until heated thoroughly (about 20 minutes).

George H.W. Bush: Corn Pudding
Cooking something for Bush was not easy since he refused to eat vegetables such as cauliflower and brussel sprouts. However, this was one of Bush's favorite recipes because it balances vegetables with bacon, butter, and cream.

## Ingredients:

4 strips of bacon, cut into small pieces
$3 / 4$ cup of chopped onions
1 diced sweet bell pepper
1 cup of milk
1 cup of heavy whipping cream
2 tablespoons of butter
3 eggs, beaten
1 cup of white corn kernels
2 tablespoons and 2 teaspoons of flour
$1 / 2$ teaspoon of thyme
$11 / 2$ teaspoons of chopped fresh parsley
Salt and white pepper (Optional)

## Directions:

-Step 1: Preheat oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit.
-Step 2: In frying pan, cook bacon until crisp, then set aside.
-Step 3: Add onions to pan and sauté until transparent.
-Step 4: Add bell pepper and cook for 3 minutes, then set aside.
-Step 5: Heat milk and cream on low until warm, add butter, and continue heating until butter melts.
-Step 6: Remove from heat and slowly add milk mixture to beaten eggs, whisking lightly to combine.
-Step 7: Add the corn, flour, thyme, parsley, cooked bacon, onions, peppers, salt, and pepper to mixture and stir.
-Step 8: Pour mixture into ungreased $1 \frac{1}{2}$ quart oval baking dish.
-Step 10: Bake $1 \frac{1}{4}$ hour until golden brown.

Although this year's ceremony has already been plagued with controversy over its host (or lack thereof), this should not distract from the great movies released this year. Here are the eight nominated movies ranked from best to worst, in my opinion.
8. Vice: Vice is about Dick Cheney's time as vice president under Bush and is the only movie that I would consider to have more negative aspects than positive. Though Christian Bale delivers a phenomenal performance, that alone cannot save this movie from being a jumbled mess. The plot is uneven and the editing, flat. This movie tries to be a satire, drama, and documentary, leaving this movie with no soul. This movie tries to say so much, but ends up saying nothing. Rating: 4/10.
7. Black Panther: Personally, I do not understand the excitement for this movie, as it is just another Marvel movie. T'challa lacks any kind of charisma or likable qualities; the supporting cast is all very similar. Despite all of this, Michael B. Jordan's Killmonger is amazing and has depth, even if he was not as developed as he could have been. Rating: 5/10.
6. Bohemian Rhapsody: Rami Malek gives one of the best performances of the year as Freddie Mercury, selling every second of his portrayal with depth and palpable emotion. The music is, of course, amazing, but that also leads to the problem with this movie: without Queen, this movie fails to be interesting. Take Queen out and replace them with some random band, and no one would care for this movie. The only reason it is not lower on my list is due to Malek's amazing performance. Rating: 5/10.
5. Green Book: This is where the movies start to become good, even great. Green Book is a feel-good movie. The charm and banter between the two leads is so endearing that one cannot help but smile. Both Viggo Mortensen and Mahershala Ali give amazing performances. The main problem is that this movie can be corny at times, which underplays its serious topic of racism. However, the charm between the two leads makes this flaw forgivable. Rating: 8/10.
4. BlackkKlansman: This movie is a passion project by Spike Lee, based on the true story of the first black detective in Colorado Springs who infiltrated the Ku Klux Klan. Spike Lee managed to craft a movie that balances drama and comedy perfectly, with the help of witty banter, easily making this one of the best screenplays of the year. The political commentary gives advice to both sides of the spectrum. The minor negatives of the film would be that it takes a while to pick up momentum, and some of the editing choices feel a bit off. Rating: $8 / 10$
3. The Favourite: This is such an odd movie with its stylistic choices, but in a good way. The performances are all perfect, with Olivia Colman being the standout as the mentally unstable Queen Anne. The score and cinematography set the mood perfectly in every scene, creating a disordered feeling. The commentary on power and taking advantage of a handicapped person is also well done. However, the beginning was not as captivating as it could have been. Rating: 9/10.
2. A Star is Born: This emotional rollercoaster left me absolutely astounded. The story tackles major themes of fame, happiness, and addiction, and weaves them together into a realistic screenplay. Bradley Cooper and Lady Gaga give the best performances of the year in the movie's insanely powerful and heart-wrenching scenes. The cinematography and direction are phenomenal, and the songs carry the same weight the themes do. The only problem I see is that Cooper was snubbed for a best director nomination. Rating: 10/10.

1. Roma: Roma is a masterpiece. Every choice in this film by director Alfonso Cuaron is meaningful and purposeful. Never have I felt a movie to be so calm and uncomfortable at once. So much hope is felt just to be squashed by the most tragic accident. The cinematography is breathtaking, with exceptionally long takes that would seem impossible to film.
