

For those of your who want to get more into the details, this season, many varsity players been tracking advanced stats which are metrics that usually require formulas to be calculated. Using these metrics, we can take a closer look at the first game of the season. Plus/Minus (PM) is a statistic that tracks how the team performs while an individual player is in the game. For example, if the team outscores the opponent by 10 points, while a specific player was on the court, that specific player receives a plus/minus score of +10.

For this game, every single varsity player recorded a positive, double-digit plus/minus. Although the game was not the most competitive one, a double-digit plus/minus is difficult to maintain, especially as the winning team tends to ease off scoring during a blowout. The excellent plus/minus of all players bodes well for the games to come when the Bulldogs will face much tougher opponents and rivals.

After this blowout win in their first game of the season, the Bulldogs look poised for another spectacular season – a testament to how far BASIS's sports programs have come. As their season progresses, the Bulldogs' true mettle will be tested, as we see whether they can bring a championship to BASIS in the seniors' final year. Regardless, our beloved Bulldogs are back and ready to take on another season!

Victoria: I got a phone and a computer, but not at the same time


Alex: The best gift that I've gotten from my parents or Santa was a MacBook one year.


Solutions for last month's problems:

1. Given the following right triangle, what is the length of the hypotenuse?



Solution: Let the length of segment AB be x. In right triangle ABD, $\cos A=AB/AD=x/1=x$. In right triangle CBD, $\cos A=AD/AC=1/(x+1)$. Since $\cos A=\cos A$, then we can get the equation x=1/(x+1). Solve for x and get $x=(5^{1}/2 -1)/2$. The hypotenuse AC equals $AB+BC=(5^{1}/2+1)/2$

2. What is the area of the largest square that can fit in the following figure?



Solution: We want to find the largest square within the figure. The only restriction is that there couldn't be any overlaps between the square we want to find and the small square. The limit condition is the square is tangent to the vertex, which is located in the figure, of the smaller square. Therefore, the problem is to solve the length of the hypotenuse of a right triangle, in which a 1*1 square is enclosed. Let the length of one leg of the right triangle be



x, then $\tan A=(10-x)/x$. In the smaller triangle, $\tan A=1/(x-1)$. We can solve for x, which turns out to be $(80)^{1/2}$. Thus, the area of the largest square is 80.

THE SUNS ARE ON FIRE

The past decade for the Phoenix Suns has been a nightmare. Many consider the Steve Nash/Amare Stoudemire era to have been the last significant period in Suns' history. The post-seven-second era has plunged our hometown team into a period of chronic rebuilding and disappointing lottery picks. Suns' fans have been through the ups and downs, saying goodbye to fan favorites like Goran Dragic and Eric Bledsoe. The trend does not appear to have changed much since. The 2019 trade that sent Trevor Ariza to the Wizards was left relatively unnoticed in the NBA, especially in the midst of other blockbuster deals, such as those sending Jimmy Butler to the Philadelphia 76ers and Anthony Davis to the Los Angeles Lakers. Retrospectively, that trade was vital for the modern-day Phoenix Suns team, who now appear to be the clear trade winners. Whereas Trevor Ariza was merely one to take shots without setting himself up, Kelly Oubre Jr., who the Wizards sent to Phoenix, is a passionate guard with much to offer to the young team.

The 2019 offseason was underwhelming. The Suns' second-highest PPG scorer, TJ Warren, was dealt to the Indiana Pacers for cash. They drafted Cam Johnson, 4th year forward (the older the player, the lower their draft stock) just short of the lottery. The only notable acquisitions were Ricky Rubio and Dario Saric, two relatively low-spotlight role players who have failed to add much star-power to their names.

So how can we possibly explain the Suns' blazing success at the start of the 2019-2020 NBA Season? Three factors stood out.

Coaching: After finishing with the second-worst record in franchise history (19-63), former coach Igor Kokoskov was fired and replaced with Monty Williams. According to GM James Jones, Kokoskov lacked leadership and an ability to connect with the players. He was a great Assistant Coach, a role he took on with the Jazz, but Monty Williams has filled his gaps. A former NBA player himself, Monty Williams is able to relate to the players and has a leader's pedigree. Additionally, his fast-paced offense and his ability to bring out the best within his players has paved the way for success on the court this season, as seen in the Suns' 6-3 start.

Booker's personality change: Looking back, star player Devin Booker's various scoring records, including his 70-point game were not able to translate into team success. Apart from the glory, he actually had a negative plus/minus differential (-2.88), meaning that the team performs better when he is off the court. Recent interviews show that he acknowledges the presence of leadership on the court aside from him, especially from veterans with playoff experience such as Ricky Rubio. Booker's evident effort to play "team ball" has translated to both off-court chemistry and early success which, with this new mentality, will probably last throughout the duration of the season.

The Valley Boyz Movement: Chemistry is one of the most underrated aspects underlying success in NBA basketball. The media tends to oversaturate highlights, bringing little to no attention to the threat that a team with good chemistry could pose for the league. Although the recent additions of Oubre and Ayton went relatively unnoticed, it formed a strong bond within the organization as a friendship. They began advertising this through a movement known as "The Valley Boyz," as well as hosting numerous events to bond with the Suns' fanbase. This team chemistry has played a crucial role in the transformation from iso-ball to team-ball, particularly in the development of Devin Booker. We can only hope that this chemistry will last throughout the season.

Suns fans can only hope that the current attitude and stability can maintain the 2nd seed power ranking that the team has earned thus far. But one thing is for sure: the Phoenix Suns have a young core that brings some much-needed hope for a shining future in the Valley.

ELECTRIC TRUCKS: ANOTHER STEP TOWARDS RENEWABLE ENERGY

It is quite fitting that over a decade ago, the first race to electric vehicles began. Tesla, Chevrolet, Nissan, and Mitsubishi all created models, gaining a share in the electric-vehicle market. Now in the new decade ahead, an average consumer can spot various Teslas and Volts on local freeways. The end of 2019 is experiencing another race to electrical vehicles: trucks.

These new electric trucks would have the same benefits and downsides to owning a regular electric vehicle. Lower emissions, HOV lane access, more miles per gallon, and lower noise pollution create obvious benefits. However, just like a Tesla Model Y, the combination of a lack of charging stations and lower travel distances might be unreliable for truck users. Long-distance road trips would not be suitable for an electric truck due to constant re-charging.

In the last month, the Cybertruck has caught lots of attention for its radical geometric design, completely different than any other truck design. Despite criticism, the company has already received 200,000 preorders. Even with hardly any advertising, both the Cybertruck event and its unique design might have produced such enormous amounts of interest. Surprising.

While Tesla seems like the major electric vehicle company of this decade, other companies are proving worthy competitors. Ford is planning to release the F-150s, either a hybrid or full-electric pickup truck, during 2020 or 2021. Rivian designed a futuristic sleek R1T, claiming to be able to reach 400+ miles with three battery packs. On the flip side, the Tonka Truck-looking Bollinger B2 can tow up to 7500 pounds and run for 200 miles. The combination of both distance and towing power is a balance that different companies have to consider. Is it worth increasing mileage or power at the expense of other factors?

General Motors believe that electric trucks will take time to become the norm. Some truck owners wish that the new electric vehicles would look normal, while others want to be able to use the truck with heavier loads. Right now, truck buyers are "fiercely loyal." 


