

A Simple Calling for Complicated Times

The words of the prophet Micah are simple, yet demanding: “He has told you, human one, what is good and what the Lord requires from you: to do justice, embrace faithful love, and walk humbly with your God.” Micah 6:8.

In a world that often feels tense, divided, and overwhelming, this verse offers us both clarity and steadiness. Micah doesn’t overwhelm us with a long list of rules or complicated theology. Instead, he points us toward a way of living that is faithful, grounded, and practical.

To do justice is about more than holding the right beliefs—it’s about living them out. It means paying attention to who is being pushed aside, who isn’t being heard, and who is carrying the weight of broken systems. In a time shaped by economic inequality, racial tension, debates about immigration, and fear about the future, doing justice means refusing to look away. As followers of Christ, we are called to stand for fairness, dignity, and equity—not as a political statement, but as a faithful response to the gospel.

To embrace faithful love reminds us that how we treat people matters. Kindness is not weakness; it is a deliberate choice to act with compassion, even when it’s difficult. In a culture that often rewards anger and division, kindness becomes a powerful act of resistance. It shows itself in how we speak to one another, how we listen across differences, how we care for neighbors in need, and how we extend grace when judgment would be easier.

To walk humbly with God is an invitation to remember that we don’t have all the answers. Humility draws us into prayer, reflection, and a willingness to learn and grow. It reminds us that our deepest loyalty is not to an ideology or a nation, but to Christ. Walking humbly means seeking God’s guidance day by day, trusting God even as we acknowledge our own limits.

As United Methodists, we do not walk this path alone. Our Social Principles help guide us as we live out Micah’s call. They affirm the sacred worth of every person, urge us to **work for peace and justice**, call us to **care for God’s creation**, and encourage us to engage the world with thoughtfulness, faith, and courage.

John Wesley taught that faith is not just something we believe or feel, it’s something we live. Our tradition reminds us that the gospel has real-world consequences. When we feed the hungry, welcome the stranger, stand against racism, care for the poor, and work for peace, we are not being “political.” We are being faithful.

Living out Micah 6:8 in today’s world won’t always be easy or comfortable. It will take prayer, discernment, courage, and patience with one another. But it is also a hopeful calling. God has already shown us what is good. The task before us is how we will respond...together.

May we be a church that does justice with courage, loves kindness with joy, and walks humbly with God every step of the way.



For the 5th year, Going to Pieces will run the Salvation Army Food Pantry Challenge!! This has been a hugely successful community outreach event for our church, and we have become valuable contributors to the Oak Creek Salvation Army Food Pantry.

As in years past, the raising of funds instead of collecting actual food items has proven to be much more efficient, as the Salvation Army has the resources to buy in bulk and gets more value for every dollar raised. This year the Going to Pieces group voted to start the challenge with \$750. We also have a \$300 contribution from the United Women in Faith. So, that brings the total for the challenge to \$1,050.

We challenge the congregation to match the initial \$1,050 contribution. This will start Ash Wednesday (February 18th) and run through Lent until Easter Sunday (April 5th). YOUTH OPPORTUNITIES



WALK TO EMMAUS



Do you seek spiritual renewal? New understandings of God's grace & love? Worship & community with other believers?

Are you desiring to strengthen your spiritual life? Seeking answers to questions about your faith? Willing to dedicate your everyday life to God?

On an Emmaus weekend you will sing, reflect, pray, worship, learn, share Holy Communion, participate in small groups, experience God's grace in community and in the world and understand Christian love in action. The Walk to Emmaus develops Christian disciples and leaders by inspiring, challenging, and equipping active adult church members for Christian action in their homes, churches, workplaces, and communities. It also benefits less active members seeking to renew a relationship with God, grow spiritually, or discover firmer foundations for their lives.

The program begins with a 72-hour short course in Christianity, that is wrapped in prayer and signs of sacrificial service. It continues for the rest of participants' lives with follow-up groups that contribute to participants' ongoing growth in grace, along with the local church's robust offerings.

The days are getting longer and, even if it's winter out there, every time each of us has the opportunity to walk through any of the doors of our church, we feel the warmth of the building and the comfort of the fellowship that our community offers. What a gift from God!

Speaking of gifts, we have those in abundance within our community and within our Trustee Team. We sadly bid farewell to Daryl Borchardt who has served our church as a trustee for many, many years and in that time has offered his skills, time and knowledge without hesitation. The next time you see Daryl, please thank him for his dedication to OCCUMC. Thank you Daryl!



We also have the opportunity to welcome two new members to the team; Dexter Peirce and Pete Siepert. Please thank them both for volunteering to be a part of this team.



Once again, thanks to a generous donation, we've been able to make some much needed major improvements to the parsonage and garage. Both buildings have received a new roof and windows.

Other smaller projects have been completed as well, including adding more permanent reflectors to the bottom of each driveway to ensure that folks who use our church at night have no trouble finding their way safely into our parking lot. Two flushing systems in the upstairs ladies and men's bathrooms have been replaced, and we are in the process of replacing the bathroom soap dispensers as well.



If you use the downstairs rooms, you will probably have noticed that most of our lighting is provided by fluorescent tube fixtures. For reasons relating to changes in the bulbs for these types of fixtures and other details that I won't bore you with, we will be systematically upgrading all of these fixtures starting with rooms where the fixtures are currently not working eg. the adult Sunday School rooms and the Preschool. Thank you to Rich for leading this effort.

As always we are grateful for the opportunity to serve this community through the work we do to care for our buildings and grounds. If you notice anything that is not working properly or if you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact any of the trustees.





The food is given on the day it is requested and represents breakfast, lunch, and dinner for all members of the household. Those receiving food are also informed about how they can participate in supplemental food programs so they can move beyond visiting food pantries.

The following are required in order to be eligible:

- Client picture ID (Must have current address and be shown every time).
- School record, Birth Record/Birth Certificate for children in household. If you do not have this information you will only be served for yourself and not the other household members.
- 2 proofs of residence (Mail and utility bill from the last 30 days).
- Resident of ZIP Codes 53129, 53130, 53132, 53154.

MOBILE MARKET

The Mobile Market is a grocery store on wheels that travels throughout Milwaukee County with grocery staples: fruits, vegetables, milk (dairy & non dairy options), chicken, beef, pork, deli meat, cheese, yogurt, etc. Canned items or processed foods are not sold here. The market is an active store, not a food pantry or donation center. Prices are 25% off Piggly Wiggly prices. The market accepts debit cards, credit cards and Quest EBT, but no cash.
