Greetings to All!

We are moving toward coming out of the pandemic. There is much conversation in my pastoral care circles about how to be present with people who suffered much during the past year. Everyone has suffered trauma as a result of the lockdown, the disease, the death of a loved one or a friend, and the constant anxiety and worry about what we will need to do individually and collectively as a society to heal. How will we care for each other and our communities?

Other pastoral care circles share conversations and webinars on how faith-families will reengage in worship, education, fellowship, mission, and inviting new people to meet God in Jesus Christ as our congregations reopen our buildings and ministries. There is so much potential and all people of faith are being encouraged to use coming out of the pandemic as an opportunity to launch new ministries, do things differently to effectively reach new people for Christ, and not settle back into the same pre-Covid patterns of declining mission and ministry.

We are working with the My Church Can Improve Initiative (MCCI) to learn about where we stand in mission and ministry today, to be trained in ways to change how we share God's love, and to discern how God is leading us to reach new people for Christ in the future.

Friends, we are God's people and our mission as United Methodists is to *Make Disciples of Jesus Christ for the Transformation of the World*. This is a challenging mission for the whole denomination here in the United States, if we are going to be honest, has not been very successful attaining and engaging in the past 40 years. Collectively as a whole, statistics show that our UMC worship attendance and membership rolls have declined precipitously in the past four decades.

As we come out of the other side of the pandemic, we will need to seek, discern, and rely on God's call and vision to help build a beloved community in the Kin-dom of God where all are welcomed, accepted, and affirmed as people of sacred worth who are needed to reach new people for Christ. There are challenges of racism, rebuilding our economy and individuals and family's monetary stability, getting our school-age kids back to their classrooms, and everyone on track to success including all who, in the past, have been left behind. How will we address one or more of these challenges so that more people can come to a sense of peace following the chaos caused by the pandemic?

I look forward to reengaging, discussing, and discerning with each of you as to where God is leading our faith-family in the future. For now, keep praying our Break Through Prayer Initiative prayer, *Creator God, we humbly ask what your plan is for us here at Oak Creek Community United Methodist Church. Please, direct our path to your vision for us in our community. Amen.*



Parking Lot Worship Notes

Process for participating in Parking Lot Worship on April 4 and May 2:

We are looking forward to seeing you all on Easter Sunday at our first parking lot service (weather permitting). We have a great group of volunteers who have worked hard to make this an meaningful experience and tried to plan everything to run smoothly. You will enter from 13th Street only.... and exit out onto Puetz Road. Once in the parking lot, you will immediately turn right and be directed to a parking space. Once parked, volunteers with masks and gloves will come and give you a bulletin, collect any offering you may have, give you the option to check out hymnals, give you the communion elements and an Easter cross. Please come early enough for all to be parked as the service will start promptly at 9am. This is being live-streamed on Facebook also.

This past Sunday, we had a "dry run" and we found the music (you will hear Todd on the organ and Shelly singing) was very clear and sufficiently loud in the parking lot. Obviously this can be affected by wind, airplanes, traffic and motorcycles....but that's all part of outside services! Remember to stay in your cars, the church is not open for use or access to the restroom. But feel free to sing, bring your own coffee, donuts and ENJOY!! The service will last approximately 35-40 minutes. This is the first important step in being back

Message From Bishop Hee Soo Jung

Moving Forward

As the scripture has said, "Out of the believer's heart shall flow rivers of living water." Now he said this about the Spirit, which believers in him were to receive; for as yet there was no Spirit, because Jesus was not yet glorified.

When they heard these words, some in the crowd said, 'This is really the prophet.' Others said, 'This is the Messiah.' But some asked, 'Surely the Messiah does not come from Galilee, does he? Has not the scripture said that the Messiah is descended from David and comes from Bethlehem, the village where David lived?' So there was a division in the crowd because of him. (John 7:38b-43)

One rhetorical question Christians ask on a regular basis is, "Are we being faithful?" The fundamental answer is, "not yet, but we are trying." John Wesley spoke regularly about how human beings are "being perfected in love in this life," but this was an honest acknowledgement that we are not yet perfect. We are flawed and weak of will, and for this reason we need a Savior. This is why we need Jesus.

But the author of the gospel of John returned regularly to a clear human failing: even with Jesus, we do not always agree, and things do not always play out the way God intends. God's grand vision for unity and oneness as the incarnate body of Christ for the world is regularly undermined by our human penchant for disagreement and debate.

United Methodists who have represented our global church at General Conference have first-hand experience of disunity within the fellowship. We find creative ways to discuss and debate just about anything you can think of. And yet, this is what it means to be the church of Jesus Christ, as Paul reminds us in Philippians, "to work out our own salvation with fear and trembling." (Philippians 2:12b) Our reality is that different groups of United Methodists discern God's will for the world and the church differently. Some feel that God intends we be one in Christ, reflecting Paul's vision in Philippians 2:1-5, "If then there is any encouragement in Christ, any consolation from love, any sharing in the Spirit, any compassion and sympathy, make my joy complete: be of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others. Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus," Others are more persuaded by words attributed to Jesus in Luke 12:49-53, "I came to bring fire to the earth, and how I wish it were already kindled! I have a baptism with which to be baptized, and what stress I am under until it is completed! Do you think that I have come to bring peace to the earth? No, I tell you, but rather division! From now on, five in one household will be divided, three against two and two against three;" where not everyone belongs together. All of us wrestle with our baptismal covenant and the theology of our communion liturgy which asks the Holy Spirit to "make us one with Christ, one with each other, and one in ministry for all the world.

We have come to a critical crossroads in our life of faith together as United Methodist disciples and stewards. Some have determined they can no longer abide a denomination committed to full inclusion of LGBTQIA+ peoples and who hold a more inclusive and progressive interpretation of scripture and an adaptive and expansive theology. There is a heartfelt desire and need for a more historic and traditional interpretation of the Bible with a stricter and clearer defining theology.

Others have decided they can no longer wait for The United Methodist Church to get its act together and actually love and affirm all of God's blessed children, created as they are in God's image without judgment, condemnation, and hate. They are seeking a Biblical faith and theological frame that recognizes that the Holy Spirit is alive and at work to help us move from a mythic/magic interpretation of the Christian faith to a transcendent awareness of God as love.

While we may debate various points of doctrine, polity, and theology, almost everything boils down to our interpretation of the authority of Biblical interpretation and our defining discernment of God's Holy Spirit at work in the world and church today. We seemingly cannot agree.

For this reason, some United Methodists have banded together to launch new denominations – the Global Methodist Church (https://www.globalmethodist.org/) and the Liberation Methodist Connexion (https://www.globalmethodist.org/) and the Liberation Methodist Church is no longer the best fit for their sense of belief, behavior, and belonging.

The United Methodist Church is still proclaiming an invitation to full inclusion and the offer of God's unmerited grace and unconditional love to all people regardless of race, gender, language, ethnicity, sexual orientation, caste, class, education, economic status, or culture. We remain committed to serving all of God's children and creation. Our leadership seeks to live into a unity and fellowship grounded fully in the power and strength of God's Holy Spirit.

I want to also make sure everyone is aware that our General Conference has been postponed a second time due to the global pandemic, and we will (hopefully) gather in Minneapolis, Minnesota to figure out our future together or apart. We openly acknowledge the many challenges facing our church, but we also confess that what is impossible for flawed and well-meaning human beings is always possible for God through the power of the Holy Spirit. This will be a Holy Conference, worshipful work, regardless of disagreement or debate. I am calling on all Wisconsin United Methodists, regardless of your allegiance to the existing or new denomination to hold General Conference, Jurisdictional Conference, and the future of our church and witness.

It is never easy to break apart, to separate and go our own way. Relationships are precious, fellowship is essential, and we often believe that our covenants are forever. There will be pain. There will be grief. There will be loss. But this is part of life; we face such partings all the time. How we separate, how we unite, how we disagree, and how we speak of one another is critically important. Let us pray that regardless of the future that unfolds, we may travel through with the utmost grace, kindness, compassion, mercy, and love as possible, truly trusting that God will walk with us all, every step of the way.



NORTHCOTT NEIGHBORHOOD HOUSE

A Message from Gail Nelson, SE District UMW President

Greetings UMW Sisters,

As we proceed into 2021 and figure out how to deal with our collective "pandemic fatigue," I'm excited to share some of the good things that are happening at our UMW National Missional Institution, Northcott Neighborhood House.

Northcott continues its three-pronged success of training community members for living wage jobs, improving the community, and raising unrestricted funds through its Milwaukee Builds, YouthBuild, Habitat for Humanity, Transitional Jobs, Arborist, and demolition programs.

With one of its primary missions being youth services, Northcott is striving to find innovative programming for the community's young people that can be conducted safely. During 2021, Northcott will be starting a new and exciting program for youth in Aquaponics. They currently have two donors to help offer the program to Northcott's youth participants and ultimately the community. You may view the technology at https://forkfarms.com/ to learn more.

Northcott is continuing to meet the needs of community members, many more of whom are struggling due to the ongoing pandemic. Northcott provided dinners for 1,000 families of four on Thanksgiving day, and as a result of the success of that program, was asked to provide meals on Christmas day. Northcott fed 700 families and provided 2,400 toys and gifts for children and youths age 0-18 on Christmas morning. Donations were provided for the event by a number of foundations and private donors. I had the pleasure of wrapping about 120 of those gifts! Safely-distanced wrapping stations were set up in the gymnasium, and the energy and joy were palpable as many hands made light work.

The food pantry is operating in full swing, including the delivery of 3,000 stock boxes to seniors, which will continue until the pandemic is under control or funding for the stock box service runs out. In addition, partnership with medical clinics has provided space for free COVID-19 testing and chronic disease care for the elderly.

Besides Northcott's community activities, the Board of Directors has been at work (via Zoom) updating the Bylaws and the Articles of Incorporation, which hadn't been updated since Northcott was formed in the 1960s. Those changes impact both who are the members of the corporation and who are voting members of the board of directors, which in turn will require some changes to the wording of our South East District UMW standing rules. We'll vote on the applicable changes to the standing rules at our fall gathering/annual meeting. The details will be communicated closer to the meeting date, but I wanted to give you a "heads-up," and let you know the reason for the necessary changes.

All the joy I feel when I think of the good things Northcott is achieving despite the current challenges helps dispel my own "pandemic fatigue." I pray that it can do the same for you!


