RACHAEL D. STEPHENS

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Rachael Stephens is a joint Ph.D. candidate in Anthropology and Education at the University of Pennsylvania. Her research traces how racial capitalism is semiotically and institutionally produced through arenas of the American political economy such as real estate, schooling, and public finance — processes that shape contested formations of civic belonging, politicization, and ethno-racial difference. Her dissertation is an ethnography of public-school finance inequality that examines how everyday practices of valuation and discursive avoidance reproduce social inequality in U.S. (sub)urban contexts.

Drawing on training in anthropology, education, urban studies, and political science, Rachael's scholarship and teaching are driven by a commitment to building more democratic and equitable futures. She has conducted ethnographic and community-based research, as well as participatory filmmaking projects, in the Greater Hartford region for over thirteen years, and has taught and advised research projects at institutions including the University of Pennsylvania, Stanford University, and Columbia University.
