Apple QR Instructions

Open the Camera app from the Home screen, Control Center, or Lock screen. Select the rear facing camera. Hold your device so that the QR code appears in the viewfinder in the Camera app. Your device recognizes the QR code and shows a notification. Tap the notification to open the link associated with the QR code.

Android QR Instructions

Open your Camera app and point it steadily for 2-3 seconds towards the QR Code you want to scan. Whenever scanning is enabled, a notification will appear. If nothing happens, you may have to go to your Settings app and enable QR Code scanning. If QR Codes isn't an option in your settings, your device unfortunately can't scan QR Codes natively. Bishop Adam J. Richardson Presenter



Adam Jefferson Richardson, Jr. was elected and consecrated the 115th Bishop in the African Methodist Episcopal Church in 1996 at Louisville, Kentucky. He was assigned to the 14th Episcopal District which includes six countries in West Africa. In the 2000 – 2004 quadrennial, he served as chair of the Lay Commission and as a member of the World Methodist Council. He has chaired the Health Commission and twice as chair of the Commission on Seminaries, Universities, Colleges and Schools. In 2002, Bishop Richardson served as President of the Council of Bishops and the Presiding Bishop of the 19th Episcopal District with headquarters in Johannesburg, South Africa. Beginning in 2004, he served as the presiding bishop of the Second Episcopal District which includes North Carolina, Virginia, Maryland, and Washington, DC. For eight years, the Second Dis-trict saw phenomenal growth in membership, educational support, missions-related ministries, and ministry to men, health, prisons, the advancement of women in ministry, and a commitment to social and political action. Bishop and Mrs. Richardson took great pride in the District's embrace of ministries to youths and young adults. At the 2012 General Conference, Bishop Richardson was elected president of the Gen-



eral Board and was assigned to the Electrifying, Empowering Eleventh Episcopal District which includes Florida and the Commonwealth of the Bahamas. For nine years, he was chairman of the Board of Trustees at Edward Waters College. Prior to his election as a Bishop, he was senior minister of the Bethel A. M. E. Church, Tallahassee, Florida. For eighteen years his leadership and teaching skills produced a major ministry of growth in membership, new and expanded facilities, outreach to the poor and dis-possessed, with an active presence in the community. Under his leadership, a ten-acre camp was acquired called Bethel-By-the-Lake. In honor of he and Mrs. Richardson, the well-appointed recreational site has been renamed Camp Richardson.

Bishop Richardson began his educational pursuit in the public schools of Tampa, Florida. He received the B.A. degree from the Florida A&M University in Philosophy and Religion (where he was also noted as the head drum major of the famed Marching '100' Band). He received the Master of Divinity degree from the Turner Theological Seminary at the Interdenominational Theological Center (ITC) in Atlanta and the Doctor of Sacred Theology (STD) degree at the ITC through the Atlanta Theological Association.

His ministry has included teaching at the Interdenominational Theological Center and Morris Brown College in Atlanta, and as an adjunct instructor at his alma mater, Florida A&M University. He has received recognition from the City of Tallahassee, the State of Florida and the many places he has taken his message of hope and encouragement. In 1994, he was cited by Tallahassee Magazine as one of the most influential people of that city in the past fifteen years. Bishop Richardson has contributed articles or chapters in several books, including: "The Great High Priest" in the African American Devotional Bible, 1997 (Congress of National Black Churches); "Courage to Face the Battles of Life" in Ain't That Good News, 1984 (the Rev. Gregory G. M. Ingram, ed.); "An Introduction to the New Testament" and "Pastoral Care" in The Pastor's Manual of the AME Church, 1976 and 2000 (Dr. George L. Champion, ed.); and has written several instructional manuals for discipleship training and spiritual formation for churches he has served and for use on the lecture circuit, which include Take Me To The Water: A Manual For Christian Baptism, 1996; African Methodism 101, 1996; Traditional and Charismatic Styles of Ministry, 1996; The Wedding Manual, 1994; The Funeral Manual, 1995; and Headlines to Homilies: Sermons on Political, Commercial and Other Popular Annoyances, 2000. His most recent publication is "Let the Church say Amen: Liturgy, Litany and Homily," published in 2012. His travels outside of the United States have taken him to 50 countries, commonwealths and nation states. He and his wife of 51 years, Dr. Connie Speights, are the proud parents of two adult children, Monique (an elected County Judge), and Trey (a certified radiographer and recipient of two Master's degrees in music theory and classical saxophone performance).

Bishop John Franklin White Jarena Lee Honoree



130th Elected and Consecrated Bishop of the AME Church Presiding Bishop of the Fourth Episcopal District President of the Council of Bishops

Bishop John F. White serves as the 130th elected and consecrated bishop of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. He was assigned to the Fourth Episcopal District at the 50th Quadrennial Session of the AME General Conference in July 2016.

Before his appointment to the Fourth Episcopal District, he served the Sixteenth and Eighteenth Episcopal Districts simultaneously. He has previously served as the AME Ecumenical and Urban Affairs officer and has represented the AME Church globally on several church councils.

Bishop White is a native of Boynton Beach, Florida, and a graduate of Carver High School, Delray Beach, Florida. He is the recipient of a Bachelor of Science degree from Edward Waters College, Jacksonville, Florida; Master of Education from Florida Atlantic University, Boca Raton, Florida; Master of Divinity from Interdenominational Theological Center, Atlanta, Georgia; and the Doctorate of Ed-

ucation degree in Organizational Leadership from Nova Southeastern University, Fort Lauderdale, Florida.

Bishop White has also served as an educator in Florida's Duval and Palm Beach County School districts, Assistant Professor of Philosophy at Edward Waters College, and as a member of the ITC Continuing Education faculty. He has pastored churches in Florida and Georgia.

Throughout his ministry, Bishop White has dedicated himself to kingdom building. In 1977, he led the St. John A.M.E. Church of Eatonton, Georgia, in the building a new church edifice. While at Greater Grant Memorial A.M.E. Church, Jacksonville, Florida, he led the congregation in the burning of the church's mortgage and the building of a new parsonage. During his 13½ - year tenure at Greater Bethel A.M.E. Church in Miami, (January 1988 – October 2001), he established the B.A.M.E. Development Corporation of South Florida Inc.; a Legal Assistance Program in collaboration with St. Thomas University Law School; the Agape Academic Enrichment Center, an after-school tutorial program for children in the Overtown community of the inner city Miami; the Wilbur F. Ellison Scholarship Fund; the Mattie B. Koonce Computer Lab; the Bethel Investment Club; and a new model for church growth, one church in two locations, planting a Bethel A.M.E.C. (Miami) satellite worship center at Silver Lakes Elementary School, Miramar, Florida. He also led the Overtown community in building the Jefferson Reaves Health Center and 211 units of tax credit residences, Miami River Apartments.

Bishop White began providing spiritual leadership in October 2001 to Mount Hermon A.M.E. Church, Fort Lauderdale, Florida. During his tenure, Mount Hermon experienced an unusual amount of spiritual growth. Bishop White created the Mount Hermon Development Corporation of South Florida, Sons of Allen Men's Ministry, the Mount Hermon Summer Camp, Back-to-School Explosion, a separate youth church, and he hired several full-time employees, an Associate Pastor, Youth and Young Adult Minister, custodian, and Minister of Music. He led Mount Hermon in the building of a 17,000-sq.-ft. Family Life /Assembly Hall with a multipurpose room, classrooms and an administrative suite. The cost of this project was \$4 million.

Bishop White is married to Penny Hartsfield White, a native of Tallahassee, Florida. They are the proud parents of five lovely children: Tenner, John II, Alfred, Byron and Candace. They have two daughters-in-law, one son-in-law and nine grandchildren, Erica, Dwayne, Alisha, Kya, John III, Byron Ealie, Ashton, Doriana and Joseph.

Bishop E. Anne Henning Byfield Panelist Jarena Lee Honoree



Bishop Anne Henning Byfield is one who dares to Live, Learn, Lead, and Love GOD. She lives a life filled with creativity and passion as a preacher, psalmist, a poet, spoken word artist, strategic consultant, writer, composer, wife, mother and grand- mother. Married to Ainsley for over 40 years, they have one son, Michael, and four grandchildren. She loves GOD and encourages others to know and love GOD as well.

As a leader, Bishop Anne Henning Byfield serves as the 135th elected and consecrated bishop of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. Her historic election in the year 2016 represents the first time in the history of the AME Church, a person was elected who had a sibling on the bench of Bishops. She is also the first known person to be elected from Indiana since Bishop William Paul Quinn. Bishop Byfield is the President of the Council of Bishops of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. At the 51st Session of the General Conference of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, Bishop Byfield was assigned as the Presiding Prelate of the Thirteenth Episcopal District (Tennessee and Kentucky). Previously, she served as the Presiding Prelate of the 16th Episcopal District, where she provides leadership to seven annual conferences in the Caribbean, South America, and Europe.

She is the author of three books. The first one Let the Worship Begin is a book of lectionary aids for the church and pastor. It contains, calls to worship, litanies, stewardship prayers, and benedictions. The second: The Essence of My Existence is a book of essays and poetry, which helps with personal and professional growth. Her third book Produced by Strength, Living by Power provides life changing principles for those on the journey of life. Her other works include Flowing Essence, a Spoken Word CD, An Explanation of AME Church Worship; Now That You Are Saved: Preparing Leaders for Leadership, Odyssey, A Girls Mentoring Program, AME 101, Reigniting Success, and numerous Christian Education materials. She wrote the litany used for Mrs. Rosa Parks' funeral in Detroit, Michigan, and Congresswoman Julia Carson's funeral in Indianapolis. She is also the editor of the Prayer Booklet for the 2008 General Conference.

As a learner, she has her Bachelor of Science degree from Wilberforce University, Master of Divinity degree from Newburgh Theological Seminary; A Master of Divinity Degree from Payne Theological Seminary, A Doctor of Ministry Degree from Ashland Theological Seminary, and an Honorary Doctor of Divinity Degree from R.R. Wright School of Religion, Johannesburg, South Africa. Her dissertation is entitled the Effect of Short Notice Itinerant Moves In the North District Indiana Annual Conference, AME Church.

She is a former Presiding Elder of the North District Indiana Annual Conference and of the South District. She is the first presiding elder who is female in the Fourth Episcopal District and considered first woman presiding elder in the AME connection whose father was presiding elder. She has served as Senior Pastor of three churches, Bethel AME Church, Bloomington, IN, Robinson Community AME Church, Indianapolis, and St. Paul AME Church, Detroit, MI. She is the managing partner of AHBand Associates, a consulting firm to help clients unleash their talents through personal and organizational transformation, and leadership development. She is a member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority and held numerous connectional and local offices.

She has received numerous awards including the Jarena Lee Preaching Award; the Legacy Award for over 25 years of leadership in Pastoral Health Initiatives particularly in the HIV/AIDS community; one of eight religious history makers in the Indianapolis Community, one of the most 15 influential African Americans in Indianapolis and was named as one of its ten most influential pastors. In 2016 she received the state of Indiana 47th Drum Major for Justice Award.

Bishop Francine Brookins Panelist



Francine Angelique Brookins is the 141 st elected and consecrated Bishop of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. She is a builder of buildings and of people, a licensed

attorney in the State of California, a skilled mediator, and an experienced and beloved Pastor. Bishop Francine Brookins (141) is the biological daughter of two social activists: The Rt. Rev. Hamel Hartford Brookins (deceased) (91 st elected and consecrated Bishop in the AMEC) and the Rev. Carole Nelson Ingram (Ret.). She is also the dog-mom of Zumme.


Bishop Brookins (141) earned her B.A. from Georgetown University in 1993, her Juris Doctor (J.D.) from The George Washington National Law Center in 1996, and her Master of Divinity from Pacific School of Religion in Berkeley, CA in 2002. As a practicing attorney in the State of California she has represented litigants in the areas of civil rights, criminal defense, family law, personal injury, church property, and conflict resolution.

She has served as mentor for students matriculating through the Doctor of Ministry program at the Interdenominational Theological Center in Atlanta, GA. Bishop Brookins has been committed to the liberating and reconciling ministry of the AMEC from an early age. As a child she sang in the choir and was a junior stewardess and usher. In later years she collaborated in drafting and passing

stewardess and usher. In later years she collaborated in drafting and passing the revised policy on clergy sexual misconduct for the AMEC and helping to train its constituents. In 2008 she was elected and served as one of nine members of the Judicial Council, and as the 2nd Vice President of Women in Ministry in charge of legislation and bylaws. She is the recipient of numerous community service and leadership awards.

Bishop Brookins (141) is a dynamic, thought-provoking, soul-stirring, and powerful preacher and teacher who loves God, loves the AME Church, and loves you. She is faithful to the cause of Jesus Christ of Nazareth and dedicated to the work of caring for all of humankind. She is determined to expand the family of God using her special abilities to see and cultivate the gifts and calling in those who others sometimes overlook.

Bishop Frederick A. Wright, Sr. Moderator Preacher



Bishop Frederick A. Wright, Sr. is the son of the late Reverends Abner and Cornelia Wright, the fast female appointed Presiding Elder in the African Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States.

Bishop Wright earned a Master of Divinity Degree from the Interdenominational Theological Center Seminary as a Turner Student in Atlanta Georgia and a Doctorate of Ministry Degree from the United Theological Seminary in Dayton, Ohio.

As a pastor in the Third Episcopal District in the AME Church, he served as Dean of the Board of Examiner for ministerial students. He served as Chairperson of the Third Episcopal District Finance Committee and Vice Chairperson of the Ohio-South Ohio Conference Trustees.

Bishop Wright served as pastor in the states of Pennsylvania and Ohio within the Third Episcopal District of the AME Church. He last pastorate was at the Quinn Chapel AME Church, Cincinnati, Ohio for seventeen years.

Also, Bishop Wright is an associate professor at Payne Theological Seminary and a Trustee Board Member at the Turner Theological Seminary, Atlanta, Georgia.

On July 10, 2021 at the 51st Session of the African Methodist Episcopal Church General Conference in Orlando, Florida, he was elected and consecrated the 142'd Bishop.

Bishop Wright serves as the Presiding Prelate of the 20th Episcopal District AME Church which includes the countries of Malawi, Zimbabwe, Mozambique, Tanzania, and Uganda.

In addition, Bishop Wright serves as the Commission Chair for Women in Ministry in the AME Church. He is also a life member of the Alpha Phi Alpha, Inc fraternity.

Bishop Wright is married to Supervisor Jennifer Dixon Wright and the father of two sons.

Bishop Carolyn Tyler Guidry Panelist



122nd Elected and Consecrated Bishop of the AME Church (Retired)

The Right Reverend Carolyn Tyler Guidry became the 122nd Elected and Consecrated Bishop of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. She was born and raised in Jackson, Mississippi and came of age in the early years of the Civil Rights Movement. As a very young woman in 1959, Bishop Tyler Guidry was employed as the office manager for Rev. R. L. T. Smith, the first African American to run for Congress in Mississippi in one hundred years. After Rev. Smith's unsuccessful electoral run, Bishop Tyler Guidry began to work for Medgar Evers and the NAACP later that year. Here she worked as the women's voter registration chairperson for that organization.

Carolyn, with her husband Cary B. Tyler, moved from Jackson, MS. to Los Angeles, CA, with their five sons in September 1964. Their daughter was born in 1972.

Carolyn Tyler Guidry answered her call to preach in 1973; She was ordained itinerant deacon in 1975 by Bishop Harrison J. Bryant; and itinerant elder in 1977 by Bishop H. H. Brookins. Her first appointment was at First A. M. E. Church in Indio, California, in 1977.

In 1983 she was assigned to Cain Memorial A. M. E. Church in Bakersfield, California.

In 1989, Rev. Carolyn Tyler was assigned to the 600-member Walker Temple A. M. E. Church in Los Angeles, California. This assignment gave her the distinction of being the first female appointed to a major metropolitan charge in the A M E Church. She was appointed as the first female Presiding Elder in the Fifth Episcopal District in 1994 and served in that capacity until elected and consecrated the 122nd AME Bishop in 2004. After that, she was assigned Presiding Prelate to the 16th Episcopal District.

She served two terms as the chairperson of the Social Action Commission of the AME Church and initiated the effort to have the US Postal Service designate a stamp in honor of the founder of the AME Church, Bishop Richard Allen; that stamp was released during the first quarter of 2016.

She is a lifetime member of the NAACP and an Honorary Member of Sigma Gamma Rho Sorority.

Bishop Rev. Carolyn Tyler Guidry received her Associate of Arts Degree in Business and Secretarial Science from J. P. Campbell College in Jackson, MS. She also studied Economics at Tougaloo College in Tougaloo, MS. In 1977 she graduated from Los Angeles Bible School (under the auspices of Talbot Seminary) with a four-year certificate in Religion and Bible; she is a graduate of the Fuller Theological Seminary with the Master of Arts in Theology.

She was awarded an honorary degree, The Doctor of Humane Letters, by Payne Theological Seminary in May 2009. She was included in the archives of the HistoryMakers in November 2004. In April 2011, she was inducted into the Martin Luther King, Jr. International Board of Preachers at Morehouse College. The Turner Seminary presented her with The President's Lifetime Achievement Award in February 2019.

She is a contributor to the fourth edition of "Those Preaching Women," by The Rev. Dr. Ella Mitchell, published by Judson Press, which was released in June 2004, and has contributed to the publications of the AME Bishops, "The Anvil."

Carolyn Eujean Jackson Tyler Guidry is the mother of five sons, one daughter, thirteen grandchildren, and eleven great-grandchildren.

Dr. Holley serves as the Senior Presiding Elder of the Columbus-Springfield-Xenia District of the Ohio South Ohio Conference, Third Episcopal District in the African Methodist Episcopal Church; superintending twenty-eight pastors and congregations across the State of Ohio.

Dr. Holley serves as the Academic Dean, Director of the Master of Divinity Degree Program, and is a Full Tenured Professor of Ecological Theology at Payne Theological Seminary, the oldest free-standing African American seminary of the six historical black seminaries, in the United States. Her service to Payne expands over 22 years.

Dr. Holley is the first African American woman elected as Chair of the Board of Commissioners on Accrediting for the Association for Theological Schools (ATS) that accredits over 280 seminaries in the United States and Canada. She serves as the African Methodist Episcopal Church representative to the Executive Board for Creation Justice Ministries, Washington, DC. She also serves as a member of the Smithsonian Institute of Natural History's Human Origins Broader Social Impacts Committee (BSIC), Washington, DC.

Dr. Flake is the author of the popular book, *God In Her Midst: Preaching Healing to Hurting Women and has contributed to The Women of Color Study Bible, and Souls of My Sisters: Black Women Break Their Silence, Tell Their Stories, and Heal Their Spirits.* She and her husband, the Reverend Dr. Floyd H. Flake authored two books, *Practical Virtues: Everyday Values and Devotions for African American Families Learning to Live With All Our Souls* published by Harper Collins and *African American Church Management Handbook*, published in 2005 by Judson Press.

A native of Memphis, Tennessee, Dr. Flake earned her Bachelor of Arts Degree in English from Fisk University in Nashville, Tennessee. She received a Master of Arts Degree in English from Boston University and a Master of Divinity Degree from Union Theological Seminary in New York City. She was awarded the Doctor of Ministry Degree from United Theological Seminary of Dayton, Ohio. She has received numerous citations and awards. Most recently, The Distinguished Alumni Award was conferred upon her by Union Seminar, and in March, 2017, she was inducted onto Morehouse College's "Martin Luther King, Jr. Board of Preachers." She is also a proud member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated; The Links, Incorporated; and the National Council of Negro Women.

Blackmon to the President's Advisory Council on Faith-Based Neighborhood Partnerships for the White House and awarded her special recognition as a presidential volunteer for her community service. She was also appointed to the Ferguson Commission by Governor Jay Nixon and led the criminal justice reform task force featured in the 'Forward Through Ferguson: A Path Toward Racial Equity' Report, calling for sweeping changes in policing, the courts, child well-being and economic mobility in 2015.

Rev. Blackmon is the co-author of The White Privilege Curriculum for the United Church of Christ, and is a prominent voice in the PBS Special; The Black Church, and is featured in several print publications. She currently serves on the board of the Samuel DeWitt Proctor Conference. She is a recipient of the NAACP Rosa Parks Award; the Hannah G.  - 1868 Ordination of women comes before the General Conference for a fourth time, this leads to the creation of the office of Stewardess, female evangelist, and deaconess.
- 1884 Women were licensed to preach in the AME Church.
- 1885 Bishop Henry McNeal Turner ordained Sarah Hughes an itinerant deacon
- 1887 Ordination of women rescinded by Bishop Jabez P. Campbell
- 1888 The General Conference affirms Bishop Campbell's order to rescind the ordination of Sarah Hughes. Women are confirmed as Evangelist.
- 1936- Martha Jane Keys, a pastor and evangelist from Kentucky, initiated the legal challenge to women's exclusion from ordination when she introduced a bill at the General Conference calling for the ordination of women. The bill failed.
- 1956 The General Conference authorized the ordination of women as Local Deacons
- 1960- The General Conference passed legislation to ordain women as Itinerants
- 1964 Rev. Carrie Thomas Hooper becomes first female candidate for the Episcopacy
- 1968 Rev. Carrie Thomas Hooper runs for the Episcopacy a second time
- 1972 Rev. Carrie Thomas Hooper runs for the Episcopacy a third time.
- 1973 Bishop Frederick H. Talbot broke with the tradition of nearly two centuries when he appointed Reverend Dorothy Millicent Stephens Morris Acting Presiding Elder (16th Episcopal District)
- 1976 Rev. Carrie Thomas Hooper runs for the Episcopacy for a fourth time
- 1977 Ad Hoc WIM Committee established with Rev. Jacquelyn Grant as chair
- 1980 Rev. Carrie Thomas Hooper runs for the Episcopacy for a fifth time
- 1983 Bishop Reverend Vinton R. Anderson appointed Rev. Cornelia Wright Presiding Elder, making her the first female Presiding Elder in the United States.
- 1988 The Commission on WIM is established
- 1992 The Commission on WIM is admitted by the General Conference
- 1996 Rev. Carrie Thomas Hooper dies at the age of 102
- 1996 Dr. Jayme Coleman pushed for a resolution to elect a female Bishop. Bishop Frank Cummings made the formal recommendation to the General Conference
- 2000 Bishop Vashti Murphy McKenzie is elected the first female Bishop in the AME Church
- 2004 Bishop Carolyn Tyler Guidry and Bishop Sarah Frances Davis elected Bishops in the AME Church
- 2012 Rev. Teresa Fry Brown, PhD, elected as Historiographer making her the first clergy woman to hold a General Office.
- 2012 Bishop Carolyn Tyler Guidry retires.
- 2013- Bishop Sarah Frances Davis dies
- 2016 Bishop E. Anne Henning Byfield elected a Bishop in the AME Church
- 2021 Rev. Dr. Elaine Flake appointed as Pastor of Greater Allen Cathedral (Jamaica, NY), the largest congregation in the African Methodist Episcopal Church
- 2021 Bishop Vashti Murphy McKenzie retires
- 2021- Bishop Francine A. Brookins, Esq elected a Bishop in the AME Church
