#### West Floral Park Goes to the Dogs



Enjoy our dog photos sent in by people all over our neighborhood who responded to my Nextdoor.com request for photos.



Above: MAGGIE, the new kid on the block. Proud owners Matt Holland & Mark Spratt of Westwood Avenue.





the advent of the "sharing economy" there has been a meteoric rise in vacation home rentals in residential neighborhoods. With sharing websites such as Airbnb.com and Homeaway.com, to name a few, a homeowner can easily rent out their house on a short-term basis and generate some serious revenue for the homeowner. Cities, and neighbors alike, had never anticipated this sort of activity years ago and therefore this activity has operated via loopholes (although some cities, like Anaheim, have expressly allowed it). The rise of these rentals has a consequence on the surrounding neighbors and neighborhood. While these short-term rentals may be a great deal for the homeowner, in practice they are often a raw deal for the neighborhood. Cities, such as Santa Ana, and a myriad number of others in the County, are scrambling to address this new reality.

The impact of these rentals was highlighted recently when a new homeowner rented out their home in our neighborhood, on a short term basis, and advertised it as a six bedroom house that sleeps 22. The advertisement for the house highlighted its proximity to Disneyland and proudly informed the reader that it was located in a "nice, quiet neighborhood." However, when renters started to occupy the house the surrounding neighbors could no longer enjoy their "nice, quiet neighborhood" because of the disturbances caused by the attended the administrative hearing that was eventually held As one of our neighbors stated so touchingly at the hearing, while referencing his other attending homeown of the ACTEMENT this go on. The City appeared at a recent City Council meeting and spoke about the problems.

While the administrative judge ultimately ruled that the notices of violation that the City had issued against the homeowner were invalid (on procedural and other grounds), the City Council later voted unanimously to impose 45-day emergency moratoriums targeting short-term rentals while officials craft new regulations to curb neighborhood impacts of the rapidly growing industry. The neighbors of West Floral Park were heard! We can all be very proud of our neighbors.

Our Review of Local Restaurant: Robbin's Nest in Downtown Santa Ana

Our Girls' Night Out team leader Laurie Hampton had to travel unexpectedly for family. So the girls decided to contribute their little review for our latest happy hour venture.

The Robbin's Nest Wine Bar and Bistro is a quaint low-key hideaway located at 207 West 2nd Street in Santa Ana. The Happy Hour menu features a good selection of red and white wines, some craft and bottled beers all at competitive prices. Paired with their appetizers and ambiance this makes for a nice Happy Hour Tuesday-Friday from 3 pm-7 pm. But it doesn't stop there. They offer weekly specials, i.e. Tapas Tuesdays, Sunday Brunch and Group Events. They have all sorts of yummy dishes on their menu. The Pastrami Rolls are crispy wonton wraps filled with their house smoked pastrami, fontina cheese and some type of crunchy slaw, they serve it up with a special mustard aioli sauce. We couldn't decide what to eat!



Between the starters, salads, soup, sandwiches, flatbreads and pizza too. They also serve a variety of entrées after 5 pm from Spaghetti alla Puttanesca and Shrimp Scampi to Filet Mignon (purchased from the local and famous Harris Ranch). One of the Pizzas that caught our eye was one called "Three Fun Guys in a Mini Van!" Wonder what's in it? We did too...it starts with three types of mushrooms sautéed in butter and deglazed with marsala wine, then layered on top of mozzarella and asiago cheeses...Sign us up for a ride in that van! Among other things we decided to try their Charcuterie and Cheese Platter, You

can see it in our photo below, plenty of everything that goes great with wine.

Added to the evening's relaxed vibe was a wonderful group, the OCEA Trio, playing background music. The live music provided a relaxed, upscale ambiance to the entire evening.

#### ROASTED BUTTERNUT BRUSCHETTA

From Donna Layne's Kitchen Served recently at our WFP new neighbor social

Makes 8 servings Prep: 10 Minutes Bake: 15 minutes

- Medium Butternut Squash, peeled, seeded and chopped into 1/2 inch pieces (about 4 cups)
- 1 Tablespoon Extra Virgin Olive Oil
- 1/2 Teaspoon Kosher Salt
- 3/4 Teaspoon Ground Black Pepper (divided as instructed in directions)
- 1 Log of Goat Cheese (8-ounces)
- 2 Cups Baby Arugula
- Lemon (halved)
   Crostini Recipe (see below)
- 1) Preheat oven to 450°
- 2) On a large rimmed baking sheet, combine squash, oil, salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- **3)** Bake, stirring once, for 15 minutes or until cooked through and beginning to caramelize. Let cool (this can be made the day before.)
- 4) To assemble: Make crostini recipe (as directed.)
  Spread goat cheese on the crostini. Top with a pinch of arugula leaves and a few pieces of roasted squash.
  Squeeze a small amount of lemon juice over the crostini just before serving. Sprinkle with remaining ½ teaspoon pepper.

#### CROSTINI RECIPE

Makes 8 servings Prep: 10 Minutes Bake: 15 minutes



- 1 French Baguette, thinly sliced on a diagonal
- 1½ Tablespoons Extra Virgin Olive Oil
- 1/2 Teaspoon Kosher Salt
- 1/2 Teaspoon Ground Black Pepper
- Clove Garlic, skin removed
- 1) Preheat oven to 350°
- 2) Place sliced baguette on a large rimmed baking sheet. Brush both sides of bread slices lightly with oil sprinkle evenly with salt and pepper.
- 3) Bake for 8 minutes or until lightly toasted. Let cool. Once cooled, rub garlic clove over each crostini.

With fall here and summer behind us, it's time to start thinking about cooler weather and cozier meals. Start off your fall fixings with Donna's Roasted Butternut Bruschetta or try this delicious Pumpkin Soup that is an annual tradition in our home at Thanksgiving time!

#### LAURA'S PUMPKIN SOUP

From Laura Jagerman's Kitchen

- 1 Tablespoon Butter
- 1/2 Cup of Diced Onion
- 1 Chopped Garlic Clove
- 2 Tablespoon Flour
- 2 Teaspoon Curry Powder
- 2 Cups of Chicken Stock
- 2 Cups of Canned Pumpkin (one 14 oz can)
- 1 Tablespoon Honey Nutmeg
- 2 Cups of Heavy Cream

In a large sauce pan, melt butter. Cook onion and garlic for 8-10 minutes. Stir in flour and curry powder and cook for one minute over low heat, stirring until well blended. Gradually add chicken stock, whisking until smooth. Stir in pumpkin and honey. Season with nutmeg. At this point you can refrigerate the soup. Before serving, reheat and add heavy cream until thickened. Be careful not to let it boil. Serve with homemade croûtons and caramelized red onions.

#### WFP STEVE FRYER INDUCTED INTO SANTA ANA U.S.D. HALL OF FAME

WFP Register readers were delighted to read this article in August about our own Steve Fryer. Congratulations Steve! High school sports columnist Steve Fryer was part of an inaugural group of honorees who have been added to Santa Ana Unified School District Athletics Hall of Fame.

Fryer was honored for his contributions to covering high school sports. He now has his name permanently placed on a wall of fame beside 26 coaches and athletes who graduated from Santa Ana public schools (he is an alum of Saddleback High School). Fellow inductees include Olympic medal winner Ed Carruthers and baseball All-Star Garry Templeton.

The introduction of the Hall of Fame was part of Friday's unveiling of Santa Ana Public Schools Complex, which includes a football stadium, baseball fields, batting cages and soccer fields. Fryer and other inaugural inductees were recognized during halftime of the Segerstrom vs. Santa Ana Valley game.

Fryer has been with the Register since the late 70's, and became high school sports columnist in 1990. "It was a proud moment Friday, representing Saddleback High with my name on the wall of fame," Fryer said in a Friday column on OCVarsity.com. "This career has been like stealing, in a way. So many times I've covered a great high school game and thought, I should have paid to get in to see this, but instead I'm getting paid to be here."

Fryer is an award-winning journalist with an encyclopedic knowledge of high school sports. He has been honored by the CIF-Southern Section as a champion for character, the Orange County Department of Education for his contributions to public education and the Southern California Interscholastic Basketball Association as a member of its hall of fame.

We have just learned that Steve will be honored by the City of Santa Ana for his contributions. His invitation letter cites him as a "community treasure". The City Council will recognize him on Tuesday, November 3rd at 5:45 pm.

FINALLY, rain for those parched lawns and planters. I relished the long overdue one-day storm after what seemed a never ending steamy four weeks. My backyard went from dried patches to puddles of mud in one day. But not all was lost. After all, my garden is more than plants and trees. The birds in my aviary took full advantage of the rainy moment. Not a minute of their day was wasted building nests and looking for sprouted seeds and a cool drink. The humidity and heat combined didn't dampen their activity and it encouraged me to do my part by providing fresh water with ice cubes, a rotating assortment of cool sliced cucumbers or slices of orange as well as occasional chopped lettuce or spinach. Yes, it's true that in the wild

they'd have to fend for themselves and hide in the shaded trees to avoid the weather, but they aren't in the wild. They're in my backyard. Some may think it a bit over board. After all they're just finches, but I so enjoy their enthusiasm for life. And I could never repay them for what they give me. They are all about the moment. Not vesterday or tomorrow...not even a minute ago. It's about the NOW. There are plenty of resources in the yard as well. My first North Santa Ana home had double porthole window ovens that still worked. Too many times I see trendy remodels that scream 1980 or something bad. If you must remodel it's always a good idea to get professional help. Also go with the style of your home and take it to the next level, stay true to the heart and soul of the original house. Vinyl windows do NOT add value to your home and can hurt it. There are some great examples of beautifully done remodels here and unfortunately some bad ones. Rescuing an old house can be a labor of love but if done right can bring

big returns to the owner. Paint is the cheapest thing you can do to make things look fresh and well kept. Get some advice on color if you are unsure, colors can be tricky and look very different when you get them on a whole house! Now about the neighborhood. I hope you love your neighborhood as much as I do. Driving or walking or biking down any of our streets you are likely to see chairs or benches in front yards for neighbors to relax in and visit with passersby. If you have a dog you walk you are likely well connected with your neighbors. Our large front

## **OUR WFPNA NEWSLETTER**

I remember receiving my first WFPNA newsletter soon after Allen and I moved into the neighborhood almost 15 years ago. I loved it! I loved the neighborhood connections and the sense of community it brought. I honestly have loved receiving every WFPNA newsletter since that time and for the past three years, I have been editor of this newsletter. Over the years, this newsletter has gotten better and better.

We are now publishing 16 page, full-color newsletters! Someone recently asked why we don't just send the newsletter electronically to the neighborhood. I thought it was a very good question that many people might be asking. First, we have many long-time neighbors who do not use the computer or connect to the internet. So for them, they would miss out on this important neighborhood connection tool. Second, we know that only a small fraction of people would look on our website for our latest newsletter (if we posted it there only) and that sending our newsletter via email is impossible since we don't have everyone's email address. Having a copy in hand multiplies the chances that our newsletter will be read. The WFPNA Board feels strongly that one of our primary responsibilities is to build connections and a sense of community in West Floral Park. We feel that our newsletter is one of our best

tools for doing this. Plus it is beautiful and draws people's attention. One story shared with me was when a friend visited one of our residents



and saw our newsletter laying on the coffee table. This visitor commented on how beautiful it was, was impressed with the stories and said how fortunate that we were to live in a neighborhood that produced a newsletter. People learn about our neighborhood and what a great place WFP is to live by hard copies of our newsletter.

Yes, the newsletter does cost to print. Even with the addition of pages, the cost of our newsletter has remained the same due to a change in the printer we use. We have Mika Denny to thank for this. In addition to designing and producing the newsletter, she has a trade account with our new printer and she passes along the savings to us. The newsletter costs about \$4,000 each year to print. This is about 13% of our total expenses. Plus last year WFPNA received \$2,000 from targeted newsletter advertising. All in all, I think our printed newsletter is a heavy hitter that does not come with a relatively high price. I hope you enjoy this edition, I think it is one of the best yet!
