Meet Cathy Boutelle of Westwood Avenue Raised-Bed Garden Queen

I've been dabbling with gardening for many years since we lived in a little apartment with just a walkway for gardening space. However, since moving to WFP five years ago, the inner gardener in me is blossoming and continues to grow. My current garden project is filling my garden boxes with fruits, veggies, and flowers,



hoping to share the bounty with my neighbors. This year I'm adamant to try and



grow anything that I wasn't able to last year due to a recent remodel, which left our garden in sad shape. My goal for my garden is to grow 100 pounds of veggies and fruits. I also plan to plant a few more berries and fruit trees as well as set up a little garden oasis outside my office. My final goal is to have my hubby realize that a she-shed in our yard would be a perfect birthday present. Hey, a girl can wish,

right? I am so proud of our current garden sanctuary made up of eight garden beds that are bursting with so many colors. I love to walk through every day with my

(continued from page 1) last year by my hubby. It was by far my best gardening bed. For those that don't know, a keyhole garden is a circular raised garden with a keyhole-shaped indentation on one side. The indentation allows gardeners to add uncooked vegetable scraps, water, and manure into a composting basket that sits in the center of the bed. In this way, composting materials can be added to the basket throughout the growing season to provide nutrients for the plants.

My advice to gardeners just starting out is that it's okay to dream big, to stumble and make mistakes. Also, be prepared to be very patient. Most importantly, grow what makes you happy. The internet is your friend and anything you don't know, simply google and you'll get some type of answer. And finally, share your highs and lows. I still send pictures to my daughter and hubby and now I get to share with my neighbors on Nextdoor in The Loco Gardeners Group (join us and meet new gardening friends).



I grew up gardening with my mom. I was her only child that didn't see it as a chore. My grandfather lived with us growing up and he taught me all about growing veggies, sugar cane, and working the soil. He grew lots of tasty fruits and veggies but I was never brave enough to try the tiny spicy chilies he grew and I'm totally ok with that!

Before I start anything, I always envision what I want the space to look like when I'm done. When I finish my task at hand, I love stepping back and taking a good look at the end product. Sometimes this involves stepping back multiple times and changing my plan, but in the end I always love that moment when it's finally complete. I'm proud of my front yard re-do. Our house was really plain when we bought it and I was inspired by many of the beautiful gardens in the neighborhood. My family and I did all our own landscaping. Believe it or not, even Grandma helped! From the drip irrigation, to picking plants and trees, to shoveling rocks out of the back of our truck, it was a family affair! We even worked together to place each of the large boulders in our planter bed! It took some time but I'd say we did alright for being rookies. I'm currently working in my backyard. Our backyard had nothing, literally nothing, but grass and mulch when we moved in. I didn't want a typical yard. Back in 2000, even before purchasing our home, I started collecting several varieties of cacti and succulents. I always knew that I wanted to surround myself with these unique and low maintenance plants, so it was just a matter of putting it together. Little did I know I was ahead of the trend! Many of my plants were originally cuttings from family and friends so it's like I'm surrounded by memories of them whenever talk about my garden. It really makes it something special. Almost every plant has a story behind it!





My advice to those starting out is taken from Bob Marley, "Don't worry about a thing. Every little thing is gonna be alright." Talk to other gardeners, we love to talk about our gardens. You might even wish you hadn't asked! We all have our own trial and error stories but that's part of the experience. And much like home repairs, you'll never be "done" and that's actually part of the fun!





Meet Cat Quinn and John Straw of Marion Way Gardeners and Canners Extraordinaire

We both have parents and grandparents who had gardens where we learned to grow food from an early age. We also learned to can food, which we often get to do from our own garden but also a lot when our neighbors have more than they can use and share their bounty with us. Cat regularly makes small and medium to large size batches of jams from neighbors' grapefruit, peach, and fig trees, to stewed tomatoes, pickled green tomatoes, and pesto. We just built two more raised-bed planter boxes, converting more of our grass to garden space. It is fun to build up the soil and put the first plants in to watch them grow. We enjoy growing fruits and vegetables, working outside, being part of creating healthy soil, air, and food, and the community aspect of sharing seeds/seedlings, bounty, and information. Cat is also participating in a local community garden project that turns unused plots in Santa Ana into gardens for community members who otherwise would not be able to afford fresh, organic produce and who bring their own wisdom and history to gardening and plants. Cat is also a canner and loves teaching others to preserve their bounty. In addition to slowly replacing grass with garden boxes, we really enjoy and appreciate having converted the front of our lawn into a succulent garden that rarely needs watering. We were given cuttings from many neighbors and able to create a long space full of beautiful plants.

Our advice to those starting out is to start small, even with a few pots and seedlings from a local nursery. A few herbs and veggie plants go a long way. Also, most succulents are easy to propagate with just a cutting from a neighbor. No need to invest money, just a little time and creativity! Also, approach your neighbors who have gardens and yards you admire and ask them about them. They will most certainly love to share!


































2018 Santa Ana Neighborhood Hero

The power of a few can be the force that starts change. Just last month I sat with Councilman Jose Solorio, former councilwoman Lisa Mills who lives in WFP, and neighborhood association presidents from Floral Park, Jack Fisher Park, and Morrison Park to discuss the increase of homeless people in our neighborhoods. The association presidents called the meeting. Our focus was on how best to maintain the quality of life that our residents love and expect. We face many challenges currently and the uptick in the homeless population is a very big challenge for us.

Statistics from the most recent point in time count taken on March 31, 2018 showed that the homeless population is growing in Santa Ana. Santa Ana is carrying a disproportionate amount of the homeless population and I think everyone knows that.

But is there anything we can do as residents? Of course, there is! Most people agree that a lot of homeless people are living in our creek bed and under the Flower Street Bridge. Jack Fisher Park seems to have more sightings of the homeless. Here is a list of actions that were discussed at this informal meeting with Councilman Solorio.

- Focus SAPD on the creek bed and under the Flower Street bridge. Specifically target the route from Jack Fisher Park to Santiago Park.
- Clear out and clean up the creek bed of dead and overgrown plants and rubbish.
- Keep the graffiti in check, especially under the Flower Street bridge.
- Get more SAPD presence in the creek bed on a consistent basis.
- Enforce anti-camping ordinance.
- Advocate for more policing in the north part of the city.
- Jack Fisher Park will be getting together a committee of homeowners who live on the north side of the creek to see what their thoughts are and what they are willing to do. The north side of the creek bed is where most of the homeless live.
- Walk the creek more often. Have scheduled walks.
- Get businesses, such as the Discovery Science Center, involved in helping with solutions and making the creek bed a more pleasant environment.

We can make a difference. It will be slow but we have to sustain our efforts. With that in mind, I would like to get a West Floral Park coalition together to work on this quality of life issue. If you would like to join, let me know at a.layne@sbcglobal.net. It would be easy if the answers could be found by asking the "magic 8 ball," but they can't. Sitting back and complaining on Nextdoor.com won't accomplish much either. Let's try something. Let's be the force! In the meantime, keep up your email correspondence with our council people, our county supervisors, and Judge Carter. Your voice is important!

Note: I know this is a two-sided issue. This article is not about not helping the homeless find permanent housing. This article is about protecting what we have and about our quality of life. I will continue to advocate for housing, mental health services, and detox services for those in need.








Garden Award Guidelines

- *Water-wise gardening: plants and trees that reduce the need for watering, while preserving the integrity and continuity of the landscapes for which the WFP neighborhood is known.
- *Excellence in home and property maintenance.
- *Overall landscape design, including elements that are original and creative.
- *Garden beds that are neat in appearance, weed-free, mulched, etc.
- *Landscape design that fits the home's architecture.
- *Overall, beautiful curb appeal.



HAPPY HOUR Girls' Night Out

The Happy Hour Girls Take on Fleenor's on 4th by Melinda Jordan-Heathcock

Since Fleenor's has been opened for four weeks, we decided it was high time for the WFP Happy Hour Girls to make a visit. The restaurant is located on the corner of 4th Street and Birch in DTSA, just a couple of doors east of its sister restaurant, Crave. While both restaurants have the same owner, Judy Fleenor, each place has its own unique vibe.

Walking in from the street and passing through an outdoor eating patio, we entered the restaurant first noticing the two beautiful chandeliers on either side of the entry door. The rest of the restaurant has a more modern decor with brick walls, white subway tiles surrounding the bar, and beautifully polished concrete floors. There is a stairway leading to another room upstairs that can be used for large parties or special occasions.

We started off the evening by ordering drinks. The happy hour drink menu is somewhat limited to some select beers and wine, well drinks, and a red wine sangria, with prices at \$5 and \$6. All specialty cocktails are served at regular price. I was happy with the "Judy Sangria." Karen ordered a strawberry daiquiri which she said was "quite delicious" and then followed that with a "San Tanero Jungle Bird" cocktail that contained rum, poblano, pineapple, and lime...also "quite delicious." Donna sipped on a margarita or two, and Charlie enjoyed a refreshing drink called a "La Mentada Roja" of rum, lemon, mint, and red wine.





We all loved our happy hour treats: Spicy Fried Chicken Bites, Poke on Crispy Rice, Tempura Cauliflower, Deviled Eggs, and the Kennebec French Fries. All bites ran from \$3 to \$8 each and we loved them all. The cauliflower, with a harissa and cucumber yogurt sauce, and the spicy chicken were our favorites, just edging out the poke.









We ended our food frenzy by splitting two delicious "Pizookies." One was a giant warm chocolate chip cookie with vanilla ice cream and chocolate sauce, and the other (our favorite) was a "Snookie," a huge, warm, snickerdoodle cookie with vanilla ice cream, caramel sauce, and some crunchy pralines sprinkled on top. Both were very yummy desserts.



The dinner menu includes pasta, salmon, scallops, spicy toasted half chicken, steak frites with New York aged steak, and pork chops with prices ranging from \$17 to \$28. We were told Fleenor's is a farm-to-table restaurant and they plan to change their menu seasonally.







The staff is very friendly and we met both the head bartender, Cameron, who will customize your drink, and the head chef, Linh, who is back in DTSA after previously working at the Crosby. We all give this little restaurant two thumbs up and plan to return again!

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
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
