Case update 12/10/24

Case #: 27-CR-24-20979

On 10/9/25 Hennepin county attorney filled motion to seek aggravated charging this means if case goes to trial at time of sentencing DA can ask judge to seek a charge that is greater than the normal maximum sentencing. The reason this was filled is she meet 2 or more aggravated circumstances in a major economic crime:

- 1. the charge offense is greater then the minimum loss specified
- 2. The charged offense occurred over lengthy period
- 3. The offense involved multiple incidents
- 4. The defendant used her position to facilitate the crime

Emily McMullin had a court date on 12/2/24 at 10am

At 9:16am DA advocate informed me they offered her a plea deal with following details:

The state has an offer for Ms. McMullin

- Plead guilty to the sole count (theft by swindle)
- Probation for 3 years
- 240 days in jail
- 21 months hanging over her head; meaning, while on probation, if she is successful, she will not have to serve the 21 months. If not, probation can violate her and recommend that she serves the 21 months in custody,
- Must complete a pre-sentencing investigation and complete recommendations that they may have.
- pay restitution.

(With the restitution piece, she makes payments to probation and probation cuts a check every quarter. I filled out a restitution form for the Elm Creek PTO if she is ordered to pay at any point.)

• She declined plea deal

On 12/2/24 judge filled a scheduling order. This means the defense must be follow a specific timeline for motions. This ensures no surprises at time of trial.

- all discovery motions must be in by 1/2/25
- All motions to suppress evidence (Rasmussen motions) must be in by 2/2/25 these
