THE PRICE OF BEING A PASTOR By Pastor Rick Newton

We are blessed with having Pastor Steve and Teressa serving us here at FCC! For with them comes a deep abiding love for their flock, a commitment to the Lord Jesus Christ, faithfulness to His Word, as well as commitment to serve Him and His people with compassion.

Being a Pastor list among the four most difficult professions in the United States! In 2 Timothy 2 for example, Paul uses seven different metaphors to describe the rigors of pastoring. He pictures the minister as a "teacher" in verse 2, a "soldier" vs 3&4, an "athlete" in vs 5, a "farmer" in vs6, a "workmen" in vs 15, a "vessel" in vs 20, 21 and a "slave" in vs 24. All such images evoke ideas of sacrifice, labor, service and hardship. They speak eloquently of the complex and varied responsibilities of spiritual leadership. Not one of them make leadership out to be glamorous. Some contemporary church leaders do fancy themselves to be business men, media figures, entertainers, psychologist, even lawyers. Those notions contrast sharply with the description and the symbolism that scripture employs to depict a Pastor. Church family, just know also that, that just scratches the surface because here is a continuing list of what is expected of a Pastor; they must be:

Eloquent Pastor, Example, Father, Husband, Counselor, Confidant, Conference caller, Planner, Minister, Visionary, Director, Mentor, Friend, Reconciliator, Marriage Counselor, Youth Counselor, Leader's trainer, Bible Teacher, Strategist, Intercessor, etc...Besides being: Keeper of the temple, Construction superintendent.

And above all else, a willingness to serve humbly. Remember the word Pastor itself means Shepherd. That's appropriate imagery. A shepherd leads, feeds, nurtures, comforts, corrects and protects his flock! Those are responsibilities that belong to every pastor. So shepherding a spiritual flock is not so simple. It takes more than a passive leader to be a spiritual shepherd! The standards are high, and the requirements are hard to satisfy 1 Tim. 3:1-7. Not everyone can meet the qualifications, and those who do, few seem to excel at the task. Spiritual shepherding demands a godly, gifted, multi-skilled man of integrity, yet he must maintain that humble perspective and demeanor of a shepherd boy. That's the reason the scriptures demand that he be "Spirit filled"." Remember also, the position comes with tremendous responsibilities of leading God's flock, but it also comes with the potential for either great blessings or great judgment. Good leaders are doubly blessed, 1 Timothy 5:17 tell us, and poor leaders are doubly chastened, vs 20. James 3:1 warns "Let not many of you become teachers, my brethren, knowing that as such, we shall incur a stricter judgment."

Don't get me wrong, pastoring has many blessings as well. Those hours spent each week in God's presence, and in the word are a high and holy privilege. Pastoring also embraces all of life's bless-

ings. They share the joy with parents over the birth of a child, as well as the pain of children, over the death of a parent. They help celebrate at a wedding; pastors also offer comfort at a funeral, not to mention all the inevitable unpredictability that accompanies the calling. An incredible adventure also may begin at any given moment. It is at those times that the pastor goes beyond his sermon to stand in the gap for God in the lives of His people.

Pastoring also requires much wisdom...To separate the essential from the tyranny of the urgent. That's not easy. Not everything that clamors for attention is essential! Some of the biggest challenges come though, when trying to separate the real contrast in today's competing ministry models. Do we do traditional versus the contemporary, or do blended services? No matter what, it has to be scriptural compared to unscriptural, not just preferences in styles. That takes much discernment and prayer! As does answering the questions of "how should the church respond to a rapidly changing culture?"... What does God consider relevant?... And then, really, just how concerned is Jesus with the traditional and or the contemporary question? Then after all, what direction does Jesus want for His church in the 21st century? These are all questions a pastor has to wrestle with and then try to explain articulately to his people while staying focused on "moving forward" in the Kingdom of God, for our day. Our relationship with the Bluefield church has been a mixture of cooperation and competition. The April 9, 1936 edition of the *Princeton Observer* reports one such competition and announces the upcoming Easter services. The numbers are impressive.

"Princeton Wins Over Bluefield in Church Contest.

Impressive Easter Service Is Planned For Church Sunday Morning

There were 394 persons present for the mid-week prayer meeting Wednesday night at the Christian church. The highlight of the service was a candle light communion service with the minister of the South Princeton church of Christ, Rev. Rinead Thornton, participating.

The local church is contesting its mid-week attendance with the Christian church in Bluefield.

This week the count was Princeton, 394; Bluefield, 194; Bible school attendance last Sunday morning was Bluefield, 483; Princeton, 482.

The local church of Christ extends a sincere welcome to everyone to attend its Easter Services.

Impressive Easter services are being planned which begin at 6:30 a.m., the most impressive service of the year.

At 9:45 o'clock, a beautiful Easter pageant entitled, "Seven Words From the Cross," will be presented by a group in charge of Mrs. Sarah Evans Charlton. A goal of 600 attendance has been set for the Bible school and the picture which could not be produced last week on account of the weather will be taken this week.
