Administrative Items

Approval of Agenda -

Motion by Loseke, seconded by Moes to approve the meeting agenda as presented. Motion carried unanimously.

Minutes - The Board reviewed the Minutes of the meeting on April 16th, 2020.

Motion by Loseke, seconded by Barth, to approve the April 16th, 2020, Minutes as presented. Motion carried unanimously.

<u>Financial Reports</u> - The Board reviewed the April 2020 Financial Reports.

Project Assistance Request(s)

<u>City of Brandon</u> - Tami Jansma, City Engineer for the City of Brandon, presented a request for District cost-share assistance to support the completion of an engineering assessment (facility plan) for the community's water treatment plant. The community has been experiencing a number of issues pertaining to its drinking water system in the past several years, and this effort is part of their ongoing efforts to address various issues. They have engaged Advanced Engineering & Environmental Services (AE²S) of Sioux Falls to complete the investigation, at a total projected cost of \$59,451.

Kevin Smith, AE²S, briefed the Board on the planned activities. He noted that the resulting engineering assessment will serve as the basis for a request for placement on the South Dakota State Water Plan, and subsequent requests for funding through the State's Drinking Water State Revolving Fund loan program.

Motion by Moes, seconded by Barth to provide a project assistance grant to cover one-third (1/3) of the total costs of the development of the proposed facility plan, up to a cap of \$20,000. Motion carried unanimously.

SD DENR Rotating Basins Big Sioux/Minnesota/Red Rivers Assessments - The Manager presented the final version of the agreement between the District and South Dakota Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) for completion of the Rotating Basins Big Sioux/Minnesota/Red Rivers Assessments. He noted that while the plan had been to start sample collection on May 1st, the COVID-19 pandemic has delayed the process somewhat, with all formal work now scheduled to start on June 1st. The effort will involve twice-monthly water quality sampling at 42 river and stream sites within the Big Sioux River and Minnesota River watersheds during June through September in 2020 and May through September in 2021. All river and stream site sampling will be conducted by District staff. There will also be monthly sampling at a total of 37 lakes during the same period. Most (24) will be sampled by District staff, however some of the sampling will be handled by other stakeholders (Northeast Glacial Lakes Watershed Project, Upper Big Sioux River Watershed Project and the Friends of the Big Sioux) working under the supervision of the District.

The overall projected cost of the effort is \$325,566, with \$220,056 coming from DENR as grants from various sources. The bulk of the funds will be applied to the analytical costs of the water samples collected, equipment purchases and support for sub-contractor services. The balance, \$105,510, will be in-kind contributions of staff time and travel contributed by East Dakota.

Joshua Strobel, DENR Watershed Protection Program, and the manager answered questions about the effort.

Motion by Kassube, seconded by Barth to approve the Rotating Basins Big Sioux/Minnesota/Red Rivers Assessments agreement between the District and DENR, and to authorize the Vice-Chair (Director Loseke) to sign the agreement. Motion carried unanimously.

Whetstone River Re-Diversion/Channel Restoration

Amber Doschadis, Manager for the Upper Minnesota River Watershed District (UMRWD), Ortonville, MN, provided information on efforts to return the flow of the Whetstone River to its natural channel in the vicinity of Big Stone City. In the 1930s, in an effort to maintain the water level in Big Stone Lake, the natural course of the Whetstone River was altered, and it's flow diverted into the lake. She noted that as with many such efforts, what seemed like a good idea at the time didn't necessarily work out that way. In addition to bringing extra water into the lake, which exacerbated flooding during wet years, the diverted flow also carried with it significant sediment and nutrient loads. Big Stone Lake has experienced significant water quality degradation as a result.

UMRWD has been working for a number of years on a plan to return the rivers flow to its natural channel. Nearly a decade ago, an engineering and feasibility study was conducted to consider a return to the original channel. East Dakota was one of several area entities, from both Minnesota and South Dakota, supporting the effort. While this early effort identified a generally accepted plan of action, a lack of landowner cooperation delayed implementation until just recently. UMRWD has re-opened discussion and planning for the planned changes.

Under the current plan, low- to moderate-flows would move down the old (re-opened?) river channel, joining the Minnesota River about 2 miles south of Ortonville. At higher flow rates, a portion of the

water would still move into the lake, but at rates that UMRWD believes can be better managed to the benefit of the lake.

As the changes to the river straddle the South Dakota/Minnesota border, funding for the changes will need to be raised in both states. Grants from the State of Minnesota are covering expenses at this time, but UMRWD staff and their engineers have started reaching out to state and local governments in South Dakota. The Manager indicated that he would be part of these discussions as necessary, and would keep the Board notified as things develop.

Adjournment

There being no further District business or issues for consideration, Chairman Anderson declared the meeting adjourned at 10:40 a.m.
